History, menagerie and a bit of mystery

AS excitement grows for the opening of Maldon's Porcupine Village tourist attraction, the managers are looking forward to sharing the results of their hard work and they have surprises in store for future visitors. Managers Doug and Deb Baird have been toiling for four years developing, renovating and documenting in order to bring the passion project to life; they look forward to revealing all soon.

Doug described the appointment of the Lockwood South couple to the role as 'serendipitous' because it aligned so well with their experience and interests in renovations and property. "The owner's brief is: quality and local wherever possible," Doug explained, pointing out that the staff are locals while many products and materials are sourced locally. "Maldon Butcher supplies the meat for the restaurant. Cabins are currently being manufactured in Bendigo," he said, as examples.

Showing the *Tarrangower Times* some highlights, Doug was particularly proud of the accommodation, which is family friendly and nestled neatly between the restaurant and the historic village. The rooms have private courtyards and will also have easy access to the soon-to-be-built swimming pool. The *TT* noticed paintings by local artists and stylish, comfortable mod cons. Doug described a "compendium" of nearby attractions and amenities that will be supplied to guests. "We're building a destination attraction but people will also want to head out."

The historic village is quaint and inviting, with plenty of historic information available to help visitors learn about its gold rush context. The details are incredible: Deb has been shopping for props at local antique stores, while a stylist from a recent film shoot offered some expert final touches. Of particular note is the

smallest freestanding pub in Australia, with a tiny bar and incredible second-floor appeal... but the *TT* is sworn to secrecy about that.

In addition to the tiny gold rush town, Porcupine Village will offer farm animal interactions with some rescued residents (such as goats). Plus, there will be a small wildlife attraction consisting of kangaroos, wombat, emus and dingo, all re-homed by a zoologist who is now on staff. With such a variety of activities available, the Bairds are confident that the village will become a magnet for visitors to the region. "We're very hopeful that we'll bring hundreds of people per week," Doug stated, adding that he hopes locals will help to spread the word.

With the onsite restaurant, The Golden Nugget, winning awards and impressing tastebuds, the Bairds' dedication to quality has already been evident. "Look at the restaurant as a microcosm of the village," Doug said. "We cater for locals but we get a lot of visitors from around the state and even interstate."

Now that the permit to proceed has been obtained, it won't be too long until Porcupine Village can open and become fully operational... just don't ask how long. There is still a lot of work to be done to meet all 94 of the permit conditions. "It's essentially onwards and upwards now that we've got the permit," Doug said confidently. "And we can meet the conditions." He said the thing he most looks forward to is working with the passionate staff. "Everyone's invested in it and that's what makes it a fun place to be."

Stay tuned and get excited because Porcupine Village promises to be full of surprises!

Regions encouraged to join Melbourne International Games Week



If you read the headline and imagined monopoly, table tennis or anything Olympic, please press your restart button. Melbourne International Games Week (MIGW) is coming in October and expressions of interest are now open for regional events to join the program — this is about playing games on screens, an activity that is hugely popular, extremely lucrative and accessible from almost anywhere. The week will involve some huge activities in various Melbourne venues including Big Games Night Out, a free, family-friendly takeover of Fed Square and ACMI with playable games, food and entertainment; plus High Score, a conference on music and sound design in video games. In addition to these key events, MIGW hosts more than 60 initiatives and events that are pitched by producers from the sector.

The State Government invites gamers, influencers, businesses, educators and industry leaders to get involved. MIGW 2025 runs from 4 to 12 October 2025, and expressions of interest to join the program are now open, to apply visit gamesweek.melbourne/about/event-registration. The full program will be

announced in August. Minister for Creative Industries Colin Brooks says: "We invite local games businesses, enthusiasts and event organisers to get involved, particularly those in regional areas."

Drought advice offered and sought as dams remain empty



Agriculture Victoria says that while some good rain has fallen across much of the state, many dams are unlikely to fill unless they are in the path of a thunderstorm.

Agriculture Victoria Land Management Officer Clem Sturmfels said the hot, dry summer and lack of autumn rainfall has left soil moisture levels well below average for this time of the year.

"Without an intense rainfall event, good runoff is unlikely until our soils become saturated. Developing a water budget can help with making decisions about remaining water levels and how to manage shortages. With this year's late 'break', farmers are encouraged to consider maximising their ability to collect water. Even in an average year, plenty of rain is required to fill farm dams," Mr Sturmfels said. "Contour banks can help to increase the catchment area of a dam by collecting water from the adjoining area. They only need to be 200 - 300mm high and can be installed quickly and efficiently using a modern articulated grader. However, they should not be built on soils prone to tunnel erosion."

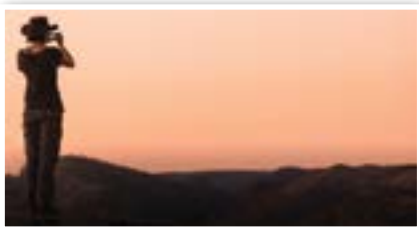
Permits or licences may be required before undertaking this type of work. Landholders are encouraged to contact their local council planning officer and water authority for guidance.

Meanwhile, Agriculture Victoria is calling for agriculture organisations, service providers and consultants to apply their expertise to help support farmers across the state. "Agriculture Victoria is seeking quotes from service providers with specialist farm management technical expertise to work with us in delivering one-on-one consultations and group-based events," said Acting Executive Director Agriculture Sector Development and Services Kate Linden. "We are looking for specialists to deliver our one-on-one service, which offers farmers the opportunity to sit down one-on-one with a consultant to discuss the best way forward for their business in the current season." Quotes from experts are invited up until Thursday 31 July.

Funding available for battery recycling



The State Government is offering funding to local councils and registered charities to establish convenient battery drop off locations, to keep batteries out of household bins. Acting Minister for Environment Gayle Tierney announced on Monday 14 July that \$1.7 million in funding is available through the Circular Economy Hazardous Waste Fund to improve access to battery collection sites.

E-waste, one of the fastest growing waste streams in Australia, includes embedded batteries in vapes, e-scooters, shavers and toys, and poses an environmental and health and safety risk when not disposed of correctly. Waste collectors and fire rescue organisations,

including Fire Rescue Victoria, have reported an increase in waste truck fires related to batteries being put in kerbside bins.

Local councils and charities are invited to apply for grants of up to \$22,000 to support the purchase, installation and promotion of battery drop off units. The funded facilities will accept a wide range of battery types including loose household batteries, batteries from e-cigarettes, embedded batteries in small devices such as electric toothbrushes, and larger batteries weighing up to 60 kg.

Found mystery objects

RECENT gardening weather has seen lots of backyard digging and a few dirty finds. A Maldon resident found the object in the picture a few weeks ago and decided to seek expert information and guidance from Maldon Museum. The find raised some questions like: What is it? And: What should I do with it?

Gold rush objects

Many areas in our gold rush region are protected archaeological sites, because they meet certain criteria such as evidence of buried artefacts, more than 75 years old, that provide information about past activity.

Archaeology is essentially the study of humans' stuff as a window into history. It uses defined methods to reveal information about a place, by looking at the stuff that people left behind.

Goldfields residents are surrounded by disturbed ground and former mining areas; so the first thing we should know is that it is an offence under the *Heritage Act 2017* to "knowingly or negligently" disturb an archaeological site without Heritage Victoria's approval and penalties apply.

If you're digging in your yard and you come across something unusual, you may need to look around to know if it belongs to a larger site or is just a forgotten object. If it appears to

be part of something bigger and you think you've found an archaeological site, Heritage Victoria may like to hear about it (email heritage.victoria@transport.vic.gov.au).

If it is a lone object, the local museum can advise whether it is significant and what you should do next. Also note that under the Heritage Act, found artefacts may only be sold with Heritage Victoria's consent.

Aboriginal objects

If you believe you have found an Aboriginal artefact, you must report it to First Peoples - State Relations under the *Aboriginal Heritage Act 2006*. There is lots of information about cultural objects and a form available that notifies First Peoples - State Relations of any backyard finds, visit: first-peoplesrelations.vic.gov.au/aboriginal-places-and-objects.

News in the news

THE Victorian Country Press Association (VCPA) is alerting publishers and readers of country press about the federal government's proposed News Bargaining Incentive (NBI), which was introduced in December 2024 and has since been the subject of consultation discussions. The NBI hopes to ensure that local news producers are being fairly compensated for their content that is shared broadly online. A public consultation document is due to be released shortly.

The NBI is designed to encourage large online platforms to develop commercial deals with news businesses, with the goal of "ensuring that large digital platforms contribute to the sustainability of news and journalism in Australia." It includes a charge for large platforms without commercial deals to support Australian journalism, with an offset mechanism to charge lower amounts or 'reduced liabilities' to large platforms who do support local news outlets. The VCPA summarises this as: "Under the plan, any platform that refuses to pay would face a new charge worth hundreds of millions of dollars each year. Those that strike fair deals with local publishers can offset that charge, giving them a clear incentive to support trusted local news instead of fighting it."

'Large platforms' under the NBI are defined as large digital platforms operating significant social media or search services, regardless of their news content, and would likely include Meta, Google and TikTok. The NBI will work to address limitations of the 2021 News Media Bargaining Code, which the government says: "sought to address the imbalance of bargaining power between digital platforms and news media publishers." Attempting to remove the loophole that makes it easiest for large platforms to simply not share local news, which the government says is not in the best interest of Australians, the NBI aims to encourage access to news across all types of media.

The government has indicated that there will be the opportunity for readers to respond to the NBI, with its fact sheet stating: "Following consideration of submissions on the consultation paper, exposure draft legislation will be developed for public consultation."

The Country Press Association describes the NBI as a measure to keep large digital platforms accountable: "This fight is about more than just billion-dollar companies or trade deals. It is about whether our region keeps its local stories, its local voice and its local trust."

How long will this wine last? Understanding aging potential

It's a question we hear often at Panacea Estate:

"Should I drink this now or hold onto it?"

The truth is, there's no one-size-fits-all answer. Some wines are made to age gracefully for decades. Others are meant to be enjoyed while their fresh fruit and vibrancy are singing. Knowing the difference can help you make the most of every bottle—and avoid the heartbreak of opening a wine long past its prime.

Let's break it down.

Not all wines are built to age

Here's the first thing to understand: aging doesn't make all wines better.

Some improve, some evolve, and some just get old. That bottle of fresh, juicy rosé? It might lose its charm in a couple of years. A structured red with firm tannins and balanced acidity? That one might be just getting started.

What gives a wine aging potential?

Several factors determine whether a wine will hold up—or improve—over time:

1. Acidity

Think of acidity as a wine's backbone. It keeps flavours bright and helps preserve freshness as the wine matures. White wines with crisp acidity (like Semillon) can age beautifully, sometimes for decades.

2. Tannins

Tannins are compounds found in grape skins, seeds, and oak barrels. They provide

structure and help preserve red wines. Over time, tannins soften and integrate, giving aged reds that silky texture we all love.

3. Alcohol and sugar

Higher alcohol and/or sugar content can help preserve wine. That's why fortified wines like Tawny or Vintage Port, and dessert wines like Sauternes, can last 20, 30, even 50+ years.

4. Balance

This is the winemaker's secret weapon. Wines with all elements in harmony—fruit, acid, tannin, alcohol—are the ones most likely to age well.

5. Closure type

As we shared in our last article, cork-sealed bottles tend to allow slow oxygen exchange over time (helpful for aging), while screw caps preserve freshness and consistency. Both have their place—depending on the wine's intended life.

A Panacea Estate guide to longevity

Here's a rough idea of how long some of our wines are likely to hold up—assuming proper storage (cool, dark, consistent temperature):

- **Rosé & young whites:** two-three years – Meant for bright, easy drinking. Best enjoyed fresh.
- **Textured whites (e.g. Barrel-Fermented Semillon):** three–six years – Gains richness and complexity.
- **Shiraz, Cabernet, and Blends:** five–10 years – Structure and fruit allow graceful aging.

- **Reserve Reds (Cork-Sealed):** eight–12+ years – Made with aging in mind; best opened when the moment feels right.
- **Fortified Wines:** 10+ years (often far longer) – Built to last and evolve beautifully.

Of course, every vintage is different, and taste is subjective. Some people prefer the freshness of youth; others love the subtle, earthy tones of aged wine.

On a personal note, I've opened bottles at five years old that still tasted young, and others at two years that had already peaked. One of the most humbling lessons in winemaking is that we don't always get to control the full arc—just the starting point.

That's why we always encourage people to *try their wines more than once*. If you've got a few bottles, open one early, make some notes, and decide when to revisit. Wine isn't just about the final glass—it's about the journey along the way.

Weed Watch

Cootamundra Wattle

Common Name: Cootamundra Wattle
Botanical Name: *Acacia baileyana*.
Weed classification: Cootamundra Wattle is a native Australian plant that has become an environmental weed in many states of Australia, including Victoria.
Where did it come from: Cootamundra Wattle is native only to New South Wales, with a very restricted natural range in the Cootamundra, Stockinbingal and Temora districts. This plant is an excellent example of how a native Australian species can become a weed in other regions of Australia.
What does it look like: Cootamundra Wattle is a shrub or small tree, grows to 10 m high with a spreading crown and smooth grey or brown bark. The younger branches have prominent vertical ridges and are covered with a whitish, waxy bloom. The leaves are bipinnate ('feathery' or 'fern-like'

appearance) and silvery grey-green or blue-green colour. It has abundant golden-yellow, ball-shaped flower heads with 11-25 flowers. Flowering generally occurs during late winter and spring. Seed-pods are elongated (3-10 cm long and 8-15 mm wide), flattened, hairless, usually straight and borne on a short stalk. Seed pods turn purplish-brown or reddish-brown as they mature, when they split open to release up to 12 dark-brown to black seeds. Seed pods are normally present during late spring and summer.
Why is it a problem? Cootamundra Wattle looks very similar to other bipinnate (fern-like) wattles, especially Silver Wattle (*Acacia dealbata*) hence it's easily mistaken as a 'local' species in other regions. Cootamundra Wattle has more silvery grey-green leaves and relatively short leaves with usually only 2-6 pairs of leaflets, whereas Silver Wattle has longer leaves with up to 20 pairs of leaflets. There's an excellent information brochure,

Friend or Foe? on the North Central Catchment Management Authority website at: <https://tinyurl.com/2mazwaju>. Natural ecosystems are at risk as Cootamundra Wattle competes with 'local' native shrubs, small trees and ground flora, and impedes their regeneration and therefore reducing the 'local' biodiversity. It invades woodlands and forests in drier areas where annual rainfall exceeds 400 mm.
How does it spread: Cootamundra Wattle has been extensively planted outside its limited natural range in NSW. It's been widely available in nurseries, garden centres, fetes and markets and hence extensively planted in gardens, conservation areas and shelter-belts. The hard seeds are also spread by birds and ants, on machinery and in garden waste, and can remain viable in the soil for more than 10 years.
How can it be controlled? An integrated, long-term strategy is needed to eliminate

infestations of Cootamundra Wattle because several years are required to exhaust its seed bank. Seedlings can be hand-pulled and small plants dug out. Mature plants do not usually re-shoot, so they can be ring-barked. Seed pods can be collected, double bagged and disposed of in landfill. A range of herbicides can also be used to spray seedlings and smaller plants, or by cutting stems back to near ground level and painting the cut stem (the cut-paint method). There is no Biological Control for this species.

Regular checks reduce risks

THIS National Diabetes Week (13 – 19 July), members of the Mt Alexander Diabetes Support and Information Group are encouraging people to schedule a health check today, for a healthier tomorrow. The Mount Alexander Diabetes Support and Information Group meet in the Community Rehabilitation Centre at Dhelkaya Health on the first Wednesday of the month from 1 to 2pm.
Almost 400,000 Victorians live with diabetes – enough people to fill the MCG four times over. A further 125,000 have undiagnosed diabetes. Dhelkaya Health Diabetes Educators, Kay Pedretti and Fei Siegel state that, “for people living with diabetes, regular health checks for eyes, feet, blood pressure and kidneys can reduce the risk of long-term complications.

Kay and Fei say knowing your risk is the first step to living well. “Regular checks mean you can find potential health problems early and discuss the best possible treatment with health professionals.” Relatives of people with type 1 diabetes can access the national Type1Screen program for an antibody test to determine their risk of developing type 1. “While type 1 diabetes cannot be prevented, the Type1Screen program can give your relatives peace of mind,” Kay and Fei explain.
“Family members of people living with type 1 diabetes have a higher risk of developing type 1. Early detection can prevent serious health problems.”

brings sixties glamour



V for Victory

YOU may have glimpsed it while driving past the south-east end of Mount Tarran-gower: the giant white V on a slope known as Preece’s Hill or Victory Hill. It’s best viewed on foot so if you (and your dog) are feeling energetic, take a walk up Parkins Reef Road for a closer look. The V is a simple, historic remnant of local citizen activism that was installed in 1917; it has been adjusted and updated numerous times since and can even be seen on aerial maps.

What is it all about? The hill was owned in the early twentieth century by Councillor William Preece who was also the president of the Maldon Anti-Conscription League. The League vehemently and vocally opposed a proposal for compulsory military conscription for Australians to serve in overseas conflict. Conscription was a hot topic during World War One, when many Australians still felt emotionally connected to England. Under Labor Prime Minister Billy Hughes, two referenda were held in 1916 and 1917, asking

Australians if they supported conscription. The sign on the hill was first created with white-washed stones as a command to locals: Vote No.

In both polls, the margins were very narrow (49% to 51% and 46% to 54%) but the answer remained: No. The result fractured the Federal Labor Party and caused massive waves in politics at the time. The huge sign remained on the hill to commemorate the success of the Anti-Conscription League. During the Second World War, Sunday School students from the

Baptist Church rearranged the stones into an enormous V (numbers have since been added to commemorate the founding of Maldon town and the Gallipoli landing). It’s an interesting example of a historic landmark evolving and of locals taking ownership. There’s lots more to learn about the events surrounding the giant V (for example, did you know that the V hand gesture for Victory was first adopted in the 1940s?), but why not start by taking a walk to check it out.

Help Protect Maldon's visiting Swift Parrot and the local Brush-tailed Phascogale

We are local students who care about our wildlife, and we want to share how our community can help protect two special animals that currently live right here near Maldon — the *Swift Parrot* and the *Brush-tailed Phascogale*.

The *Swift Parrot* is a critically endangered bird that visits Victoria in winter and feeds on flowering eucalypts. You may be able to see the gumtree blossoms on the ground as they loudly feast above! They have migrated all the way from Tasmania to feast on our trees. Without enough native trees, these beautiful birds can't survive. We are also lucky enough to be home to the *Brush-tailed Phascogale*. This small, tree-dwelling marsupial is near threatened in our area. It needs old trees with hollows to make its home.

Here's how YOU can help:

- Protect old trees and native bushland, especially those with hollows.
- Plant local native trees and flowering eucalypts to provide food and habitat.
- Keep cats indoors at night to protect small wildlife like the Phascogale.
- Get involved in making nesting boxes! We have made some at school and are looking for help to get them up into trees if anyone could help us.

Together, we can make a big difference and help these unique animals survive for future generations.

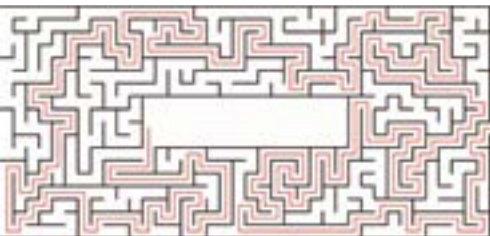

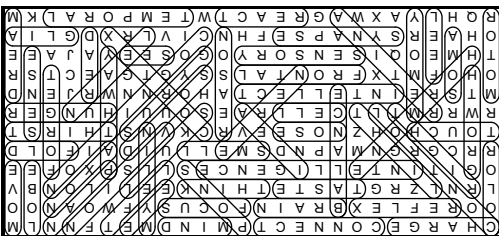

Winter magnet

Spreading Wattle *Acacia genistifolia* is an important early winter food source for small woodland birds, including a selection of thornbills and honeyeaters. It has a prolonged flowering season, commencing around Christmas and extending until at least mid-winter. It is not unusual to also find a few flowers in early spring. The flowers attract insects, including many small insect larvae. I've often observed small birds 'working over' a Spreading Wattle and picking insects as they go. Such was the case with the sequence shown below where a flock of **Buff-rumped Thornbills** arrived at the wattle, followed by some Weebills (not pictured), a couple of **Brown Thornbills** and finally a **Brown-headed Honeyeater**. All were seen to successfully capture prey, however the photographer only managed one image of the process ... the birds were just too quick!

Tiny Homes On Wheels - an affordable housing option



AS the housing crisis hits our community hard, the appeal of the Tiny Home on Wheels (THOW) has risen.

The My Home Network Tiny Homes On Wheels working group have developed a confidential survey tinyurl.com/39z94pt5 to better understand:

- the number of THOWs currently being lived in or being built in our Shire
- the level of interest in THOW as an affordable housing option
- the benefits of a THOW and
- any barriers to living in a THOW and what supports people think they might need to make the transition, and sustain, a THOW arrangement.

This anonymous information will be used in advocacy locally, statewide and nationally to improve appropriate uptake of THOW as affordable housing in our Shire and elsewhere.

Nearly two years ago, the Mount Alexander Shire Council amended the Local Law No 13 allowing a THOW to be placed and remain on land with an existing permanent dwelling, without a permit, for 'an indefinite period of time', as long as it complies with Local Law 13 conditions. For further details of these conditions see: tinyurl.com/3pr9vnm9.

The My Home Network THOW Working Group appreciates Council's leadership in changing the local law. They feel this has had a positive impact on increasing housing

diversity and the Working Group continues to work towards improving the appropriate uptake of THOW in our Shire on Djaara Country. The THOW Working Group:

- Shares information and supports people interested in THOW, including with sharing THOW owner/occupier expertise
- Supports matching those who own or occupy a THOW with those who have a suitable location for the THOW
- Advocates with others such as the Australian Tiny House Association (ATHA) for clear, consistent and practical THOW regulations and policy frameworks at the state and national levels.
- Is exploring THOW as a 'Caretaker' model and the possibility of THOW small clusters on vacant land.

Western Australia is leading the way in addressing THOW uptake as a viable option to address the housing affordability crisis. This could provide a model for other states to follow.

As one elder in our community explains: "I am 68 years old on a zero hours contract and a month-to-month rental lease paying \$400 a week, which is incredibly stressful. I am not eligible for social housing, and want to get out of renting.

I have worked all my life, paid my bills and just want somewhere I can afford, feel at home, have more time with family and feel the magic inside of me.

I can't afford a secondary dwelling but I can afford a THOW I am hoping to buy one and I can put it in my daughter's back yard so I can be near family and be in my community."

THOW working group member Tom Danby also adds, "We know that THOW are not for everyone but for some community members it is their only affordable housing option and it provides infill housing and builds community."

Simmering passions

THE coldest, darkest nights of winter are the perfect time to really spice things up (...literally, that is! This is a family newspaper). The addition of spice adds extra dimension and depth to so many warming drinks that are best enjoyed with a lap rug, by lamplight.

In Europe, spiced cider— or wassail — is a traditional winter cocktail made delicious with cinnamon, cloves, nutmeg and allspice, while the rum probably helps warm your cockles, too.

Harcourt apple cider is perfect; Patrick from Harcourt Perry & Cider Makers recommended using a slow cooker to heat the cider and said: "Be sure to strain the spices before serving."

Indian milky spiced tea can be made on the stove with your favourite spicy combinations that might include cardamom or ginger, but for something different; get out the pepper grinder and add some zing! In fact, the author of *Spice Notes*, Ian Hemphill, points out that spice combinations that partner with tea will often work well with coffee as well, leaving lots of room for hot drink experimentation. For something very simple, turmeric and honey in hot milk is calming and comforting (you could try growing your own turmeric if you come across some fresh root, it sprouts readily).

Always a favourite at cold-weather events is mulled wine or glühwein, that rich red heart-warmer that fills the air with a festive aroma. The *Tarrangower Times* asked Chef Sonya from the Golden Nugget for her hot tips to making mulled wine. Firstly, she suggests purchasing spices from an Indian spice shop or grocery. In addition to providing great flavour, whole spices such as cinnamon sticks and star anise can make beautiful decorations; Sonya also recommends dehydrating some citrus slices for the glass. Lemon or orange slices can be strung in a dry place if you don't have the gadgets, or you could just add fresh peel to the pot for the flavour.

Sonya's number one tip for the ideal mulled wine (which is probably applicable across all spicy hot drinks) is: don't overcook it. "You just want a slow, gentle simmer," she advised, which applies to spicing things up figuratively as well as literally, not that you read about it here.

Guttered

Us kids used to love the Maldon gutters. On our way to school, we would run along their bluestone cliffs, daring each other to leap across the huge chasms. Sometimes we would climb down the steep sides and run or hop along the bottom of the trench. If it were raining, we would splash through in

our gumboots - risking a big telling off from the teacher for being so muddy. Didn't stop us of course.

As we graduated up into high school, the gutters became a bit less interesting and much more annoying. They made Maldon seem old. You were a bit of a loser if you stayed in the gutter town

By the time I got my driving licence, the gutters had become a total pain in the neck. I was always scared I would accidentally slide down into the bluestone canyons when I was

parking. At least shopping in Bendigo meant you had a proper car parking space. To me, Bendigo seemed to be more grown up, somehow better organised. I started avoiding the Main Street of Maldon altogether, finally moving away to Melbourne for Uni.

Living in a share house in Carlton, I began to see the gutters through a different lens. There were lots of historical 'cobbled' dunny lanes all through the inner city. Riding a pushbike over the bluestone surface was this specially exciting-bump-bump-bumping along, slipping and sliding in the wet, roaring around in our own version of the Paris Roubaix. Crashing and falling became a hoot, exploding a laugh, rather than a scream. Suddenly, Maldon style bluestone gutters were the epitome of cosmopolitan cool.

Watching my own kids navigate the gutters, I got to thinking about their back story. It must have been tough to earn a living in the depleting gold fields. Men got work digging out the channels, and heaving the large stones into place, all so the town's rainwater (and

probably filth) could be drained away. The traditional, Welsh designed gutters had a clear purpose: to improve the town's standard of living and to manage the water system. A feat of engineering and guts.

I'm a lot older now. The gutters feel more treacherous. Their dips and uneven edges proving to be hazards I am careful to avoid. I walk slowly and hesitantly, looking for the little bridges, thoughtfully laid across to the footpath. Time now for others to do the climbing and leaping.

For well over a century, these old gutters have doggedly stuck to their prime directive - to make a difference in their water world. They have adapted and evolved, but they have always stayed true - charting a confident drainage route through booms and bust, droughts and flooding rains, changing human foibles, and unexpected turbulence. They are there still.

Hail to the majestic God of the gutters, I say! May you live long and prosper, charting a sturdy passage through choppy waters.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

Maldon 1862 - A dangerous place!



Nuggetty Mine.

BY the 1860s, industrial quartz mining had begun to replace the endeavours of individual diggers, and it was a dangerous enterprise. The combination of explosives, steam-driven machinery and lax safety procedures resulted in many workplace accidents and sometimes deaths.

These are a few of the mining accidents that occurred in the Maldon area over a five-day period starting on Monday 16 June 1862.

Monday - Richard Rowe was severely injured at the Union Mine at North Maldon. He had placed a charge of gunpowder into a hole that had been drilled into the quartz reef. Instead of making a cartridge to place in the hole, he rammed the powder directly into it with a chisel. As the chisel hit the quartz, a spark ignited the powder and a resulting explosion badly lacerated Rowe's left hand.

Tuesday - a fatal mining accident occurred at Welshman's Reef. Daniel Currie and Thomas Rule were working their claim when the roof of the drive collapsed, burying them under rock. While Rule escaped with a broken collarbone, Currie received more severe injuries. His leg and arm were broken and his spine was crushed. Currie died a few hours after the accident.

Wednesday - at the Union Mine Charles Cowie was working in a shaft where a bucket of rocks was being drawn to the surface. He heard the bucket shaking, looked up and was showered by a fall of rock. Initially the *Tarrangower Times* reported that Cowie was 'removed to hospital' but in a later edition it published a correction saying he only required a sticking plaster 'to be completely cured'.

Friday - a fatal accident occurred at Nuggetty. At about 4pm James Williams was working below ground at the Enterprise claim when he sent a bucket of dirt up the skids to the surface. He then followed the bucket up the skids to retrieve a block of wood he had used to hold the skids in place. As the mine's whim (*a winch for raising ore or water from a mine. - Editor*). brought one bucket to the surface, it lowered another. Before Williams reached the block, he was hit on the head by the bucket being lowered. He fell to the bottom of the shaft and died instantly.

Terror froze the hearts of all residents whenever prolonged mine whistling called for assistance in cases like these.

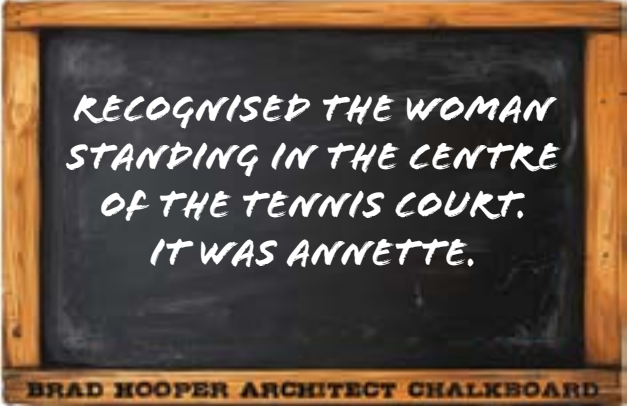

Library News

National Tree Day July 27

THIS week we celebrate National Tree Day. Perhaps every day should be tree day, but having a special day reminds us of the value of planting trees and caring for the ones we have already. Apart from their beauty, trees are very useful. They act as wind breaks and reduce runoff, flooding and soil erosion. Trees act as carbon sinks, reducing atmospheric CO2. They provide food and habitat for countless species. Trees are the source of medicines. Trees provide shade, moderating the effects of extreme temperatures. And they are also good for our mental health. Spending time among trees and nature has been proven to help boost mood and reduce depression and anxiety. So, get out there this week and thank a tree!

This week’s library news highlights an unusual ‘tree’ book in the Athenaeum Library collection: *Gum*, by Australian author Ashley Hay. *Gum* is not so much a book about eucalypts as one about eucalyptographers - individuals who have ‘sought to champion their powers, explore their potential’, battling against the disruption and threat of colonisation and climate change. Described by one reviewer as a love letter to Australia’s most iconic tree, *Gum* chronicles the history of human relationships with the tree, from the indigenous story of seven warriors who are transformed into eucalypts to combat the malevolent Wiree. The first eucalypt was cut down under Captain Arthur Phillip’s instruction (a disappointment, good only for boiling pots) on January 27, 1788. *Gum* follows Joseph Banks, (who collected samples and first referred to ‘gum’ trees for their sticky secretion) and Major Thomas Mitchell, who noted the diversity of species on his three inland expeditions through what he called ‘another Eden’. Artists are not ignored, from John Glover, the eucalypt’s first dedicated portraitist, to Albert Namatjira, John Olson and Fred Williams. Not forgotten is the role of Ferdinand von Mueller, Victoria’s government botanist in the mid-19th century, who promoted the trees’ scientific and commercial prospects and distributed thousands of their seeds around the world, or May Gibbs, whose Snugglepot and Cuddlepie, the gumnut babies, captured the imagination of children with their daily battles against the evil Banksia Men. In the penultimate chapter of *Gum*, The Forest at the Edge of Time, Ashley Hay writes:

‘At the end of every July comes National Tree Day in Australia, a community event that’s seen almost 26 million trees planted in the 25 years since it began in 1996. In 2015, for the first time, you could register to plant some of those trees at home.... On 26 July 2015, people at more than 3,000 locations in Australia planted trees. My son, then six, and I were among them, in our front yard... it’s an interesting thing, aiming for the right balance, the right words, when you are talking climate change with a six year-old. We talked about the way trees breathe, and my boy leaned in to our tiny new mallees to blow his breath gently across their leaves. Just giving them a bit more air, he explained.’



Each year, around 300,000 people volunteer their time to engage in environmental activities that educate Australians about the world around them. Connecting Country Inc. (Mount Alexander Region) is working to restore landscapes across the Mount Alexander Shire. This year, on Sunday 27 July, Connecting Country is partnering with the Friends of Campbells Creek to host a community planting day along the newly completed trail, just upstream from the Princess Street bridge in Campbells Creek. Library Reviews

There are Rivers in the Sky by Elif Shafak, 2024

In the ancient city of Nineveh, on the bank of the River Tigris, King Ashurbanipal of Mesopotamia, erudite but ruthless built a great library that would crumble with the end of his reign. From its ruins, however, emerged a poem, the ‘Epic of Gilgamesh’, that would infuse the existence of two rivers and bind together three lives.

In 1840 London, Arthur is born beside the stinking, sewage-filled River Thames. With an abusive, alcoholic father and a mentally ill mother, Arthur’s only chance of escaping destitution is his brilliant memory. When his gift earns him a spot as an apprentice at a leading publisher, Arthur’s world opens up far beyond the slums, and one book in particular catches his interest: *Nineveh and Its Remains*.

James by Percival Everett, 2024

When Jim overhears that he is about to be sold to a man in New Orleans, separated from his wife and daughter forever, he runs away until he can formulate a plan. Meanwhile, Huck has faked his own death to escape his violent father. As all readers of American literature know, thus begins the dangerous and transcendent journey by raft down the Mississippi River toward the elusive and unreliable promise of the Free States and beyond.

Beneath Dark Waters by Karen Rose, 2023

Public prosecutor J.P. ‘Kaj’ Cardozo has only lived in New Orleans for six months, and he’s already working on a high-profile celebrity sexual assault case that’s made headlines all over the country. But when his son becomes the target of a kidnapping attempt as a threat to Kaj, he is desperate to keep him safe and turns to a private investigative firm famous for their protection services. A veteran Marine, Val Sorensen is glad to have found a new career with Broussard Investigations. Her latest assignment as the bodyguard to 10-year-old Elijah Cardozo. Through her duties, Val grows fond of the boy and his handsome father.

Lucy by the Sea by Elizabeth Strout, 2022

As a panicked world goes into lockdown, Lucy Barton is uprooted from her life in Manhattan and bundled away to a small town in Maine by her ex-husband and on-again, off-again friend, William. For the next several months, it’s just Lucy, William, and their complex past together in a little house nestled against the moody, swirling sea. Rich with empathy and emotion, *Lucy by the Sea* vividly captures the fear and struggles that come with isolation, as well as the hope, peace, and possibilities that those long, quiet days can inspire. At the heart of this story are the deep human connections that unite us even when we’re apart, the pain of a beloved daughter’s suffering, the emptiness that comes from the death of a loved one, the promise of a new friendship, and the comfort of an old, enduring love.
