Newstead Solar Farm edges closer

STATE Planning Minister Richard Wynne has issued a Notice of Decision to grant a permit for Newstead's proposed solar farm with a number of conditions.

While the Minister has not approved the permit, the notice means he plans to issue it after 28 days if no objections are received.

Renewable Newstead (RN), the volunteer group that's been working towards a solar farm to generate enough electricity for the township and immediate surrounding areas, has welcomed the step.

"This is great news for us and we hope that once the planning permit is issued we can bring our community together to explain what's RN spokeswoman next,"

Genevieve Barlow "We are keen to introduce potential partners for the community's endorsement to build and operate the farm and sell the electricity."

The Notice of Decision was issued on March 12. Applicants had 28 days to make a submission.

As previously reported in the TT, Renewable Newstead is proposing a site for the solar farm near the corner of Captains Gully Road and Clarke Lane, 3km west of Newstead. It reduced its original planning permit application for a solar farm of up to 10MW to 5MW in October in response to community and neighbouring landholders' feedback.

Ms Barlow says the solar farm would be a great step towards the group's goal of delivering affordable and reliable renewable energy to Newstead and surrounds.

"We have applied for a permit to build a solar farm big enough to generate electricity enough for Newstead (2-3MW) plus some extra to make it viable for a commercial partner to build and operate," Ms Barlow said.

She said the Minister had included several conditions, some of which were onerous and the group is now working through these.

"Of particular interest is the condition for the Captains Gully Road/Clarke Lane intersection to be

upgraded from an existing intersection to a 'T' intersection.

"That cost could be onerous and we are hopeful we can negotiate on that one."

Ms Barlow said the cost would have to be borne by Renewable Newstead and its potential project partners.

Among other conditions are landscaping work to reduce the visual impact of the farm, fire protection including on-site water storage and the completion of a heritage study.

We have been quietly shaping this project for a decade and we're optimistic we can proceed to the next stage," Ms Barlow said.

Flinders said the Challenge involved training and controlling a one-year-old Australian Stock Horse that was still pretty wild.

"I had five hours to showcase to the crowd how to start a young horse," he said.

"By the end, I was able to walk, trot and canter the colt and had him flexing both sides and backing up.

"I also had him going over a tarp and weaving through cones. I also got to name

him, Spinifex." The finale, where Flinders stood on his horse and cracked his whip, not only conjures up images of the Man from Snowy River, but it also sealed first prize for him.

"This was my first time ever doing something like this ... it was pretty amazing.

"I got pretty emotional at the presentation, I was pretty much crying during the speech - it's the second biggest colt starting competition in the country.'

Gold exploration continues: Maldon

WORK on the South Muckleford Gold Project is continuing, with Kalamazoo Resources this week confirming it has started a 4000 metre drilling program in the Maldon Historic Reserve.

Kalamazoo's Exploration Manager – Eastern Region Luke Mortimer said the company is focusing on the Fentiman's Reef and Smith's Reef area of the Reserve, on tracks that follow the Castlemaine-Maldon Rail Trail.

"This is our first phase of drilling just to test what's out there," Mr Mortimer said. "Previously, we had a ground geo-physics team in the southern part of the area and they finished up a week ago. We've now started drilling in the northern part of the area."

He said the drilling would go for about a month and that local residents have been notified.

"We've gone through an exhaustive process to get to this stage. We've got all the permits from the Mines Department, Parks Victoria and Mount Alexander Shire Council.

"We are temporarily blocking some tracks in that area and have put up the appropriate signage warning people that a drilling rig is up ahead."

Mr Mortimer said the drilling would be occurring from 7.30am-5.30pm, seven days a week.

"We're trying to source as small a rig as possible and we're sticking to existing tracks.

"There will be a mess on site while we're drilling but we are bound by the conditions on our exploration licence to rehabilitate the area back to its original state."

Mr Mortimer said the company also had to lodge a \$10,000 environmental cash bond to ensure the rehabilitation work is undertaken.

He said Kalamazoo is testing the historical mine workings in the area as well as target areas.

"We have done a lot of soil sampling in the area and found a lot of gold anomalies in the soil, so we have sent them off for testing to see if there might be gold underneath those spots."

He said the company will be drilling 20-30 holes up to 230 metres deep in the coming month.

"We're doing Reverse Circulation drilling which is a quicker and cheaper way to test areas and we'll see if it's encouraging or not and then, (if it is), we might come back and do a more exhausting program.

"We should know in two to three months time."



A crowdfunding campaign has been launched to raise \$150,000 to buy back culturally significant land for the Aboriginal community of Castlemaine.

The 5 acre site is in the foothills of Chewton, sitting on the northern banks of Forest Creek.

"It's got a massive old tree on it, I think it's a Grey Box, with a huge circumference and branches as big as trees," said Vic Say, an advocate for the recognition of Aboriginal heritage and a partner of the Aboriginal community in the region since the 1970s.

"There's also an old colonial stone ruin building on the block and the aim is to build a cultural centre and run activities for young Aboriginals to learn and take pride in their culture, which is wonderful."

The land will be owned by Nalderun, an Aboriginal organisation based in Castlemaine, on Dja Dja Wurrung lands in the Mount Alexander Shire.

Nalderun provides education and advocacy in support of Aboriginal children, young people and families, and delivers training and support to the broader community on different ways we can see and be in the world. These ways hold and honour Country and



Wednesday, 21 On March, 1866, the Tarrangower Court of the Ancient Order of Foresters celebrated the anniversary of their founding with a fete at the Maldon Oval. The oval was located on the north-eastern corner of the intersection of High and Parker streets. Since 1859 the oval had been used as a cricket ground.

The day of the fete was declared a half-holiday by shopkeepers in Maldon. The Foresters engaged the Vaughan Brass Band to play at the Fete and also organised a concert and ball to be held in the evening at the Shire Hall, (now the Maldon Museum).

On the morning of the fete the Foresters, the local drum and fife band and children from the Penny School and Porcupine Flat School assembled at the Shire Hall. Three clergymen, the Revs John Stretch, Alex Robb and William Tranter, addressed them and opened the celebrations.

The Rev Stretch hoped that they would have a happy day tempered by moderation. Alex Robb warned the men in the audience against drunkenness and took the opportunity to promote the idea that the Shire Council should install a town clock on the Shire Hall. The Rev Tranter addressed the children present. He held up Robin Hood and his merry men as ideal examples of Foresters. While he did not condone their lawlessness, he commended their hospitality and he also impressed upon the children the value of education.

Following the meeting a procession was formed led by three Foresters dressed as Robin Hood, Will Scarlet and Big John. The Vaughan Brass Band followed them ahead of members of the Tarrangower Court, the drum and fife band and the school children. The procession marched down High Street to the Castlemaine Road and then turned around and marched via Main and Reef streets to the oval.

The Fete was a great success featuring a cricket match, (which some said went on too long), footraces for the children and carnival games such as 'Aunt Sally' 'Knock-em-down'. and The Tarrangower Times commented on the large number of gaily-dressed attended. women who Edward Ellis provided the publicans' booth and there was also a temperance booth and a fruit stall.

In the evening both the concert and ball at the Shire Hall were attended by a large crowd. The concert featured humorous and burlesque items that drew peals of laughter from the audience. At the ball that followed, dancing continued until after five o'clock the next morning.

Local motorists well behaved but thousands nabbed statewide

CASTLEMAINE Police report there were lots of police officers on patrol across the shire over the Easter long weekend but the vast majority of motorists were doing the right thing. "We gave out a few

speeding tickets but generally everyone was well behaved and we were quite pleased with the behaviour," said Acting Senior Sergeant Mick Peckham.

Statewide it was a different story, in fact it was the worst Easter long weekend on Victorian roads since 2007 with five people losing their lives in separate collisions across the state.

Police detected more than 9000 traffic offences during the state-wide, five-day road safety operation aimed at reducing road trauma.

Operation Nexus also saw more than 270 drivers return a positive result for drugs in their system, while almost 300 drivers were found to have exceeded the prescribed concentration of alcohol.

Republic Democratic People's Police is called on to investigate the murder of a man found trapped and bound in a state fabric mill. This is no ordinary murder (is there such a thing?), but there are political and devious aspects to this case. The political situation of the time is so complicated and there are so many undercurrents that as more victims surface, Muller realises that she must delve into the dark past of the region. The old mill was once a concentration camp and it becomes apparent that this story moves between the closing weeks of the Second World War and the Stasi control of the region in the 1970s.

The Abstainer is a novel by Ian McGuire and is set in Manchester in 1867, where two men haunted by their past are driven by the need for justice. Stephen Doyle is an Irish American who arrives from New York with a thirst for blood. He is a member of the Fenians, the secret society intent on ending British rule in Ireland. James O'Connor has fled grief and drink in Dublin to start a new life as the Head Constable in Manchester. His mission is to thwart the Fenians' plans. When his long lost nephew arrives from America, O'Connor's new life is imperilled and his and Stephen Doyle's lives become intertwined. This is a story about the Irish fight for independence and the blood that was shed during this terrible time.

The Lying Life of Adults is the new book by popular author Elena Ferrante. There are currently five other Ferrante books at The Athenaeum. My Brilliant Friend is the first of the Neapolitan Quartet made up of The Story of a New Name, Those Who Leave and Those Who Stay and The Story of the Lost Child. These brilliant books are much loved and have been read by many of our members. There is also **The Days of Abandonment**, another popular book by Ferrante. This new book, **The Lying Life of Adults** is set in Naples where a teenage girl has to find herself as she vacillates between the two very different cities of Naples: the Naples of assumed refinement situated in the heights and the Naples which is a place of excess and, vulgarity situated in the more lowly areas. This is the story about the transition from childhood to adolescence to adulthood and Ferrante again shows her skill with this gripping piece of writing.

Once again we hope that these four books offer you a wide variety of reading.


