A massive hole appeared on a vacant block of land on the north-east corner of Camp and Church Streets and is believed to be an old mine shaft.

The hole is now being

fondly referred to as the Hopley Hole, as Phil Hopley discovered it while he was dog walking last week with his wife Judy.

He rang Parks Victoria who referred him to Department of Environment, Land,

Water and Planning who promptly came and fenced off the area the following day.

The exact size is still unknown, but the width is equivalent to a family sized caravan and appears to be

about four metres deep at present.

"It's a shame," says Phil. "The land can never be built on, because of the old mine shafts. The block has the most beautiful views in all of Maldon."

Live saving defibrillator for Maldon Croquet Club

MALDON and District Community Bank have presented the Maldon Croquet Club with a defibrillator.

Members of the club, Cheryl Long and Melissa Pollock, advocated for the life saving equipment after

an incident that occurred recently.

A member of the club, Chris Cooper, was at the grounds when he witnessed a man fall from his lawnmower due to a heart attack.

Chris performed CPR on the man for 20 minutes

before the ambulance arrived.

The incident highlighted the need to have a defibrillator close at hand, as many members of the club are elderly and unable to quickly access the defibrillator at Maldon Community

Centre.

The Croquet Club will have the defibrillator installed on the outside of the building so it can be utilised by other community groups and members of the public.

“The RSL is just across the road, and the museum is here as well,” said Bryan Fitzgerald, President of the RSL. “We can all access this equipment if needed.”

Maldon Museum awarded grant

MALDON Museum & Archives Association (MM&AA) is delighted to have been successful in a grant application to FRRR (Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal) for funding for a high tech photocopier.

The Museum was advised by FRRR last week that through the Strengthening Rural Communities program the application had been approved. This FRRR program gives small rural and regional communities across Australia the opportunity to access funds for a broad range of initiatives that benefit local communities.

For some time MM&AA have been aware of the demand from our visitors

for historical pamphlets and booklets they can take with them. This funding will allow the purchase of a colour photocopier that has the capability to produce material of a high standard to meet that demand.

Our volunteer researchers will be able to create the brochures and booklets which will then be available from the Museum.

The copier will be purchased locally from a Bendigo firm and can be made available for use by other Maldon Community groups.

We are grateful to FRRR for this opportunity to improve what's on offer to visitors to Maldon and to work with other local groups.

Businesses deemed too small for financial support

MALDON Inc. recently wrote a letter to MP Maree Edwards expressing its concerns for small businesses

and sole traders who are unable to access business support grants unless they are registered for GST.

“We are aware that many of our members do not reach the required level of turnover to register for GST and are therefore not able to apply for the offered government support.

“Not doing enough business to register for GST does not diminish the importance of the income these businesses generate, nor its value to a small regional economy,” said Kate Gamble, president of Maldon Inc.

“While we appreciate the rationale for lockdowns, and the intention behind relaxing restrictions on regional Victoria before Melbourne, for many businesses in Maldon a major proportion of their customers come from Melbourne. While regional visitors are important, they cannot replace the trade generated by people from

Melbourne, particularly while visitors from interstate are also being restricted.”

Mike Smythe, owner of The Book Wolf in Maldon, is one of the many businesses in the region that do not qualify for financial support.

“I tried to apply but I don't qualify due to not meeting the financial criteria,” he said. “I support the government with all they're doing during the pandemic, but there is no doubt there is a lot of damage to small business as a result.”

Rebecca Haack, Secretary of Maldon Inc. told the *TT*: “The support of the local and regional communities is wonderful, but we are nowhere near operating at full capacity without people from Melbourne,” she said. “It's like trading with one arm behind your back.”



Maldon Town Centre Streetscape: Streetscape Plan and Design Standards



Site Analysis

THE trial pedestrian crossing on Main Street has been the subject of much debate over the past few weeks. The *Tarrangower Times* has put together excerpts from Mount Alexander Shire Council website that relate to the crossing.

In November 2016, Mount Alexander Shire Council commissioned a team of landscape architects, urban designers and town planners to develop designs for the town centre streetscapes of Castlemaine and Maldon...

ENGAGEMENT PROCESS

The process has included five key interactions with the community.

In June 2017, Council hosted an online survey to understand what the community likes about Maldon's town centre and opportunities for improvement.

In that same month, the project was presented to the community following a Council meeting in Maldon, outlining the issues and opportunities for the project.

In August, the project was

presented to the Maldon Streetscape Committee outlining initial design ideas and taking detailed feedback.

In October 2017, a Listening Post was held on a Saturday morning in Main Street where the designs produced in this document were displayed. The same materials were displayed on Council's 'Have your Say' webpage for two weeks following the Listening Post.

In December 2017, the project was again presented to the Streetscape Committee confirming support for proposals shown at the Listening Post.

Community engagement has been important throughout the project.

The designs produced for Maldon are a genuine attempt to reflect the sentiment of a wide-ranging and divergent community opinion.

COMMUNITY FEEDBACK

The Maldon Streetscape Committee has provided consistent comment and feedback throughout the project.

Feedback from the first

two community interactions produced the following results:

- 41 people responded to the online survey.
- 13 people submitted completed questionnaires after the June 2017 community forum, in addition to several comments scribed onto project information boards.

Of the approximately 60 responses:...

- 26 people wanted powerlines removed.
- 23 people made comment about more trees, more shade and better protection for existing street trees.
- 20 people cited disability access as an issue.
- 16 people commented on wanting improvements to rubbish bins and the addition of recycling bins.
- 16 people suggested a car-free main street...

PEDESTRIAN CONNECTIVITY AND SAFETY

There are five key locations where improvements to pedestrian crossings is

- 1 The very wide intersection at Main Street and High Street combined with rows of parked cars can compromise pedestrian safety particularly on busy days.
- 2 In many cases asphalt surrounds many of the street trees restricting amount of permeable surface around each tree
- 3 The 'Old Bank' corner is the heart of Maldon and yet it does not reflect the architectural and streetscape quality of the town.
- 4 Furniture is tired. No recycling bins.
- 5 Western side of High Street is a priority area for gutter improvements and preservation.
- 6 Access from parked cars to the footpath is difficult in many cases due to the stone channels and range of crossovers. Pedestrians are difficult to see as they move from the footpath through parked cars.

appropriate.

Consideration could be given to the following:

- Narrowing the intersection and creating kerb extensions at Main Street and High Street to reduce pedestrian crossing distances and improve driver site lines.
- Inclusion of kerb extensions to the edge of parking lanes at two locations on Main Street to provide identifiable crossing locations and allow pedestrians to see and be seen by oncoming traffic.
- Two crossings on High Street, one north of the Main Street intersection and one south of the intersection. Exact locations are not yet confirmed. They would not be marked crossings but could be similar to kerb extensions as proposed for Main Street. Pedestrian operated signals have been suggested by the community for the crossing north of the Main Street intersection. Consultation

with VicRoads is required.

- Locating accessible parking spaces adjacent to designated crossings and ensuring timber cross-overs meet accessibility standards.
- Reducing traffic speed to 15km-20km per hour on Main Street.
- The community has also raised the possibility of adding rumble strips on Main Street at the intersections of High Street and Templeton Street to slow traffic and alert drivers to the presence of pedestrians...

INTERSECTION OF MAIN STREET AND HIGH STREET

A narrowing of the intersection through the use of kerb extensions is proposed at the intersection of High Street and Main Street.

The intersection is currently very wide and does not include a clear location for pedestrians to cross. Although there is only a single lane of traffic in either direction, cars utilise the full width of the street which makes it more difficult for pedestrians to cross safely.

The proposal will:

- Reduce crossing distances for pedestrians.
- Channel vehicles into a single, more ordered flow of movement.
- Direct pedestrians to a single crossing point. Careful placement of pram ramps will help negate the need for marked crossings.
- Provide additional space for seating, low planting, signage or public art on both sides of Main Street. Detailed design and engineering advice will be required to:
- Investigate sight line requirements for improved pedestrian and driver safety.
- Satisfy VicRoads requirements.

To accommodate the new pedestrian crossing point, car parking in Main

Street will be reduced by approximately three spaces. Improved signage could direct drivers to additional parking spaces on Tobin Street and Fountain Street.

PEDESTRIAN CROSSINGS ON MAIN STREET

Two locations have been identified for designated pedestrian crossing points on Main Street.

Main Street is relatively narrow and pedestrian activity is high. With no formal crossing points, pedestrians are required to walk between parked cars and cross the street haphazardly, creating safety concerns for both pedestrians and vehicle drivers.

Although exact locations will need to be identified, conceptually one can be located near the supermarket and the other can be located near the chemist and newsagent.

This proposal will:

- Narrow the crossing distance on Main Street by creating a designated pedestrian space out to the edge of the line of parked cars. This will improve visibility for both pedestrians and vehicle drivers.
- Locate the kerb extensions directly opposite each other. This will provide pedestrians with a direct and short crossing point instead of the current situation.
- Channel pedestrian movement to two key locations on Main Street
- Provide the opportunity to create accessible cross-overs to the footpath.
- Utilise an existing parking space on either side of the street and transform it into pedestrian space...

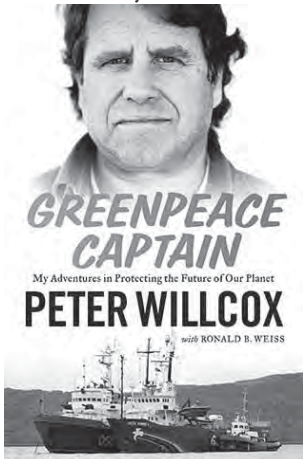
Books for all tastes

The four books that I'm looking at this week cover a wide spectrum and will provide some fascinating reading.

The Coroner and **The Redeemed** are two books from a series by M.R. (Matthew) Hall and follow the life and career of Jenny Cooper. She has been a successful Family Law lawyer but in **The Coroner** has recently been appointed the

coroner for the Severn Vale District. This is the area around Bristol and the Wye Valley of England. Jenny although a very capable person is in a terrible mental state only surviving from day to day by using the tranquilizer temazepam, drinking large quantities of caffeine and often far too much alcohol. She's been through a dramatic divorce from her domineering husband and

her regular visits to a psychiatrist have not helped her very much. When she takes up her new role she is hoping for a less stressful time but finds that her predecessor has left things in a mess and although a good man, he seems to have been under some heavy pressure from the local police and legal system. **The Redeemed** is a later book in the series and Jenny is still fighting her health problems as well as confronting the legal establishment. In this one, Jenny's investigations lead her into a powerful new religious organisation. Again her quest for justice brings her into conflict with unscrupulous, powerful people. These are serious books which explore the corruption of a system which should be safe guarding the people most at risk in society.



Greenpeace Captain is written by Peter Willcox with help from Ronald B. Weiss. Published in 2016, this is the story of a man who has devoted his life to the environment. He is the senior captain for Greenpeace International and has been at the epicentre of almost every dramatic ecological conflict for more than 30 years. He started as a young man with activist Pete Seeger and his continued adventures and his determination are nothing short of inspirational. This is definitely a book for all who care about our earth and shouldn't that be all of us?

For our thriller loving readers James Phelan, a Melbournian, has written **The Spy**. This is a book full of intrigue and is certainly scary enough to make the reader hold onto the edge of his/her chair. There is a sinister group, code named Zodiac, which has launched 12 global targets for devastating attacks. This is an ultimate terrorist organisation watching and waiting for a precise attack to activate the next group. The aim of Zodiac is to cause the most chaos and investigator Jed Walker is determined to stop the group and catch the mastermind behind it. There is a frightening deadline for Walker to try to bring this dreadful group under control.

I think that you'll agree that these books cover many interests and I hope that at least one of them will make your reading satisfying and enjoyable.

BLAST FROM THE PAST THE CORONATION CELEBRATIONS



☆ The Coronation Procession.

Unlike previous British coronations, that of Edward VII and his wife Alexandra in 1902 was planned well in advance and was intended to be a celebration of Britain's imperial power. The ceremony was scheduled to take place on 26 June, 1902.

Maldon had a very early connection with the royal couple. When news of their marriage arrived in Victoria via ship in May 1863, two oaks, which still survive, were planted in the Shire Gardens to commemorate the event.

Anticipating the upcoming Coronation, the 1902 Easter Parade featured a grand 'Coronation Procession'. The procession featured eight horse drawn carriages and several mounted riders. In the leading carriage were Lottie and Howard Dabb dressed as the King and Queen. In the other carriages were locals dressed as various British nobles and military figures.

As the Coronation approached, some were concerned that Maldon would not celebrate appropriately. Eventually the Shire Council decided to issue commemorative medals to every school child. The *Maldon News* however complained that the Council should have erected a permanent memorial.

Despite the delay, several events were organised for Coronation Day. A public holiday was declared for businesses, schools and mines and Maldon's streets were to be decked with flags and bunting. A united

Coronation service was planned at the Methodist Church in Fountain Street and another service was to be held at Holy Trinity. At noon the commemorative medals would be distributed to the school children at the State School along with lollies and fruit.

In the afternoon the Shire Council would hold a dinner at the Masonic Hall and later a Coronation football match would be played at the Shire Reserve between Maldon and West Bendigo. The Maldon Hospital arranged a special treat for all its patients and several local groups planned picnics. In the evening a patriotic lantern lecture would be presented at the Temperance Hall.

On the day prior to the planned celebrations, news arrived that the Coronation had been cancelled due to Edward's ill health. He had suffered an attack of appendicitis and required an operation. The Coronation was later rescheduled for 9 August, 1902.

Despite the cancellation most of the celebrations planned in Maldon went ahead. Only the church services were altered to include prayers for the King's speedy recovery.

In August, when the Coronation eventually took place, a special church service was conducted at Holy Trinity, otherwise the event went largely unnoticed.

Kirsty Mullholland



"I love Maldon. I love the community - my friends are of all different ages. Many people who live here would do anything for you. All towns have their ups and downs," Kirsty laughs. "But at the end of the day the community will rally around you when something is wrong."

She met her husband Chris while they were in kindergarten in Maldon and found each other again in high school. The pair married in 2008 at Buda historic home

and garden in Castlemaine. The wedding was held in the gardens, and 100 guests packed tightly into the rooms for the reception.

Kirsty's career has been varied. She studied and worked in childcare for a number of years, running her own childcare business, worked in a funeral home in Castlemaine and has been a stay-at-home mum to two boys now aged 13 and 11 who have also grown up in Maldon.

Now working at Waller

Realty in Maldon, she enjoys helping bring property and people together as an Assistant Property Manager.

"It's been really hard since the rental reforms, a lot of people are choosing to sell instead of rent properties," she said. "Sometimes there can be up to 50 applications for a house, particularly in Castlemaine and Bendigo."

As we sit in the window of Le Sel eating a baguette and a croissant, Kirsty pulls a small black box from her top and explains her type one diabetes to me as she enters the number of carbohydrates she's eaten, into the insulin pump.

She shows me a small circular patch on her arm connected to an app on her phone that can instantly tell her glucose levels.

"It's much better than pricking your finger," she says.

She has lived with diabetes since she was diagnosed at 12 years-old.

"I'd much rather have diabetes than some other medical conditions. At least this is something that can be managed."

Death Cafe in Castlemaine

LAST Saturday morning in the warmth of the winter sun, 14 people sat in the beautiful courtyard of Cream Town in Castlemaine. Snug beneath their warm coats, woollen blankets draped over knees, they drank coffee and talked about... death.

The first Death Cafe was run in London in 2011, and since then the idea has spread to 78 countries.

They are designed to help people come together to discuss death over a tea or coffee, increase awareness of death and help people make the most of their finite lives.

A Death Cafe is a group-directed discussion

of death. There is no set agenda, objectives or themes. It is a discussion group not a grief support or counselling group and has no intention of leading people to any conclusion, product or course of action.

The Castlemaine Death Cafe has been running for the past five years and is usually held a few times a year in a local cafe.

Hayley West, one of the facilitators, is an artist who has explored the subject of death through her art. She first became involved with Death Cafes in New South Wales in 2014.

The other facilitator, Annie Morabito, has studied counselling and has been a

Death Doula for the past 10 years.

A Death Doula, similar to a Birth Doula, is someone who provides emotional support, information and companionship to people. However, instead of helping to welcome life, they are helping a person to die in the way they choose.

"I became comfortable in this space; it's my thing," she said. "My initiation into death was when my partner died, but even as a young child I liked doing things for other people."

ON a beautiful winter's day, the Maldon Seniors held their first Winter Lunch.




