Free

Many voices at Community Forum



A community forum at Baringhup Hall on Wednesday 26 March attracted close to 50 attendees, many with comments and questions about the State Government's proposed Emergency Services and Volunteer Fund (ESVF). Arranged and hosted by local campaigner Brian Fitzgerald, the forum featured representatives from local and state government plus the Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF).

Background

The Government announced in December 2024 that from 1 July 2025, the Fire Services Property Levy would be replaced by the new ESVF. The Bill to formally introduce the ESVF into law has passed the lower house of the Victorian Parliament and had its second reading in the upper house on Thursday 20 March. Member for Bendigo Maree Edwards MP pointed out that as the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly (the lower house), she does not participate in debate and so was accompanied at the forum by fellow Labor MP, Member for Ripon Martha Haylett, to hear feedback from the community about the Bill. Nationals Member of the Victorian Legislative Council Gaelle Broad, who represents the Northern Victoria Region in the upper house, Senior Policy Advisor Glen Hepburn from the VFF and Deputy Mayor of Mount Alexander Shire Council Toby Heydon all spoke against the current form of the proposed ESVF.

"We all agree to fund the emergency services," said Mr Fitzgerald in his introduction. "It's just a matter of how we do it."

Ms Edwards explained that the ESVF had been introduced as a result of a campaign by the State Emergency Services (SES) for financial support in the wake of the 2020 Bushfires Royal Commission (Royal Commission into National Natural Disaster Arrangements). She said that while the ESVF Bill had already been debated in the upper house of parliament, there was the potential for it to return to the lower house for further debate if amendments are required. Ms Haylett said: "I'm getting a lot of feedback that there's never been more pressure on our emergency services than now. We wanted to back them a bit more."

Criticisms

Ms Broad said: "The CFA and SES are in need of additional resources, I absolutely agree. But I think the big question that comes in is the priorities of the government when it comes to that. Another new tax is very concerning." She went on to say the services that the ESVF would fund according to the Bill, including Triple Zero, Emergency Management Victoria and Fire Rescue Victoria should be funded by the Victorian Government. "These are core services of government," she said, pointing out that "...every dollar that goes to Spring Street is not spent in our local communities." Ms Broad stated bluntly about the Nationals' position: "We oppose this levy."

Deputy Mayor Heydon advised the meeting that Council had taken steps about the issue (see the *TT* of Friday 28 March for coverage). "This has been a topic of significant concern for us. We've very clearly expressed our concern to the government," he said. "Our principal concern is the impact on farmers around the shire, particularly with the other pressures on primary producers." Mr Heydon also spoke about the "reputational risk" of Council being required to collect the new levy, given that council itself is restricted by a rate cap that prevents rate increases.

The VFF representative, Mr Hepburn, expressed worry about the impact of the increased cost to farmers, who would be affected by the land-value indexing of the levy. He said the average increase for farmers would be 109% and questioned the different costs for primary producers versus residential land owners: "One of the things we're asking is what's behind the rationale of the difference?" He pointed out that the levy represented an extra business cost that farmers would need to absorb or pass on, saying it is difficult for farmers to

pass on expenses. "Costs change and you can adapt," he said. "But this was a surprise and it was announced in December with no consultation." Ms Edwards objected, saying: "There was definitely consultation, especially with the SES."

Community comments

Numerous attendees addressed the panel and some key themes emerged. Some questioned why the levy could not apply as a flat rate to make it equal for farms and residential properties, others asked for transparency about where the funds would be spent. It was pointed out that there is already pressure on farmers and their families that has significant impact on mental health. Some queried the proposed levy exemptions or rebates for emergency service volunteers, wondering how these would be applied and what conditions would apply. Farmers pointed out that climate change increases the need for emergency services but also makes their income more erratic and that during some years they incur a negative income while the levy would still apply. In general attendees were critical about the perceived lack of fairness, consultation and clarity about the implementation of the ESVF.

Forum organiser Mr Fitzgerald intends to circulate further information and questions about the ESVF and said he will prepare an open letter from the community to the State Government, to be signed by local farmers. He concluded at the meeting by saying to Ms Haylett, Ms Edwards and Ms Broad: "We expect you three to go back to Spring Street and work out how to fund emergency services. Come up with something that's not going to hurt like this will."

Council cans broiler application

GOLDFIELDS Shire Council voted unanimously at its meeting on Wednesday 26 March to reject an application for a broiler farm on the Moolort Plains. The motion was carried to refuse the permit (subject to conditions) and issue a notice to refuse a permit for a Farm Cluster broiler farm for up to 445,000 birds and two caretaker houses at Clarkes Road, Moolort and 141 Clarkes Road, Strathlea.

Councillor Gerard Murphy, who made the motion to reject the application, acknowledged the history of broiler farm applications in the area, including a 2017 VCAT decision. "Sometimes enough is enough and we must move on," Councillor Murphy said.

Councillor Ben Green said: "It is a balancing act." He spoke about the various considerations, including the history, employment opportunities plus the social, economic and environmental impacts. He said he was moved by the objectors and "their sincerity and country honesty".

Mayor Grace La Vella said she understood the appeal of the Moolort Plains for big corporations looking to develop "huge enterprises" due to the ideal location, climate and cost. However, she said that the Council had been elected to represent the people. "We have listened to the community, understanding the distress they are enduring through a compromised amenity. A community tense and fearful of health issues, anxiety and diminished quality of life," she said. "The broiler farms' own code admits the dust particles that are dispersed." Councillor La Vella proceeded to list the sources of dust, including feather particles, skin cells, litter, mould and faeces. She concluded by stating: "We have a passionate,

close community who flourish and love living in the ideal location, in or adjacent to the Moolort Plains. Not because it is cheap, not because they want to generate business and satisfy shareholder pockets but because they choose to live in this locality to enjoy and maintain the quality of life and rightfully so."

The applicant, ProTen, has been approached for comment.

Bite size news and opportunities

Visit Newstead Solar Farm

Bendigo region in the budget

The Federal Government Budget, which was announced on Tuesday 25 March, included an \$800,000 funding boost for the Golden Dragon Museum Redevelopment Detailed Design and Planning Stage. The redevelopment of the site into a fit-for-purpose museum of national significance is focused on protecting, nurturing and celebrating the Chinese heritage of Bendigo and Australia. The government also announced that, in partnership with the



Victorian State Government, \$300 million will go to the construction of a new interchange between the Calder Freeway and Calder Park Drive, Calder Park, saying that it will improve access on and off the Calder Freeway, the main access route onto the Calder Freeway and to Macedon Ranges, Mount Alexander and Greater Bendigo communities.

Some smoke expected

With calm autumn conditions across much of the state, communities can expect to see smoke in the air as a mix of planned burns, private burns under CFA's permit system and agricultural burns take place over the coming weeks. Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) Chief Fire Officer Chris Hardman said it is crucial fire agencies take advantage of favourable conditions when they present. "Planned burning on public land is one of the tools FFMVic uses to keep Victoria safer from bushfires," Mr Hardman said. "We work closely with Country Fire Authority (CFA), Environment Protection Authority (EPA) and Bureau of Meteorology to keep the smoke impact from planned burns as low as possible. We make every effort to make sure favourable weather conditions reduce smoke drift into communities. The Planned Burns Victoria website has details of all planned burns currently on the three-year Joint Fuel Management Program, visit **plannedburns**. **ffm.vic.gov.au**. Showcasing a great survival rate

Ambulance Victoria has released its 2023/24 Victorian Ambulance Cardiac Arrest Registry (VACAR) Annual Report, showcasing groundbreaking advancements in cardiac arrest response and survival rates across the state. This year's report highlights the significant impact of early intervention, with bystander cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) administered in 79 per cent of witnessed cases and 141 cases receiving a shock from a public Automated External Defibrillator (AED) — the highest number on record. As a result of these interventions, and the dedication of paramedics and first responders, 422 cardiac arrest patients were discharged from hospital, with 84 per cent returning home to their families. Ambulance Victoria's Director Research and Evaluation Dr. Ziad Nehme said: "These improvements in survival are not by chance — they reflect the unwavering dedication of our paramedics and first responders, the responsiveness of the community, and the targeted initiatives that have strengthened the Chain of Survival."

Council advocates for affordable rentals



Mount Alexander Shire Council is advocating for federal funding to deliver a new 22 apartment development in Templeton Street, Castlemaine ahead of the upcoming federal election.

The project will deliver affordable rental apartments on Council land at 65 Templeton Street Castlemaine. Apartments will be a mix of one and two-bedrooms, a household type that is currently lacking locally. In 2023, Mount Alexander Shire Councillors unanimously agreed to go ahead with the project, in partnership with local community housing provider Haven Home Safe.

Since then, Haven Home Safe and Council have been seeking funding for the apartment development.

Community groups and projects receive funding

The latest round of Mount Alexander Shire Council's Community Grants program has been announced, with 17 community groups to share in almost \$50,000 to deliver projects that foster connection and community. Maldon Museum & Archives Association who received \$2,1000 for recording and storing digitised records, Maldon Golf Club who were granted \$3,000 for outdoor furniture and South Muckleford Hall & Recreation Reserve Committee who received \$3,000 for an equipment upgrade.

Drive safely close to home

Transport Accident Commission (TAC) analysis of road fatalities from 2020 to 2024 shows that more than 70% of people killed on country roads died within a 30km radius of their home address. The research follows a tragic start to the year on Victoria's roads, with 74 lives lost compared with 75 at the same time last year. January this year was the deadliest month on Victoria's roads since March 2008, and the worst start to a year since 2001. The findings have prompted the TAC to remind drivers to slow down on low-volume, highspeed country roads, come to a complete stop at intersections and ensure they are distraction free - even on roads they know like the 'back of their hand'.



Democracy, Sausage

HOOK up the gas bottles and fire up the burners; the election has been called and Australia will go to the polls on Saturday 3 May to vote for the next federal government. The Tarrangower Times will continue the silly metaphor and commentate on the process without mincing words, but what is the role of media in an election?

The tongs of transparency

The TT believes that mass media, the traditional kind, can direct you towards the sausage sizzle but shouldn't influence your choice of polling booth snack. (Note that not all media outlets and publications agree). The TT intends to provide profile and policy information about the local candidates and will keep a tally to ensure fair coverage during the campaign.

Social media behaves quite differently, however and the amount and type of information available to voters has hugely increased since the last federal election, with both positive and negative consequences. Many social media platforms do not moderate or remove false claims or incomplete data, making it difficult to know who to trust. On the other hand, social media makes it easier and cheaper for candidates to broadcast their own campaign messages. It's like they're holding the tongs and you don't have to wait for someone to pass along a second-hand snag.

Authorisation and sauce

The law requires that electoral information designed to influence voters is 'authorised'; this means that the information must be accompanied by a statement to clearly state the source of the communication. Enforced by the Australian Electoral Commission (AEC), these rules mean that posters, fridge magnets, corflute signs, billboards and



printed advertisements - for example must all feature a prominent message of authorisation. Depending upon the type of communication, the authorisation must indicate which person or entity authorised the communication, along with an address or location. Size, placement and design guidelines apply to authorisations to ensure clarity, just as tomato sauce should never be offered in a yellow bottle or mustard in a red one.

Be a savvy saveloy

In light of all this, the role of the media in an election is to be your information tool, but it is up to you to use it wisely. Be aware of the filter bubbles and echo chambers that you inhabit when using social media; they might be reinforcing your own biases but not be accurate with their information. Be aware of who owns the media that you consume; do your values align with a squillionaire or a dominant lobby group pushing a printed agenda? Don't be a silly sausage taking everything at face value; use reliable sources, confirm the authorisation, check facts, seek additional points of view. It's painful to say it but: definitely don't believe everything you read, even if you read it in the TT.

Survey reveals farm sector mood

A Rural Confidence Survey by Rabobank, an agribusiness bank, has found that despite a very dry summer, Victoria's "rural confidence" is at a 12-month high, driven by expectations of good seasonal conditions, positive commodity prices and global markets/economies.

The bank says that a quarter of Victorian farmers surveyed now expect agricultural economic conditions to improve over the coming year (up from 19 per cent last quarter), while the proportion expecting agribusiness conditions to worsen also fell back - to 20 per cent, from 28 per cent last quarter. A further 48 per cent expect similar conditions to the past 12 months.

The survey found confidence rallied among Victorian beef producers, with cattle farmers the most positive about their prospects in the state - 35 per cent expecting conditions to improve (up from 11 per cent), while a further 48 per cent (was 59 per cent) forecasting similar conditions to last year. Confidence also lifted in dairy, with 29 per cent of the state's dairy farmers expecting farm business conditions to improve - up from 16 per cent last quarter. Confidence increased slightly in the state's grain sector, while it fell back among sheep producers.

In line with rising confidence levels, the latest survey found investment appetite increased among the state's farmers, with 24 per cent of those surveyed looking to invest more in their farm business in the year ahead, up considerably from 14 per cent with that intention in the previous quarter. Meanwhile, it found that just 13 per cent are intending to and a further 63 per cent (67 per cent previously) are planning to maintain investment at current levels. Victorian grain growers hold the strongest investment intentions, with 32 per cent looking to increase spending over the year ahead. Investment appetite was though tempered among the state's sheep producers, with just 13 per cent intending to increase their investment.

Across the state, investment priorities for farmers were shown to be on-farm infrastructure (including fences, silos, yards etc) for 67 per cent, adopting new technologies (37 per cent) and new plant/machinery (33 per cent).

The survey found 15 per cent of Victorian respondents are looking at property acquisition in the coming year (up from nine per cent last wind back investment (16 per cent last quarter) quarter), with the highest interest among grain and dairy producers, at 22 per cent.

Those expecting gross farm incomes to increase rose to 31 per cent (up from 17 per cent last quarter), while a 22 per cent expect a weaker financial result (down from 36 per cent previously). A further 45 per cent expect incomes to remain similar to last year.

A comprehensive monitor of outlook and sentiment in Australian rural industries, the Rabobank Rural Confidence Survey questions an average of 1,000 primary producers across a wide range of commodities and geographical areas throughout Australia on a quarterly basis. Maldon's Empty Shops

I want to write something about Maldon that worries and upsets me.

My husband and I came to Maldon about 40 years ago. We loved everything about it. It grabbed both of us — as it does to so many who come here. I was so taken with the place that I purchased a tearoom after sitting for two days, just watching people walking the streets of Maldon.

It took me a little while to get into a routine that worked. One Monday, I found a bus full of people waiting for me to open, and I felt awful — so from then on, I opened seven days a week. Some days, like Tuesdays, were quiet, but it became known that there was always somewhere to eat in Maldon.

I even wrote to every bus line in South Australia and NSW to let them know we were open every day.

We ran the Cumquat Tree Tearooms for 16 very busy and successful years. Back then, Maldon had so much to offer visitors — and it kept drawing people back, time and again.

One Easter, we served around 3,500 people over Saturday, Sunday, and Monday — all with my own cooking. I want to stress how important it is to cater to what people come to Maldon for.

When we bought the tearooms, it seated 16 people. We added a mezzanine and brought the capacity up to 85 to meet the demand.

At that time, people would complain there were no beds in Maldon. There were only four — including the Lace Shop and the Grand Hotel. So we purchased Palm House to offer Bed and Breakfast accommodation — and it was very successful.

What I'm saying is: when there is a need, we should try to meet it.

Now that Berryman's has closed, I hope it might reopen as a tearoom. I've been in business all my life — I was born into a shop.

In the past, zoning meant that if a certain type of business already existed in an area, another of the same type wasn't allowed which gave shops a real chance to thrive. Now, many of Maldon's shops are gone: antiques, repairs, tearooms, clothing.

Visitors today are greeted by closed windows, curtains, or blinds — signs that the building is now a private residence, not a shop offering goods or heritage items like we once did.

We used to have a grocery store that became a multi-stall antique centre — a big draw for visitors. Within that shop, one storekeeper did repairs, and the other sold antiques as-is. One of them even took the shop where the bikes are now repaired. It was a very welcome and busy store, right up until the owner passed away.

These days, even the shops that open from Wednesday onward seem to be dwindling.

I overheard a visitor on a Tuesday say, "There's nothing to eat here." He hadn't walked far enough to find the two cafés that were open then — but now, it's even worse.

We still have the lovely Rose shop near the takeaway, and up the top of the street, just two left: Café Maldon and the Gold Exchange.

When the Easter Fair is on — what's going to happen? People will be hungry. A lucky few might get into one of the three food outlets we have left, but others may just leave without taking the time to explore the rest of what Maldon has to offer.

What truly upsets me are the closed doors and covered windows — a sign of what we've lost.

Going nuclear

Have you ever heard nuclear energy advocates claim that all the used nuclear fuel from a person's lifetime electricity use could fit in a soda can?

Consider the cumulative waste, especially over the years, when applied to countries with large populations. That would amount to a lot of soda cans!

Orano states that France produces 2 kg of radioactive waste per inhabitant annually. 1.8 kg is 'short-lived' radioactive waste, which will have radioactivity comparable to natural levels after 300 years. 200 grams is 'long-lived' waste, remaining radioactive for tens of thousands of years. Around 67% of France's electricity comes from nuclear energy.

Radioactive waste is typically classified as either low-level (LLW), intermediate-level (ILW), or high-level (HLW), dependent, primarily, on its level of radioactivity.

A major concern with high-level nuclear waste is its long-term radioactivity, lasting for thousands of years.

Considering our relatively short lifespans compared to the decay time of this waste, it's crucial to address the long-term impact on future generations if nuclear power were to be adopted in Australia.

What legacy do we want to leave for future generations? Will we be remembered as the generation that prioritised 'cheaper' electricity, placing our trust in those who promote or profit from this energy source, without fully considering the long-term consequences of its waste?

I understand and feel the current financial pressures, but some decisions demand a broader perspective than mere monetary considerations.

As the Federal Election approaches, it's essential to learn from countries with well-established nuclear programs and critically examine some key questions. Who exactly is advocating for nuclear energy, and what are their motivations? Who stands to gain financially from nuclear power? And, importantly, are there safer alternatives available?

Why has Peter Dutton indicated a push to fast-track mining and energy projects, including high-emissions gas and coal?

One Nation claims to want a level playing field for all energy technologies. In January of this year Pauline Hanson (One Nation leader) was spotted in Thailand with Gina Rinehart. I want to know why? And if this has anything to do with One Nations stance on renewables?

The Nationals express doubt that renewable energy can do it alone. Why?

Tasmania is one of the few places in the world that is 100% self-sufficient in renewable electricity generation. Having been net zero six times in the last seven years, Tasmania aims to double its capacity to 200% by 2040.

December 2024, Deputy Premier Treasurer Guy Barnett and Minister for Energy and Renewables Nick Duigan (both Liberal) confirmed that Tasmania has the lowest electricity prices in the nation for households and small businesses.

Who makes money from coal, gas and Uranium (Uranium primarily used as fuel for nuclear reactors to generate electricity)?

BHP, Rio Tinto, and Hancock Prospecting are among the companies that profit from either gas, uranium, or coal.

Can nuclear waste be recycled? France recycles 96% of its nuclear waste. The remaining 4% takes thousands of years to break down. Interestingly, only 10% of the electricity produced by nuclear power in France is powered by recycled waste.



Andra is currently building a geological disposal facility for the long-term storage of intermediate to high-level nuclear waste, which has seen many protests.

I can understand the protests. Imagine if someone suggested storing nuclear waste 500 metres under Maldon?

What about the nuclear waste that's already been produced worldwide?

As of August 2024, the W.N.A stated that there are 400,000 tonnes of used fuel discharged from reactors worldwide, with only one-third having been reprocessed.

This may be attributed to the U.S. not recycling its nuclear waste. Since the 1950s, approximately 86,000 metric tons of spent nuclear fuel have been produced from commercial reactors, with an additional 2,000 metric tons generated each year.

In 2021, it was disclosed that the U.S. government paid reactor owners about \$9 billion because of its failure to fulfil disposal commitments

Reflecting on the information presented by associations that advocate for nuclear energy, it seems they might be downplaying certain aspects of nuclear waste, as well as the complexities and costs associated with its recycling and storage.

My partner and I run an electrical and solar company; we wouldn't sell anything we didn't believe in. While we're passionate about what we do, we also understand that it's not everyone's cup of tea.

My hopes are for a battery storage rebate. I believe this would make solar PV systems with battery storage more accessible to everyday taxpayers by bridging the financial gap.

Free energy generated by a solar PV system paired with battery storage offers a superior and sustainable alternative to nuclear energy.

Australia has the potential to lead in renewable energy rather than relying on nuclear energy. We don't need to catch up with other countries who are still chasing their 1950s nuclear nightmares.

Perhaps other countries could benefit from our progress. Currently, 39.4% of our electricity comes from renewables, with Tasmania being 100% self-sufficient.

This is just my perspective. You have the freedom to choose- remember you don't have to embrace renewable energy, nor do you have to compromise by choosing nuclear energy. The power is yours! *Tash*

A Reconstructed Landscape

GEOFF Hocking will be exhibiting a selection of his landscape paintings in the MANet Art Gallery from Friday 4 April until Friday 9 May. The Exhibition will be opened on Sunday 6 April at 2 pm. The exhibition 'A Reconstructed Landscape', features new work in which Geoff imagines a landscape being rebuilt after the devastation and ravages of the gold rush. The impact of which can still be seen although 150 years have passed.

After a torturous drive on the unsealed back roads of Castlemaine, I finally found his studio up among the gum trees with a lot of phone help from Geoff. His studio is packed with a cornucopia of his life's work, including paintings, drawings, and books from every era.

Geoff trained at Bendigo School of Mines (now Bendigo TAFE) in what was then called advertising art, and is now Graphic Design. He then took up a studentship at Toorak Technical Teachers' College which obliged him to spend three years teaching in country schools including Shepparton Tech School, and finally Wangaratta Tech School.

Geoff worked in the studio of World Record Club for two years from 1966 to 1967. Like many other young WRC designers, it was his first job after training in painting at the Central School of Art in London.

He is an author, artist, illustrator, and designer, who has written extensively on goldfields history and Australian social history in general. He began to work in publishing in Britain in the 1970s, specialising in children's educational books. His first published illustrations were for children's records.

Geoff generously gave me a copy of a book he researched meticulously and wrote titled *Its Another World Record – Album Cover Art.* Browsing through it, to my delight I found many covers of WRC records which I had bought when I first discovered classical music way back in the early sixties. Many of which were designed by Geoff.

After looking around his studio I am very tempted to call him an artistic polymath: often called a Renaissance person. He has expertise and knowledge across multiple and diverse fields of the arts, and his writing demonstrates a broad intellectual curiosity and the ability to connect seemingly unrelated disciplines, while weaving stories in books and narrative paintings.

I could go on about the number of books he has written, including his latest book of sketches and paintings around

Castlemaine and district titled *In Brick, Stone & Wood*, available at Stoneman's. It is a limited edition book which offers a wonderful retrospective of his life's work and the history of our region.

However, I should discuss the art work you will see in the MANet Gallery from tomorrow. His paintings in oil on linen are quite stylised, almost abstract. He calls his style narrative, as each painting tells a story. They are true to his story telling background having written so many books which reflect his strong interest in publishing, combining design, writing and picture research.

When you study *Timbered Hill, Paddocks* and *The Tunnel*, you can see the influence of his graphic design background, combined with subtle use of colour, and unifying shapes to create balanced compositions.

Natural Newstead

A meal for a shrike-tit

The bush certainly comes to life at this time of year, especially after just a little rain.

As I 'camped' beside a bush pool at the Rise and Shine earlier in the week I couldn't fail to notice the winged ants gathering around my feet, presumably from the several ant nests nearby. About to take off on their nuptial flight there must have easily been a hundred alates (In entomology, 'alate' usually refers to the winged form of a social insect - *Ed*.) per square metre.

Suddenly a **Crested Shrike-tit** arrived in the sapling above the pool. I presumed it was coming in for a drink along with the various indulgent honeyeaters already present. I was wrong – it descended to the ground and proceeded to snare a winged ant before returning to its perch to quickly dismember the victim.

Crested Shrike-tits are insectivores and are often seen (and heard) as they tear away bark from tree branches in search of prey concealed beneath. It is unusual to see one feeding on the ground but they are an adaptable bird.

New Chapter at Panacea Estate: Welcome to the Journey



AS summer gives way to the softer golden tones of early autumn here in regional Victoria, there's a feeling in the air—a gentle shift that says something new is beginning. And it is.

Welcome to the first of what will be a weekly series from right here at Panacea Estate—a small, family-owned winery nestled among rolling hills, historic goldfields, and endless blue skies. This series is for anyone who's ever swirled a glass and wondered about the story behind the wine. It's also for those who, like me, find joy in working close to the land, watching the seasons pass through vines and barrels, and sharing the fruits of that labour with good people. When we started Panacea Estate, we weren't just growing grapes, making wine or planting vines—we were creating a place. A place to relax, connect, and breathe. A place where the simple pleasure of a glass of wine can become something more: a conversation, a memory, a moment. Something that can be a panacea for many of today's problems.

As the winemaker, vineyard hand, groundskeeper, cleaner, and occasional sheep wrangler, I've learned that no two days are ever the same. Some days are muddy and slow. Others are full of sun, movement, and the faint smell of fermenting grapes on the breeze. This series is my chance to bring you along—through pruning season and bottling days, weekend weddings, and early morning vineyard walks.

What to expect, each week, I'll be sharing:

- Seasonal updates from the vineyard and winery (yes, even the messy bits)
- **Insights** into the winemaking process demystifying the craft without talking down to anyone and also areas that I am learning about and want to share with people
- Food pairings, local events, and tips for enjoying wine (without needing to be an expert)

• **Personal stories** from here at the property—triumphs, mistakes, and everything in between

Right now, at Panacea, we're watching the vines ease into their post-vintage rest. The fruit has been picked, the fermenters are quieting, and the soil is breathing again. It's one of those beautiful in-between moments that many people miss—but for those of us living it, it's a time for reflection and planning.

There's pruning on the horizon, new wine to check, barrels to top, and of course, the never-ending job of keeping the grass in check between the rows. But for today, it's enough to share this with you—and to say thanks for being here at the start.

DID you know that there is such a thing as a bum breathing Turtle? It's actually called the white-throated snapping turtle and its scientific name is *Elseya albagula* but those names are much less catchy and intriguing. Either way the bum breathing turtles are critically endangered, so clever researchers in the Burnett Mary Region of Queensland (up near Bundaberg and Hervey Bay) have partnered with traditional owners to try innovative approaches to protecting them.

More about the project shortly because I know you are wondering: how does a turtle breath through its bum? It all happens with the turtle's cloaca, a rude-sounding name for a body part that turtles (plus other reptiles, amphibians and birds) use to both pass waste and reproduce; the cloaca is located under the tail. These turtles have gills in their cloaca! It means they can remain underwater for up to 21 days at a time, genius.

If you thought white-throated snapping turtles were cool, you should also see their Queensland colleagues known as the Mary River Turtle (*Elusor macrurus*) or, much cooler: the punk turtle. They also breathe through their bums but not for such long stretches of time. They are distinguished and named for the algae that grows out of their heads (please do an internet image search, it will make your day). These punks are also critically endangered and in need of protection.

A collaboration between Burnett Mary Regional Group, Taribelang Aboriginal Corporation, WYLD Indigenous Projects and the Kabi Kabi People's Aboriginal Corporation is using the humble technology of the common, backyard sprinkler to help these freshwater bum breathers and punks to survive through nesting and hatching, improving their chances of avoiding extinction. These turtles nest in response to rainfall; it provides a visual stimulant and the moisture needed to dig nests into the riverbank. With no rain, there is no nesting, no eggs, and consequently, no new turtles added to already struggling populations. So the sprinklers are used to mimic a rain shower while mum plops her eggs in the sand.

Nearby agriculture in recent years has changed the soil and vegetation by the river and driven predators closer to the water, so nest protection and relocation by researchers and Indigenous rangers supports the next generation of bum breathers.

Trials have since commenced in the lower Burnett River to integrate cultural knowledge and management into modern conservation efforts. Obviously any attempt to protect these brilliant turtles is a good thing but this project offers a great model for how things can be achieved through collaboration.

BLAST FROM THE PAST



George McArthur abroad

IN February 1886 George McArthur sailed for New Zealand aboard the SS Manipouri. He had sold his interest in the family's local bakery to his brother Alexander and set out on his second journey around the world. In the 1860s as a young man George went to sea and worked his passage around Cape Horn to England. On his second trip he sent regular letters home that were published in the *Tarrangower Times* under the pen name 'Rambler'.

George landed in New Zealand at Bluff and travelled by train from Invercargill to Kingston on Lake Wakitipu. He noted that, as in Australia, rabbits were in plague proportions and the country was suffering from a severe drought. Travelling across Wakitipu to Queenstown, George was awestruck by the beauty of the scenery. He also visited most of New Zealand's major centres. In Rotorua Maoris guided him through the geothermal attractions including the Pink and White Terraces, which were destroyed a few months later when Mount Tarawera erupted.

After he reached Auckland, George sailed across the Pacific, via Honolulu, to San Francisco. On landing his first priority was to visit the Yosemite Valley. To reach it he had to travel by rail making one change at the town of Berenda. Unfortunately George left the first train at the station before Berenda and had to walk 10 miles down the tracks in the dark. When he found himself on a trestle bridge high above the Fresno River he realised that a freight train was fast approaching behind him. Clutching his bags George sprinted across the bridge reaching the other side just before the train whizzed by.

George spent the night sleeping rough in Berenda, before a three-day journey by train and stagecoach into Yosemite. After negotiating 50 miles of narrow, rough and winding roads, he and his fellow passengers where 'speechless with astonishment' when they got their first view of the Valley from Inspiration Point. George saw Yosemite under ideal conditions with the mountains covered with snow, waterfalls in full flow and the ground covered in wildflowers.

George continued across the continent by train visiting gold mines in Nevada and the huge stockyards, slaughterhouses and meat processing plants of Chicago. He also visited Niagara Falls before arriving in New York where he saw Shakespearean actress Mary Anderson perform, heard the famed abolitionist Henry Ward Beecher preach and spent a Sunday afternoon at Coney Island.

George sent his last letters home from London in October 1886. He returned back to Australia through Europe, the Middle East and Sri Lanka. Although not recorded in his letters, throughout his journey George was adding to his large collections of rare books, coins and curios. His books are now housed at the University of Melbourne and his coins and medallions at the Melbourne Museum.

Library news



World Health Day

THIS week we are focusing on the Health and Wellbeing section of the library, to celebrate World Health Day (7 April). Given that locals seem to be a fairly healthy bunch, people are still interested in their health and wellbeing and are keen to live healthier lives, both mentally and physically. So here are some library books that may be of interest. However, please take these recommendations with the caveat: if unwell, always consult a health professional, no matter how tempting it is to ask Doctor Google.

Let's start with Dr Norman Swan, well known as the producer and presenter of the ABC radio program The Health Report and the podcasts Coronacast and What's That Rash? In his 2021 book So You Think You Know What's Good For You? common myths and misconceptions are put under the spotlight, to be replaced by facts. It is full of good advice, offered in a no-nonsense way. It is, unsurprising given the author's medical and broadcasting backgrounds, also entertaining and very readable.

Health: Spirit, Country and Culture is the latest in the First *Knowledges* series, written by three well-credentialled women: Shawana Andrews, Sandra Eades and Fiona Stanley. For those of you who are new to this series, First Knowledges offers an introduction to Indigenous knowledges in vital areas and their application to the present day and the future. Health delves into birthing, end-of-life care and other Indigenous cultural rituals. Good health occurred naturally because lifestyle and diet were connected to Country and culture.

The Body in Action: You Can Keep Your Joints Young by physiotherapist Sarah Keyes is now in its 10th edition, suggesting a lot of people have found her advice of value. Using easy to follow, illustrated exercises the book outlines how you can keep your skeleton young with a series of stretches designed to combat stiffness and alleviate pain. As arthritis is a common

feature of advancing age, this might be the book for many of us.

The Two-Day Diet by Dr Michelle Harvie and Professor Tony Howell - how could you resist a book with a title like that! What makes it even better is the scientific credentials of the authors: Harvie is a research dietician and Howell is a medical oncologist, and their area of research is prevention of breast cancer. This book is about how to do the 5:2 diet and why it is beneficial. All you need to do is follow the low-carb, low-sugar plan for two days a week, then for the rest of the week eat normally (but sensibly). Sound tempting? Clinical trial suggest it actually works.

And lastly, a different book about health that celebrates a local hero. Gweneth Wisewould: Outpost Doctor (first published in 1993 but reprinted in 2016) is the biography of 'Dr Gwen' of Trentham. Born in 1884 into a wealthy Melbourne family, Dr Wisewould gave up a successful and lucrative practice as a surgeon in Melbourne to move to the then remote district of Trentham and stayed there as GP from 1938 until her death in 1972. Dr Gwen challenging social norms: she wore men's clothing, had 'bohemian ideas' and rode a motor bike. The author, Ian Braybrook, for many years a radio broadcaster in Central Victoria, credits her with saving his life as a young child in a poverty-stricken family, treating him and his family without charge. This book can be found in the library's Autobiography, Biography and Memoir collection.

Reviews

Strong Women and Men Beat Arthritis by Miriam E Nelson, 2002

The New York Times bestselling author of Strong Women Eat Well and fellow Tufts University scientists present a simple plan that has been proven to reduce the pain and immobility caused by arthritis. Strong Women and Men Beat Arthritis shows the direct connection between a strength-training program you can do at home and the reduction and even prevention of arthritis symptoms. No other research study using an exercise program has ever showed the results that the Tufts study did: a 43% reduction in pain, a 44% improvement in physical function and a 71% improvement in strength. This book offers all the tools you need and an exercise program designed specifically to protect the joints and relieve stiffness and soreness.

Natural Causes: An Epidemic of Wellness, the Certainty of Dving, and Killing Ourselves to Live Longer by Barbara Ehrenreich, 2018

A razor-sharp polemic which offers an entirely new understanding of our bodies, ourselves and our place in the universe, Natural Causes describes how we over-prepare and worry way too much about what is inevitable. One by one, Ehrenreich topples the shibboleths that guide our attempts to live a long, healthy life from the importance of preventive medical screenings to the concepts of wellness and mindfulness, from dietary fads to fitness culture.

But Natural Causes goes deeper into the fundamental unreliability of our bodies and even our 'mind-bodies', to use the fashionable term. Starting with the mysterious and seldom-acknowledged tendency of our own immune cells to promote deadly cancers, Ehrenreich looks into the cellular basis of aging and shows how little control we actually have over it. We tend to believe we have agency over our bodies, our minds and even over the manner of our deaths. But the latest science shows that the microscopic subunits of our bodies make their own 'decisions', and not always in our favour.

A pie is just a vehicle, isn't it, or a parcel for carrying a meal that happens to also be part of the meal. When it comes to vegetable-packed options for these mobile meals, there often aren't many. Luckily we have Maldon Bakery where veggie lovers are spoilt for choice, but during April the bakery wants hungry people to focus on its Curried Lentil and Vegetable Pie. Don't mind if we do!

This particular pie, with its signature orange stripe, is packed with puy (green) lentils, potatoes and other vegetables infused with a satisfyingly spice; tangy not hot. It's reminiscent of dhal but slightly drier to maintain the crispiness of the pastry parcel. (The TT has styled it on a plate but it usually comes perfectly fresh in a paper bag so you can continue on your way, happily munching).

Why all the fuss about a fantastic veggie lunch option? The lentil pie is Maldon Bakery's entry into the Edgy Veg Awards, a promotion to get everyone eating more vegetables and enjoying the offerings of eateries across the region. Try the nominated dishes, score them on the Edgy Veg website and everyone wins.* Visit: edgyvegawards.com.au.

SPOTTED in Maldon on Saturday 29 March: this gloriously coloured Model-T Ford, on its way to participate in the Florence Thomson Tour, which celebrates "the pioneering spirit and contribution of women to Australian motoring."

It's a tour for female drivers in classic cars; this one was driven by Louise Kilgour who has been driving it for less than a year. Pointing to the vehicle's gear-pedal and the hand-operated accelerator stick, Louise said: "It's completely different and you almost have to retrain your brain." She points to her dad, Brian Smith, as responsible for the car's eye-catching colour-scheme. Is it a traditional palette? Not exactly, but Brian liked the extra punch of the fluoro highlights and, he said, almost as a

defiant response to Henry Ford's famous quote: "I just don't like black." Florence Thomson was a trailblazer, having been the first woman to drive a 'motor car' from Adelaide to Melbourne in 1905. "The journey was accomplished with great difficulty," said a contemporary news-paper account. "As there are sandy stretches along the road which only a light flying car can traverse." Mrs Thomson drove a Beeston Humberette with about 5 horse power, wearing "leather overalls, peaked cap, ear-flaps, mask and googles." She was such a startling sight that some hotels along the route would not allow her to stay so, coupled with numerous mechanical delays, her journey took eight days to complete.
