





THERE were a few surprises in store when I visited the Maldon Vintage Machinery Museum last Sunday to see how things were going with this year's Easter Fair.

"It's brilliant," said gate attendant Dave Brown when

asked about the huge crowd

in Maldon on the day. "People are overflowing from the market (at the Beehive Chimney) to here and then into the town."

Dave said everything was 'up and running' at

the Machinery Museum ... 'we've even got people bringing in things from home to demonstrate'.

Just inside the gate, sits a model of the Tarrangower Times' delivery van, atop a truck, and directly opposite

is a shed housing the TT's old flat-bed printing press that is still in working order. A little further up the

road I run into Charles Hall sitting on a bench. He's got a long grey beard, a twinkle in his eye and he doesn't mind

a chat. "I'm from Korweinguboora," he says.

"That's easy for you to say - where's that?"

"It's south of Daylesford, on top of the Great Dividing

Range." Charles tells me he's been collecting machines, cars and bits and pieces for many years and that he's slowed down a bit now but 'that doesn't matter'.

"Have you seen the redwood table in the dining area? Have a look on your way out. I made it out of an old tree that was out back of the Maldon Fire Station. It's a California Redwood."

I did check the table out as I was leaving and it's a beauty. It'd look nice in the dining room at home but I'm told it's too bloody heavy to lift and besides it won't fit through the tiny front door of an old miner's cottage.

As I mosey into the main shed at the Museum, I come across a man who looks like the Mayor of Maldon, Alan Miller.

Alan looks resplendent in a beautiful suit, bowler hat and he's even wearing a badge declaring he's the President of the Maldon Vintage Machinery Museum.

"It's been a really good weekend," he said. "We had about 100 people through vesterday and that was supposed to be the set-up day. Today's a bit slower but that's ok."

Inside the shed, Alan shows me a huge condenser pump.

"I think it dates back to the 1920s and it's believed Thompsons in Castlemaine used it to pump water over to the foundry.

"We got it in here - oiled and cleaned it, connected it to air, turned it over and away it went."

Near the front gate, John Conn, shows me an even bigger pump that was also made by Thompsons in Castlemaine, this one in the 1950s.

"It once worked up at Mildura on irrigation and pumped 22,500 gallons of water a minute."

The final surprise was an outside toilet.

John says poke your head inside the door and tell me what you see.

It's a toilet with two holes in the seat, instead of one.

John explains that in the old days they built toilets for families with up to four holes in the long seat so that no one had to wait when nature called. Jeff Jones

Relaxing Reading

The new books this week should provide some relaxing and interesting reading for our adult readers and our younger ones too.

The Other Passenger is by Louise Candlish and was just printed last year. This exciting story is based in London where the narrator Jamie goes to work by riverboat avoiding traffic snarls and tube mayhem but when Kit, his friend and neighbour who usually catches the same boat doesn't turn up one morning, trouble really starts with a vengeance. Due to the fact that the two chaps had had an argument after drinks the night before and now Kit is missing, the police think that foul play has taken place. This easily read and extremely well written book has so many twists and turns and I think that you will find it hard to put down.

The Midsummer Garden is another Kirsty Manning book and should be as popular as The Lost Jewels. We have another Kirsty Manning book 'up our sleeves', so watch for that in the coming weeks. In The Midsummer Garden we again have two stories centuries and continents apart but which come together in a wonderfully fascinating way. In 1487 in France a young 14-year-old is working in the kitchen of a Chateau and overseeing the wedding feast of Lord Boschaud and his bride. In 2014 we meet Pip Arnet an environmental expert living in Tasmania and passionate about the Tasmanian coastline. The two stories of these amazing women illustrate a rich celebration of family and love.

Eleanor Oliphant is Completely Fine written by Gail Honeyman is the story of a girl who lives her life to a pattern. She wears the same clothes to work every day, eats the same food for lunch every day and buys two bottles of vodka to drink every weekend. She's happy with her carefully timetabled life but then a simple act of kindness shatters her walls and she has to navigate the world that everyone else seems to take for granted. This very original book is funny and sad and very cleverly written to keep the reader enthralled and interested in this most unusual person.

Now for two junior books which, if you're an adult like me (probably not I hear you saying), you may find these two real fun to read. Certainly our young readers will enjoy them and you could always have the excuse to read them to the younger ones.

I'm Really Ever So Not Well is the first of the two books by Lauren Child. These books are about Charlie, a very kind and caring boy whose little sister Lola tries his patience to the limit but he always understands and looks after her very well. In this book, you've guessed that it's Lola who is 'really ever so not well' and Charlie looks after her with a bad result for him.

Again in **But Excuse Me That Is My Book** Lola is proving difficult by claiming a library book is her personal property while Charlie tries to divert her with suggestions of other books. Really these are two gems and the illustrations are excellent, funny yet appealing.

MY grandmother knew how to throw a tea party. Her finest china, her best silverware, the linen napkins crisply ironed – all would be laid out on the table in readiness for Sunday afternoon tea.

Standing on my tip-toes, I'd ring the doorbell to alert my 'Nanna of the Cake' to our family's arrival, the smell of freshly baked scones


wafting through the fly-wire door.

Some 40 years later, and I wonder what she'd make of my own efforts to organise an afternoon tea party – on this occasion to celebrate my daughter's fifth birthday. The crockery and cutlery are different but equally cheery: brightly coloured melamine plates, bowls, cups and serving dishes, together with a swathe of party bunting, all hired from Mount Alexander Sustainability Group's wash against waste service, which has been serving local communities for more than a decade.

"We started off with just the regular party hire, which is white crockery and tumblers, wine glasses and serving platers," says the group's Sarah Myles. was no negligence on the part of the Company and that there was contributory negligence on the part of William Guymer in that he had not put in timbering to secure the area he was working in. The Company also claimed that they had made all reasonable efforts to observe the regulations and any non-observance was due to the negligence of the men who were injured.

On the first day of the case much evidence was heard from miners who had been working at the South German on the day of the accident. Most of them claimed that nothing had been out of the ordinary. On the second day however George Tollitt, the boss of an earlier shift, testified that some days before a 'truck of dirt' had fallen where the accident took place. Guymer's mate, Henry Goldsmith, then told the Court that they had never been told about the earlier fall and, if they had been, they would have been more careful.

The jury found for Matilda Guymer and awarded her family £1,000. Soon after Henry Goldsmith also sued the South German directors and was eventually awarded £1,166.




