

ount Alexander Shire Council (MASC) has been keeping play a priority; it has featured as a key agenda item at its recent council meeting and in the recently released budget. It comes as school starts back again, after a holiday period that saw local children and visitors looking for wintry activities in regional small towns.

Maldon Playground has been allocated \$40k in the 2025/26 budget, which the Council says will be used to start the ball rolling on designs and ensure that multiple needs are met. At this stage the planning is about broad concepts, which will then guide the details and costs, and it's not all fun and games. "Delivering a playground involves more than the play equipment itself. We are also required to provide accessible paths, soft fall, landscaping and shade," explained Karen Evennett, Manager Parks, Recreation and Community Facilities

at MASC. "Community consultation is key in delivering all our playgrounds."

The idea is to create something that nestles into the area in a sympathetic and accessible way. "Each community has very valid suggestions on how the playground sits with the environment and what features of the town and surrounds should be reflected to help to make the space a special feature of the township," Ms Evennett said.

A similar process took place in the development of the iconic apple-box design tower and slide, as requested by the community, in Harcourt Recreation Reserve. Ms Evennett said: "As Maldon is a heritage town and the playground is situated in the Government Reserve, we need to ensure the designs both celebrate and adhere to heritage guidelines. This is not something that an off-the-shelf play equipment design can deliver." That also means that it will take time before changes will be seen at Maldon Playground. Ms Evennett said: "Community consultation and scoping will need to be completed before we can prepare detailed costings. We will keep the community updated via local media and our website on opportunities to provide feedback."

Meanwhile, at its last meeting on Tuesday 15 July, Council passed a motion to accept a new Playground Renewal Plan for the shire. The Playground Renewal Plan is designed to guide Council's future investment in Council's 29 playgrounds by using a 'playground hierarchy' to ascribe and compare "levels of service".

Governor's goldfields visit



THE Governor of Victoria, Her Excellency Professor the Honourable Margaret Gardner AC, toured the region last week to visit local operations and meet with locals in her role as Head of State, representative of the King.

Between Tuesday 15 and Friday 18 July, Her Excellency traversed towns between Harcourt and Woodend, with visits to Buda Homestead in Castlemaine, Josh's Eggs in Monegeetta and Hanging Rock. One of her first stops was Tarrengower Prison, in Maldon, where she interacted with prisoners and chatted to staff. The Governor sought to understand the role that Tarrengower Prison undertakes, serving as a model of transition and 'bridging' prisoners back into the community. She said a good justice system is foundational to a well-functioning society. "If people do end up in prison, we want to make sure that when they get out, they don't go back in again," she said, noting that there needs to be positive outcomes from detention.

Later, in Harcourt, Simon and Vicki from Harcourt Perry and Cider Makers took the Governor on a tour of their business from the beginning of the production cycle, with fragrant crates of applies, sorting and crushing, enormous barrels, tastings and observations. Her Excellency and Simon discussed trade opportunities and markets; achievements and areas needing support.

On Wednesday 16 July, Her Excellency visited the Victoria Goldfields Railway (VGR) Depot in Castlemaine and met with staff of the VGR, including CEO Wil Maylor and President Rob Lee, as well as Mt Alexander Shire Deputy Mayor Councillor Toby Heydon. After a tour of the workshop and sheds, the Governor took a short (100m!) train trip; the steam engine J549 was bright and sparkling after a recent refit. Her Excellency was very impressed with the restored engine and carriages, admiring the lavish levels of decoration and comfort in the saloon cars.

There was a bit of drama during the Governor's visit when the Vice Regal car was reportedly pulled over by an over enthusiastic member of the police force who hadn't recognised the distinctive Crown number plate! A Civic Reception was held at Castlemaine Art Museum later in the day to cordially welcome the Governor and hear her official address for this Regional Visit.

As the non-political Head of State, key roles of the Governor include supporting democracy and creating a strong community; encouraging ventures such as volunteering, arts, sports and innovation. Governors of Victoria usually serve terms of five years, endeavouring to spend time in each region of the state during that time. It means undertaking this kind of expedition around three or four times a year to acknowledge the contributions of regional Victorians and engage with local organisations, businesses, leaders and cultural groups. Regional Visits are a chance for the Governor to gauge the overall mood and priorities of the state; no doubt Her Excellency will provide a glowing report of this goldfields region for the King.

Shining a light on Goth culture



THE Goldfields Gothic Festival returns next weekend from Friday 1 to Sunday 3 August and the organisers are excited to share a fantastic program of music, markets and more with locals and visitors. The opening event features local Goth icon, Gabrielle Kelly (also known as Crimson Strix), presenting a fascinating overview of the history and context of Goth culture. It's the first taste of a weekend that invites open-mindedness, accessibility and non-conformity.

Gabrielle explained to the *TT* that while Goth started in the late 1970s as a music-based subculture, it has thrived since the eighties and features many sub-branches to embrace people with many related interests. "I got into it with the aesthetics and then the music caught my interest," Gabrielle said. "What I've loved about being part of this community is that everybody is welcome, in terms of people embracing who they are and what others are."

Working with regular Goldfields Gothic artists, Saša Čuha and Earl Black, Gabrielle has created the opening event to invite everyone to learn about the interaction and impact of music, politics, literature and media - not to mention fashion — of the Goth subculture. She will also highlight the diversity of Goth identities that include Trad and Romantic Goths, Corporate Goths, Cyber-goths, Death Rockers. It's surprisingly broad and that's part of the point, said Gabrielle. "Goth is about rejecting mainstream societal norms. It's very, very against fast fashion and all that kind of stuff. It goes against conformity so if Goths were all the same, what's the point?" Gabrielle encourages locals to attend, especially those who are still "in the dark" about what Goth is. Come and hear Crimson Strix at the Vintage Machinery and Museum from 6.30pm on Friday 1 August.

Something Goth for everyone

Meanwhile, check out the rest of the program too, there are some incredible events to explore!

Gabrielle's highlights include: Saša Čuha performing a "chilling" live score to a screening of the 1922 horror classic, *Nosferatu*. "Definitely get along to Saša's events," Gabrielle



said. "Both his screening and his Nevermore performance, because Edgar Allen Poe is a big influence on Goth culture." Gabrielle also said the Saturday music performances on the main stage should not be missed, since they are a chance to see some internationally known musicians without having to travel overseas. "We've got bands that have played across the world, at massive events in Germany — that can also help people understand the type of music that is big in the scene, or perhaps get them nostalgic."

There's also the Hearse Parade, history and stories with Dr David Waldron in the Museum Tunnel, poetry, readings plus chill-out spaces with food and drinks galore.

Check out the full program for all the deadly details. Gabrielle hopes to entice locals and visitors alike: "Come and broaden your interests," she said. "I would love locals to be open-minded as we get more Goth people involved. It will hopefully be eye-opening as people understand that there's more to the Goth community than the stereotype."

MP in Canberra as Parliament commences

Member for Bendigo, Lisa Chesters MP returned to Canberra on Tuesday 22 July for the first parliamentary sitting week of the 48th Parliament, where she was sworn in for the 5th time as the Federal Member for Bendigo. Ms Chesters said in a statement that she will be taking the issues and concerns of Central Victorians directly to Parliament, saying: "For locals, the rising cost of living remains a key issue affecting many people in the community." Priority issues are a plan to reduce student debt by 20%, address the ongoing impact of drought on local water storages and commence steps towards: "delivering Federal Labor's election commitment to establish a Veterans' and Families' Hub in Bendigo."

Free adaptive farming workshops



Agriculture Victoria invites Farmers from livestock and grain businesses to attend a twoday adaptive farming workshops in western and northern Victoria this winter. Consultant Dr Kate Burke will present the 'In good times and bad: adaptive skills for your farming future' workshops funded through the Farm Business Resilience (FBR) program which are free but numbers are limited so registration is essential. The workshops will cover a range of topics including: managing climate variability, farm financial performance; growth opportunities, risk, production potential and scenario planning. Running from 8.30am to 3pm over two days each, the workshops will take place between Thursday 14 and Friday 22 August in Rutherglen, Wonwondah and Dunkeld. New tool for epilepsy patients

A new questionnaire has been developed to ensure that epilepsy patients are experiencing the best outcomes from their treatments. The Seizure Related Impact Assessment Scale (SE-RIAS) is a 'simple but powerful' five-minute questionnaire that asks patients to rank the impact of their seizures and epilepsy treatment on work, school, and family/social activities in the past 30 days. It converts both seizure and treatment side effects into 'time lost', so it is possible to directly compare and identify which is causing a patient the most issues. A recent study at The Alfred Hospital by Monash and New York University researchers validated the tool and the researchers say it will be made available free of charge to suitably qualified clinicians for use in Australia to help shape management plants. Epilepsy affects 270,000 Australians and is the world's most common chronic neurological condition. It is treatable, but many treatments cause substantial side effects.

National Farm Safety Week is marked as Sunday 20 to Sunday 26 July by Farmsafe Australia, with a particular focus this year on farm water safety amidst horrifying statistics. Parents and carers are being urged to take immediate steps to reduce the risk of childhood drownings on farms, as new figures reveal inland waterways remain one of the most common sites for toddler and child fatalities. Information is available online to assist rural property owners, with experts pointing out that farms have a variety of water features including dams, troughs, irrigation channels and septic pits — that are particularly risky for young children. Farm water safety tips include: keeping children actively supervised or within arms reach at all times when in or around water, securely fencing safe play areas away from water hazards, machinery and animals; covering water tanks, securing septic lids and filling or fencing ditches and holes. Experts also encourage early and regular swimming lessons for children and CPR for adults. Bright clothing on young children provides visibility for family activities in rural or bushy areas. Nationals at Australian Sheep and Wool Show



The 25th Annual Australian Sheep and Wool Show took place in Bendigo over the weekend of Friday 18 to Sunday 20 July, bringing together sheep breeders and fibre enthusiasts in a huge event at Prince of Wales Showground. Member for Northern Victoria Gaelle Broad said she and a team from The Nationals attended the show to hear the concerns of regional Victorians first-hand.

Leader of the Victorian Nationals Danny O'Brien, Senator Bridget McKenzie, the Member for Euroa Annabelle Cleeland and the Member for Murray Plains Peter Walsh all attended with Ms Broad to show their support for the Show. Ms Broad said in a statement following the event that concerns raised included the government's introduction of the National Electricity (Victoria) Amendment (VicGrid Stage 2 Reform) Bill along with drought, roads, rural crime and regional health service access. Ms Broad pledged to remove the contentious Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund, saying: "In government, the Nationals will scrap this tax, along with four other onerous taxes - the GP health tax; the Air BnB tax; the schools tax; and stamp duty on homes up to \$1million for first home buyers."

Winery events: council defers decision

AT its recent Council meeting on Tuesday 15 July, Mount Alexander Shire Council (MASC) voted to defer a decision on a planning application from local winery, Panacea Estate. Councillors stated concerns including environmental impact and fire risks.

The application requested approval to host larger events such as annual festivals, community gatherings and functions and to amend the company's liquor licence accordingly. The proposal did not include development of the site, noting that existing and temporary infrastructure would be used to produce events. The winery has been operating as a winery and cellar door for over 20 years and is currently run as Panacea Estate by the applicant, Peter Christen.

Notice of the planning application was advertised via letters to adjoining and surrounding landowners and occupiers; 16 objections and five letters of support were submitted to Council.

As a result of the objections, the application was referred to Council for a decision. The report prepared by Council Officers recommended that the application be approved, saying: "The proposal supports rural-based tourism and community engagement opportunities, contributing to the diversification of land use in the area without compromising the ongoing agricultural potential of the land." **Council concerns and considerations**

Initially, Councillor Bill Maltby moved to grant the permit, saying: "The Planning Department have really done their homework and put in 40 conditions," he said, pointing out that many of them addressed the objections received about the proposal. He said the shire is lucky to have numerous wineries. "That area has three or four wineries and they're all active and trying to promote tourism and make a dollar, naturally."

In objecting to the motion, Councillor Lucas Maddock said he had sympathy for the concerns of the objectors. "I wish to focus on the unknown effects this will have on native fauna," he said. "I note and take strong issue with the fact that no ecological assessment was undertaken for the application," noting that "there aren't planning triggers in the environmental significance overlay and significant landscape overlay so they aren't being considered here." He continued to say that he was not satisfied that the effects of noise - from proposed events, likely to include music - on local fauna, and considerations to protect and enhance biodiversity, were addressed in the application.

Councillor Toby Heydon also expressed concern about noise volume and local fauna, quoting a university researcher whose work indicates that human-caused noise changes animals' behaviour and puts them at risk, but pointed out that smaller events at Panacea Estate have been successfully running for some time.

Councillor Philip Walker said he was very sympathetic to outdoor festivals but noted concerns around sound impacts on fauna and residents. He said his main worry was emergency management. "It's a single dirt road in and out of there," he said. "I know the CFA says they've got an emergency management plan... If there is an emergency evacuation and you have 700 people with over 200 cars... it's not going to be an orderly evacuation."

Decision Deferred

After the motion to accept the application failed the vote, Councillor Toby Heydon put a motion to defer the decision and allow the applicant to "consider revising the proposal to remove the Place of Assembly / Large Events component" and undertake further reviews, referrals and provide public notice. The motion to defer was carried by a 5-2 majority. "This won't prevent the operation from continuing to hold smaller-scale events. And I hope this can lead to more conversation between the interested parties so that we can find a resolution that we can all agree to," Councillor Heyden said.

Difficult position for winery

Owner and Operator of Panacea Estate, Peter Christen, said his next steps will be determined by the outcome of the deferred decision and any extra conditions imposed. "The devil's in the detail. It depends exactly on what the details of the conditions are," Peter said, noting that some suggestions raised during the Council meeting, such as sound-proofing the shed/venue, would demand significant financial outlay.

Peter believes the future viability of the business depends on more than making and selling wine. "The options, depending on how practical or impractical the conditions are, range from bulldozing the vineyard and just selling it as a house and land, all the way through to having an ongoing event location and a viable local business that brings visitors to the region."

Changes afoot at the IGA



MALDON'S IGA supermarket is undergoing an upgrade and the owner wants to assure shoppers that the goal is an improved shopping experience. The changes will also reveal and highlight the heritage features of the 1859 building, in addition to structural reinforcements and repairs.

Having operated Maldon's IGA for over 14 years, owner Jay Lu has a good understanding of local preferences. He seeks to offer modern convenience inside the historic building, built in 1859 as Dabb and Co Merchants, and hopes it will encourage people to shop local, amidst growing pressures in the supermarket sector.

The recent re-arrangement of the deli area is just the latest phase of the upgrade, which has seen a new roof, exterior paint and the installation of a new deli processing area to the rear of the store. Jay said the aim is for a better display, explaining that the new deli case will also feature "easy-to-grab" items and that deli products are still available. "Please ask staff. The new case is coming soon." He also revealed a glimpse of a heritage fire-safe door that is currently hidden behind the dairy fridges: the new layout will allow the historic detail to be seen by shoppers.

Coming soon are new fruit and vegetable cases and new shelving across the store, while the street-front signage is still being negotiated (to local heritage standards) by the central IGA management and Mount Alexander Shire Council. Jay assures residents that a new notice board is included in that mix, but says it will be maintained by requiring all notices to be dated.

It is a large and complex upgrade that Jay is conscious may cause some inconvenience; he is apologetic to customers and says the improved outcome will be worthwhile. He said: "The shop will look better and better, we would like customers to keep coming to their local store."

IGA is alerting customers to its new operating hours, which are: Monday to Saturday 8am to 6.30pm and Sunday 9am to 5pm. The new Liquor Store hours are 9.30am to 6.30pm from Monday to Saturday and 10am-5pm on Sundays. These hours will come into effect from Monday 28 July.

Confidence starts when you stop looking for permission to enjoy something.

Learn through sipping, not studying. You don't have to memorise regions or vintage charts to enjoy wine. Here's a better approach:

- Try different wines side by side.
- Notice how they feel—light vs. full, • smooth vs. grippy.
- Make notes, even casual ones. "Red fruit," "peppery," "great with pizza."

Every bottle is a chance to learn something about the wine, and about what you enjoy.

Be curious, not correct

Some of the best wine conversations start with: "I'm not sure what I'm tasting, but I like it."

Ask questions. Talk to winemakers. Read labels. Try things from different places and producers. You'll start to see patterns-and those patterns help you understand your preferences. Are you drawn to oaked whites or crisp ones? Earthy reds or fruit-forward styles? There's no right answer—only *your* answer.

Let go of the 'Perfect Pairing' myth. Pairing wine with food can be fun, but don't let it stress you out.

Yes, acidity can cut through richness. Yes, bold reds can overpower light dishes. But the best pairing is often the wine you like with the food you love. Want Chardonnay with steak? Go for it. Sparkling rosé with sausages? Sounds perfect. There's freedom in choosing what suits *your* taste—not someone else's rules.

Know what you like—and own it. This is where real confidence lives.

Once you know what you enjoy, you can explore variations of it, ask for recommendations that suit your palate, and describe it in your own words-even if it's 'reminds me of summer holidays' or 'tastes like a good mood'. 



Maldon District Hospital

ONE need not be a billionaire to experience significant life events in splendour: see the glorious façade of Maldon District Hospital.

Listed with the National Trust and the Victorian Heritage Register, having been built in phases since 1860, the building as it appears now features architectural detailing that is considered distinctive and historically important. The style is called 'Classical Revival' and it draws heavily on the architectural elements of ancient Greece and Rome; look at the symmetry of the design and those – relatively-minimalist – Doric columns. (The term Doric is believed to have originated from the Greek-speaking Dorian tribes: save that tidbit for your next trivia night. It's rare to be able to drop it into conversation — Ed.)

'Classical Revival' was a movement in the mid-18th century that tried to emulate the grandeur and simplicity of Greek and Roman styles while adapting them to contemporary uses. Maldon Hospital is exactly that.

The Victorian Heritage Register says: "The original Maldon Hospital was a temporary timber building constructed in 1859. This was soon extended with

NEWSAGENCY 56 MAIN ST two red brick wings either side, the male ward constructed in 1860 and the female ward constructed in 1862." The early versions of the hospital were designed by local artist David Relph Drape. Further extensions and alterations have taken place since then, notably those in 1867 to the designs of TF Kibble, when the elaborate decorations and details were added.

It still operates as a hospital, so it's not a visitors' attraction, but it doesn't hurt to know more about this vision of splendour as you drive or cycle past, enjoying the sites of Maldon.

The plan does not include an evaluation of Council's existing playgrounds, or whether there are any unmet demands for playgrounds. Councillor Lucas Maddock highlighted this point and said that while a hierarchy is useful, an analysis of needs would also assist decision-making and "...how to best equitably spend our limited resources."

Cr Maddock added: "When we're thinking about spending money on playgrounds and we want to make the most equitable decision, we need to know where those service gaps are and if our money would be better spent building a new playground, fulfilling a service gap, than renewing one that already exists."

After the unanimous motion to accept the Playground Renewal Plan, Mayor Rosie Annear stated: "This document is really to guide how we pick which playground we renew next, because we do have a lot; they are spread across the entire shire."

It's interesting to realise how much research and red tape there is in recreation. But when you think about play in terms of health, safety, fitness, tourism, education and socialisation, it's reassuring to know that climbing and swinging are being treated with appropriate gravitas.

The visual power lies in the intense sense of stillness and ambiguity, the thoughtful use of media and paper, and the gradual realisation that each image captures a fleeting moment, soon to change. As Rockwell Kent observed, "In quietness the soul expands." Expressing this concern remains a constant thread throughout Julie's practice.

Natural Newstead

Spinebills feasting on winter 'strawberries'

I visited the Newstead Cemetery in June one Friday evening, keen to see what might be around in the middle of winter. Pleasingly a trio of Southern Whitefaces was observed, but not photographed.

The cemetery has several mature specimens of **Irish Strawberry** Arbutus unedo, with their winter flowers a source of nectar for honeyeaters, including this **Eastern Spinebill**.

Irish Strawberry is an introduced species that can become an environmental weed in Mediterranean climates. It's an interesting plant nonetheless – the national tree of Italy, included in the Coat of Arms of Madrid, with relict populations in south-western Ireland of disputed origin but possibly introduced during Neolithic times.

These 'interesting' facts are of no great concern to the Eastern Spinebill.



JULIE Patey's 40-year retrospective exhibition will open at the Newstead Arts Hub, 8A Tivey St, Newstead on Saturday 2 August 2025 and run until 24 August. Opening hours 10am-4pm Saturdays and Sundays. The official opening will be on Saturday 9 August at 2pm.

THE final days of the Maldon in Winter Festival and the school holidays resulted in some interesting sights around Maldon. Visitors bustled amongst primary school portraits and kids of all ages rolled candle wax. Neon lights in glorious rainbow-coloured configurations danced across the facade of Maldon Hotel. And there was also the day of the Knight. On Thursday 17 July, the mythical Knight in Shining Armour became a reality for participants in a drawing

session with Greg Nash, who is a professional jouster from Kryall Castle (one of only two in Australia, guess where the other one works?). Cosy by Nature

Firelight feast

IN the depths of winter it's an ancient human activity to gather around a fire for warmth and to prepare food. While baked bean jaffles prepared in a hot iron are a camp classic, it is possible to incorporate fresh and seasonal produce into your winter feasts.

Regular campers in the goldfields region, Rocky and June Huxley, have mobile meal planning down to a fine art and their methods often boil down to good preparation. "Pack your protein in a marinade," she suggested, while also revealing that a small box packed with condiments is part of their camping kit. They take a few vegetables and fry them up under the stars — corn is particularly fantastic this way.

Scorching fruit is another idea that brings out some amazing flavours — and aromas. Try grilling some citrus (for cordial) or quince and apple for a crumble or with some blue cheese.

Roast Potatoes

Such a classic comfort food, while also operating as a vehicle for other flavours piled on, baked potatoes are so simple and satisfying. If you're popping your potatoes into the fire, you just need foil, some fork-holes and a good spot in the coals.

If you are preparing roast potatoes at home, Anthony, the



dedicated chef behind the Community Lunch and Midwinter Dance at Newstead Community Centre, reckons you should take a step back before baking. "Parboil them first," he recommends. "Add some crushed garlic and put some rosemary in the water with some salt. Then it's already infusing." He suggests choosing sebago or pontiac varieties. "They're not mushy, they hold their form." Thanks for the great hints, Anthony.

Roasts and firelight feasts are sociable, delicious and they don't have to come from a can!

BLAST FROM THE PAST

Florence Emily Green



FLORENCE Emily Green was born in New Zealand in 1862. She came as a child to Australia and in 1880 was one of the first women to pass the University of Melbourne matriculation exams. She then completed a degree at the Australian College of Theology with first-class honours.

Florence came to Maldon in December 1885 when her brother Rev Arthur Vincent Green was appointed the vicar at Holy Trinity. Soon after they arrived, advertisements appeared in the *Tarrangower Times* announcing that they were reopening the Trinity Church High School. Arthur would teach the Classics and Mathematics, while Florence would teach English and French. Lessons in drawing and painting were also offered and evening tuition could be arranged.

Six months later their first student, Louisa Aylwin, passed the matriculation exams. Other students who matriculated in the School's first years included Colin Gray, who for over 40 years was Maldon's local GP, and Alfred Adams, an engineer and war correspondent, who died in 1900 at Bloemfontein in South Africa while reporting on the Boer War.

During her time in Maldon, Florence also established the Girls' Rational Recreation Club. Rational Recreation was a concept promoted by middle-class reformers in the 19th century aimed at replacing 'degrading' popular pastimes with 'improving' and well-ordered activities. The Club presented several musical performances to raise funds for the Maldon Hospital and the Ladies' Benevolent Association.

Florence is said to have paid some of Ethel (Henry Handel) Richardson's fees at Presbyterian Ladies' College. Later in *The Getting of Wisdom* Richardson based her characters Miss Isabella and the Rev 'Robby' Shepherd on Florence and Arthur. Her depictions were said to be "malicious but accurate".

In 1889, when Arthur became the vicar of St Paul's Geelong, Florence went with him and there she founded the Geelong Girls' High School, a forerunner of The Hermitage that is now part of Geelong Grammar. In 1894 when Arthur was appointed Bishop of Grafton and Armidale, Florence again followed him and in Armidale founded the New England Girls' School that soon became one of Australia's largest girls' boarding schools.

Florence returned to Victoria in 1910 when she was appointed on a temporary basis as the first headmistress of Firbank Girls' Grammar School in Brighton. Ill health forced her to resign this position in 1911. Florence however had not finished her career as a school founder. Before her death in 1926 she founded two further schools at Montmorency and Murrumbeena.



Library news

State Government Grant for the Maldon Athenaeum Library THE library has received an unexpected (but gratefully received) grant as part of the Mechanics' Institute Grant Program. Mechanics' Institutes were formed to provide free lectures and educational and community facilities. More than 500 Mechanics' Institute buildings in Victoria are still in use, but only a handful continue to provide a library service.

The Maldon Athenaeum Library is a member of this small group, along with the Melbourne Athenaeum and the Mechanics' Institutes in Ararat, Ballarat, Berwick, Bonnie Doon, Footscray, Little River, Prahran, Stanley, Talbot and Toora. In announcing the grants, Minister for Local Government Nick Staikos said, "These grants will help their invaluable library collections remain for future generations to enjoy." Maldon Athenaeum Library will use the funds as directed to increase the availability and use of technology for library users, including the installation of Wi-Fi, purchase of additional laptops and other IT equipment and upgrading of existing software. These facilities will benefit the community by increasing access to information resources, enhancing management and use of the library collection and facilitating storage and retrieval of library archival material.

Library reviews

Crucified by Lynda La Plante, 2025

Detective Jack Warr is haunted by the gruesome legacy of serial killer Rodney Middleton and reeling from a series of events that has left him deep in depression. Refusing the Met-offered counselling service, Jack instead finds solace through renewing a dangerous friendship with the artist and master forger, Adam Border. When a body is discovered nailed to a giant cross in a framer's shop, Jack feels a connection to the case even though it is not in his jurisdiction. But is his involvement that of a detective or witness?

The Star on the Grave by Linda Margolin Royal, 2024

In 1940, as the Nazis sweep toward Lithuania, Japanese diplomat Chiune Sugihara defies his own government and secretly issues thousands of visas to Jewish refugees desperate to flee. After the war, Sugihara is dismissed and disappears into obscurity. Three decades later, in Australia, Rachael Margol, her father and her grandmother live disconnected from one another and haunted by unspoken tragedies. When Rachel announces her engagement to a Greek Orthodox man, it detonates a long-held secret. The Margols are actually the Margolins: they are Jewish, and her family has concealed their identity from her and the world. But why? As Rachel struggles to understand this deception, an opportunity arrives to visit Chiune Sugihara, the man who risked his life to save them during World War II. Rachel becomes determined to meet him, but will a journey to Japan, and the secrets it uncovers, heal the Margolins or fracture them for good?

Just Don't be a D**khead by Kasey Chambers, 2024

Kasey Chambers' Just Don't Be a D**khead and Other Profound Things I've Learnt is a whirlwind of great stories, rock-solid life lessons and Kasey Chambers at her most heartfelt and honest. From her childhood in the Australian outback to the heights of her chart-topping international success as a singer/songwriter, Kasey has trusted her gut, stuck to her values and learned some hard truths, always while trying to live by the best advice she's ever received: just don't be a d**khead.

The Last Convict by Anthony Hill, 2021

Oxford 1863: Young Samuel Speed sets a barley stack alight in the hope it will earn him a bed in prison for the night. He wants nothing more than a morsel of food in his belly and a warm place to sleep off the streets. What he receives is a sentence of seven years' servitude, to be served half a world away in the penal colony of Fremantle, Western Australia. When Samuel boards the transport ship Belgravia, he is stripped of his clothing and even his name, and given regulations about when to rise, eat, clean and sleep. On arrival at Fremantle Prison, hard labour is added to the mix and he wonders if life can get any worse. The only solace he finds is a love of reading, which allows the likes of Tom Sawyer and Oliver Twist to become his lifelong friends. Samuel is granted a ticket of leave in 1867 and full freedom in 1871, but what sort of life can a man forge for himself in the colony, with no skills, no money and no family? Will it be the beginning of the life he has always dreamed of, or do some sentences truly never end?

Mrs Kelly by Grantlee Keiza, 2017

Ellen Kelly was born during the troubles in Ireland. When she arrived in Melbourne in 1841 aged nine, British convict ships were still dumping their unhappy cargo in what was then known as the colony of New South Wales. When she died at the age of 91 in 1923, having outlived seven of her 12 children, motor cars plied the highway near her bush home north of Melbourne, and Australia was a modern sovereign nation.

The wife of a convict, Ellen, like so many Australian pioneering women, led a life of great hardship. She was a mother of seven when her husband died after months in a police lock-up, lived through famine and Australian drought, saw her babies die, listened through the prison wall while her eldest son was hanged and saw the charred remains of another of her children who'd died in a shoot-out with police. One son became Australia's most infamous (and ultimately popular) outlaw. Another became a highly decorated policeman, an honorary member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and a worldwide star on the rodeo circuit.






