Dangerous local road to be upgraded

unding under the Australian Government's Black Spot Program is set to improve 47 dangerous crash sites on Victorian roads in 2022–23.

The state will receive \$18.4 million under the Black Spot Program's 2022–23 funding round, including almost \$2.2 million for the Bendigo electorate.

The local funding includes \$1,200,847 for Fogartys Gap Road at Ravenswood South, one of the most dangerous roads in the electorate.

Federal Member for Bendigo, Lisa Chesters said the funding will be welcomed by the whole community.

"I'm relieved to announce funding to upgrade Fogartys Gap Road, this stretch of road has seen three fatalities in recent times," Ms Chesters said.

"In announcing these new projects, this government recognises the importance of working with the Victorian government to partner with local councils to deliver the program in the state."

Councillor for Tarrengower Ward, Stephen Gardner, said

"After many years of lobbying by council it was great to see Lisa Chesters announce funding to finish the upgrading of Fogartys Gap Road off to the intersection with the Calder Highway and I was very happy to support this."

Cr Gardner told the *Times* that traffic along the narrow and dangerous road has increased, and bike riders are now a common sight.

"Council has prioritised Fogartys Gap Road as its number

The group now meets every Wednesday (during school terms) from 10am to 11.30 at the Maldon Neighbourhood



New directions for Cactus Warriors

OVER the past 16 years, the Tarrangower Cactus Control Group has achieved remarkable success in increasing knowledge about wheel cactus in our local area, and how to keep the problem under control. Now, in this new era of change, the TCCG Committee has decided to plan some different approaches and objectives for our future.

These changes are brought about by many factors, including having achieved most of our original objectives, the overwhelming logistics of running large field days and the desire to have landowners and managers, both public and private, take more responsibility for the control of wheel cactus on their land.

The major changes we are implementing are, limiting our large community field days to two per year and instead focusing on supporting smaller, casual groups treating areas of wheel cactus that they find and by providing information and education via stalls at community events such as the Maldon Market and Maldon and Baringhup Agricultural Show.

We will be maintaining many of our actions, such as continuing to educate and advise new landowners, continuing to provide equipment loans and support to community members willing to kill wheel cactus and continuing to assist Parks Victoria in controlling re-infestations in the Maldon Historic Reserve.

We'll also continue to liaise with council and state government departments for action on the wheel cactus problem and actively promote the wheel cactus issue via TV and radio media, our website, Facebook and wheel cactus control brochure distribution, etcetera.

We have five more events planned for this year which include: a small-scale field day on 28 August, an info stall at Maldon Market on 11 September, an info stall at Maldon Baringhup Ag Show on 16 October, a community field day in Maldon Historic Reserve on 23 October and our AGM on 27 November.

Friends of CHIRP

Beekeepers from around Australia rally together to eradicate parasitic mite

THE presence of Varroa Mite (a parasite of adult honey bees that weakens and kills colonies and can also transmit viruses) has exacerbated and magnified the regular stresses of beekeeping in Australia. Unfortunately, this year there is a huge shortfall of hives to assist with pollination, which could dramatically impact on the almond industry, other food suppliers and local beekeepers.

The importance of managed honey bees as the main ignition point of our food security is becoming more evident. This year the Victorian almond industry will be short up to 60 per cent of their normal hives delivered, placing concerns about the nut set and future crop.

Fifth-generation beekeeper, owner and Managing Director of Warral Maldon, Lindsay Callaway, told the Times, "We will have to help clients spread the bees over more drops. This year

the spread will be much smaller loads. But the bees will give it a red hot go to spread the love!

"Almond trees have a certain number of flowers that are pollinated; they then shed fruit through different stages of the maturing process.

"Fingers crossed, the trees will get enough pollination and shed accordingly. The proof will be in the pudding", said

Warral currently has 500 hives (with 50,000 bees per hive) stuck in NSW due to the border closure, which has resulted in an instant cash flow reduction for the commercial beekeeping

"Even though I'd like to, I'm reluctant to take more bees to NSW, where my canola crop clients are; however, I am able to use the bees that are already there," said Lindsay.

"I've restructured my plans to account for the situation, building more hives, chasing honey flows instead of pollination and looking after hives in Victoria and trying to make the best of the situation.

"The border closure is frustrating and means the business can't function how it needs to. Having the border closed makes it difficult to get to where the 'ball' is (to speak in footy terms).

"Lead by beekeeper volunteers from around Australia, the eradication effort is progressing well; however, if NSW can't contain Varroa Mite, then it will eventually be everywhere in time, including Victoria."

Lindsay, two staff members and another commercial apiarist volunteered their time in July to assist with the eradication of Varroa Mite. They became temporary authorised officers, working alongside 12 volunteer Queensland commercial beekeepers and went into the field, conducting surveillance on beehives near infected premises.

The positive news is that, in addition to the volunteer beekeepers from around Australia, the Department of Primary Industries (DPI) in NSW is working tirelessly, and beekeepers from all around Australia are helping, with between 40 to 80 volunteers on the ground at any one time.

At present, bees are still allowed to move around NSW through the blue zones (where Varroa Mite hasn't been detected) with a permit. Bees in the purple zone (a 25-kilometre radius of mite detection) are unable to be moved and are under

surveillance, and those in the red zone (a 10-kilometre radius) are being euthanised.

As of Monday, 22 August, DPI teams will be working in the Central Coast, Hunter Valley and Newcastle Eradication zones to carry out widespread euthanasia actions. In Victoria, regular mite checks are being undertaken as required.

Lindsay told the *Times* that during peak season, Warral has three and half thousand hives, which equals 200 million bees.

"That's some serious pollination power there! We sent all of our bees off for almond pollination in early August, and they will be picked up in four weeks' time. After that, they will be moved to canola or yellow gum in central Victoria.

"It's all systems go; pollinating, making new bees, making new honey," said Lindsay.

"Commercial beekeepers are champions because we're pollinating the food that feeds Australians. The industry is highly resilient, punching above its weight, and it will bounce back If mite eradication is achieved, we'll high-five each other and be the first and only country to ever eradicate Varroa from our mainland. If Varroa Mite is not eradicated, well, that's the end of an era of beekeeping in Australia, but we'll still say- let's go, beekeeping life will be a little different, though."

RCVC desexing day another win for animal welfare



Dr Yvette Berkely and volunteer vets and vet nurses from Vets for Compassion generously donated their time last Sunday, desexing 28 cats on RCVC's second cat desexing day.

ON Sunday, 21 August, Regional Community Vet Clinic held their second free cat desexing day thanks to a donation received in May specifically for cat desexing, with a total of 28 cats desexed.

RCVC was delighted to welcome volunteer vets and vet nurses from Vets for Compassion, who assisted Dr Yvette Berkely a director of RCVC, castrate 11 male cats and spay 16 females. The de-sexing of 16 females means RCVC has prevented the birth of approximately 400 kittens in the next 12 months. RCVC also handled an unexpected wildlife emergency, helping local wildlife rescuers with critical care of a juvenile kangaroo who had been caught in a fence.

RCVC Director Robyn Slattery and volunteers spent the day hard at work looking after cats from as far away as Maryborough. This free desexing program is saving generations of misery by preventing the births of unwanted kittens and is also saving the lives of thousands of birds and native animals who become prey to cats.

Director James Mack said, "Despite not yet having a permanent home, RCVC will continue to operate pop-up clinics and will shortly launch its outreach program assisting elderly and frail residents to care for their companion animals and maintain the vital human-animal bond".

Regional Community Vet Clinic is working towards building a not-for-profit, low-cost vet clinic in Campbells Creek, with a grant of \$200,000 announced in April from the Victorian State government, giving them a big boost towards the estimated \$400,000 building cost.

RCVC is a not-for-profit, and all donations over \$2 are tax deductible. If you'd like to help RCVC get their project started soon, you can donate via their MyCause page at https://rcvc. org.au/donate/.

The aim of RCVC is to establish facilities that provide affordable, quality veterinary care for companion animals when their owners are experiencing social disadvantage or financial hardship in Central Victoria. It is hoped the RCVC clinic will be up and running by the end of 2023.

Lost heritage



It is with interest that, given the current happenings with Maldon's streetscape, I have been re-reading Brad Hooper's article 'A bid to identify and protect our common heritage' (TT 24 January 2020) and consider its relevance with the visual changes that are undergoing to Maldon's CBD. Brad looks at the various ways in which heritage is lost - it can be sudden but planned; sudden but unplanned, incremental by stealth, incremental by design, or incremental by neglect - much of which can rarely be reversed. The last two ways in which heritage is lost can almost happen before we realise what we have lost. Whereas, with either planned change, or incremental by stealth, there may be some warnings as to what is happening, whether by advertisement by the planning authority or by concerned residents taking note of what is happening around them.

This then leads to the question: is Maldon in need of a fully updated conservation/ heritage study of the town and the former shire of Maldon areas, which has been sadly neglected just like the heritage by the authorities who are charged with the legislative

protection of it? The study would identify what we have as well as determining its significance along with how it should be protected now and into the future. Then there is the documented history and heritage that would add a layer to the physical landscape artefacts and assist with the interpretation.

So whose responsibility is it to stand up and be counted in relation to the heritage that surrounds us all? And how do we get the heritage recorded and protected? Perhaps the shire council needs to step up and be counted as well and protect the 'old heritage' as well as planning for Cr Gardner's 'new heritage', or should we just put Maldon's heritage to rest as reported and pictured in the TT on the 24 April 2009?

Slowly Decaying

New Maldon entry sign not following heritage guidelines

I found it interesting that council has not followed Maldon Heritage Guidelines in the new design options for the town entry sign. MALDON DESIGN GUIDELINES - 1998 SCHEDULE 6 - ADVERTISING SIGNS states:

'RAISED CAPITALS: While the general practice was to use uniform capital letters, some small number of signs have words set out in capitals but with the first letter (and sometimes the last) slightly taller than the other letters.

The lettering faces on signs were sometimes given additional character by flaring the letters, by presenting them as shaded faces, by highlighting parts of the letters, or by giving the letters cast shadows. In addition to these devices, words were sometimes arranged as a waving pattern.'

The old sign uses capital letters, so why have council themselves chosen not to follow the heritage guidelines?

I'd also be interested to know who decided on the two designs out of the 30 submitted.

So your pet needs a dental...what does this involve?

YOU may have been told during a routine veterinary check that your dog or cat needs a dental. This means that signs of dental disease have been detected, such as a build-up of calculus, gingivitis (gum inflammation) or tooth decay.

As humans, we brush our teeth every day and have our teeth professionally cleaned and scaled at the dentist once or twice a year. While it is possible to brush our pet's teeth, this is often too difficult or time-consuming to be done regularly to make a difference. Hence over time, it is inevitable that their teeth will need a scale and polish to address dental disease and deal

A lot of people ask, why does a dog or cat need to be under anaesthetic to have their teeth cleaned? There are many reasons for this:

- 1. We need them to hold still if you've ever tried to brush your dog or cat's teeth, you can appreciate how hard it is to do anything around their mouth. A dental involves probing under the gum line to assess gum recession, probing teeth for decay, ultrasonic scaling and polishing.
- 2. We need to protect their airway scaling and polishing teeth involves a lot of water, just like when we have our own teeth scaled at the dentist. Therefore, we need to be able to ensure they can maintain their breathing without panicking. They have an endotracheal tube placed while

under anaesthesia to keep their airway open and prevent them from inhaling water.


It hurts to have teeth extracted - once they are under anaesthesia, we are able to determine whether there are any rotten teeth that need extracting, and this is quite often the case. Extracting teeth is not easy; it involves injecting local anaesthetic, cutting into the gum to access the roots, sectioning the tooth using a burr in order to remove each tooth root separately, and sometimes burring into the bone to remove retained roots.

The dental machines that veterinarians use are the same as the machines that human dentists use. So next time you're sitting in the dentist's chair, imagine your pet going through the same process and how difficult it would be if they weren't anaesthetised. It is understandable to have concerns about putting your pet under anaesthesia, which is why it's important for your pet to see a veterinarian for a full health check and discussion about potential anaesthetic risks and what can be done to minimise them. Know Your Local - Frank Forster

OWNER of the EnviroShop in Newstead, Frank's passion and knowledge about all things renewable are astounding. There is an increasing demand for renewable energy, and Frank believes that the best starting point is to understand your energy usage and ways to improve efficiency before upgrading systems.

"Everyone wants a magic wand, but there's no magic fix for anyone. Australia has so many advantages, such as space, sunshine, and truckloads of coastline, and with the development of undersea cables, there's the possibility of supplying green energy to other countries. Australia has smart people and good academic research capability; we can definitely move towards being smarter, cleaner and greener.

I grew up in Auckland, New Zealand, and after high school, I moved to the South Island to the city of Dunedin with the intent of becoming a doctor, but Dunedin was a very university-oriented town. With all the attractions and distractions (whichever way you look at it), the social aspects and student politics in the 70s, so I started studying history and politics, which I found to be less academic and more socially interactive.

Then I travelled overseas, to Australia and the US for a year, a working holiday. I spent winter skiing in a resort in Colorado and travelled during the summer. I bought a 'Rambler', a huge, dark green station wagon, for \$500. I used to roll out the sleeping bag in the back at night time.

Then I moved to Australia in 1982, initially in Canberra, where I studied my master's in political science at the Australian National University before working in Canberra for six years in the Department of Trade.

I did a lot of research, preparing briefs for ministers etcetera. This was during the time of the Hawke/Keating government, and the public service was dynamic, with a lot of new initiatives. I really enjoyed that for a while.

After that, I moved to Melbourne and worked at an industry association. There were a lot of small high-tech manufacturers who developed a whole network in the early 90s, taking on trade missions and early co-op research centres, promoting Australia's high-tech advanced manufacturing.

I then went on to work as an International Market Manager for a company that was selling to America, Europe and Asia.

I've been married twice, first when I came to Australia, and after that, I met Angie at an office we both worked at on St Kilda Road. We were married in 1990, so we've been married for 32 years. Angie has two children from a former marriage, and we have a daughter, Aspen (named after the ski resort I stayed at in the US), who has just turned 30.

Despite the strength of a relationship, there are not many couples who can run a business together, and we've run two.

We had 'She Sells Seafood' in Castlemaine for nine years. During that time, we spent a lot of time contemplating sustainability, and we often had customers asking about sustainably sourced fish. I got fairly interested in the issue, first, as it related to the food industry and then more broadly. Outside of work, I became involved in the Mount Alexander Sustainability Group, which at that time was looking at building a community wind farm.

When we sold the business, I was in my 50s and didn't want to retire, I wanted to find something intellectually stimulating, and someone asked if I was interested in starting up a renewable energy business. We started at the top end of Barker Street in Castlemaine. I could see an opportunity, and that this would be the way of the future.

When I'm not eating, breathing and dreaming of renewable energy? Mountain bike riding is my escape. I'm part of the Castlemaine Rocky Riders, and there are so many great places around Castlemaine, Maldon, Muckleford and Harcourt.

Of course, I've broken things; that goes with the territory. In the last six years, I've broken a collar bone and elbow and had cracked ribs. My wife knows that I'll come home with cuts and scrapes.

Five to six years ago, I used to ride a lot harder, but as you get older, the body doesn't recover as quickly, so I'm a little more conservative now. However, I do still ride the black diamond rock trails (there are green circles for beginners, blue squares for an intermediate, black diamond for an advanced and double black diamond for the really extreme!).

The technology in mountain bikes these days is fantastic; there are dual suspension and stiff frames. The mechanics of it all is very forgiving, which enables people to ride technical trails more safely. If you look back at videos from the 80s, there was no suspension or decent brakes; they were complete daredevils!

I also used to present a regular radio program on Main FM called 'Independence Incarcerated', featuring a lot of Indi music and was able to attend many big festivals between 2006- 2014; Meredith, Falls, Splendour, Laneways etcetera. That was great fun. The whole scene has moved on now, and the demographic has changed."

It is an exquisite literary meander for those who, like Bird, are captivated by words, imagery and symbolism.

Along the Coliban: A Journey Through Landscape and Time by Brian Coman and Harry Oldmeadow

This stylishly produced book presents a series of portraits of the Coliban River and its more recent history through the personal experiences of two people. Brian Coman, drawing on his lifelong association with the river, wrote the text, and Harry Oldmeadow took the photographs that sumptuously illustrate the book throughout. Coman and Oldmeadow's aim is primarily to portray the natural beauty of the river from its source near Lyonsville 'little more than a swampy depression' until it empties itself into Lake Eppalock. As they trace its journey through the landscape, they also tell of some of its history since colonisation - from observations by Major Mitchell to the construction of reservoirs and channels - all of which inevitably and irrevocably changed the river and its surrounding vegetation. Published this year, the book will appeal to those interested in local geography, recent history and feats of engineering, or those who just want to enjoy beautiful photos of the Coliban River.

Past the Shallows by Favel Parrett

BLAST FROM THE PAST

The Oswald Ward



ightrightarpoons Oswald Ward.

When local mine owner Robert Dent Oswald Snr died in 1891, he bequeathed £500 to the Maldon Hospital. Five years later, an inspection of the hospital revealed a long list of urgent repairs required to the buildings. During a discussion about what should be done, hospital committee member William Broughall suggested that the best approach would be to pull down the old, dilapidated benevolent ward and use Oswald's bequest to replace it with a new wing.

Broughall's proposal was supported by Oswald's son, Robert Dent Oswald Jnr, and was adopted at a committee meeting on Friday, 4 September 1896. It was agreed to name the new building the 'Oswald Ward'. Due to illness William Broughall could not attend the meeting, and he died 10 days later.

Local architect Louis Boldini drafted plans for the new ward, and the committee called for builders to tender for the project and to make other repairs to the hospital. When the period for tenders closed on 13 November, five had been received. Only one of them was from a local builder. George Clayfield of Daylesford offered to complete the work for £876 and was awarded the contract. Prior to the start of work, photographs were taken of the old building in its original condition and copies were sold for 2s 6d each.

Work progressed well, and in early July 1897, the *Tarrangower Times* reported that the new building was completed. The *Times* described it as comprising two large rooms, one to be used by benevolent asylum inmates and the other as a hospital ward. The building had high ceilings and excellent lighting and ventilation.

The hospital committee then started to plan a celebration for the ward's opening. Initially, it was suggested that a dance be held in the new building. This suggestion, however, was quickly set aside as being inappropriate. Instead, a 'calico ball' was organised to be held in the Shire Hall. The ball proved a great success both socially and financially.

Although the building had been completed and opened, the hospital was still waiting for approval from the Board of Health before it could be occupied. In December 1897, the Board asked for improvements to the flooring, ventilation in the dining room and other minor changes. Exasperated, the hospital committee told the Board they did not have any funds to make further changes. This seems to have ended the matter, and the ward was soon fully occupied.






