Porcupine Village: full steam ahead



Porcupine Village has received the go-ahead to proceed.

THE operators of Porcupine Village have triumphantly announced that their planning application has been approved by the Minister for Planning. The decision to allow a permit for Application number PA2403444, for the use and development of the land at Porcupine Village for a function centre, museum, restaurant and accommodation, was approved on Friday 27 June. The application had originally been submitted in December 2024.

“The owners, management team and staff at Porcupine Village have never lost sight of the end goal; to bring the village back to life, along with much needed accommodation for visitors, quality dining options and a function space that is unique to the area,” Doug and Deb Baird said in their announcement.

The Bairds have faced over four years of

challenging uncertainty as they endeavour to rehabilitate the existing elements of the site and work towards upgrades and additions. They pointed out that the permit comes with numerous conditions requiring further labour before they can open the gates, to ensure that the project complies with the requirements of multiple regulatory bodies. “But it is now very much a case of WHEN we open, as opposed to IF we will open,” they said.

Stay tuned for updates and more signs of life at Porcupine Village! The operators gratefully look forward to continued support from the community, saying it “kept us focused on the task and buoyed our spirits when things got tough.”

Street sign fix forthcoming

INCORRECT street signs spotted around Maldon are being amended, with eagle-eyed residents encouraged to continue monitoring signage. Mount Alexander Shire Council has responded to queries about signs at Phoenix Street and Langs Lane.

The erroneous sign at Phoenix Street (see the *TT* edition of Friday 13 June) was located at the corner of Main Street and was amended by council in time to correctly direct revellers to the recent Solstice Bonfire, located nearby.

Meanwhile, Mount Alexander Shire Council (MASC) has explained how the wrong sign was erected at Langs Lane. A spokesperson said: “There is always a chance that signage may be incorrect on a small percentage of roads, due to human error. In the case of the Woodlocks Lane sign, it appears the incorrect name was loaded into our asset management software.”

The MASC’s web page about street names highlights their importance for emergency services, mail delivery and road transport; it details the process for road name proposals and lists newly-named roads in the shire. The Council spokesperson said it is unusual for names to be changed. “It is very rare for

street names to be changed,” they said. “If it does happen, there is a lengthy consultation and approval process.”

Shire residents are encouraged to contact MASC if they believe a street sign to be incorrect, this can be done online at www.mountalexander.vic.gov.au/Report-an-issue. There is also the (privately owned) digital application called Snap Send Solve, which can be used to alert councils and other authorities of issues or incidents and can be found at: snapsendsolve.com.

“The Maldon community alerted us to the issue, which we very much appreciate as we do not have resources to audit all our street signs on a routine basis,” Council advised.

Residents and family members can rest assured that the correct sign for Woodlocks Lane is on its way. “A new sign has been ordered,” the spokesperson told the *TT*. “Unfortunately, street sign delivery lead times can be lengthy. We apologise for the inconvenience to the community.”

Council adopts \$56 million budget

Council adopted the 2025-2026 Budget following community consultation and feedback.

The budget outlines Council’s priorities for the upcoming financial year and how we will deliver more than 100 services to the community.

Highlights include active transport, carbon offsetting initiatives, a shire-wide biodiversity strategy, affordable housing, a Fair Access Policy, and support for community groups and events.

The budget also includes \$17 million in capital works to improve infrastructure such as roads, bridges, drains, and footpaths, as well as strong investment in our community facilities.

Energy support for renters



A new video demonstrating energy efficiency and techniques to make homes more comfortable and cost effective has been created by My Home Network (MHN) Tenants Rights Working Group and the West End Resilience (WER) Energy Group; it was launched by Dhelkaya Health on Monday 23 June. With temperatures plummeting at the arrival of winter, tenants of rented homes can now access the video, which was created following a workshop about how simple changes can improve energy efficiency and reduce gas and electricity bills.

MHN spokesperson Frankie Nugent said everyone deserved an affordable, comfortable home; however, this was often not the case for many local residents, particularly tenants.

"The cost of housing also includes the cost of heating and cooling, and tenants often don't have the same opportunities to improve the energy efficiency of their rental or have equitable access to affordable renewable energy or renewable energy systems," Ms Nugent said.

"This video will offer tips on how to lower electricity and gas usage, which energy providers are best value, how to lower your bills and how to connect with renting rights and supports."

West End Resilience is a place-based community group open to anyone living on the west side of Castlemaine. My Home Network is auspiced by Dhelkaya Health and made up of passionate community members, locals with lived experience of the housing crisis and representatives from local housing initiatives, community, and government organisations.

Alistar Robertson from WER said they had previously delivered successful workshops for home-owners and now wanted to assist tenants. The video can be accessed on Dhelkaya Health's website at dhelkayahealth.org.au/my-home-network.

Funds to train aged care nurses

La Trobe University has received \$3.77 million in funding from the Federal Government to provide critical skills training for nurses working in Victorian residential aged care homes. A series of free three-day workshops will be run by La Trobe's Australian Centre for Evidence-Based Aged Care (ACEBAC) to upskill nurses in conducting comprehensive health assessments of older people. These assessments help support improved healthcare through early intervention, reducing hospital admissions and facilitating hospital discharges. The new funding will support 140 workshops over three years, reaching up to 2,800 aged care nurses. It will be rolled out across the state from August 2025.

La Trobe Vice-Chancellor Professor Theo Farrell said the funding would add to the University's \$170 million investment across health teaching, research and innovation to help address Victoria's health workforce crisis. Professor Farrell said: "Government support is crucial to meet the growing needs of our aged care workforce and this helps solidify our position as the partner of choice for health professional clinical education."

Tax time: wait!

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO) is warning taxpayers not to lodge their tax returns until their income statement is marked as 'tax ready' and data has been pre-filled by the ATO.

Last year 142,000 people who lodged in the first two weeks of July had to lodge amendments, or had their returns investigated and amended by the ATO to fix inaccuracies in their tax return, for example, income that had not been declared properly.

ATO Assistant Commissioner Rob Thomson said that waiting until late July allows for the ATO to prefill information in your tax return.

"We know doing your tax return is something to tick off your to-do list each year, but there's no need to rush. The best time to lodge is from late July once everything is ready."

"We pre-fill information from your employer, banks, government agencies and health funds into your tax return to help you get it right the first time – regardless of whether you use a registered tax agent or lodge yourself," Mr Thomson said. Waiting for this information to be pre-filled reduces the likelihood of mistakes or omissions, which can often result in taxpayers having to submit an amendment, causing delays.

The Hub future secured



Castlemaine Community Investment Co-operative announced on Thursday 26 June that it had realised its goal to raise the funds to purchase The Hub, three days before the investment deadline. The Castlemaine Community Investment Co-operative is a group of residents working together to purchase and manage local properties and keep them community-owned. The Hub is the

historical building on the corner of Barker and Templeton Streets in Castlemaine. For details or to become a member of the Co-op, visit: castlemaine.coop.

Tourism data shows huge spend

The latest data from Tourism Research Australia's Domestic Tourism Statistics and International Visitor Survey shows international travellers spent a record \$9.3 billion in the year to March 2025.

In the year ending March 2025, Indian travellers spent \$810 million in Victoria – an 84 per cent year-on-year increase – while the rest of Australia has declined. China remained the state's largest international market for spend at \$2.9 billion, up 23 per cent.

The latest data also confirms Melbourne is the top interstate overnight leisure destination, with 861,000 travellers staying 3.5 million nights and spending \$1.4 billion in the March 2025 quarter – outperforming Sydney on trips, nights, and expenditure.

This data follows the release of Tourism Research Australia's 2023-24 State Tourism Satellite Account, showing Victoria's record-breaking \$40 billion visitor economy supported 288,800 filled jobs – including 183,800 direct tourism jobs – with nearly three quarters in hospitality, accommodation and retail.

Visit Victoria is working with Tourism Australia to train 65,000 global travel agents to promote the state, while supporting local operators to connect with international markets and grow their businesses.

Overall, overnight visitors spent \$34.3 billion in Victoria – up 5.6 per cent year-on-year. For the first time, this figure includes overnight stays only, with domestic day trip data to be added in future releases. This is the first data set from the new Domestic Tourism Statistics program, replacing the National Visitor Survey.

Drought challenges continue



Recent rainfall in south-western Victoria may have wrongly led many to believe the drought is over but scientists are calling the current situation a "Green Drought". Dr Andrew Watkins, Research Associate at Monash University's School of Earth, Atmosphere and Environment said: "From a distance, it looks as if recent rainfall in south-western Victoria and southern South Australia has turned things around for our farmers. On closer inspection, the green tinge to the landscape is just a little growth returning to surviving grasses. There are few new shoots and those that are popping up tend to be climate-resilient winter weeds. The rain came too late, when the winter chill had already set in. Hay carting is likely to continue well into spring regardless of rainfall when the soil warms up enough to support new growth. That means your spring lamb is also likely to be more expensive this year."

Meanwhile, farmers are urged to check for

toxic weeds and plants in dry swamps and dams before allowing stock access for grazing. Agriculture Victoria (AV) says toxic plants that might be found in these areas include dock, soursob, fat hen, lesser loosestrife and swamp grass. These weeds are not palatable, so ensuring that stock are not hungry and have access to a wider forage area and supplementary feed, will help to mitigate the risk. Farmers are encouraged to observe livestock for signs of toxicity which may include a stiff gait, staggering, signs of lethargy or abdominal discomfort. AV says before putting stock onto a new area, thoroughly check for different species of plants, look at records to see if anything happened last time it was used and ensure stock are not put on hungry which may cause them to forage indiscriminately.

If livestock show signs of weed toxicity, remove them from the area and contact a veterinarian or local Animal Health staff for advice. Farmers can access technical information and advice to help manage the impacts of increasingly difficult seasonal conditions at agriculture.vic.gov.au/drought or by calling 136 186.

Soil needed to dig into microbiome research



Agriculture Victoria is launching an expression of interest campaign to encourage farmers to donate soil samples to a National Soil Action Plan research project. Funded by the Australian and Victorian governments, the 'Soil biodiversity across landscapes' project will seek to implement priority actions from the Plan under the National Soil Strategy. Agriculture Victoria Principal Scientist Tim Sawbridge said he hoped to attract interest from at least 50 farmers statewide. "To gain a deep understanding of their role in soil health, we're wanting a broad range of samples from various production zones and agricultural industries in Victoria," he said.

To express interest in participating in the project, farmers should email soil.microbiome@agriculture.vic.gov.au by 5pm, Tuesday 30 September.

Soil samples will be taken from a single geo-location to a depth of 10cm and 30cm from a small area on the farm. The soil structure, chemistry, botanical information and DNA will be analysed and barcoded for comparison with other samples in the dataset.

"We anticipate that farmers who express interest in submitting samples to the project will have a natural curiosity about what is living within their soil," Dr Sawbridge said.

"Everyone is set to gain from this project – researchers, farmers and land conservationists will learn more about the benefits of this microscopic subterranean world."

"We may discover ways to influence the microbiome's effect on soil productivity, nutrient uptake, soil carbon and soil capacity to recover and maintain resilience in a changing climate."

Maldon Beehive Chimney: Frequently Asked Questions



NEWS of proposed repair works for Maldon's Beehive Chimney has local folk chattering, so Parks Victoria met with representatives of local groups at the site last Thursday 26 June to answer lingering and pressing queries.

With the help of Parks Victoria State-wide Heritage Advisor Janine Major, the *Tarrangower Times* has compiled this list of FAQ's for the broader community. 1. Why are works needed?

The structure has been out in the weather since it was built in 1861; that's over 160 years in which rain and wind have entered the mouth of the chimney causing severe weathering, particularly to the interior of the top 6.7m section. Efforts to repair the brickwork using inappropriate mortar in the past have unfortunately contributed to further decay. A recent independent engineering assessment has determined that the chimney requires work within 12 to 24 months to repair and retain its structural integrity and prevent falling bricks or collapse. This will include 'repointing' with traditional lime mortar and securing a metal cap inside the opening (where it won't be seen) to prevent rain and water from entering the chimney. The works will also improve the structure's earthquake rating and improve public safety.

2. What is repointing?

Repointing brickwork is the process of repairing and renewing the mortar joints between bricks. It involves removing old, damaged mortar and replacing it with new mortar to ensure the bricks are properly bonded and the structure is protected from water damage and deterioration.

3. Why will the chimney be 3.5m shorter?

The reduced height reduces earthquake risk and allows for reuse of bricks, described in the Heritage Impact Statement as an "efficient outcome".

The original bricks were made locally by Wagener's brickworks, which was located between Tobin and High Streets (and which also supplied the bricks for the primary school). The bricks are curved and sized to taper towards the chimney's slender tip; workers will carefully salvage and clean the bricks from the top to repair holes and gaps further down. This also avoids the need to source new materials or old bricks that may not match the rest of the chimney.

Options to rebuild the chimney to its current height and retain safe structural integrity, which would require reinforcements, were

considered but deemed unachievable within the timeframe and budget available. The currently proposed works do not exclude the possibility of future endeavours to rebuild to the current height, should further funding ever become available for the task.

4. Why can't Parks Victoria source more bricks to rebuild?

Most local brickworks were closed by the end of the 19th century when the gold boom was declining and the need for new buildings in the area reduced. The narrowing and curved design of the Maldon Beehive Chimney would require traditional hand-made bricks, the manufacture of which is almost a lost art, making them difficult and expensive to source. Bricks salvaged during the proposed project (and not used for immediate repairs) will be stored for future use.

5. How will the project affect access to the Chimney?

Scaffolding and temporary fencing will be erected around the chimney structure and bunting will delineate other archaeological features at the site. Parks Victoria expects that the exclusion area around the chimney while the works are in progress will be very similar to the current fenced area. The works are expected to take place between July and September and are not expected to cause ground disturbance. A small, temporary site-office will be located nearby, generators are likely to be used during the day, while lighting and security considerations are yet to be determined.

6. What happens if the proposed works do not proceed?

Without urgent attention, the Beehive Chimney continues to be a public safety risk and will require a large exclusion zone to prevent injury caused by falling bricks or structural collapse. In other words, the area around the chimney will be fenced off for visitors indefinitely.

Crucially, the funding that has been allocated to proceed with the current proposal will no longer be available if the works do not progress as proposed.

In summary, the Heritage Impact Statement says: 'The works have been carefully specified and balanced to address safety risks, while minimising the degree of change required. While these works necessitate a change in height to a feature that substantially contributes to the heritage place, they ensure that this chimney can remain in-situ, substantially intact, and in good repair, while also reducing the immediate threat to public safety. The significance of this feature and the larger Beehive Company Gold Mine site will still be clearly understood, and the heritage values will not be detrimentally impacted'.

Goldfields Shire Opposes ESVF

A Notice of Motion to formally oppose the Victorian Government's Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund (ESVF) was passed unanimously by Central Goldfields Shire Council (CGSC) at its meeting on Wednesday 25 June. The Council determined to write to the State Government in opposition to the new levy scheme, saying it has projected that if fully implemented in the coming financial year, the increased amount paid by its ratepayers would top \$890,000.

The Council pointed to the financial impact of the levy on the farming sector, in particular, and the State Government's decision to burden local councils with the collection of the levy. Central Goldfields Shire Mayor Cr Grace La Vella said Councillors were committed to doing everything in their power to lobby against the ESVF. "We as Councillors are united in our view that the levy is unfair and we refuse to sit back while our community is unfairly penalised," she said.

CGSC said the recently announced 12-month reprieve for primary producers is welcome, but that the issue will arise again

in a year. It also said the scheme will have a significant impact on council itself. "The cost alone to administer this extra tax collection is huge - and this will ultimately impact the services we deliver to the community," Cr La Vella said. CGSC said emergency services should be funded through the State's general revenue, indicating it believed the funds should be collected by the State Revenue Office. Cr La Vella concluded: "Without strategy, consultation, and fairness, the ESVF risks doing more harm than good."

Meanwhile, CGSC formally adopted its 2025-2026 Budget and Revenue and Rating Plan at the Council Meeting, committing it to more than \$10 million of capital works alongside the continued delivery of over 37 services to the community. Key initiatives in the budget include \$450,000 for ongoing design works for Maryborough Outdoor Pool and a commitment to progress the Castlemaine-Maryborough Rail Trail in partnership with Mount Alexander Shire Council. Heritage crumbles under Council watch

More evidence that the Castlemaine-centric Mount Alexander Shire Council doesn't care about Maldon.

I first noticed brick erosion on the Beehive Chimney back before COVID, and emailed MASC to notify them that maintenance was required. This was just after they'd spent over \$1 million restoring a similar big brick chimney in The Mill precinct. Of course I heard nothing back. Never do.

The current dilapidated state of the Beehive Chimney is directly the fault of MASC, because the last repair, made in 1996, omitted protective capping at the top. This failure occurred not long after then Premier Jeff Kennett's forced amalgamation of many Victorian councils, in 1995, meant Maldon lost its own Shire council, which prefigured the slide into disrepair of many of Maldon's heritage assets.

This slide was accelerated when MASC handballed responsibility for Maldon's reserves (which contain many of our heritage assets, including the Beehive Chimney) to Parks Victoria. Parks is chronically underfunded, and heritage is not its priority. This was made very clear by the loss of Carmans Tunnel. Parks Victoria's solution to expensive repairs? Bulldoze the entrance closed.

The loss of several metres in height from the Beehive Chimney could be avoided if proper (and more expensive) heritage-sensitive repairs were made. But Council won't be forking out a cent to assist.

I urgently ask that our Councillor Rosalie Hastwell protest about this issue. Perhaps MASC could redirect the hundreds of thousands of dollars they are allocating to upgrade the Mechanics Lane/Frederick St precinct in Castlemaine, which is functioning well as is.

This is how MASC works. Let public assets run down until they're too expensive to fix and sell 'em off (or dump them on Parks Victoria). They did it with Castlemaine Gaol. They're doing it with Maldon's Caravan Park too; just you watch.

Quilt winner announced

THE winner of the Golden Textures Contemporary Quilt Award was announced in Maryborough on Saturday 28 June. Sue de Vanny received the honour for her exquisitely detailed and layered fabric collage called *Unguarded Moment*. The quilt reflects upon hidden beauty in nature, “depicting an echidna’s quiet journey,” according to the artist statement.

The announcement was made at the Central Goldfields Art Gallery in Maryborough, with a large gathering of people surrounded by the striking backdrop of the 19 finalist quilts. While many of them looked very inviting on a cold day, these art quilts are designed to be hung on the wall and enjoy. The contemplative themes, innovative use of textiles and diverse interpretation of the idea of a ‘quilt’ has made the resulting exhibition a great conversation-starter. 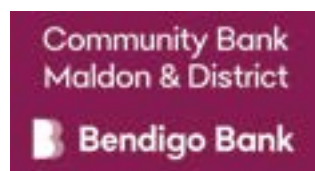

Maldon District Museum

THIS striking red brick building was constructed in 1859 as a market building for Maldon, but it wasn't a success and the market closed down a few years later. Now it is home to the Maldon District Museum and History Research Centre, which seems entirely appropriate given the historic significance of the building. During the in-

tervening years the building housed a hall and shire offices; the council eventually moved to the nearby yellow brick building in the 1960s.

The market was established in the classic English market building tradition and it originally had large arches at either end. It's worth visiting inside the museum just to see the fascinating painting of the building as it

looked in around 1864, painted by Henry J.C. Mitchell who was a painter, draughtsman, surveyor and mining engineer and the first Shire Secretary of the Shire of Maldon.

The classical style portico at the east end of the building was added in 1865, while a mezzanine was built inside ('renovated warehouse' style: ahead of its time!). Now there's a lovely manicured lawn area near the entrance

to the museum and lovely trees of course; the building is nestled in amongst the Maldon Shire Gardens and an easy walk from the retail strip.

Reminder! To experience a special insider's view into this wonderful historic building, come to the Maldon Museum & Archives Association's Open Day on Sunday 6 July from 11am to 3pm.

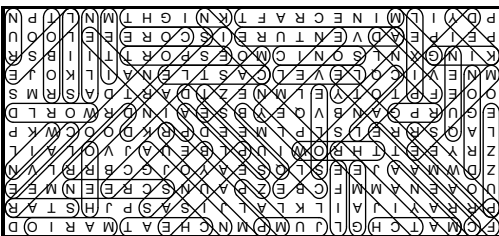
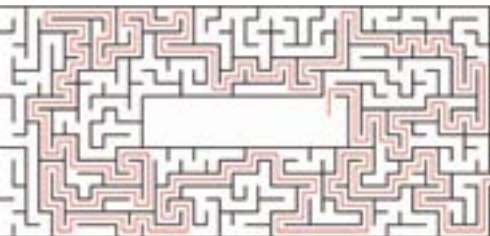

BLAST FROM THE PAST

Save our fish

IN 1935 the decline of native fish in the Loddon River was causing much concern. This concern led the Maldon Angling Club, through its president Thomas McKeogh, to call a meeting at the Athenaeum to form the Loddon Valley Angling Association. Invitations to attend were extended to angling clubs in Castlemaine, Maryborough and Bendigo. All attended except Bendigo, who sent its apologies.

The meeting was held on Monday 3 June and all present agreed to form the Association to provide a united front in protecting fishing in the Loddon. Thomas McKeogh was elected its president. The meeting then agreed that the Association should seek an immediate ban on the use of drum nets that threatened the existence of native species. The meeting also voted unanimously in favour of a 2/6 fishing licence being levied throughout the State to raise funds that could be used to police waterways and prosecute illegal practices. In order to preserve Murray cod and other native fish it was suggested that the sale of these species be prohibited in Victoria.

In April 1936 the Maldon Angling Club called another meeting of the Association to which they invited Fred Lewis, the State's Inspector of Fisheries and Game. When the Association met with Lewis at Maldon they reiterated the measures they had agreed at their 1935 meeting. They also proposed a six-month closed season on all fish except trout.

Responding, Fred Lewis said there was no doubt that cod numbers were in decline. The main reasons for this were both legal and illegal netting, the introduction of redfin, carp and tench, and the lifting of closed seasons in New South Wales and South Australia. He said that banning the sale of native fish in Victoria would have little effect as the bulk of supplies came from the Murray and its New South Wales tributaries. Having a six-month closed season would be impractical as all fishing would have to be suspended. Lewis recommended that the Association agitate for an interstate conference to find common approaches to the problem.

On the question of the cost of fishing licences, Lewis said anglers could not expect the Government or general public to pay for their sport. He did not favour abolishing the 5/-trout licence but would support a cheaper licence for those who did not want to fish for trout. When the meeting strongly condemned the use of drum nets particularly by farmers with river frontages, Lewis agreed with them and said that if anglers found these nets they had every right to smash up the drums. If the owners complained it would only provide the evidence needed to convict them.

After further discussion, the meeting concluded with a vote of thanks to Fred Lewis for attending. Lewis responded by saying it was a pleasure to come along and hear their views. Fishing, he said, was becoming an issue for the Government which would have to achieve a balance between its recreational and commercial values.

AS a TV comedian might say: What is the deal with pumpkin soup? It's either fantastically delicious or... 'meh'. The *Tarrangower Times* decided to undertake a semi-quasi-scientific study to try and understand why pumpkin soup seems to swing so effortlessly from amazing to average.

More importantly, the mission sought to discover tricks from the experts that ensure every batch of pumpkin soup is a winner.

One way is to branch out into root vegetables, according to Lynn McShanag, who coordinates Maldon Market and its Community Lunch. She spends a lot of time around fresh food and said she doesn't keep secrets. "I'm happy to share cooking tips. I reckon add a few root vegetables, because they're sweet and earthy," Lynn said, listing beetroot and parsnip as favourite additions in small quantities. And as for the pumpkin itself? "I think jap pumpkin is the best, it's not too watery." Lynn doesn't use cream in her pumpkin soup, but names stock, leek, garlic and onions as enhancers and said she always

roasts the pumpkin first, for a boost of flavour.

'Soup enthusiast' Alex Riches, who is the Community Engagement Coordinator for the Castlemaine Documentary Festival — which starts this weekend — and can occasionally be seen behind the counter at Much Ado Maldon, held a well-received soup and movie event with Maldon Golden Movies in winter last year. Alex told the *TT*: "My favourite thing to do is to roast the pumpkin with a bit of rosemary (and some garlic if that's your thing)." Alex also suggested a delicious-sounding vegan twist: "Coconut cream makes it very smooth and creamy."

While there seems to be more than one version of Perfect Pumpkin Soup, that just means you can make it to perfectly suit your own taste. And if anyone else finds your soup to be 'meh', then just tell them sternly that they can't have any soup.

NAIDOC Week July 6 to 13 celebrates the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. NAIDOC stands for the National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee.

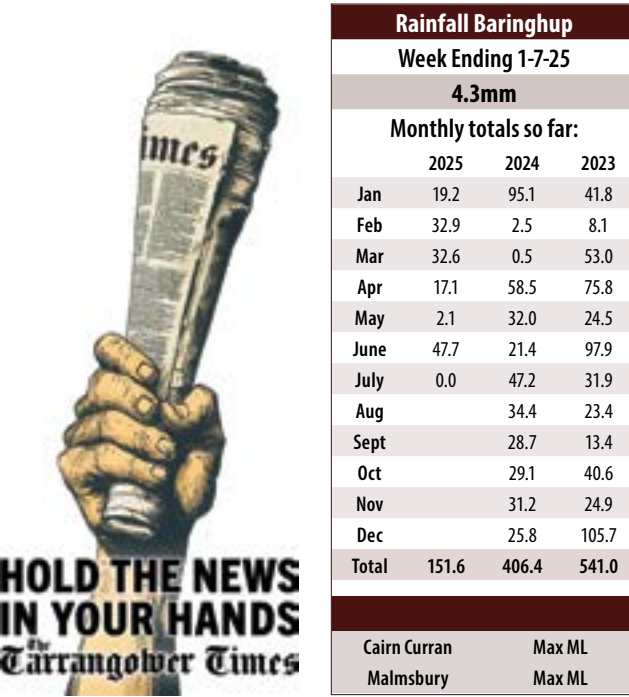
While Reconciliation Week focuses on relations between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people, NAIDOC Week celebrates Indigenous culture and achievements. This year marks 50 years of NAIDOC Week: 50 years of honouring and elevating Indigenous voices, resilience and culture. The theme for NAIDOC Week 2025 is ‘The Next Generation: Strength, Vision & Legacy’. One way for the Athenaeum Library to help celebrate NAIDOC Week is to highlight the contribution Indigenous Australians have made and continue to make to the literary heritage of Australia.

Dick Roughsey (c. 1920-1985) was an Australian Aboriginal artist from Mornington Island in the Gulf of Carpentaria. He was an active and prominent figure involved in reviving and preserving the cultural life of the Lardil people. His best-known work, created with Percy Trezise, is a series of children’s picture books including *The Rainbow Serpent* (1974) that retell traditional Aboriginal stories. This is one of the most widespread Dreamtime stories: the Rainbow Serpent moved across the land, creating billabongs, rivers, mountains and valleys in the shape of his body.

Aunty Patsy Cameron (born 1947) is an Aboriginal Elder who grew up on Flinders Island, Tasmania. She has a Master of Arts in Tasmanian Aboriginal History, an Honorary Doctor of Letters from the University of Tasmania and is an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO) for distinguished service to Indigenous communities in Tasmania. Her children’s picture books include *Sea Country* and *Sky Country*. Cameron’s most recent publication is a memoir, *Trouwerner*. Starting with ‘coming-into-being’ time, the book tells of colonisation, the lies of history, the power of truth-telling and her hope for the future. Aunty Patsy writes, “I hope the reader will understand how precious and unique my cultural heritage is.”

Melissa Lucashenko (born 1967) is an Indigenous Australian writer of adult literary fiction and literary non-fiction. She has written three award-winning novels: *Mullumbimby* (2013), *Too Much Lip* (2019) and, most recently, a work of historical fiction, *Edenglassie* (2023) that won the \$100,000 ARA Historical Novel Prize. The book was described by the prize chair as an “ambitious, epic” novel and “a fiercely original exploration of Australia’s past and its enduring consequences.” In an interview with the ABC, Lucashenko said the book is a “First Nations love story about how to try to live a good Aboriginal life as society is being transformed around you.”

Tara June Winch (born 1983) is a Wiradjuri woman who grew up near Wollongong, NSW. Her 2019 novel *The Yield* won seven national Australian literary awards, including the Prime Minister’s Literary Award for fiction and the Miles Franklin Literary Award. This is a historical novel, told from three perspectives: ‘Poppy’ Gondiwindi, about to die, who is writing a dictionary, not just the definitions but telling of stories through each word to ‘pass on everything that was ever remembered’.



His granddaughter provides a contemporary perspective of mining companies taking over his land, trying to erase land rights and his people’s existence. The third narrative is told in letters of Reverend Ferdinand Greenleaf, written in 1915, speaking of camps of Aborigines, his mission, his thoughts on the people, highlighting the atrocities committed against them.

And a special mention of **Magabala Books**, Indigenous publishing house. Aboriginal owned and led, Broome-based Magabala Books celebrates and nurtures the talent and diversity of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voices. In 1984, more than 500 Aboriginal Elders and leaders met near Fitzroy Crossing in the Kimberley region to discuss how they could keep culture strong and protect cultural and intellectual property. At this meeting, the foundations for Magabala Books were set. Since then, Magabala has published more than 250 titles by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander authors, artists and illustrators from across Australia, including award-winning authors Aunty Patsy Cameron, Bruce Pascoe, Sally Morgan, Alexis Wright and Thomas Mayo. But the Colebrook twins are far from useless old maids. They are secretly protecting women and children ignored by society and the law. When Lord Evan, a charming, escaped convict who has won Gus’s heart, must hide his sister Hester from their vindictive brother, Gus and Julia take Hester and her lover into their home. But Lord Evan’s complicated past puts them all in danger. Gus knows they must clear his name of murder if he is to survive the thief takers who hunt him.
