ount Alexander Shire Council (MASC) announced last Friday 7 February that a large crew, shooting for a Hollywood movie, will arrive to film in Castlemaine over the next week. Permits are still being finalised so not all details are available, but the council advised that a Liam Neeson movie called *The Mongoose* will be shot in the centre of town in streets including Lyttleton, Templeton and Frederick Streets, plus some filming on the Midland Highway near Maclise Street. The expected dates are Monday 17 to Tuesday 25 February and some changes to traffic access may occur during these times.

Council advised that it is working closely with the production company, Servo Productions, to arrange permits; it requires the film team to work closely with local community. The council announcement said: "We understand that this filming might cause some inconvenience over those days. At Mount Alexander Shire Council, we are seeking to maximise the substantial benefits this opportunity presents the shire and the region, while recognising and minimising the effect it has on the community's day-to-day operations."

Walk to consider impact of proposed chicken farms

THE group behind the Castlemaine to Maryborough Rail Trail (CMRT) project is inviting the general public to take a walk along a section of the trail on Sunday 16 March, asking residents to consider the potential impact of proposed broiler farms. The CMRT project aims to turn the 1870s railway line, known as the Moloort Line, into a recreational track for walking, running and cycling between Castlemaine and Maryborough.

President of CMRT Janice Simpson explained that the proposed Carisbrooke broiler farm, which has an application with Central Goldfields Shire (CGS) Council, would affect the rail trail because it is very close to the old railway line. "They've proposed a buffer zone over the existing rail trail," she explained. The CGS Planning Scheme requires 'buffers' for various constructions, to provide adequate distances between different uses of land.

The CMRT website states that the proposed buffer, "could limit or stop use of about 1.5km of the Rail Trail across the Moolort Plains." But Ms Simpson explained that there is no option to move the rail trail from its 150-yearold route. "There's been a feasibility study that indicates it's very feasible and there's no reason to go anywhere else." She pointed out that Central Goldfields Shire Council and Mount Alexander Shire Council have each pledged \$40,000 to the project. "I can't see that cash-strapped councils want to chuck money into the air for no gain," she said.

The CMRT hopes that if people can walk the route, they will be able to see the impact that a broiler farm would have on users of the trail. "The walk will cover the 1.3km of 'buffer zone' according to the application," Ms Simpson said. "Readers might like to come along, Geoff Park will speak, he knows so much about the Moolort Plains. We've chosen that location to specifically highlight where the planning proposal has located the broiler farm and we hope people will be able to see that the site is inappropriate."

Peter Strang from Maldon Cycling indicated that a broiler farm might not be a draw-card for cyclists on the route. "It depends. Having

a broiler farm there would not make it more attractive," Peter said. "It certainly could be a disincentive if it was sited badly." It reinforces the suggestion that people should visit for themselves.

The CMRT project commenced in February 2021, with a feasibility study completed in August 2023; it is now in its pre-construction phase. The \$35million project has received funding so far from the Mount Alexander Shire Council, Central Goldfields Shire Council, State Government of Victoria. The Tarrangower Times has contacted Mount Alexander Shire Council for comment.

Ms Simpson said that her group is opposed to the proposed broiler farm application. "We have formally objected to CGS because that's where the formal application lies. Members of our committee have been in touch directly with councillors about our concerns."

Avian flu arrives in Victoria

Agriculture Victoria confirmed on Saturday 8 February the presence of avian influenza at a poultry property in northern Victoria. The affected property has been placed under quarantine and restrictions have been placed over much of Strathbogie Shire to prevent movements that could spread the virus. The Australian Centre for Disease Preparedness at Geelong stated that it is a different strain to the one that impacted south-western Victorian poultry farms during 2024 and the 2024 New South Wales/Australian Capital Territory outbreak.

The current risk to the public remains low and Agriculture Victoria advised that it is safe to consume eggs and poultry products from supermarkets.

Any suspicion of an emergency animal disease (EAD) should be immediately reported to the 24-hour EAD Hotline on 1800 675 888 or to your local vet.

MP rejects renewables



Member for Northern Victoria Region Rikkie-Lee Tyrrell has used the first sitting week of State Parliament, Tuesday 4 to Thursday 6 February, to make contributions relating to three proposed renewable energy projects that she says will rob three separate communities within this electorate of valuable agricultural land. The One Nation Party member called on Minister for Planning Sonya Kilkenny to reject planning permits for a Battery Energy Storage System (BESS) project in Dederang and solar facilities proposed for Meadow Creek and Colbinabbin, between Bendigo and Rushworth. Mrs Tyrrell said: "All three of these projects are strongly opposed by the respective communities and it is time the Minister and the Allan Labor Government finally listened to regional Victorians instead of pushing ahead with their destructive renewable energy agenda."

Council building services shared

Mount Alexander Shire Council (MASC) announced on Monday 10 February that it has entered a partnership with Hepburn Shire Council to deliver building services across both shire areas. It says community members will benefit from a more streamlined and efficient building services team. The consolidation of the building services teams means a single, skilled team will now provide building services to the communities of both shires.

The new team structure will commence on Tuesday 1 April 2025 and will be managed by MASC. MASC Chief Executive Officer, Darren Fuzzard said the change would improve service delivery and reduce duplication. "By combining our resources, we can provide a stronger, more efficient service for our communities," said Mr Fuzzard. "This means better support for local builders, businesses and residents when it comes to building processes." The council says there will be no changes to the way residents and businesses access services.

Mosquito virus found in Northern VIC

A confirmed human case of Japanese encephalitis (JE) has been identified in a resident of northern Victoria, the first case of JE in Victoria this mosquito season. JE virus has also been detected through environmental surveillance in northern Victoria along the Murray River, and in mosquitoes and feral pigs in New South Wales this summer. These findings indicate that JE virus is likely circulating in northern Victoria. JE virus can cause a rare but potentially serious infection of the brain and is spread to humans through bites from infected mosquitoes.



Residents and people visiting northern Victoria, particularly inland riverine regions and near the Murray River, are potentially at higher risk of infection and should take measures to prevent mosquito bites by using mosquito repellent containing picaridin or diethyltoluamide (DEET) on all exposed skin. Wear long, loose fitting clothing when outside, and ensure accommodation, including tents are properly fitted with mosquito nettings or screens.

Power company responds to fuse concerns

Last week's edition of the *Tarrangower Times* (Friday 7 February) featured a story about

Sam and Alex, who'd been alerted by a buzzing sound to some faulty wiring in their Maldon house. The *TT* approached Powercor and asked whether there might be an issue with older fuses. A spokesperson from Powercor has responded as follows:

"We have a wide range of protective devices on our network including fuses, automatic circuit reclosers, circuit breakers, bushfire safety devices and many more. Our teams conduct an extensive inspections and maintenance programs all year round to make sure the network remains safe and reliable. Our crews are positioned at depots right across central, northern and western Victoria and respond to any faults as quickly as possible."

The Spokesperson also advised that customers can report any faults to Powercor's Bendigo based contact centre any time on: 13 24 12.

STATE and Federal representatives of this region met at Crusoe College in Bendigo last week as both Governments made a joint announcement last week about education funding, having come to a landmark agreement that ties federal financial contributions to reforms designed to benefit students. They announced on Friday 7 February that the Australian Government will increase its contribution to Victorian public schools as the state education system makes changes intended to help students catch up, keep up and finish school.

As part of the agreement, the Commonwealth will provide an additional 5 per cent of the Schooling Resource Standard (SRS) — an estimate of how much total public funding a school needs to meet its students' educational needs — lifting the federal contribution from 20 per cent to 25 per cent of the SRS by 2034. Federal Member for Bendigo Lisa Chesters

said: "Every school student in the Bendigo electorate deserves access to a quality education. This landmark funding agreement will help improve our local schools and boost outcomes for students."

Some of the proposed improvements to education include: early phonics and numeracy checks to identify students who need additional help; initiatives that support wellbeing for learning, including access to mental health professionals in schools; high-quality and evidence-based professional learning; initiatives that improve the attraction and retention of teachers.

"There's no better place to get a world class education than one of our Victorian public schools here in Bendigo," Member for Bendigo West Maree Edwards said. "This funding agreement is a win for our students and teachers and ensures that our local public schools get their fair share.'

On location, behind the scenes

AS excitement builds for another Hollywood production filming in our region, the Tarrangower Times wanted to find out all about the behind-the-scenes processes involved.

Emily Owens is Executive Producer and CEO of Toffee Studios, which has recently been host to the filming of the new Netflix show, Apple Cider Vinegar and the 2025 AACTA (Australian Academy of Cinema, Television and the Arts) award-winning film, Better Man. Emily has extensive film and television production experience; she speaks passionately about the industry and the unique opportunities created when filming in country Victoria. She was happy to give the TT her expert, insider information about how location filming works.

"It's really important that everyone's on board and everyone understands the process," Emily said, explaining that Mount Alexander Shire Council (MASC) has a department to help manage permits and expectations for residents. "You'll have people working in council that are representing residents, they will work

with the people that will be affected by the filming."

The MASC website outlines the requirements for film, television and advertising shoots, which include permits to use council-managed land including roads, lanes, paths and parks.

"There's so much paperwork," Emily said. "Film crews have to work so hard with mud maps (site plans) and traffic management plans, there's a whole department and they will be working with the council to work it out. Council may also have been on the site visits to choose the shooting locations. Then they have to do what is reasonable and fair for the local residents - your council might request a physical meeting or a letterbox drop. It will be mandated by the council as to how the residents should be informed."

For various reasons, not least of which is the privacy that must be shown to a Hollywood star, not all information about a film shoot will be made publicly available. "They have duty of care so there may be some 'cloak and daggers' involved. They may have some flexibility in case they can't film due to changes in the weather, for example, and they are not going to inform everyone about every step,' Emily said. In situations where residents may be inconvenienced, the crew is required to keep the community informed. "It will be really low impact compared to something like construction, but the people that are affected, the crew is going to let them know. If people haven't been told, it may be because they won't be affected."

Emily spoke about the reasons why particular locations will be chosen, saying: "Place tells story, they've come here for a reason. But many other places are fighting for this business." She said producers, who were hit hard by COVID and have struggled to rebuild the local industry, want to work in regional towns where the process is smooth. "The thing is for film crews, they want ease, they want logistics to be worked out. It's highly stressful to work out things like truck access, three-phase power and billeting for crew. It's a major responsibility and they want to be conscientious." She said locations are often an extra 'character' in a film and they can inspire the feel of the film and then the region shines through.

And as for the benefits of having Hollywood come to our hometown? According to Emily, they might start with the shoot itself but then continue. "Local services will be used in those areas," she said, pointing to catering, props, traffic management and accommodation as examples. "It attracts a lot of attention to a place, think of Bondi Rescue and Bondi Vet. And with Lord of the Rings, people who trained in New Zealand have now gone on to work in Hollywood."

Overall, Emily believes that a local film production is immensely positive, particularly for tourism. "The benefit is far-reaching. And it's exciting; it's beyond financial. If you get it right, it becomes part of the tapestry of the region. We want to step in a place where we know our stars and our heroes have stepped, because we want to be part of that."

Works will commence in February and be completed in March. Please keep clear of the area during this time.

Given the tree's cultural significance and listing on the

Victorian Aboriginal Heritage Register, Council officers have consulted with local Djaara elders on the above listed works. The large, fallen limb will be used by DJAARA (Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation) for exciting future cultural activities.

TINKERS GOTTERS

CLAIRE Cooper has been gardening so long that she doesn't even know how she knows so much about it. But she continues to seek learning opportunities and she shares her knowledge without hesitation.

Claire's garden is an example of what can be done with care and innovation; she is self-sufficient in many areas. Old bathtubs are now clever wicking beds boasting vigorous cherry tomatoes. A permanent 'net' structure over the entire main orchard protects various fruit trees and Claire has enjoyed an extended season this year, compared to many who have been invaded by lorikeet bandits.

"The fruit trees are still going," she confirms. "Nectarines at the moment and the apple trees are laden. The plums are finished and the peaches are almost done. The citrus is going gangbusters, even though some people say that Maldon doesn't do well with citrus."

It has been a delicious summer in Claire's kitchen garden, which she commenced in 2017 with only two existing trees. Claire has been activating her green thumb since around 2003 before moving to Maldon from West Brunswick. It's one of her favourite activities, alongside exercising. Aqua-aerobics at Maldon Pool is a particularly favourite way for Claire to keep cool, stay fit and spend time with local friends in summer. Claire is a regular walker and she also works out with a personal trainer. Honestly, she puts many of us to shame with the healthy activities; isn't it inspiring? But back to the garden. The permanent netting over the orchard is a fairly new feature, having been installed in late 2024 by a company called Key Permaculture. "Now I just open the door and pick some cherries," Claire enthuses. "It's like going to the IGA!" But not everyone was happy with the installation of the net. "The galahs sitting up in the gum tree were watching and they were not impressed," she laughs.

There is so much smart thinking in every detail. "One side is bee-friendly because they need to get in and pollinate," Claire explains. "And the other side is fruit-fly covered netting." She goes on to explain that sadly, fruit fly has invaded Victoria — it is now considered endemic — and that everyone needs to be vigilant. "You can get traps with different lures for males and females. And I always remove fruit from under the trees for hygiene reasons, because fruit fly can spread to neighbouring houses. It's also good to freeze the fruit before you put it in the compost, to kill the fruit flies," Claire says, ever sensible.

Another innovation that others might choose to copy is the hand-stitched shade-cloths over the garden beds. They can be pulled up or down with a simple mechanism, depending upon the intensity of the sun. Meanwhile, the wicking beds are designed to reduce the need for constant care; the roots head down to the water well at the base and the water 'wicks' upwards. "It takes more effort to set them up, but then you can go away for a while and not worry about watering." As the hottest period of the year draws to a close, Claire is busy harvesting and considering her next steps. She cooks big batches and makes jams and preserves, her own tomato passata and even spicy kasundi. Next to ripen will be pomegranates and she is planning to sow rocket, chard, radishes, bok choy and snow peas when the tomatoes are finished.

Claire grows more than she can consume — particularly noting an overflow of cucumber, figs, apples and passionfruit — and generously sends the surplus to Maldon Community Pantry, which is a great reminder that the pantry can provide fresh foods to those who need it.

Claire is a fount of gardening knowledge, partly due to her years of experience and partly because she has recently undertaken courses in Harcourt at 'Grow Great Fruit'. She has a solar pump attached to her water tank, herbs and flowers in shady corners and gushes about the joys of popping into the backyard for ingredients during dinner prep.

It doesn't sound easy to create a kitchen garden, when listening to Claire Cooper, but it sounds achievable and attractive. "A lot of it is trial and error," she says humbly, making it seem as though we could all have our own delicious summer fruit garden too.

Natural Newstead

A thrilling encounter

I've been keeping an eye on a family group of **Powerful Owls** for some months now. For much of this time I thought only a single juvenile bird had fledged. Intriguingly I was certain a second nestling was present, calling from the nest hollow, when I relocated its overly adventurous twin back in late September.

In recent weeks I've confirmed the presence of a second juvenile, with both youngsters often roosting together in the company of the parents.

Now the youngsters are growing fast and the immatures are rapidly developing adult-like plumage. The bird on the left is an immature, while the other looks to me like the female parent. I found the male perched nearby but no sign of the second immature bird.

In a thrilling moment for the observer the youngster performed a wonderful wing and tail stretch, before returning to its motionless, but ever vigilant bearing.

The nationally recognised training covers a range of topics, including CPR, snake bites, choking, bleeding, asthma, fractures, and seizures. Participants will also receive instruction on using an Automated External Defibrillator (AED). According to statistics provided by Gleeson, thousands of Victorians experience out-of-hospital cardiac arrests each year, with around 20 cases occurring daily. In rural areas such as Maldon, where ambulance response times can be longer, early intervention through CPR and AED use can improve survival rates.

The course will run from 9am to 5pm and costs \$170 per person. Subsidised places at \$70 per person are available for volunteers from local community groups, supported by the Community Bank Maldon & District.

BLAST FROM THE PAST Support Local Industry



Newstead Biscuit Factory

THE Newstead Biscuit Factory (c. 1860s) was located about 1 ½ kilometres to the west of Newstead on the road to Carisbrook. The Biscuit factory was a very successful business right up until 1878.

The *Mount Alexander Mail* on 18 August 1863, wrote about the Autumn Show of the Castlemaine Agricultural Society, stating that the Newstead Biscuit Factory stall created the greatest interest. Owner Alexander McPhee, had piled up biscuits of all imaginable shapes and descriptions, none of them imports. 'The veritable handiwork of McPhee and his men, all made of Victorian flour and got up in a first-rate style.'

So important did the Society consider this class of exhibit, that they decided to visit McPhee's factory in Newstead. McPhee, who kindly conducted them over the premises, showed how they managed to fabricate such tasty goods. On the table were arranged a sample of various sorts made by the establishment: sea biscuit, arrowroot, coffee, Abernethy, wine, lemon, picnic, Boston crackers, gingernut, soda and squirts. 'Delicate morsels, choice enough to supply the want of the picnicker, sailor, or anybody else.'

The dough was worked by a lever apparatus and then taken to a machine where it was rolled into cakes. Then the biscuits were stamped and cut. Full production was aided by 'an American notion that is perfectly effective.'

McPhee told of his fears of how he thought colonial biscuits might not suit the Victorian palate, but he persevered and after eight months he conquered. He would drive his goods to Castlemaine, Maryborough, Daylesford and everywhere, driving out the enemy (imports) in more places than one.

The Society claimed that McPhee deserved great credit for what he had done and was entitled to the measure of success he had achieved.

In 1865, McPhee retired to his farm, selling the biscuit factory to William Sutherland, who had been conducting a bakery in Newstead at the time. In 1871, Sutherland planned to leave the Colony and advertised the factory for sale. It was described as 'The Newstead Confection and Biscuit Manufactory. The plant comprises the latest improvements in biscuit manufacturing and confectionery.' The property did not sell and Sutherland continued to run the factory until his death in 1878. William Sutherland was considered a gentleman who was long identified with the town in which he lived.

Library news

IT'S Valentine's Day and love is in the air! The connection between love and Saint Valentine, the 3rd Century Christian martyr, is tenuous. The habit of exchanging handmade Valentine's love tokens dates from the 17th Century; however, commercialisation has intervened and February 14 is now a key date in the retail calendar. Research from the Australian Retailers Association suggests 3.4 million people in Australia will be buying gifts to show their love this year, with a cost of over \$450 million. That's a scary \$132 dollars per head, on average.

Why not forget about sending a card or waiting to receive a dozen very expensive red roses? Instead, read a good love story on Valentine's Day. Some literary critics would argue that there is no such thing as a 'good' romance. There is a general literary snobbery that clings to the genre. We are forced to become secret consumers of romance novels, risking accusations that we are not serious readers as the books are just fluff. Perhaps this might be fair if the choice is of the Mills and Boon variety, with beautiful ingénues and dashing heroic males (miraculously united in the final pages after adversity and confusion). However, there are many good books where love is only a part of the story. It feels good, somehow, to discover romance in a book that is on the surface a work of detective fiction, or one described as an historical novel, a travel book or a spy story. This is especially satisfying when the characters are not in their first flush of youth and seem to have interesting lives that involve things other than a romantic entanglement. Here are some recommendations of books by well-known authors with excellent literary credentials. A warning - the following list includes books where the romance may be unresolved or complicated, but that's life!

Caleb's Crossing by Australian journalist and novelist Geraldine Brook; *Tell Me Everything*, the new novel by Elizabeth Strout; *On Chesil Beach*, by Ian McEwan; *Devotion*, by Hannah Kent; *The Remains of the Day*, by Kazuo Ishiguro; *Unsheltered*, by Barbara Kingsolver; *The Players*, the most recent historical novel by Minette Walters; *Possession*, by A.S. Byatt.

And finally, one from left field: Helen Garner's new book, *The Season*. No, this is not about love of football. Nor is it, as the author writes, 'a critical study of football culture and its place in society'. It's a story about the author, her grandson and a footy season they spent together 'before he turned into a man'. That sort of love story.

We'll Prescribe You a Cat by Syou Ishida, 2025 Tucked away on the fifth floor of an old building at the end of a narrow alley in Kyoto, the Nakagyō Kokoro Clinic for the Soul can be found only by people who are struggling in their lives and who genuinely need help. The mysterious clinic offers a unique treatment to those who find their way there: it prescribes cats as medication. Patients are often puzzled by this unconventional prescription, but when they 'take' their cat for the recommended duration, they witness profound transformations in their lives, guided by the playful, empathetic, and occasionally challenging yet endearing cats.

Bedtime Story by Chloe Hooper, 2022

When Chloe Hooper's partner is diagnosed with a rare and aggressive illness, she has to find a way to tell their two young sons. By instinct, she turns to the bookshelf. Can the news be broken as a bedtime tale? Is there a perfect book to prepare children for loss? Hooper embarks on a quest to find what practical lessons children's literature, with its innocent orphans and evil adults, magic, monsters and anthropomorphic animals, can teach about grief and resilience in real life.

The Dressmaker of Auschwitz by Lucy Adlington, 2021

At the height of the Holocaust 25 young inmates of the infamous Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration camp, mainly Jewish women and girls, were selected to design, cut, and sew beautiful fashions for elite Nazi women in a dedicated salon. It was work that they hoped would spare them from the gas chambers. This fashion workshop, called the Upper Tailoring Studio, was established by Hedwig Höss, the camp commandant's wife and patronised by the wives of SS guards and officers. Here, the dressmakers produced high-quality garments for SS social functions in Auschwitz, and for ladies from Nazi Berlin's upper crust.

Drawing on diverse sources, including interviews with the last surviving seamstress, *The Dressmakers of Auschwitz* follows the fates of these brave women. Their bonds of family and friendship not only helped them endure persecution, but also to play their part in camp resistance. Weaving the dressmakers' remarkable experiences within the context of Nazi policies for plunder and exploitation, historian Lucy Adlington exposes the greed, cruelty, and hypocrisy of the Third Reich and offers a fresh look at a little-known chapter of World War II and the Holocaust.

7 ¹⁄₂ by Christo Tsiolkas, 2021

A man arrives at a house on the coast to write a book. Separated from his lover and family and friends, he finds the solitude he craves in the pyrotechnic beauty of nature, just as the world he has shut out is experiencing a cataclysmic shift. The preoccupations that have galvanised him and his work fall away, and he becomes lost in memory and beauty. He also begins to tell us a story.

A retired porn star is made an offer he can't refuse for the sake of his family and future. So he returns to the world he fled years before, all too aware of the danger of opening the door to past temptations and long-buried desires. Can he resist the oblivion and bliss they promise?

Weed Watch



St John's Wort

Common Name: St John's Wort Botanical Name: Hypericum perforatum Weed Classifications: St John's Wort is classified as a noxious weed (Regionally

- Controlled Weed) in Central Victoria. Where did it Come From: St John's Wort was first introduced from Europe for ornamental and medicinal purposes in the 19th century. Many infestations in eastern Australia can be traced to a garden planting near Bright, Victoria, in about 1880.
- What Does it Look Like: In late autumn, winter and early spring, horizontal, pale green or reddish stems with bright green, elongate leaves grow from the crown to form a rosette. One to many upright flowering stems are produced from this crown in spring. Clusters of bright yellow flowers (1-2 cm in diameter) develop in summer. Flowering is followed by the formation of reddish-brown seed capsules that contain small cylindrical black seeds, approximately 1 mm long. Seeds fall from the capsules in autumn when the erect stems die.
- Why is it a Problem: St John's Wort is considered a threat to indigenous plants on private property, in national parks, state forests and other reserves. Native understorey plants in natural ecosystems of Eucalyptus and Callitris woodlands are particularly at risk.

- How does it Spread: St John's Wort reproduces from seed or by suckering. It mainly sets seed without pollination and can produce between 15,000-30,000 seeds which remain viable for at least 20 years. New crowns may be produced by shoots from the lateral roots in spring and autumn.
- **Spread:** St John's Wort is a serious weed of pastures because of its toxicity to stock and its ability to compete with desirable pasture species. However, 80% of current infestations occur in areas of indigenous vegetation, particularly open Eucalyptus woodlands. St John's Wort is a common weed of water catchment and conservation areas and therefore poses a threat to natural ecosystems.
- How can it be Controlled: Isolated plants and small infestations can be removed by hand, removing as much of the root system as possible as it can sucker from roots left in the ground. Many different herbicides can be used to control St John's Wort by spot-spraying or broader scale spraying. The best time to apply herbicides is when the plant is starting to flower (October to December depending on locality). Effective long-term control in extensive infestations can be achieved by also using Biological Control insects. The most effective has been the Chrysolina beetles. Other biological controls, including the St John's wort mite, gall midge, aphid and root-borer, may be more effective depending on local climatic conditions.
