The Housing Crisis - Time To Act

Last week's article in the *Times* about the housing crisis in the Shire outlined the extent of the problem and what assistance was available for those experiencing homelessness and housing stress.

The article also touched upon the State and Federal Governments' plans for providing more social and affordable housing and the lack of progress to date, in terms of bricks and mortar.

As Bendigo West MP Maree Edwards said, "There is no magic fix."

This week's article poses the questions: how big is government appetite to fix the homelessness and the housing problem? And what are some of the solutions?

Dragging its feet

When it comes to addressing homelessness, the State Government is undoubtedly dragging its feet. A 500-page parliamentary inquiry on homelessness that offered some solutions was tabled in March 2021. That was over two years ago, and the responsible Minister is required to formally reply within six months. It has been reported that this has yet to happen. Recommendations of the report include the need to provide

affordable, stable long-term housing.

Which is something that we already know!

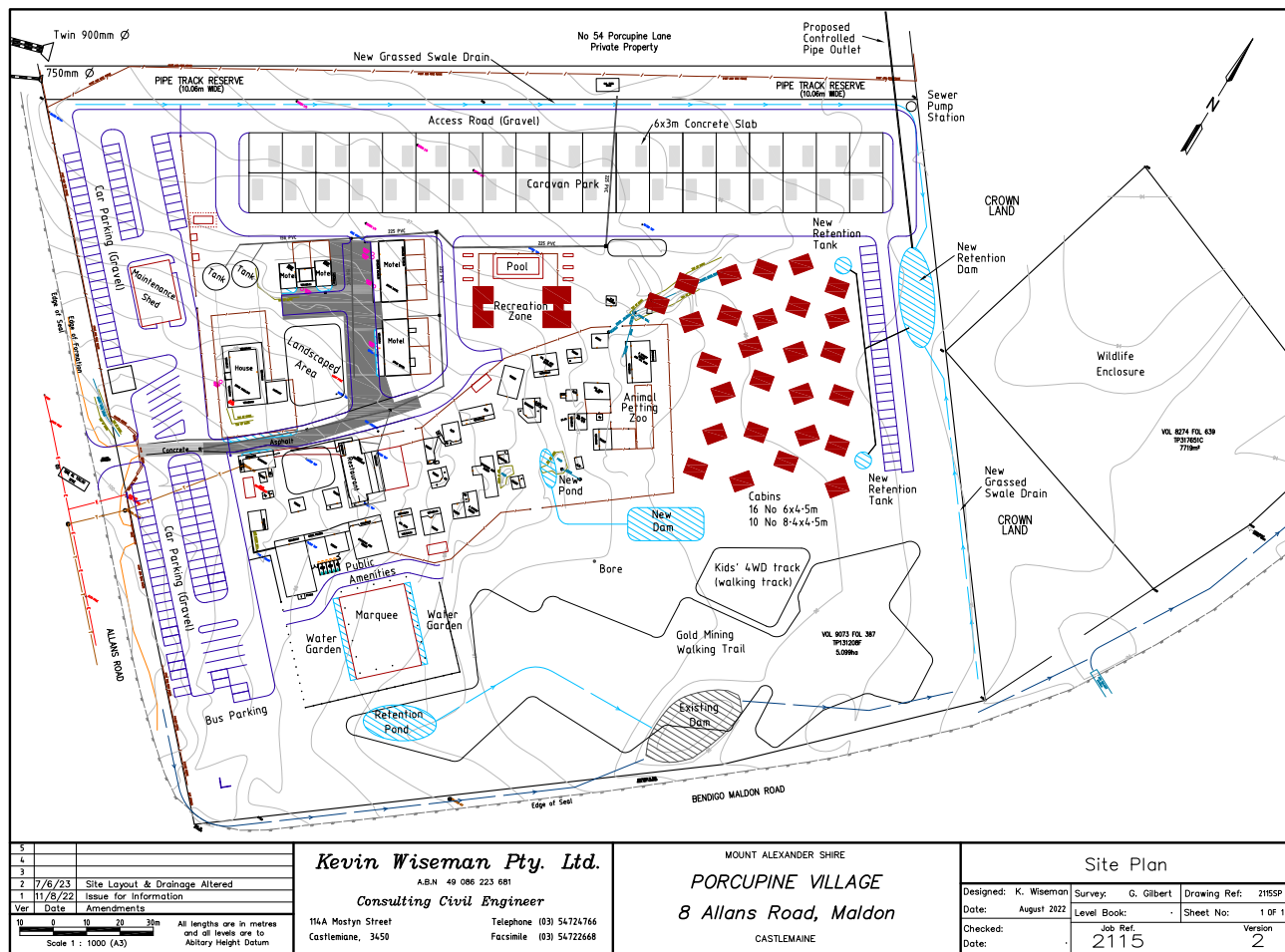
More promises...

Hard on the heels of the announcement that the Commonwealth Games would be cancelled came the promise from the State Government to build 1,300 affordable homes across the regions. Let's say, for simplicity's sake, that the cost of land plus house build is \$1 million (and the actual cost would be much less than that). The build would only cost \$1.3 billion - much less than the \$2.6 billion budgeted for the Games.

Porcupine Village - Amended Plans

AMENDED plans have been submitted to Council for planning permission to develop the Porcupine Village site. As this is one of the largest and most complex projects ever to be undertaken in Maldon, it has been the focus of considerable community interest.

The plans include a detailed flora and fauna assessment which identify 29 large trees and 54 indigenous plant species on the site. The report concludes that the development will result in a total loss of 2.2 hectares of native vegetation.

Revegetation with local trees and shrubs and an improvement of the under storey and mid storey are two key recommendations.

A traffic impact assessment commissioned by the planning permit applicant has found no traffic or parking grounds which should warrant refusal of a planning permit. This is based on the figures of daily attendance of 200 vehicles, with 300 or busy days.

The drainage management report points out that the site presently drains to the north and north east, onto neighbouring private property and Crown land.

It is proposed that most of the stormwater will be diverted to a new retention dam towards the north west boundary.

The old buildings in Porcupine Village currently have no gutters and drain directly onto the ground. A new pond and dam will deal with this issue.

New cabins will have guttering and stormwater will flow into retention tanks and then on into the retention dam. Where possible, some of this water will be recycled to water new landscaped areas.

The two new buildings in the recreation zone will be connected to the existing stormwater drainage system.

According to the site plan, there will be two dams, two ponds and a retention tank in use.

All sewerage will be collected in a new pump station and will be pumped to the Coliban sewerage system.

So where will the Games money go? Some of it will be channelled into paying a series of 'cancellation fees' while other funds will be used for sporting facility upgrades, to compensate regional communities for the fact that the Games are not being held in their towns.

Why not spend the balance, after the cancellation fees are paid, on affordable social housing? If the State Government is serious about fixing the problem, why not fix it?

Good ideas, but...

Councils lack the funds to address the problem of unaffordable housing but have the advantage over Federal and State governments of on-the-ground networks and knowledge. Within its boundaries, Mt Alexander Shire has existing partnerships with agencies and organisations who are working towards solving the housing crisis.

As Council points out, the median house price in the Shire is \$740,000 and the median weekly rent is \$455 - a sobering figure when you consider that no more than 30 percent of a household's income should go towards rent.

In 2021, Council employed a Housing Solutions Broker to address the problem of housing across the Shire. It's important to keep in mind that Council acts only as a facilitator, as it does not provide or manage social housing.

The question is: in terms of bricks and mortar, how successful is the Housing Solutions Broker's role? How many affordable homes have been built in the Shire since that appointment?

More good ideas

There are more good ideas out there to solve the housing crisis - such as the My Home Network, which is a group of community organisations working collaboratively to address the problem.

A group of like-minded women in the Shire have come together to build affordable housing on communally-owned land. Similar schemes are in their infancy.

One of the most effective ways of providing affordable housing is hiding in plain sight in Maldon - Tarrangower Village. It's a not-for-profit association run by volunteers that has been providing homes for retirees for over 45 years. It's a model of housing that other communities should consider.

Would these work?

Okay, we're at a housing crossroads, so why not consider other solutions?

Some examples, together with some pros and cons:

- Higher rates for houses that are not occupied by the owners or by long-term renters. Pros: people may think twice about the economics of owning a second home and decide to sell. This will push down the cost of housing as more housing is available to buy. Cons: potential destabilisation of the housing market.
- Abolish negative gearing. See above for the pros and cons.
- Longer leases for renters - in Europe, five-year leases are not uncommon. This is a win-win, but only if interest rates don't rise any further and leave landlords with unaffordable mortgages.
- Rent capping - see the above for pros and cons. It will only work if interest rates don't continue to climb.
- There's plenty of unused Federal, State and Council-owned land hanging around that could be rezoned and used as land for affordable housing builds. No cons with this one!
- Reduce Australia's immigration rate. Pros: less new housing is required. Cons: many of these younger migrants are needed to work and pay taxes as the Australian population ages.
- Those people living on their own in a larger house could consider taking in a boarder. Remember boarders? In the old days, they were quite common. Pros: a financial win for both house owner and boarder. Cons: who used the last of the milk?
- Short-term accommodation for those who are presently homeless - in publicly funded self-contained cabins and caravans in caravan parks and camping grounds. Pros: access to warm, clean accommodation. Cons: this should only be regarded as a temporary solution, and not a long-term fix for homelessness.
- Some form of crisis accommodation for families who need it most. Remember the emergency accommodation provided at the old parsonage in Maldon? It worked well.
- At the very least, provision of facilities for showering and clothes washing - such as those that used to be on offer at Geof and Shirley Little's Central Service Centre.

Any other ideas? The Times would love to hear them!

Volunteer Grants Awarded

LAST week, Federal Member for Bendigo, Lisa Chesters announced 18 recipients of the 2022-2023 Volunteer Grants at a morning tea recognising their achievement.

The grants, ranging between \$1,000 and \$5,000 will enable organisations in the Bendigo electorate to better support their volunteers and to purchase small equipment, pay for fuel, transport, and training. A total of 18 groups shared in the \$66,225 in funding available to each Federal electorate.

"Volunteers are an integral part of our society and make an invaluable contribution to the community," Ms Chesters said. "From Kyneton to Raywood, this round has seen groups from right across the electorate recognised for the work they do to support volunteers."

The Regional Community Vet Clinic will be spending their \$5,000 Volunteer Grant across a number of areas. According to volunteer Robyn Slattery, the funding will cover the costs of first aid training and police checks for the organisation's volunteers. It will also pay for a dedicated phone and a laptop. "The phone that we were using was a secondhand one that was secondhand before it was donated to us," Robyn said. "We've been mindful of spending the grant on things that make a difference and getting good value at the same time."

The Castlemaine & Maldon Railway Preservation Society (that's the Victorian Goldfields Railway) have received a \$5,000 grant and they are intending to spend it on defibrillators.

"We're hoping to buy three defibrillators," VGR Board member and Volunteer Coordinator Andrew Key said. "I see defibs as being like insurance - you hope you don't ever need to use them!"

The intention is to have a defibrillator available at the Maldon station, one on the train and one to be taken out in the field by work gangs.

Doors Open, Doors Close

CATHERINE Tait is MANet Arts Focus Gallery’s featured artist from 21 July to 21 August, and you are warmly invited to the opening, 5pm to 7pm Friday 28 July. ‘Doors open, Doors close’ is an exhibition of her artworks exploring what is hidden and beyond.

I first met Catherine Tait in her studio in Willy Milly Road in 2018, where I was quite overwhelmed with the variety and quality of her work in a range of media, including watercolour, pastels, oil paint, ceramics and bronze, using lost wax casting to create the forms. That seems like aeons ago before the pandemic hit and shut us all away.

Catherine did a Tertiary Orientation Design Program at Bendigo TAFE in 1978, after which she has done many things, including window dressing in Myer, before settling down to do her own artwork. Now, Catherine is a leading light in the development of the MANet Arts Focus Gallery in Main Street, where she has put her window dressing skills learned long ago to good use.

Catherine has been creating all her life and exhibiting professionally for over 35 years. She has won over 40 awards and exhibited in New York in 2019 and in Venice, Italy in 2022.

In the past, she has put her design training to work in organising the hanging of the Castlemaine Rotary Art Show, Harcourt Apple Fest art exhibition and a range of MANet events, including the Art Walk, the Portrait Prize and the Maldon in Winter Art Show. She said hanging art is basic window dressing. So, setting up of the MANet Art Focus Gallery was right up her alley. She said, “Having a local place to exhibit my works is so satisfying, and engaging with purchasers of my artworks is very enjoyable”. Being the featured artist of the month provides a challenge that has made her think deeply about her work.

Catherine has themed her exhibit around the Goldfields Gothic Festival to be held from 4 to 6 August in Maldon. Her paintings will feature hidden, secretive places as well as portraits of local gothic personalities.

She said, “I did a pop-up gallery last year (in what is now Platform No 5) and had so much fun, I even had a visit by a character portraying Queen Victoria.”

Catherine will also be a ‘talking book’ in the Athenaeum Human Library discussing Confidence Building as part of the Goldfields Gothic Festival on Saturday 5 August.

Also exhibiting at the MANet Arts Focus Gallery are Carol De Graauw, Irena Kaczmarek, Malini Lewis, Jennifer Merkus, Tricia Migdoll, Carolyn Vickers and Mark Wardle. They will be showing extra little surprises during the Goldfields Gothic Festival.

The Manet Arts Focus Gallery at 27 Main Street in Maldon is open Wednesdays and Fridays, from 11am to 4pm, Saturdays and Sundays 10am to 4pm. AND open late during the Goldfields Gothic Festival 4-6 August.

Celebrating Sustainability

THE Mount Alexander Net Zero Working Group (MANZWG) is a small but passionate brigade of locals on a timely mission: helping businesses and schools in the region reach 100% clean energy as soon as is humanly possible.

Last week, the group celebrated having received \$3,500 in regular donations from fellow climate action non-profit organisation, The Hub Foundation, to continue the work of inspiring change. Harnessing the power of positive storytelling, MANZWG aims to acknowledge businesses that are making strides towards sustainability, transitioning to clean energy sources and reducing their carbon footprint. By spreading the word about these success stories, they hope to encourage others to follow suit.

Fran Gleeson, a Maldon resident, is the group's storyteller. Concerned about climate change for more than 20 years, it was her six-year-old grandson asking her 'if the world was sick' that sponsored hard action. After moving to Mount Alexander Shire, she joined MANZWG and began interviewing local businesses that are making improvements in sustainability.

"Often, a business might not know what can be achieved or how simple some changes are to make. Hearing about what other businesses are doing is infectious," says Fran. By showcasing what other businesses have accomplished through creating video content and feature stories, MANZWG aims to foster a sense of inspiration and motivation within the community.

One inspiring success story is that of the Mostyn Street Medical Clinic in Castlemaine. Recognising the role healthcare industries play in contributing to carbon emissions, the clinic has taken significant steps to become more sustainable. They have installed solar panels and a Tesla battery system, resulting in substantial savings on their quarterly bills. Additionally, they have adopted eco-friendly practices, such as using reusable metal surgical instruments, washing cotton gowns, and eliminating single-use plastic cups in favour of paper alternatives. Eventually, they will move to become a paperless clinic entirely.

Another local business making waves in sustainability is Maldon's own historic bakery. New owner Rebecca Barnett recently

spoke with MANZWG about her own sustainability journey, making changes such as updating the insulation, repurposing second-hand building materials and composting the coffee grinds. Every story is unique.

MANZWG's efforts also extend to local schools, with member Deb Pach leading the charge. She aims to see all 14 schools in the area switch to solar energy in three stages. Stage one is installing solar panels, stage two is utilising storage batteries, and stage three will see schools contributing surplus power back into the community energy supply. Castlemaine Secondary College is one school already benefitting from solar energy, saving over \$60,000 annually on their power bills.

With a shared goal, the group's diverse members each bring unique skills to the table. "We're the right mix of personalities, all very creative. Nothing is too hard. We brainstorm ideas, come up with solutions and make it happen!" said Deb.

According to Rebecca, the Bakery’s beef pies are hot favourites, but the spinach and ricotta parcels are catching up. “Our vegetarian range is going gangbusters,” Rebecca said. “But so are our sausage rolls. The tradies often buy a pie AND a sausage roll. And people come from far and wide to buy our family pies.” The Maldon Bakery sweet treats - from Danish pastries to cardamom and cinnamon rolls - are also a hit with the customers. “Some of these I bake myself,” Rebecca said. “I make ricotta cheesecakes, fruit tarts and apple turnovers.” The tables at the front of the Maldon Bakery are becoming a gathering place for locals to meet up and enjoy a coffee, with the knee rugs and cushions providing some comfort on cool winter days. Coming from a line of bakers spanning five generations, it’s not surprising that Rebecca has built up a successful bakery business in such a short space of time. With the support of the building’s owner, Rebecca has undertaken renovations that maintain the bakery’s heritage significance, increase efficiency and introduce sustainable practices. Where possible, recycled materials were used during the renovations. Rebecca is working towards a net zero business and has future plans to install solar panels and renovate the

bakery garden to provide veg and herbs for the bakery. The Maldon Bakery has been operating almost continuously since 1854 - here’s hoping it’s thriving in 2054!

MALDON resident Gary Down died this week; his warmth and trademark wit will be missed by family, friends and most of all by his partner Harry Koponen.

Gary and Harry moved to Maldon 25 years ago and quickly became part of the Maldon community. An actor, Gary's career began in New Zealand when he was 16 and he had a long and successful career on stage and on screen.

In 1964, Gary moved to Australia and he spent some time working with the Melbourne Theatre Company (MTC), touring with the Young Elizabethan Players or 'The Young Lizzies' as he called them. Following several seasons with the MTC, Gary moved to the UK and performed in over 50 stage productions.

On his return to Australia, Gary worked for a range of production companies, including the MTC, Crawford Productions

and St Martin's Theatre, as well as beginning an extensive career in TV and radio. He appeared in many TV productions, including *Home and Away*, *Blue Heelers* and *The Secret Life of Us*.

Gary was not only an actor of vast talent and experience - he also worked as a director, writer, teacher, composer, musician and lyricist. After moving to Maldon, he continued to work; this involved commuting to Melbourne and Sydney to appear at the MTC and the STC. He also had a stint in *Neighbours* and took on the non-singing principal role in the Australian Opera's *The Merry Widow*. He retired from acting when he was in his late sixties.

Maldon residents will have known Gary best from the days of Gardens Etcetera, the Main Street shop that he and Harry ran for several years. Ever-friendly and with a great line in chat, Gary held court at the counter while mulling over the cryptic crossword.

Gary was a much-loved member of the social pétanque group. A game with Gary was a game full of entertainment, with much humour, some gentle sledging and the odd glass of red.

One of seven children, Gary was born into a large and closely knit New Zealand family. "Gary was related to 42% of the population on the North Island," Harry joked. Last year, they travelled to New Zealand for a family reunion. "It was a huge reunion, and I'm so glad we did that," Harry said.

There you have it: we say farewell to an immensely talented but humble man who excelled at acting and was able to connect with so many people on so many different levels.

Harry would like to express his thanks to the staff at the Castlemaine Hospital for their recent care of Gary. "They were just extraordinary," Harry said.

CAPTAIN MECHOSK

John Mechowski, better known as 'Captain' Mechosk, is credited with discovering gold near Tarrangower in late 1853. He was born in Poland about 1820 and had served in the Russian army during the long-running Circassian War. In 1848 Mechosk seems to have been involved in a mutiny and was sent as a prisoner to mines in Siberia. Through family connections, he was able to leave Siberia and travelled first to England and then to Australia.

In February 1852, Mechosk was prospecting for gold near what is now Fryerstown. He would later claim that Governor Charles La Trobe had invited him to search for gold in Victoria. It was at this time he was given the title 'Captain'. This was not a military title but was in the Cornish tradition where the leader of a team of miners was called 'Captain'. In 1853 he was said to have discovered gold at Jones's Creek (now Waanyarra), Tarrangower, Kingower and Simson's Ranges (now Maryborough).

According to later accounts of the discovery of gold at Tarrangower, Mechosk and his party were known to be working somewhere in the Muckleford forest. He regularly returned with his horse and dray to Barkers Creek for provisions. In December 1853, when rumours developed that Mechosk was doing well, a group of miners followed his dray tracks to Tarrangower and so started a rush. Within a month, 20,000 people had come to the diggings.

In 1855 Mechosk petitioned the Victorian Parliament for a reward for his discoveries. He was supported by a testimonial written by Captain John Bull, the Mount Alexander Gold Commissioner. Parliament, however, declined his petition, arguing that Mechosk had come to Victoria well after gold had been found. Some members thought that a private prospector looking for personal benefit should not be rewarded from the public purse.

Mechosk, who had fallen on hard times, continued to press his claim for a reward. Finally, in August 1857, a select committee recommended that he be awarded £1,000 for his discoveries at Tarrangower and Kingower. A month later, Parliament voted to award him £475.

Mechosk continued to promote himself as a gold prospector. In September 1860, the Government of Queensland appointed him leader of its Gold Exploration Expedition. Over three months he explored the area between Brisbane and the Burnett River but was unable to locate any significant goldfields. Dispirited and suffering from tuberculosis, Mechosk travelled to Fiji hoping for a cure. He later returned to Brisbane where he died on 5 May 1863.

Creek Renamed in Moving Ceremony

THE renaming of a creek on the border of Mt Alexander Shire and Hepburn Shire marks a momentous occasion of healing and cultural revival. The waterway in Franklinford, formerly known as Jim Crow Creek, has been officially renamed Larni Barramal Yaluk, meaning 'home of the emu creek' in Dja Dja Wurrung language.

In an emotional gathering of more than 50 people, the CEO of Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation (Djaara), Rodney Carter, could not contain his tears during the ceremony to mark the occasion. The decision to discard the derogatory and racist former name, Jim Crow Creek, signifies a significant step towards healing while commemorating a growing movement to embrace Indigenous language in place names. For Rodney Carter, the name change represents a personal healing journey, not only for him but also for the country and the creek itself.

Reinstating traditional language in place names is not just about symbolism, as it plays a vital role in language survival. Traditional languages in Australia are highly endangered. By honouring these languages through place names, Australians are taking an essential step in preserving cultural heritage.

2022 to 2032 has been declared the International Decade of Indigenous Languages by the UN. The declaration acknowledges the precarious state of indigenous languages worldwide and is an effort to ensure Indigenous Peoples' right to revive, preserve and promote their own languages. The Victorian naming authority, Geographic Names Victoria, has registered and gazetted 64 Aboriginal place names over the past three years alone. Support for the movement has been steadily increasing, reflecting a greater awareness of the importance of preserving Indigenous culture and language.

Dja Dja Wurrung elder Uncle Rick Nelson, who performed a smoking ceremony and welcome to country during the celebration, emphasised the significance of using local Aboriginal language in everyday community life. He believes incorporating traditional language in place names will play a crucial role in keeping language and culture alive. Uncle Rick Nelson's next objective is to create a dual name for Mount Alexander, giving it back its traditional name, Leanganook.

The push towards using traditional language demonstrates a collective commitment to celebrating the rich Indigenous heritage as an integral part of Australia's identity.

Goldfields Gothic at Maldon Athenaeum Library – Human Library

LOCAL residents and visitors are invited to visit the Maldon Athenaeum Library on Saturday 5 August, between 10am and 2pm to take part in an activity called 'Human Library'. Library volunteer Tina says, "Just come to the library and you will be matched with an available human book."

The Human Library is part of this year's Goldfields Gothic Festival, which sets out to celebrate hidden, dark, or undiscovered aspects of the region and its history.

Festival Director Valentina Tansley says, "The Human Library is a chance to hear from people who have interesting experiences or insights, many relating to Maldon and the Goldfields area." It is a chance to hear some fascinating stories directly from the source.

So how does the 'Human Library' work? It simply involves spending a short time with a person, rather than a book, to discover their story. Nine intriguing people will be 'available for loan' at the library, and you will have the opportunity to sit one-on-one and hear their tales. The 'Human books' include Catherine Tait, who will talk about facing our dark sides to unlock creativity; Marie Bell discussing her research into the history of Maldon; and Kelly Ann Blake, a local Wadawurrung woman who will talk about the spiritual significance of place.

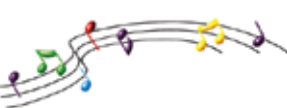

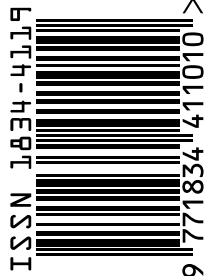
