Candidate Q&A -The Senate

THE Tarrangower Times emailed, or attempted to email, Victorian candidates for the Senate and asked them three questions, giving them the opportunity to present themselves in their own words. When elected, the new Victorian Senator will represent all Victorians.

There are 64 candidates listed on the website of the Australian Electoral Commission; not all were contactable and in some cases the TT sent the request via a central address or a web form. The questions were: Please tell us a bit about yourself, your background and why you'll be a great Senate representative for Victorians? What do you consider to be your key values, generally? What's important to you? What do you see as the key issues for rural and regional areas of Victoria and what are your ideas to address them? The responses are being published

Brittany Henderson The Greens



I'm Brittney Henderson, a Wiradjuri and Bunurong person. I'm about to finish my Master's in Social Policy, where I've focused on improving outcomes for Indigenous women and Queer mob. I've worked in the not-for-profit space, supporting community-controlled organisations with resources and frameworks to organise and spotlight the incredible work they're already doing. I'm campaigning to make sure young people, women, gender-diverse folks, and especially mob who exist across those identities, can see themselves in future campaigns. For me, campaigning isn't about being perfect. It's about being real, staying grounded in lived experience and showing up for the people who see themselves in your story.

At the core of everything I do are values like collective action, community care and integrity. I believe everything is political. How we care for each other, how we share resources, whose voices are heard and whose are silenced. That's why I show up in the spaces I do. Collective action is powerful. I've seen how much can shift when mob, young people and genderdiverse folks back each other and build something together. It's not about one person leading the charge. It's about making sure we all have what we need to thrive and no one gets left behind. Community care is the heart of it. It's how we look after each other when systems fall short. It's in the everyday acts of solidarity and showing up for people. That's the kind of politics I believe in. Integrity means staying grounded. Being real, being accountable, and knowing who I'm here for. That's why I'm running with the Greens because they back people and planet over profit and power. And that's the kind of future I want to be part of building.

In rural and regional Victoria, communities, especially Indigenous and queer folks, face challenges like poor infrastructure, limited access to services, and social isolation. These issues are tied to broader struggles like climate change, economic inequality and a lack of meaningful representation. Indigenous governance systems offer practical solutions, particularly around climate resilience and land management, benefiting all communities facing environmental pressures. But we can't truly move forward until we break down the barriers that prevent people from accessing opportunities. By bridging wealth gaps with the Greens' tax reform policies and ensuring everyone has an equal chance to thrive, we can create a future where all Victorians, no matter their background, have the opportunity to run the race. Empowering Indigenous women and gender-diverse folks in leadership roles will strengthen our communities and lead to a more inclusive, self-determined future for all.

Choices, choices

IT is said that you can't have your cake and eat it too, which is confusing and thought-provoking. When it comes to voting you will need to make a choice between voting quietly and conveniently in advance, or braving the throngs while voting on the official Election Day.

There's something to be said for both options; if you vote in advance it may involve a further drive but likely a much shorter queue. On Election Day, there is the camaraderie of partaking in your civic duty and right while in the company of fellow community members. Plus the eating of the Democracy Sausage, which is usually only available on the big day.

These nearby venues are open for early voting: Castlemaine Catholic Church Hall (St Mary's), 70 Hargraves St, Castlemaine; Shop 3, 114 Williamson St, Bendigo and Bendigo Baptist Church (Novo Centre) 757 McIvor Hwy, Junortoun. Opening hours vary but they roughly follow business hours and most of these have extra services to improve accessibility including a virtual Auslan interpreter, hearing loop and/or assisted wheelchair access. Check the website of the Australian Electoral Commission at aec.gov.au for full details.

Preference voting: you are in control of your vote

When it comes to choosing between candidates, that's a whole other rissole. The most important thing to remind yourself when it comes to food and voting is: your body, your choice. The days are gone when backroom deals between shady butchers decided the order of ingredients; now it is all laid out on the hot plate for you to choose.

If that metaphor seemed forced (it was) here it is again on a plain bun: since 2016 when there was reform to the Senate voting process, politicians, parties and candidates do not have any control over your preferences.

With the green voting form, for the House of Representatives, if a candidate receives over 50% of the vote at first count, they are declared elected. If nobody receives 50% of the votes, the preferences on the green papers of the candidate with the lowest count are distributed to the remaining candidates and that candidate is eliminated. The person who is declared elected will then be the first candidate with at least 50% of the vote from their own first preference votes plus the transferred preferences from excluded candidates.

The distribution of votes in the Senate is more complex, partly due to a quota system and because candidates from the same party are grouped together, like supermarkets with bulk small-goods buying power, on the white ballot paper. Voters can either vote above the line for political parties/groups or below the line for candidates in their preferred order. Groups who have a voting square above the line may be candidates all from one party, or from two parties that have elected to run a 'joint' ticket and have their candidates listed in the same column, or non-affiliated candidates who have chosen to run together in the one column so that they appear above the line.

The only influence that candidates, politicians and parties have over your preferences is through the printing of a How To Vote card, which will demonstrate their preferences and which they will offer to you as you enter the voting place. Like the offer of onions, mustard or tomato sauce for your snag, it is entirely your choice as to whether you accept.

Broiler application taken to VCAT

A case has reportedly been opened at Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT) relating to 705 Baringhup Road, Carisbrooke, which is the site of a currently advertised planning application with Central Goldfields Shire Council (CGSC) for a class B broiler farm.

The Tarrangower Times has contacted the company that is representing the applicant for further information but understands that the move is an application for VCAT to 'review a failure to grant a permit' under the Planning and

A spokesperson from CGSC confirmed: "The applicant for planning application DO 06-23 at 705 Baringhup Road Carisbrook has made application to review a failure to grant a permit. The application is for a Class B broiler farm – six sheds, hot water heating facility room, amenities and generator room, caretakers dwelling, water retention dam and access road widening in a heritage overlay."

This comes in light of the recent decision by CGSG on Wednesday 26 March (see the Tarrangower Times edition of Friday 11 April) to refuse a permit for a broiler farm at Clarkes Road, Moolort and 141 Clarkes Road, Strathlea.

Fire danger reminder

Although the declared Fire Danger Period (FDP) finished this week on Tuesday 22 April, the CFA warns against complacency during the continued dry period.

As restrictions lift, CFA is urging residents to remain fire-aware, as dry Autumnal conditions combined with strong winds can still lead to fast-moving grassfires. Despite the cooler change in conditions, it is important residents remain vigilant even though the FDP has come to an end.

Private burn-offs should be registered online at **firepermits.vic.gov.au**. If smoke or fire is reported, it will be cross-checked with the register to avoid an emergency response and allow 000 call-takers to prioritise emergency calls. Where possible, landowners should also notify neighbours and those nearby who may be sensitive to smoke. Residents travelling to other parts of Victoria are reminded to remain vigilant, as fire danger periods in other regions may still be active.

Saturday Main Street Closure

Fans of British motorcycles will be thrilled to know that the All British Rally will swing through Maldon on Saturday 26 April. Motorists and shoppers should be aware that Main Street will be closed from 9am until around 4pm; the rally in Newstead attracts up to 1,000 motorcycles and many will visit Maldon on their Saturday ride.

Comment on proposed council budget

At the Meeting of Mount Alexander Shire Council (MASC) on Tuesday 15 April, Council resolved to make the proposed 2025-2026 budget available for public feedback for two

weeks from Wednesday 16 April through to Wednesday 30 April.

Of a planned \$56 million for the financial year, \$17.3 million is allocated to capital works, which will improve infrastructure and community facilities.

"In developing the budget, we must first take into account what it will cost to continue delivering our existing services and funding our capital works initiatives," said Mount Alexander Shire Council's Mayor, Councillor Rosie Annear. "Then, with the very small portion that remains, we look to fund community projects brought to our attention through public budget submissions."

MASC points to active transport, carbon offsetting initiatives and levee banks as some of the highlights of its proposed budget for 2025-2026. Other features include traffic improvements and parking safety in Castlemaine, improved street lighting and toilets in Harcourt, and designs for playground improvements in Maldon.

Cairn Curran recreation area upgrade



One of Cairn Curran Reservoir's major recreation areas is fully reopened to the public following the completion of several upgrades. Located on the southeast foreshore of the reservoir, Welshmans Reef is a popular destination for boaters and fishers. Funding from the Victorian Fisheries Authority's Better Boating division recently allowed Goulburn-Murray Water (GMW) to complete extensive upgrades on the site. The works included refurbishing the boat ramp and the access track leading into the recreation area and sealing the car park. GMW has also funded and completed the refurbishment of Fisherman's Toilet Blocks, located next to the car park.

VFF calls to scrap new emergency services levy

The Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) is calling on the Victorian Government to immediately abandon its proposed expanded tax for emergency services and instead focus on urgently reforming the existing Fire Services Property Levy to ensure it is fair, transparent and sustainable for all Victorians. VFF President Brett Hosking said it comes after widespread community backlash to the government's new tax proposal, which would see families, farmers, and businesses slugged with massive bills, without any guarantee of improved services.

"Victorians are already doing their fair share and this latest tax grab is unjustified and deeply out of touch. Farmers don't support it, firefighters don't, nor do businesses and local governments," Mr Hosking said. "Instead of piling on a new tax, the government should be fixing the broken levy system we already have."

The VFF is urging the government to commit to meaningful reform, including:

- A cap on levy increases: Introduce a legislated cap so the Fire Services Property Levy cannot increase by more than the consumer price index year-on-year, similar to the rate cap applied to local councils.
- Protection against levy shock: Implement an individual capping mechanism to prevent property owners from facing levy spikes due to extreme land value revaluations.
- Fairer classification and rate setting: Conduct a full review of current land use classifications and rate structures to ensure they are equitable—particularly considering differing service levels between metropolitan and regional communities.
- Implement the rebate for CFA volunteers: The government should keep its plan to provide a levy rebate to CFA volunteers to the existing fire services levy.

"Scrapping this expanded tax and committing to genuine levy reform would be a win for transparency, equity and trust," Mr Hosking said.

Biosecurity roundtable report available

Victoria's Biosecurity Roundtable was held on 20 November 2024. There were 168 participants at the event. Local experts – from the wine industry, wildlife sector, horticulture and more – explored phylloxera impacts on the wine industry, what to do to prepare for our biggest biosecurity threats and reaching diverse communities with important messages. Victoria's Biosecurity Strategy was the underlying foundation of presentations and conversations throughout all Roundtable sessions.

What to do about the flu

Victorians are being reminded to book in their annual flu vaccination ahead of winter peak season, with free flu vaccines now available for children under five years old and other at-risk groups.

Victorian Chief Health Officer Dr Tarun Weeramanthri is encouraging more Victorians to get their annual flu vaccine, with reported cases of flu and other respiratory viruses already on the rise.

"The flu can be serious, especially for children which is why the vaccine is free for children under five," Dr Weeramanthri said.

"For vulnerable groups in the community the flu can be deadly and for others it can result in severe health effects and long recovery periods."

Flu vaccination is recommended for anyone six months and older and is free for at risk groups including children aged six months to five years, people over 65 years, pregnant women, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and people with medical conditions that put them at increased risk of severe flu. People can get their vaccine at general practices, pharmacies, local council immunisation clinics, Aboriginal Health Services and often at their workplace.

Melbourne's south-east. From mentoring youth to supporting newly arrived families, I've worked hard to build bridges across cultures and create opportunities for people to feel seen, heard and empowered. I've also supported local sports, education initiatives and small businesses—often out of my



own pocket—because I believe real leadership means showing up where it counts.

As someone who has experienced hardship, but also the strength of community, I know how important representation is—especially for those whose voices have historically been ignored in Parliament. I would be a strong Senate representative because I understand the lived experiences of working families, migrants, and marginalised communities. I bring honesty, empathy, and a relentless drive to make our systems more fair and inclusive.

My core values are social justice, equality, and community-led change. I believe in standing with people who are overlooked by the political mainstream—whether that's renters, refugees, workers, or First Nations peoples. I value transparency, grassroots democracy, and the idea that real progress only happens when we listen to and empower local voices.

Rural and regional areas in Victoria are often overlooked when it comes to investment and services. Key issues include lack of affordable housing, limited public transport, climate impacts on farming and underfunded health services. Fifth-generation Maldon beekeeper elected president of state association







WARRAL Maldon's owner, Lindsay Callaway, has been elected President of the Victorian Apiarists Association (VAA), the state's peak body for beekeepers.

Lindsay is a fifth-generation apiarist and the managing director of Warral Maldon, a beekeeping business founded by his great-great-grandfather, Edward Teague Penglase, in 1896. Operating over 5,000 hives across Central Victoria and beyond, Warral Maldon is one of the country's longest-running beekeeping enterprises. From its purpose-built facility on the outskirts of Maldon, the business produces high-quality honey and beeswax products, provides commercial pollination services, and runs two in-house programs: SWARM (an apiarist training academy) and SYZYGY (Warral's research and development wing).

Though grounded in the local community, Lindsay has spent years working at a national level to advocate for beekeepers. He is an executive member of the Australian Honey Bee Industry Council (AHBIC), a board member of B-Qual Australia and contributes to national projects, including planning for the 2026 Australian Bee Congress in Adelaide.

His leadership at the VAA has included chairing the Commercial Subcommittee and guiding the association's current rebranding process. He also proudly represents the Bendigo Branch of the VAA.


"I didn't go looking to be president—but I do care deeply about the future of our industry, and the people in it," Lindsay said. "The VAA has been a big part of my family's beekeeping story. It's where my dad shared his knowledge in the 70s, helping to form the Bendigo Branch that still thrives today. It's where I've found mentors, mates and now a platform to pay it forward."

The Warral Maldon story and history is captured in the brand's theme: 'Bees love Warral. We love bees.' It's a sentiment that reflects generations of care and one Lindsay says is, "at the heart of the role I now have as president of the VAA."

As the newly elected President, Lindsay hopes to help the VAA stay strong and united in the face of modern challenges—from managing biosecurity threats like Varroa destructor to supporting the next generation of beekeepers. "We've got some serious work to do," he said. "But we've also got a serious community of people who care about bees, the environment, and each other. That gives me hope."



The Art of Blending Wine – Balancing Personality, Structure, and Style

WHILE it might sound like a technical process (and sometimes it is), blending wine is also deeply creative, it's where intuition, experience and a touch of gut instinct meet to craft something that's more than the sum of its parts.

At Panacea Estate, blending is one of my favourite parts of winemaking. It's part science, part art—and all about listening to the wine and learning what has worked well and not worked well from the trials that occurred a year ago.

Why Blend Wines at All?

There are a few great reasons to blend:

- Balance One wine might have bold fruit but lack structure. Another might have great acidity but not enough length. Together, they fill in each other's gaps.
- **Complexity** Blending allows different layers of aroma, flavour and texture to come through. It's like adding harmonies to a melody.
- Consistency In small wineries like ours, vintages vary. Blending can smooth out differences and create a signature house style—even from year to year.

Blending isn't about masking flaws. It's about enhancing character—highlighting the best of what each component

When approaching blending, it is good to think of each wine component as a character in a story. Some are bold and outspoken. Others are quiet but necessary—like punctuation. The goal isn't to let one voice dominate, but to create harmony.

Here's what I look for:

- **Personality** The unique voice of a varietal or barrel. Maybe it's a fragrant rosé with wild strawberry notes, or a soft vanilla from a fresh oak barrel of shiraz or some more brashness and pepper from an American oak barrel that refuses to be ignored.
- **Structure** Acidity, tannin and body. These are the bones of the wine. A strong backbone gives the blend shape and aging potential.
- **Style** This is where vision comes in. Are we making something fresh and vibrant for summer drinking? Or a more contemplative red for cooler nights?

Every blend starts with a question: 'What are we trying to sav with this wine?'

Some of our wines are blended from the start—like our Rose All Day, which often combines different varietals and combined to make a consistent product each year.

Others, like our Shiraz, are crafted from multiple barrels, each with different oak, age of barrel, type of yeast used and even small differences—a few days of extra skin contact can give us options to fine-tune the final blend.

We taste, test, spit and swirl. Then we do it again. And again. Sometimes a blend comes together in minutes. Other times, it takes longer and many different opinions and discussions on what would create the best option.

On a personal note, thanks to the Welshmans Reef team for coming to help tasting and always teaching me more about the wine-making process and giving their opinions on this year's blending. Also, to those lucky enough to be at Panacea Estate on the weekend while I was doing the tasting to help out and give their opinions, it is a great pleasure to experience this with others and talk through what everyone is experiencing with the wines and how to get the best from them.

These moments reminds me why I make wine. Not just to bottle a beverage, but to tell a story, enjoy it with friend, both old and new. Next time you're sipping a Panacea Estate wine, see if you can find the layers. Better yet, visit the winery and taste different varietals side by side. You might just discover the story within the glass.

"We will very much miss the contact with people, through their sadness and happiness," Graeme said as they were stepping away. "We've been intertwined with the town and the



THE MANet gallery is proud to present not one, but THREE artists exhibiting this month. MANet Gallery is an amazing little space, punching well above its weight, thanks to the tireless and creative work of Catherine Tait, who attracts talented local artists to exhibit there. May brings three local well-known artists to present their work. They are Catherine O'Leary, Fionna Madigan and Mary Caspar.

Many years ago, I was involved in developing a flier about the importance of the arts. It was called simply *Imagine Life Without The Arts*. It went on to say 'Victoria needs people who are: creative, inventive, problem solvers, communicators, skilful, enterprising, resourceful, literate and flexible.' What would we have? A dull , dreary , uninteresting world. 'A world without THE ARTS.' You could safely say the work of these three artists demonstrate these qualities in very different ways.

Catherine O'Leary works primarily with wool fibre and silk fabrics. Her artwork is two-dimensional or sculptural in nature. "The fall of light and the shadows it creates plays an important role in the positive and negative spaces within my artwork. I am fascinated with the shadowed areas found in the internal spaces within my work."

She describes her work thus, "I have developed a style of felt making which is very fine; with the surface of the felt being evenly textured and fibrous. The sculptural shapes are hollow and skillfully manipulated. There is a stillness embodied in my art. I endeavour to construct my work to appear solid and sedentary, but there is an ephemeral lightness in the physicality of my work."

Her three-dimensional felt works almost defy gravity.

Fionna Madigan describes her work as, "A fertile zone between abstraction and realism; where scale is ambiguous, where the macro and micro slide in and out of awareness." She said, "I commence with compositional goals and encourage random occurrences. Improvisation and transience are integral

concepts to my creative endeavours. I am interested in the experience of perception; what happens when we look at something; the way our bodies and visual cortex metabolise and interpret information."


"I like to keep the wall between what we know and what we don't know, permeable. I like to play in the space between what we can control and what we can't." Her medium involving beeswax enables her to paint in layers. She added that, "the Goldfields are a never-ending source of inspiration."

Mary Caspar has been an artist for 60 years and is making compelling art into her 80s. I met the third artist Mary Caspar many years ago when she was the Artistic Director

of *Spadeworks*, which was held in the Newstead Community Centre in March 2015. Mary trained at RMIT in the 60s and has always been a working artist. She is represented in collections both here and overseas. While she took up painting in her forties, sometime after undertaking a sculpture course with Shane Merry at Box Hill TAFE. (Incidentally, Shane was formerly an art teacher at Boort – he's a long time ago, where he taught my three sisters).

Mary has an inimitable style of painting people, which involves what she describes as 'more head work' than if she is painting a still life. To quote a comment about an earlier exhibition of Mary's work at Lot 19 in Castlemaine: "There are many reasons to make art...to document, comment, reflect, grieve, forgive, explore or just because you have to, to quote Nietzsche, in order to not die from the truth." Her prints and paintings are quite wondrous, with vivid use of colour and fine line work

Platform Extension

Our trains are a popular tourist attraction in the area and we regularly bring between four and six carriages of people into town. Unfortunately, when the platform was built in the 1880s, they never envisioned large passenger trains full of people arriving at Maldon. Trains of this length are too long for the original platform and we have safety concerns with there being five or more carriage doors off the platform when our train arrives. We also need to address the issues associated with the relatively new and very popular cycle trail between Castlemaine and Maldon, which regularly sees people riding into Maldon and catching the train back and we find that large bicycle bookings often require an extra wagon to accommodate the bicycles. The extra wagon is also generally off the platform, causing more operational difficulties.

The size of the extension is dictated by the arrangement of the Castlemaine end of the platform. As the platform has a dock in it, the platform has brick facing all around and on both sides of the dock. To address this, the platform extension needs to butt up to (but not touch or join) both brick faces. This gives an overall width of eight metres. This does not impinge on the large gum tree near the steam locomotive (which was planted by the C&MRPS in the 1980s) and this tree will remain. Impact to the vegetation will

The dock itself will not be removed and the little steam locomotive currently parked there will also remain in its current location. We realise this is a great attraction for visitors, both when our train is in town and when we are not operating. I have visited on several

non-operational days and seen visitors looking in the locomotive and asking questions about it and the railway in general.

When we proposed the extension to Heritage Victoria, the original plan was to use new plain red bricks and concrete cap stones for the platform faces. Heritage Victoria replied, "Can the bricks be second-hand reds, rather than new? The concern is that new bricks may appear too stark alongside the heritage platform, whereas second-hand bricks would create a softer, more sympathetic visual connection with the existing platform." So the proposal was changed to this at their request. They also requested us to use recycled bluestone (basalt) cap stones from old railway platforms instead of the concrete ones we had suggested. We are very mindful of the history in the original platform and do not wish to diminish from that in any way.

The extended family of the Maldon brickmaker are coming to town

My letter to the Editor was published in the Tarrangower Times in February 2024, asking for any information from the community about my great-grandfather Edward Ferdinand Wagener, the long-time Maldon brickmaker

and his wife, Louisa Sophia Doris Spanhake and their nine children. I also mentioned the Wagener connection to the Subritzky brothers who had arrived in Maldon earlier and likely brought the future wife of Edward Wagener and her younger brother John William Henry to live with them in the diggings at Long Gully in the care of grandmother Sophie Dieckmann nee Subritzky where they built what became known as Dickman's Cottage.

I did not receive any direct feedback from readers, BUT I did get encouragement from the Maldon Museum & Archives Association with pieces of valuable research information from historian Tony Kane and encouragement from the secretary and newsletter editor, inviting me to write an article for the March 2025 edition of their newsletter Maldon Muse.

Edward Wagener likely met the Subritzkys at the German Club in Reef Street about 1858 soon after he arrived in Maldon and started working in the brickmaking business of Carl Klose in Long Gully. This was before the bigger brick yard was established close to town along the Tarrangower Creek beside Tobin Street. This can be seen in the two Maldon Panorama pictures taken in 1861 and 1867, as displayed on the Museum website, and in the foreground of the 1867 Maldon Panorama in its glory on the wall in the Maldon Hotel dining room.

To celebrate my Maldon roots, multi-family history, I commenced in May 2024 a very well-supported Facebook group, titled of course, Maldon Story - Wageners/Subritzkys/ Spanhakes. I have had many exchanges with other family historians and found multi-family relatives who have joined the group out of their long-held interest in our early German settler history.

A group of various family members will be getting together for a Maldon reunion on Friday 2 to Sunday 4 May. Some of us will be meeting at the Maldon Cemetery on Thursday afternoon 1 May to do some tidying up and pay our respects at the Wagener grave and Subritzky crypt.

We have a program of events that involves a Friday night get-together hopefully at the Kangaroo Hotel, a Saturday morning town loop walking tour finishing at the Vintage Machinery Museum, lunch at Café Maldon, a Museum & Archives tour, then Saturday afternoon car tour of the important family connected properties and sites, finishing with a Saturday night celebration dinner at the Maldon Hotel in front of the Maldon Panorama, with family stories and yarns and reminiscences.

Sunday morning we are to be welcomed by the Pastor Darcy Vaughan at 10am at the Holy Trinity Anglican Church Service. Various families of Wageners attended the church and there were large groups of Wagener baptisms recorded there. My grandfather Fred Wagener, local gold mine steam engine driver, Lodge and Band member was a Vestryman on the Board of the Church for about 10 years.

We will have Sunday lunch in town and recap the weekend and farewell those who need to leave. Others will finish the weekend with an afternoon tour of special local sites to relive our personal Maldon connections and enjoy our new friendships a little longer.

Invitation to the community – if anyone in town has any information or photos about the families, you would like to share with us, please give me a call or send an email. I will reward any photo of Edward Wagener the brickmaker and Mrs Wagener, children and relatives. We can arrange a place to meet OR you can join in with us at one of the sites. If you would like to join us for Saturday night dinner at the Maldon Hotel, please let me know ASAP so that I can include you in our booking numbers. We are presently booked for 20 which includes a few spare seats now and being Election Night the dining room may be full.



Still with us

Most of our summer migrants have now departed but one species that remains with us for just a little longer is the White-breasted Woodswallow

Arriving in mid-spring to breed along our local water-bodies they spend the southern winter in the north of Australia. At this time of year small flocks, such as one comprising about a dozen birds near the Loddon River recently, can be found chasing insects to fuel up for their impending northward journey. A number of immature birds in this flock is a sign of successful local breeding.

Watch out in coming weeks for some of our autumn migrants - Flame Robin, Swift Parrot, Eastern Spinebill (good numbers are already here) and if you are fortunate, a Rose Robin or two, especially in areas where there is abundant Silver Wattle.






Torchlight Parade

I'M going to go out on a limb here and reveal something about myself that those who know me may not believe.

I'm a bit shy.

Don't worry, I can be the life of the party, given the right crowd and some Dutch courage and I've amassed all the social graces and tactics, but there are some situations which still make me feel a bit uncomfortable.

Like walking into a room full of strangers who aren't necessarily expecting me without a specific invitation.

I'm going down this path because I think that behind all the outward confidence that most of us possess, I may not be the only one.

The other day I paid a visit to the Newstead Men's Shed. Firstly, it's a place full of very friendly people, like a group of your old mates that you just haven't happened to have met before. Secondly, they are just as pleased to see you and only want to know how you take your tea or coffee. So, I had no need for bravado, Dutch courage or social graces.

So here's another surprise. To be a member of the Newstead Men's Shed, you don't need to be a man.

The group's overall attitude is mainly about being friendly, as I mentioned, helpful, useful and harnessing skills and recently, the natural progression is to broaden the membership base to include women. It's just a logical progression. The role of the shed is changing and it's a reflection on the dynamic of our society generally. Now, everyone's welcome, it's just about wanting to be active.

Having made the connection, curiosity kicked in. What's that machine? What's that guy doing? Can I have a go? I've always wanted to learn how to use a lathe ... I was like a dog at a picnic.

I was shown around by Graeme Lees and James Grant who are two of the eight or so core members who help run the shed.

The first thing I learned was that there are no expectations, you can drop in anytime they're open, just depending on your mood.

The open times are Monday and Tuesday: all day, Thursday: Ladies, Friday and Sunday: two hours in the morning for a cuppa and a game of pool.

They are right on the main road in Lyons Street, you've probably seen the cool aeroplane on the top of the verandah and they have a retail store out the front with lots of great gift ideas.

The front part on the road is council-owned, but the back part, where the meeting rooms and workshop are, is actually owned by the group, an excellent idea, so they can set it up exactly as they want and change it without having to ask the landlord.

The group gets involved with all sorts of community projects, like outdoor furniture for the local pool, to helping out the school, fixing things that people bring in and providing a space for members to work on their own interests.

The whole place, although welcoming, has the feel of efficiency and purpose. The meeting room I first sat down

in has a large TV monitor running off a laptop and was being set up for a hands-on demonstration about how to take better photos on your iPhone. There are lots of people with lots of skills and you just have to ask. They're running all sorts of workshops/courses where you can learn new skills and you don't necessarily need to be a member.

So now, even if you're shy like me, just wander on down and have a look around and have a chat with your new mates, the kettle is on...







BLAST FROM THE PAST



Private Harold Johnson

MALDON born Harold Johnson was working in Echuca when he enlisted in the A.I.F. on 19 August 1914 and from that day he kept a diary recording his experiences of army life.

After a brief farewell visit home, Harold reported to the Broadmeadows Military Camp where he underwent two months of training. When it leaked out that the Victorian contingent, including Harold's 7th Battalion, were due to sail, many friends and relations gathered at Broadmeadows to watch the last drill parade. In the crowd were Harold's aunt and three cousins.

On the day before they sailed, the 7th Battalion travelled by train to Port Melbourne. They had no farewell parade but when their train stopped on the viaduct between Spencer and Flinders Street stations, the troops said goodbye to Melbourne by creating a ruckus, banging their rifle butts on the carriage floors.

At Port Melbourne the 7th Battalion boarded the troopship *Hororata* and spent the night at anchor in the Bay. The next morning, Monday 19 October, the first Victorian convoy steamed down the Bay. For Harold this was his first experience of the sea and, as a keen photographer, he took the opportunity to take snapshots of Sorrento and the Heads.

The passage to Albany was remarkably calm. Harold spent the time getting used to the cramped conditions and meeting old friends. He was however concerned for the horses on board. They were closely confined and he saw one destroyed after it fell and broke a leg.

The Victorian convoy reached Albany on Sunday 25 October. Only officers were allowed ashore, but Harold managed to replenish his photographic supplies by throwing an envelope containing a sovereign and a list of requirements to a young man on the wharf. Two days later a parcel arrived with all that he had asked for. As they waited for more troopships to arrive, the tedium on board the *Hororata* gave rise to regular fights among the men, one of which Harold managed to photograph.

On Sunday 1 November everyone was ordered to dress in khaki and line the decks to salute the transport flagship, *Orvieto*. In what he described as 'a sight of a lifetime', Harold counted 38 transports as they fell into line and left Albany Harbour flanked by many warships.

The convoy, originally destined for Europe, was redirected to Egypt to prepare for the Dardanelles campaign. Harold Johnson landed at Gallipoli on the morning of 25 April 1915. He was wounded three days later and evacuated to Alexandria where he died of his wounds on 2 May. Harold was the first soldier from Maldon to be killed in the Great War.



Library Reviews

Unsettled by Kate Grenville, 2025

What does it mean to be on land taken from others?

'What does it mean to be on land that was taken from other people? Now that we know how the taking was done, what do we do with that knowledge?'

Kate Grenville is no stranger to the past. Her success and fame as a writer exploded when she published The Secret River in 2005, a bestseller based on the story of her convict ancestor, an early settler on the Hawkesbury River. More than two decades on, and following the defeat of the Voice referendum, Grenville is still grappling with what it means to descend from people who were, as she puts it, "on the sharp edge of the moving blade that was colonisation." So, she decides to go on a kind of pilgrimage, back through the places her family stories happened, and put the stories and the First People back into the same frame, on the same country, to try to think about those questions. This gripping book is the result of that journey.

Bone Lands by Pip Fioretti, 2024

1911, on a winter's night in arid New South Wales wool country, mounted trooper Augustus Hawkins discovers the bodies of three young people. They are scions of the richest family in the district, savagely murdered on a road that Hawkins should have been patrolling, had he not been busy bedding the local schoolteacher.

Detectives arrive from Sydney and the disgraced Hawkins, a traumatised veteran of the Boer War, comes under fierce scrutiny. With his honour and sanity at stake, he becomes hell-bent on finding the murderer. But as ever darker secrets are revealed about the people he thinks of as friends, Hawkins is forced to confront an uncomfortable question: who is paying the price for the new nation's prosperity?

Smoke by Michael Brissenden, 2024

After a brutal wildfire tears through the town of Jasper in the Californian sierras, a body is discovered in a shed. It looks like an open-and-shut case of accidental death until further investigation reveals that the victim was locked in from the

Years after leaving Jasper, Detective Alex Markov has been sent back under the shadow of an LAPD corruption investigation. She is convinced that the man, a family friend, was murdered opportunistically under the cover of the fire. As the smoke clears, Alex reveals a town corrupt to its core - but exposing that corruption could destroy her and the people she loves. Will she ignore the crookedness and deceit, or face the consequences of pursuing an inconvenient truth?

Traitor's Gate by Jeffrey Archer, 2023

The Tower of London – impenetrable, well protected, secure. Home to the most valuable jewels on earth. But once a year, when the Queen attends the State Opening of Parliament, the Metropolitan Police must execute the most secret operation in their armoury as they transport the Crown Jewels across London.

For decades, the elite squad at Scotland Yard have been in charge of the operation. And for decades, it's run like clockwork. But this year, everything is about to change. Because a master criminal has set his sights on pulling off the most outrageous theft in history and with a man on the inside, the odds are in his favour. Unless the team can stop him before it's too late.

The Creeper by Margaret Hickey, 2024

For the last decade, the small mountain town of Edenville in Victoria's high country has been haunted by the horrific murders of five hikers up on Jagged Ridge. Also found dead near the scene was Bill 'Creeper' Durant, a bushland loner, expert deer-hunter and a man with a known reputation for stalking campers . . . murder-suicide. Case closed.

But as the 10-year anniversary of the massacre draws near, Detective Constable Sally White, the only officer at Edenville's modest police station, finds herself drawn into the dark world of the notorious Durant family. Lex Durant, in particular, has started to publicly protest his brother's innocence and accuse the police of persecution. As Sally combs the investigation to prove him wrong, it becomes all too clear that each murdered hiker had skeletons in their closet and possible enemies in their past.
