Concern Grows for Native Wildlife and Residents

New Warnings for Noise Pollution Are Policy Makers Hearing?

THE community is awaiting follow up from local Member for Bendigo West, Maree Edwards, regarding the petition to close local wetlands to recreational duck shooting and instead make them a sanctuary for the threatened species which call them home.

The petition attracted just

under 500 signatures, mostly local, compared to a petition by shooters to have duck shooting remain which ob-

tained 21 signatures (11 local).

A spokesperson for Regional Victorians Opposed to Duck Shooting Inc said community sentiment is obvious and calls for action.

From a safety perspective, two wetlands were closed to shooting in Mildura in 2019 for safety reasons - without 483 signatures. The group says this paves the way for Goulburn Murray Water (GMW) to do the same at their storage here.

Documents obtained through freedom of information show GMW was aware of safety concerns of their own staff in approaching duck shooters. "We would like to see them show more concern for public safety, protection of threatened species, and economic impacts to surrounding towns," said the spokesperson.

It's no secret Victoria is failing to protect threatened species as has featured in major media.

'We would be lucky to have a dozen wetland sanctuaries compared to the thousands of public waterways across our state where shooters can take

Fire restrictions

THE Fire Danger Period will begin at 1am on Monday 6 December for the City of Greater Bendigo and will begin at 1am on Monday 13 December for Mount Alexander and Central Goldfield Shires.

The Seasonal Bushfire Outlook for Victoria released on 26 August identified potential for increased grassfire conditions for the 2021/22 fire season.

Much of Victoria has experienced average to above average rainfall during winter and this is likely to result in continuous grass and crop fuels through most areas west and north of the Great Dividing Range.

However, Acting Assistant Chief Fire Officer Chris Jacobsen reminded Victorians that even an average fire season in this state can still be a bad one.

"Conditions through the last fire season were similar to what we're expecting this year, and during those months we saw significant grass fires in the north and west of the state," he said.

"We've had plenty of winter and spring rainfall and now as the grass and bush is drying out in the North West and Central parts of the state, the warmer weather, and drying grass means the fire potential is becoming heightened.

"Reducing fuel loads in these areas will ensure if a fire does break out, it has less chance of taking hold or spreading.

"While CFA and our partner agencies Fire Rescue Victoria and Forest Fire Management Victoria are doing everything we can to prepare for the bushfire season, we look to the community to use common sense and take responsibility for preventing fires."







and selling furniture made from old pallets, including planter boxes, dog houses and possum homes.

"The possum boxes were made because there were heaps of possums living in the old buildings so we needed to re-home them," said Chris.

"I love it, I've worked with these guys for a couple of years. They've picked up the skills well, and are building towards independence, which is what we want.

"We're going to start fixing up old bikes soon, so if anyone has any old bikes lying around they want to donate, please let us know."

Dylan, an EPIC participant, told the Tarrangower Times that they've also been doing some painting and

rendering at Porcupine Village, and his favourite part of the work so far has been the bonfire. He'd like to work at a car wreckers when he finishes his workplace training.

A keen worker, Nathan said, "It's been pretty interesting. I'd like to do woodwork after I finish here. As long as I'm building something with my hands I'm all right."

EPIC is part of Access Australia Group and is a National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS)-funded employment preparation program for recent school leavers. The NDIS funding is called School Leaver Employment Supports (SLES).

Paul Weeks, EPIC team leader, told the Times that he has worked with Access Australia Group for six years. His role includes not only developing work experience opportunities, but advocacy on behalf of participants and their families, usually with the NDIA and Centrelink.

"EPIC now supports over 30 young people through SLES funding," Paul said, "and our goal is to help the participants open employment, which is to say, working in what are not traditionally considered disability-specific roles and industries. We have had some amazing outcomes. Graduates from our program are now working in jobs such as motor mechanic, at Bunnings, at Coles, Don KR, and in fields like hospitality, cleaning, and retail.

"The partnership with Porcupine Village has been very valuable for our participants, and came at a time when COVID meant we were unable to complete as much work experience in our more 'traditional sectors' setting like retail. Doug has made us all very welcome, and the variety of tasks means the participants have built a whole new range of skills."

"I left Year 12 three days in," laughs Casey. "I went and did my builders pre-apprenticeship at CVGT in Bendigo and spent one day a week working with Kinga. He told me you can only work one day here and there, it won't ever be an apprenticeship. I kept asking and he gave in,"

Councillor's Column

It has been a busy couple of months on council and in Maldon. As everyone is aware we have reached the 90 percent double vaccination rates and we are all getting back to relatively normal.

It's great to see Melbourne people visiting us. I know it has been great to catch up with friends and family and to welcome people back in our homes. The town has been busy with visitors and the coming couple of months are looking to be a busy period. Some of the highlights have been:

- The new street lights are in and the solar lights have gone
- The front shop rejuvenation grants have been advertised and council staff are working with those shop owners who are looking to participate
- There is a meeting of stakeholders in December to look at the feedback

from the crossovers. I am an advocate for improving the streetscape to make it accessible for all so I am hopeful we will have a design that is acceptable and meets the local heritage experts.

It was fantastic to see that the old Bank Corner received an Award for best regional town and the work council and the Old Salvage Yard did to make this successful was nothing short of awesome. Council is looking at what can be done to keep this in place but improve it, as it really has turned into a great community asset.

I want to also acknowledge Liam and the local kids who put together a short video advocating for a skate park/pump track. I presented this to council officers who will have a look at it, get in touch with Liam, and this will be considered as part of the 2021/22 budget process. This was an initiative by some of our local kids and I look forward to supporting it.

Council meetings

Since the last time I wrote there have been two council meetings in October and November. The October meeting mainly dealt with administrative items that we were required to finalise under the Local Government Act.

The only planning matter of interest was the shed that has been built on the Maldon/Castlemaine Road and the change of use to a depot. Cr Driscoll (Loddon Ward) moved a motion to NOT approve this application and I supported this. I felt that the location for this depot is not appropriate. It will see an increase in truck movements and the creation of a major intersection at the entrance of Maldon is not desirable and I also feel that there are significant risks having large trucks entering and exiting on a small intersection. This motion was supported by the majority of the Council so no permit was issued.

November meeting

Cr Henderson put forward a motion to rescind the decision made in the October meeting for the shed on the Maldon/Castlemaine Road. Her reason for this was she felt that the traffic management report was not given due consideration when not approving the planning application. I did not agree with this as the report was provided and I did consider this in my decision making. This motion was eventually successful so council will now have to revisit this application at the December meeting. Personally I was astounded by such a motion and this is the first time this sort of thing has happened in my time on council and I believe in a very long time.

November also saw the election of the new Mayor – Cr Maltby and I look forward to working with him over the next 12 months. I was particularly pleased to nominate and see Cr Annear being elected as Deputy Major and I believe she has shown leadership on a number of major issues, put a lot of time and effort into Council activities and grown her leadership abilities. I know she will make a great future Mayor.

It is nearly Christmas and it is looking like this year we will be able to travel, catch up with family and friends and overall I hope it is a great time. For me personally and professionally (council and work), it has been hectic to say the least and I am really looking forward to some down time. I would encourage everyone to be mindful that each and every one of us have dealt with or had different experiences during the last two years. towards Reconciliation

RECONCILIATION - ARE WE ANY CLOSER?



WHAT does Reconciliation mean?

Dictionary definition: restoration of friendly relations, process of two people or groups in a conflict agreeing to make amends or come to a truce.

Reconciliation can be seen in action in some relatively recent events. However there continue to be appalling breaches of what Reconciliation should mean more centrally in our shared Australia.

In the lead up to the 2001 centenary of Federation, the Council for Reconciliation organised Corroboree 2000: a meeting of dozens of high-profile Indigenous and non-Indigenous leaders on Sorry Day where the Australian Declaration Towards Reconciliation was presented. It concluded with 'Our hope is for a united Australia that respects this land of ours; values the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander heritage; and provides justice and equity

The following day 250,000 Indigenous and non-Indigenous people streamed across



the Harbour Bridge for the Corroboree Walks; Brisbane's silent march was held a week later with 60,000 participants; Melbourne's Walk for Reconciliation was attended by 300,000 people on 3 December 2000. Scores of smaller walks were held in other state capitals and regional towns.

These peaceful demonstrations, symbolic of moving from the injustices of the past to a new togetherness, illustrated shifts in public mood and the growing awareness of the importance of reconciliation and the need for a national apology.

In the same year, Cathy Freeman's win at the Sydney Olympics united Australians, but later the energy of the Bridge walks was challenged, in part due to the political stance of the government of the time. Practical as well as symbolic action was needed, and some significant actions were a long time coming.

In 2001 the Council for Aboriginal Reconciliation was replaced by a new, independent body, Reconciliation Australia



with the ultimate goal to build strong and trusting relationships between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and other Australians as a foundation for success in the goals of closing the gaps and sharing a sense of fairness and justice.

Since 2000, significant actions include the Close the Gap campaign for Indigenous equality in health, education etc (2006); the Emergency Response in the Northern Territory (2007); the Apology on behalf of the Nation (2008); the Recognise campaign to amend the Constitution (2012); and the Uluru Statement from the Heart (2017), unfortunately rejected by the Turnbull government.

Victoria was the first Australian state to pass Treaty legislation (2018); the Budj Bim Cultural Landscape was given World Heritage status (2019). In 2020 the Black Lives Matter marches protested Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander deaths in custody and were attended by tens of thousands of Australians.

That same year, mining company Rio Tinto destroyed two 46,000-year-old sites in the Juukan gorge, Pilbara, illustrating the need for protective legislation of important traditional sites. It is yet to be passed.

In Castlemaine, in partnership between the Shire Council, the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community and the broader community a Sorry Day commemoration has been held each year since 1998 and a Reconciliation Week exhibition mounted annually since 2000.

This year, the Victorian Government is setting up the Yoo-rrook justice commission to investigate both historical and ongoing injustices against Aboriginal people, as part of the truth-telling process called for by the Uluru Statement from the Heart.

Nalderun is a service that supports the Aboriginal Community, led by Aboriginal people. Many people and organisations in the Mount Alexander Shire contribute to Nalderun; the name is a Dja Dja Wurrung word meaning 'all together'.

aim at our native waterbirds. Threatened species are too often collateral damage."

The group believes that sanctuaries here (and elsewhere) would make a real difference in helping native wildlife, while also opening up the area to the benefits of nature-based tourism.

"In the first year birdwatching data was collected in Australia, over 1.4 million tourists birdwatched in our country and spent \$2.88 billion. More overnight domestic tourists birdwatched than visited the Great Barrier Reef and more international tourists birdwatched than fished" (source: National Visitor Survey Year ending December 2019).

Meanwhile, studies show most holiday makers avoid areas where there is shooting.

This week the EPA issued a warning on the use of scare guns due to noise pollution and RVOTDS say noise pollution from shotguns is worse. "If you compare the decibels from gas guns, to that of shotguns, you begin to understand

the impact duck shooting is having on residents. Add to that, the fact it starts before dawn and is allowed to go all day for weeks if not months.

"As the petition comments show, people are stressed and anxious. Animals are impacted. It's very hard to work from home. There are real health and safety risks of duck shooting to community which authorities need to act on," said the spokesperson.

Recreational duck shooting is banned in QLD, ACT, NSW and WA. In Victoria, less than half of one percent of the population shoot ducks. Professional polls show most Victorians want the activity banned, with the strongest support for a ban coming from regional areas.



BLAST FROM THE PAST

THE BICYCLE CLUB



☆ Early Maldon cyclists.

In the 1890s bicycle riding was all the rage. When the Governor, Lord Hopetoun, visited Maldon in May 1894, members of the Castlemaine Bicycle Club rode out from Castlemaine to be at the Maldon station in time to meet his train. They covered the eleven-mile journey in forty minutes.

The Maldon Bicycle Club was formed on June 27 1894 at the Criterion Hotel which once stood at the corner of High and Camp streets. Robert Dent Oswald junior was elected president and Rees David was elected secretary. Rees David was an accomplished cyclist who had recently won a twenty-five mile road race from Castlemaine to Newstead via Guildford. The club's colours were navy blue coat, cap and shorts with cardinal red stockings.

The new club competed in road races against members of the Castlemaine, Maryborough, Bendigo and Dunolly bicycle clubs. They also competed at track meetings held at Laanecoorie. A meeting was held there in September 1894 after heavy rain on a track described as a "sea of mud".

The Maldon Bicycle Club also lobbied the Shire Council to have a cinder track laid around the Shire reserve. The club offered to contribute to the cost of the track and asked other local organizations that used the reserve to also contribute.

The Shire agreed to lay the track and it was in place in time for the Amalgamated Miners' sports meeting in October 1894. This meeting featured the first track cycling races held in Maldon. There were two handicap races held over distances of two and three miles.

The Maldon Bicycle Club held its first race meeting at the Shire Reserve on the Prince of Wales' Birthday, November 9 1894. They organized a sports day that combined cycling with footraces and wood chopping events. The Brass Band also played during the afternoon.

Handicap races were held over one, two and three miles. Some of the best riders from neighbouring towns were attracted to the meeting by the generous cash prizes on offer. The leading rider on the day was J. Young from Castlemaine. The day ended with a novelty event, "tilting at the ring on safety bicycles".



Modern mining in Maldon: Nuggety Mine drilling to commence today

IN addition to the current surface drilling program at Union Hill mine, a surface drilling program will begin Friday 3 December at Nuggetty Mine (MIN5528) within the Maldon Historic Reserve.

According to Shawn Panton, Kaiser Reef Chief Geologist, the rig is mobilising from NSW today (Wednesday 1 December). The delay has been caused by a combination of factors related to border closures and staff availability for the drilling contractor.

"There are many variables that can affect the duration of a surface drilling program. It could take four to five weeks, however my hope is that it would be much less," said Shawn. "The first hole will give us a better indication."

According to information on the Kaiser Reef website, the Nuggetty Mine was one of the highest grade gold mines in Victoria, having produced an estimated 301,000 ounces from 50,000 tons, an average grade of 184 g/t (~ 6 oz/t).

A recent mining study has returned a positive economic assessment of the proposed Nuggetty Underground Mine, 2km north of Union Hill. The Nuggetty mining lease was recently renewed and Kaiser is moving ahead with the necessary approvals for mining.

Monster Meeting flag will be raised at 3pm to the music of local brass band Brasslemania. Then more music from Crosswinds plus speeches from the dray by local MPs Maree Edwards and Lisa Chesters, Karen Doyle from Parks Victoria and historian Marjorie Theobald. Angus Read-Hill will bring us parts of the rousing speeches from the 1851 speakers, finishing with more music from Brasslemania. MC for the day will be Mt Alexander Shire Deputy Mayor Rosie Annear.

COVID regulations will apply including registration. Hand sanitisers will be provided, plus toilet facilities onsite. It is BYO water bottles and chairs.


