Structural repairs are on the horizon that will see a significant change to Maldon’s Beehive Chimney and the time to have your say about the proposed upgrades is now. Plans have been advertised by Heritage Victoria for community feedback and the deadline for comment has been extended to Friday 4 July. The long and the short of it is: urgent repairs are on the table but the result will be a permanently 3.5m shorter chimney.

Parks Victoria said an independent engineering assessment determined that the chimney requires immediate repair work to strengthen its structure. Funding has been allocated to undertake the reduction and repair, which local heritage experts have generally accepted as positive news involving a pragmatic compromise.

Rebuild, Repair

The project will require the erection of tall scaffolding so that 50 square metres of brickwork can be repaired using lime mortar. The process, according to the plans available to view online, then involves deconstructing approximately 7m from the top of the chimney and salvaging the bricks for reuse. The Heritage Impact Statement says that weather, time and earlier attempts to repair the chimney (using damaging mortar) had contributed to its deterioration. The chimney also does not satisfactorily meet modern safety requirements in the case of an earthquake, presenting a public safety risk. Of note is the

addition of a metal ‘cap’ for the chimney, to be attached to the brickwork.

Short story: shorter chimney

The works will result in a permanent reduction in the chimney’s height by approximately 3.7 metres. The Heritage Impact Statement says: “While these works necessitate a change in height to a feature that substantially contributes to the heritage place, they ensure that this chimney can remain in-situ, substantially intact, and in good repair, while also reducing the immediate threat to public safety.” The advertised documents explain that the proposed approach will meet two key goals: ensuring no further bricks fall from height plus a safer earthquake rating.

Local stakeholders respond

Maldon is fortunate to have numerous passionate and knowledgeable groups who have long advocated for repairs to the chimney, many of which are featured in our cover photo. The Maldon Heritage Network told the *TT* it is delighted that Parks Victoria has found the funds to undertake restoration works to the chimney. “It appears that the proposed works adopt sound conservation principles that will maintain and prolong the life of the structure.” The group said it is regrettable that the chimney will be reduced in height and pointed to budget and timing restraints.

Derek Reid from Maldon Museum & Newstead Historical

Society said he has reservations but wanted to see the relic saved. “I certainly do have concerns about changes in the height of such an iconic site,” he said, but noted that visitors may not notice. “All heritage places change over time and are modified to suit contemporary use, but you do try to minimise the visual impact.”

Lee Mead from Friends of Maldon Heritage Reserve said the proposal is very positive news and she appreciates what Parks Victoria is doing. “If that’s what has to happen, then that’s what has to happen to save the chimney.” She pointed out that the height of the Beehive Chimney was reduced in the 1920s after a lightening strike, adding to its story. “It’s a consequence of age and time, it can’t stay the way it is forever, which is true of everything.” Lee said she believes that the repairs will be undertaken in a sensitive manner and to heritage standards.

The heritage application says that if the proposal is refused, it would result in the loss of funding for the project. Parks Victoria said it expects the repairs to the chimney to commence in late June and be completed by September this year, with some access restrictions to the site during works.

Government must support small press

ALL levels of government in Australia must support the few remaining independent press outlets as part of a healthy democracy and cohesive society. The *Tarrangower Times* has gone in to bat for itself and the local community this week, successfully requesting an extension to the consultation period about changes to Maldon’s Beehive Mine Chimney. Heritage Victoria and Parks Victoria listened to the *TT*’s concerns and extended the consultation deadline, allowing residents a full two weeks to look at the proposal and consider responding.

Late last week, the *TT* learned that two Victorian Government agencies, Heritage Victoria and Parks Victoria, had advertised a Beehive Chimney heritage application in Bendigo instead of the local newspaper, while attempting to undertake consultation with the community that this newspaper serves.

The government agencies had advertised the proposed Beehive Chimney works in the *Bendigo Advertiser* newspaper and to a couple of local stakeholders, but not to the publication that has been informing and alerting this community for over 150 years. It prompted some investigating into what the Herriage Act would allow and was also a reminder of the role of a small-town newspaper.

Requirements under The Act

The relevant clause in *The Heritage Act 2017* says that: “The Executive Director must as soon as practicable after receiving a permit application cause notice of the application to be published in a newspaper circulating generally in the area in which the registered place or registered object is situated, if the Executive Director considers that the proposed works or activities may harm the place or object.” A Heritage Victoria spokesperson told the *TT*: “Most public notices are placed in *The Age* or the *Herald Sun* but for regional applications, public notes are placed within major regional newspapers,” followed by a list of newspapers owned by companies including NewsCorp, The Times News Group and Australian Community Media (which publishes 160 papers). There is no apparent requirement under the Act for government money to be spent with a large company — and the phrase ‘circulating generally in the area’

is vague — so surely the intent of the Act must reasonably be interpreted to mean that people actually located in the affected area must be informed in a timely manner.

By not communicating directly with the publication (this one) that specialises in local issues, speaks to local people and understands local sensibilities, the agencies missed the *TT*’s publication deadline, drastically reducing the timeframe to disseminate the news and promote the consultation before the original cutoff date of Wednesday 25 June. The *TT* attempted to mitigate this by highlighting the news from the front page, causing disruption to the paper’s normal schedule of operations.

The significance of small press

The *Tarrangower Times* runs on the scent of an oily rag and its list of advertisers reads largely like a not-for-profit roll-call, because local community groups understand its value and build promotions into their fundraising budgets. A small group of local businesses advertise for the same reason, but they are pressed themselves to scrape a living in a small town. Advertising revenue (and the occasional grant) from government agencies are a life-line that literally — but barely — keep the *Tarrangower Times* afloat. This newspaper is the local source for local information, activities and opportunities: readers and residents of the region know that it contributes to a thriving social calendar and connected community. In bypassing small publications in favour of larger publishing companies, government agencies risk reducing the diversity of media in Victoria and eliminating the benefits of small papers.

Government Guidelines

In fact, the Victorian Government’s own guidelines dictate that all of its communications must be accessible and effective. Departments and agencies must spend at least 15% of their campaign advertising expenditure on regional and rural media. There is even a ‘Master Agency Media Services’ available to government departments to help them ‘find the most suitable media channels to advertise in to get your message across to regional Victorians’. The *Tarrangower Times* has contacted the Master Agency to further this conversation and request

better targeting of messages to Maldon and surrounding areas.

Deadline Extended

The *Tarrangower Times* noted that an extension of the advertising period for community consultation is allowed under *The Heritage Act (Part 5, subsection 2)*. The *TT* called on both Heritage Victoria and Parks Victoria to extend the period in which interested parties can provide feedback on the proposed works at the Beehive Chimney, which was achieved just in time to let readers know in this edition. The new deadline is two weeks after publication of this newspaper: Friday 4 July

The *Tarrangower Times* is thrilled that its advocacy resulted in an extension of the consultation period on behalf of the community that this newspaper serves, who care deeply about the heritage of Maldon and the future of the historic Beehive Chimney. This is a win for small press and a reminder of its continuing value. See inside this edition for a notice from Parks Victoria that details the Beehive Chimney heritage application.

Thirteen brigade members received CFA Service Awards for tenures ranging from 10 years to 45 years. The CFA said: “Notably, four members of the former ladies’ auxiliary - Bev Richardson,

Joan Sartori, Lorraine Burgess and Carmel Longmire - were recognised for their unwavering support of the brigade by receiving their 45-year service medals.”

It’s fantastic to see such extremely committed volunteers and valued members of the community honoured and recognised. The CFA said of Doug Richardson: “It’s a fitting tribute to a man who has dedicated so many years to the protection of life and property in Newstead and surrounding districts.”

MP says kangaroo action needed



The Nationals' Member for Northern Victoria Gaelle Broad is calling for urgent action to address kangaroo numbers, which she says are causing safety issues for drivers and damage to farms. Ms Broad is calling for a better kangaroo management strategy.

"Aerial and ground surveys were undertaken last year to estimate the kangaroo population across Victoria. The data, which excludes some areas, shows that there are over 2.4 million kangaroos, and nearly 500,000 in the Loddon-Mallee area," Ms Broad said. "Kangaroo-related vehicle collisions are the most common wildlife hazards on our roads." She also pointed to kangaroo strikes causing rail disruptions and kangaroos competing with livestock for scarce feed and water.

Ms Broad called for a more balanced and proactive approach saying: "Sustainable harvesting provides a way to manage kangaroo numbers while also unlocking a valuable source of leather and meat."

Ms Broad encouraged people to have their say by making a submission and completing a survey for the current Parliamentary inquiry into wildlife roadstrike in Victoria. The survey closes on June 30. Visit: tinyurl.com/bp8dk546.

Award win for culture project

The 'Truth Telling, Healing and Creating for Community on Djaara Country' project has been awarded the 2025 LGPro Award for Excellence in the First Nations Community Partnership category. The partnership between Central Goldfields Shire Council and DJAARA resulted in the creation of an Indigenous Interpretive Garden and a digital animation.

The garden is called garingalang gatjin wii and is located at Central Goldfields Art Gallery and the animation, called Welcome Stranger, can be seen at the Central Goldfields Visitor Centre.

The Award acknowledges the significant partnership between Central Goldfields Shire Council and DJAARA for their collaborative work on both creative outcomes.

Central Goldfields Shire Mayor Councillor Grace La Vella said she was feeling extremely proud and described the win as an honour. "This Award comes as the finale to National

Reconciliation Week and recognises the strong partnership that has been built over the past three years between Council and DJAARA. We are very proud to work closely with our First Nations partners and delighted to share with the community and visitors such valuable cultural assets as a result of these collaborative projects. The Award just tops it off."

The Welcome Stranger Digital Animation Film is activated automatically as visitors enter a theatrette in the historic Maryborough Railway Station. The film is free to enjoy and is a permanent installation at the Visitor Centre; it traces the linked stories of the discovery of gold in this region and the impact on the lives, culture and Country of the people who were already here, with an optimistic ending.

garingalang gatjin wii means water and fire garden in Dja Dja Wurrung language and is a public garden space next to the Central Goldfields Art Gallery inviting the whole community to come together to understand and celebrate Dja Dja Wurrung Culture. The garden design was led by Dja Dja Wurrung Elders and artists to share their knowledge and story.

BREAKING NEWS

Council decides on Maldon Caravan Park and Lowther St

Mount Alexander Shire Council (MASC) passed some significant decisions at its Council Meeting on Tuesday 17 June. Firstly, Councillors present at the meeting unanimously agreed to adopt the proposed Budget 25/26, the first for this newly elected Council.

Also of note was a reconsideration of the planning proposal to clear and subdivide a vacant lot at 1 Lowther Street, Maldon, which was previously presented for decision at the Meeting of Council on Tuesday, 10 September 2024. At that Meeting, Council determined to defer the proposal so that council officers could prepare grounds for refusal; however, the officers once again recommended acceptance of the application. At Tuesday's meeting, after vigorous discussion, the Council voted again to refuse the application: see next week's *Tarrangower Times* for a thorough report.

Councillor Rosalie Hastwell also presented a post-consultation report relating to Maldon Caravan Park, which outlined the outcomes of community engagement that recently took place. It recommended noting the outcome of the community consultation, engaging a qualified consultant to investigate appropriate management models for the continued operations of the caravan park while budgeting to continue operations for the 2025-26 financial year; this was agreed upon by Council members present. Stay tuned to the *TT* for further details.

Member for Bendigo West Maree Edwards MP will take leave and requests privacy after announcing on Tuesday 18 June that her husband, Steve Kolotylo, had died after a long period of ill health. The *Tarrangower Times* extends sincere condolences to Ms Edwards and her family.

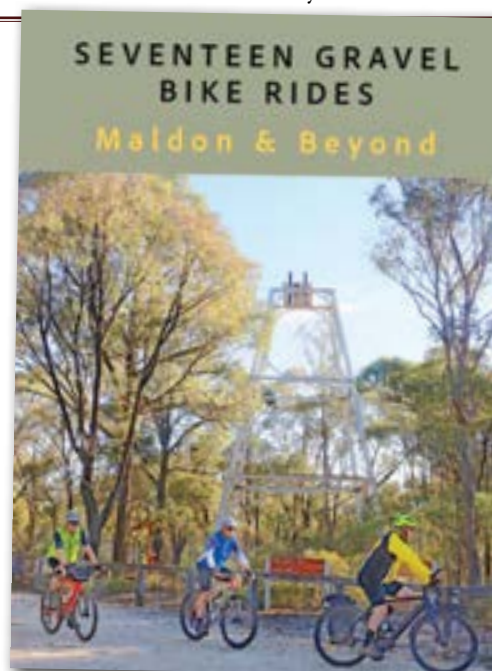

Maldon flood fix complete

ROAD damage caused by a burst water main in Maldon last week has been repaired.

The burst pipe, which caused a flash flood at the corner of Reef and Church Streets in Maldon on Tuesday 3 June, was quickly fixed on the day. A spokesperson from Coliban Water said: "There was a water supply interruption for some nearby customers, lasting less than two hours, before the water was restored at 12.30pm. The water main was repaired at this time and there is no further repair work required."

When asked last week about the remaining damage to the road surface, the spokesperson said: "After the water main repair was completed, we lodged a ticket with our contractor to reinstate the road where the water main was accessed."

Fire Report and caution

A shed fire broke out on the Newstead Road at around 4pm on Monday 16 June, attended by six brigades in the region with multiple tankers. Bruce Clements 1st Lieutenant (Acting Captain) of Maldon Fire Brigade reported that the fire took around three hours to contain and extinguish.

"It was substantial, it built rapidly," Mr Clements said, noting that the fire was believed to be ignited by a lithium ion battery used to power an off-grid system. He urged caution and care when using the rechargeable batteries, which are used in many electronic devices such as mobile phones, tablets and laptops, E-Bikes, electric toothbrushes, tools, scooters and solar

power backup storage. "Be wary," Bruce said. "Yes, they're good, they're great but treat them with respect."

The CFA website has guidelines for safe use of lithium ion rechargeable batteries which include using correct and undamaged batteries and chargers, disconnecting them from chargers when fully charged and following the manufacturer's instructions. "The main thing is not to leave them on charge overnight and not near any flammable goods," Bruce said.

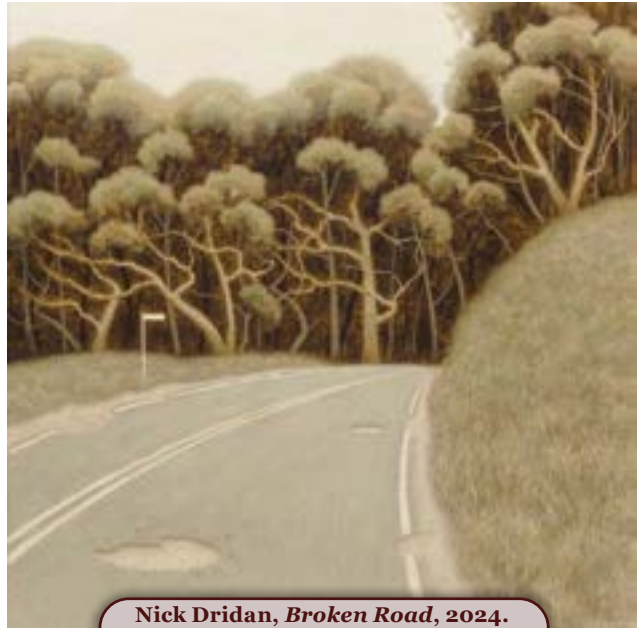

Artist talk with Nick Dridan at Central Goldfields Art Gallery

RENOWNED regional artist Nick Dridan will give an artist talk at 2pm on Sunday 22 June at Central Goldfields Art Gallery, offering visitors a chance to hear firsthand about his creative process and the ideas behind his current exhibition, *Allegories*.

Dridan, who lives in Amphitheatre in the Pyrenees Ranges, is known for his atmospheric oil paintings that blend direct observation with a strong narrative sensibility. In *Allegories*, he explores memory, symbolism and the quiet drama of the regional Victorian landscape.

“Storytelling has always been a part of how I paint,” Dridan said. “These works contain symbols and allusions to universal themes — but I think a lot of decisions in painting come from the subconscious. The meaning should remain a bit of a mystery, even to the artist.”

Corks, caps & closures - why the way we seal a bottle matters

CONSIDERING it is the namesake for the series and recent articles on bottling and labelling, it felt only natural to now write about bottle seals.

Pop, twist, pull, or snap—how a bottle opens says a lot about what’s inside.

At Panacea Estate, we often get asked, “Why does one bottle have a cork, another a screw cap, or a crown seal?” And it’s a fair question. The way we seal a wine can impact not just how you open it, but how the wine evolves, how long it lasts, and even how it tastes.

So let’s pop the top off this topic and explore the world of wine closures—what they are, why they matter, and how we make our choices.

Cork: the classic

Ah, the humble cork. Natural, slightly romantic, and full of tradition, cork has been used to seal wine bottles for centuries.

- Pros:**
- Allows a tiny bit of oxygen in over time—ideal for wines meant to age.
 - Offers a tactile, ceremonial ‘pop’ when opened.
 - 100% biodegradable and renewable when sourced sustainably.

- Cons:**
- Can cause ‘cork taint’ (TCA), which gives the wine a musty, off smell.
 - Inconsistent quality—some corks allow more oxygen than others.

When we use it at Panacea:

For small batch or premium wines, especially those we believe will improve with a few years of cellaring, also chosen for sentimental or stylistic reasons—like gifting or special releases, where tradition adds to the experience.

Screw cap: the modern workhorse

Screw caps (also known as Stelvin closures) have become the norm across many Australian wines—and for good reason.

- Pros:**
- Consistent seal with very low oxygen transmission—perfect for preserving freshness.
 - No cork taint risk.
 - Easy to open, reseal, and store.
 - Great for whites, rosés, and vibrant reds meant to be enjoyed young.

- Cons:**
- Lacks the ceremonial feel of opening a corked bottle.
 - Some traditionalists still view it as ‘less premium’.
 - Difficult to recycle if not separated into parts.

When we use it at Panacea:

For most of our wines—especially those intended to be enjoyed within a few years of release. It suits our approach: approachable wines, fewer faults, and more reliability for the customer.

Alternative closures: glass and synthetics

- There are a few other options out there as well:
- **Glass Stoppers (Vinolok):** Beautiful, reusable, and 100% inert—but pricey and mostly used for high-end whites or showpieces.

- **Synthetic Corks:** Consistent and affordable, but less environmentally friendly and sometimes prone to leaking over time.
 - **Crown Seals:** Often seen on sparkling wines and Pet-Nats. Reliable under pressure—literally.
- We occasionally experiment, especially with limited releases or sparkling wine trials, but for now, cork and screw cap remain our main tools.
- On a personal note, I’ll be honest—I loved the theatre of pulling a cork, always have and still do. But as a winemaker, consistency matters. There’s a comfort in knowing a wine sealed five years ago under screw cap will open just as it should, so we use a combination.
- That said, I also respect tradition, and there’s something undeniably special about handing someone a cork-sealed bottle and watching them treat it like a little time capsule.

We choose our closures like we choose our barrels: with intent, care, and the drinker in mind.

Next time you open a bottle, take a moment to think about the closure. Was it a screw cap, a cork, or something different? Did it make you think about aging, or maybe about convenience?

Beehive Mine Chimney

THE iconic Beehive Mine Chimney sits at the edge of the Maldon township amongst genuine archaeological relics; the site makes a very interesting walk and also a jumping off point from which to further explore the region. Beware of cliffs and mines and stick to the path! The elevated position of the chimney and its surrounds also provides a different perspective upon the township, including views of cottages nestled into the surrounding hills.

The chimney and the visible ruins are all that remains of the noisy, bustling, banging, steaming and smoking Beehive Quartz Mining Association's mine operation, likely named after the nearby Beehive General Store. During the gold rush such chimneys were common, but the

Beehive chimney is the only one of its size and age that remains in Victoria. Now the site is heritage listed because it is a historically and scientifically significant symbol of the region's gold-mining past. The chimney was just part of a complex, industrial operation that included digging, boiling, treating and crushing quartz rocks in the hope that gold could be found within.

According to a history compiled by compiled by Lee Mead and Robyn Ballinger, the chimney was designed by architect D.R. Drape and constructed in 1861 from bricks made at Wagener's Maldon brickworks. "The chimney provided draught for the steam boilers, necessary to

drive the engines that powered the poppet head winding machines and battery crushing machinery."

To reach the Beehive Chimney and explore all the remnants of this fascinating mine, head to the top of Main Street where there is parking opposite Church Street. Steps lead up to the chimney and you can't miss it, pointing boldly towards the sky. There is some signage but imagination is needed as you wander around amongst local history, now quiet, waiting to be appreciated.

(Note! The Beehive Chimney may not be entirely accessible during repairs between June and September 2025).

BLAST FROM THE PAST

Maldon's first church



Wesleyan Church c.1900.

LOCATED in Fountain Street, the eye-catching, red brick and stucco home of Cascade Art Gallery stands on the original site of Maldon's Wesleyan church, which was the first church in Maldon.

Wesleyan Methodists were often the first to reach a new diggings during a gold rush and within weeks of Maldon's first gold discovery in December 1853, Matthew Morgan was the first Wesleyan preacher to arrive in Maldon. In December 1853, he led his first congregation in a calico tent, where the first collection is said to have consisted principally of half-crown pieces – a large sum for the time – and a £1 note which was pushed in through a slit in the tent.

By 1854, the Wesleyans were reported to be very active, meeting first in a calico tent and later in a timber building constructed in 1855. As the congregation grew, a brick chapel, which still exists, was built in 1858. At the time, Fountain Street did not exist, and the old chapel was not aligned with the street. A house for the minister was also built in 1858. In 1861, two rooms were added to the chapel (probably for school purposes) and they were constructed to align with Fountain Street and are at an angle with the chapel.

The present church was completed in October 1863. The cost was underwritten by the influential Warnock family and financed by members of the congregation. The church is an early use of the red brick and render style that became very popular during the 1890s. Its exterior design incorporated features from Early English but also included Gothic style buttresses and pinnacles generally associated with Catholic architecture. The Wesleyan movement in Victoria was becoming committed to the incorporation of Gothic features, as a number of other churches (including the Wesley Church in Lonsdale Street, Melbourne) were also being designed in the Gothic style.

By the late 1800s, the Wesleyan Methodists formed about 18% of the community, which was quite substantial. The congregation believed in the sanctifying nature of hard work and the ministers preached a link between material progress, Christian charity, and spiritual salvation. The level of involvement in the Church was a clear sign of moral righteousness in a town created by the pursuit of gold.

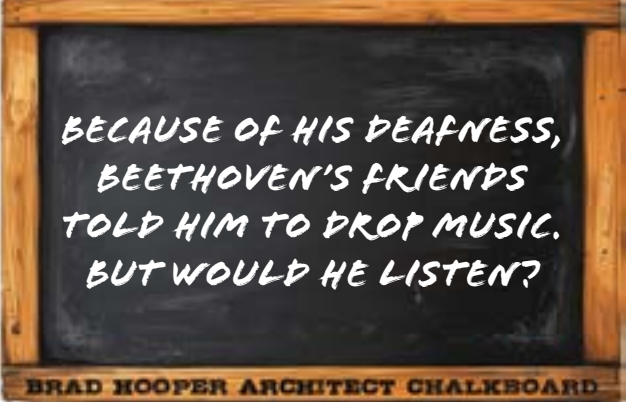

Library news

THIS week’s Library News focuses on memoirs, prompted by the publication of two much anticipated books: **Hannah Kent’s *Always Home, Always Homesick*** and **Jacinta Ardern’s *A Different Kind of Power***.

For Kent this is her first non-fiction book following the success of three novels: *Burial Rites* (2013), *The Good People* (2016) and *Devotion* (2021). Kent grew up in the Adelaide Hills, where she still lives with her wife and young children. As a 17-year-old, when applying for a Rotary exchange scholarship, Kent nominated countries with the greatest contrast to home (she had never seen snow) and the greatest cultural shock. She ended up in Iceland. In a letter to her parents during that year, Kent wrote, ‘You will find me changed.... Iceland has acted like a breath in my life.’

In an interview in *INreview* (indailt.sa.com.au), Kent talks about the memoir she never thought she would write: ‘Writing has always been the way I make sense of the world... For the first time in my life I began to really reflect on how much that first trip to Iceland affected the trajectory of my career and also how much it has shaped me as a person.’ The writing of *Always Home, Always Homesick* began during the pandemic. The first part covers her early childhood up to her time in Iceland in 2003. The second follows her return to the country, researching and writing about Agnes Magnúsdóttir, the last person to be executed there (the subject of *Burial Rites*). The third part covers a more recent trip, when she visited the site of Magnúsdóttir’s execution, now a memorial. There she found plaques engraved with lines from her novel.

In the essay *The Critic* as an Artist Oscar Wilde wrote, ‘I dislike modern memoirs. They are generally written by people who have either entirely lost their memories, or have never done anything worth remembering.’ Dame Jacinta Ardern cannot be accused of either of these faults. Prime Minister of New Zealand for six years from 2017 to 2013, Ardern gained a global reputation for her leadership, not least for her approach in the aftermath of the Christchurch Mosque shootings. In refusing to publicly use the name of the killer, she focused on the human loss rather than the threat of terrorism: ‘Speak the names of those who were lost rather than the name of the man who took them... he will, when I speak, be nameless.’

In *A Different Kind of Power*, Ardern offers advice to would-be politicians – be kind, be humble, practise empathy. Her response to the offer of assistance from Donald Trump, following the Christchurch shootings, is very telling: ‘You can show sympathy and love for all Muslim communities.’ The *Washington Post* describes the memoir as ‘a clear and compelling case for compassion- an implicit repudiation of the strongman style of leadership that has taken hold around the world.’ But it is also a very personal story of rising to power, and then choosing to give it up. One reviewer writes, ‘She doesn’t shy away from the hard stuff—burnout, public criticism, navigating motherhood while leading a country—but she does it with grace and a sense of humour that sneaks up on you and makes you laugh mid-sentence. It’s like getting a pep talk from a friend who’s been through the political wringer and come out the other side still believing in doing good.’ And the memoir answers the question we have all wanted to ask – why did she leave her job when we loved what she was doing?

Library reviews

A Different Kind of Power
by Jacinta Ardern, 2025

What if we could redefine leadership? What if kindness came first? Jacinda Ardern grew up the daughter of a police officer in small-town New Zealand, but as the 40th Prime Minister of her country, she commanded global respect for her empathetic leadership that put people first. This is the remarkable story of how a Mormon girl plagued by self-doubt made political history and changed our assumptions of what a global leader can be.

Exodus by Peter Hamilton, 2024

Forty thousand years ago, humanity fled a dying Earth. Travelling in massive arkships, these brave pioneers spread out across the galaxy to find a new home. After travelling thousands of light-years, one fleet of arkships arrived at Centauri, a dense cluster of stars with a vast array of potentially habitable planets. The survivors of Earth signalled to the remaining arkships that humanity had finally found its new home among the stars.

Thousands of years later, the Centauri Cluster has flourished. The original settlers have evolved into advanced beings known as Celestials and divided themselves into powerful Dominions. One of the most influential is that of the Crown Celestials, an alliance of five great houses that controls vast areas of Centauri. As arkships continue to arrive, the remaining humans and their descendants must fight for survival against overwhelming odds or be forced into serving the Crown Dominion.

The Eureka Stockade: 1854
by Gregory Blake, 2023

On the chilly dawn morning of 3 December 1854 British soldiers and police of the Victorian colonial government attacked and stormed a crudely-built fortification erected by insurgent gold miners at the Eureka lead on the Ballarat Gold Diggings. The fighting was intense, the carnage appalling and the political consequences of the affair profound.

This book, for the first time, examines in great detail the actual military events that unfolded during the 20 minutes of deadly fighting at Eureka. Many of the old assumptions about what occurred that day are turned on the heads, raising in their places provocative questions. Were the intentions of the Eureka diggers as pacific as tradition insists? How was it that men supposedly poorly armed and taken completely by surprise in their sleep were able to deliver ‘sharp and well-directed’ fire on their attackers? How close, in fact did the assaulting infantry come to failing in their task, and why has the pivotal part played by the police in the battle been ignored in every retelling of the Eureka story? Why have the Americans, who played a decisive part in the defence of the stockade been all but ignored?

The Caretaker by Ron Rash, 2023

It’s 1951 in Blowing Rock, North Carolina. Blackburn Gant, his life irrevocably altered by a childhood case of polio, seems condemned to spend his life among the dead as the sole caretaker of a hilltop cemetery. It suits his withdrawn personality, and the inexplicable occurrences that happen from time to time rattle him less than interaction with the living. But when his best and only friend, the kind but impulsive Jacob Lampton, is conscripted to serve overseas, Blackburn is charged with caring for Jacob’s wife, Naomi, as well.
