

COMMUNITY GENERATION

aldon residents Lauren Adele Stevens and her Dad, Ian Stevens, have once again headed off to Cambodia to continue working at Lauren's Phnom Penh office with her local Cambodian team.

Lauren told the *Times*, "My non-profit organisation, Community Generation, has very excitingly continued our long-term partnership with Reece Plumbing, having partnered earlier this year with the newly launched Reece Foundation (reecefoundation.charity)." The pair, affectionately known as 'The Stevo's', are the face of the Reece Foundation.

"Our new partnership with Reece Foundation has allowed Community Generation to grow as an organisation. We have also partnered with Australian Volunteers International (AVI). Community Generation identified that, alongside our important clean water, sanitation and hygiene builds and projects in rural Cambodian schools and communities, there is a need for up-skilling and training. Cambodia has the largest youth population in South-East Asia due to the still recent and harrowing genocide. 65% of the population are under the age of 30, and more than 50% are under the age of 24. Alongside our WASH projects, Community Generation will commence a new project delivery of up-skilling and training local Khmer peoples with life-changing plumbing and maintenance skills delivered by fully qualified Australian plumbers," she said.

Community Generation and Reece Foundation invited qualified Australian plumbers to apply to volunteer with Community Generation for the month of July in Cambodia.

"We received 94 applications of interest from around Australia. Through our interview process, we selected six qualified plumbers to come to Cambodia for our first July volunteer project. It was like speed-dating tradies!" said Lauren.

Community Generation is calling their July project the 'Pilot Project'. They are intentionally keeping the volunteer number small to enable them to 'test and learn' with the idea of growing the project and increasing the number of volunteers in-country moving forward.

"In July our six plumbing volunteers, alongside our local Khmer masons, will build two school projects in Kampong Chhnang Province. This includes the construction of our water well-fed, large-scale Community BioSand Filters, private and safe toilet blocks, handwashing stations, water harvesting tanks and edible gardens. Our health and hygiene education program will also be integrated into the school curriculum.

Winter weight gain?



NOW that we're in the midst of winter, it's understandable that we'd rather stay warm and snuggled in front of the fire instead of exercising in the cold and rain. Some of our pets are probably feeling the same way.

However, with a decrease in activity level, there is the risk of stacking on some extra kilos as they are no longer burning all the calories they normally would. How do we know if our pets are overweight or not?

A good method is to look at their body condition score. For an ideal weight, their ribs should have minimal fat covering and be easily felt. Also, look for a well-proportioned waist when viewed from the top and an abdominal tuck when viewed from the side.

If it seems your dog or cat is starting to fill out around the mid-section, perhaps try to cut back on their food intake during the winter months while they're not exercising as much.

The easiest way to do this is to cut back on treats. Alternatively, increase their indoor activity by playing indoor fetch or add enrichment using new toys or food puzzles.

If you're wondering whether your pet's diet needs adjusting, it's best to speak to your veterinarian about finding a good quality pet food and the recommended amount to feed them.

Inviting us to think about the consequences of mining when land is not rehabilitated, the wider project will culminate in an art piece to cover an abandoned mine site in Western Australia.

As the project states, '[t]he idea was conceived to symbolically 'seal' one of the holes with an artwork expressing the story of country.' Weaving individual rugs from discarded fabrics, the project offers healing of the land left by spent mines as well as keeping lots of textile waste out of landfill. Each of the round

rugs will be joined together with others from across the country to create a 'dot' painting to cover the gaping hole left by the mine site.

Coming together with a shared purpose, the mostly novice weavers are also making and strengthening community connections. We're taking time out to reflect on the importance of the environment and our relationship with the country and our First Nations people. This project carries the desire for healing country, healing community, and healing ourselves. It was such fun we agreed to keep meeting, and further get-togethers will be held next month. You would be welcome to join us! The weaving doesn't require any prior knowledge or skill and is open to all (and suitable for children).





Know Your Local - Mike Smythe (part 1)

Mike grew up east of Melbourne when it was mostly large orchards just starting to be invaded by new residential areas, and his home was the last on a dusty track that ended at a creek and heavy bush. He commented, "Mitcham was essentially a country town waiting to be swamped by suburban sprawl, but in those early years, it was a great place for kids - populated by young families like mine, with some bushland still around, and at that time in history when we were told after breakfast to get out of the house and be home for dinner. It was a lovely and rather innocent time and place to grow up."

His was a family of five boys (a girlfriend once noted the 'billy-cart' atmosphere) ruled by a loving but no-nonsense Mum and an easy-going/wisecracking Dad. Mike's primary school was a stately 19th-century building not unlike Maldon's and staffed by marvellous teachers, one a VFL/VFA football star who Mike recalls as the first of many fine mentors to enrich his life. A new high school was built next door, and Mike completed his secondary education there - and met more mentors.

He added, "A state school education was superior to

what the private schools offered then; we had some truly inspiring teachers who brought a blend of high expectations and genuine care to their classes. I got involved in athletics, football, acting and debating. My debating team was metropolitan champion three years running (Years 10, 11 and 12). We took on the best private schools and beat them. In my last year, we performed Shakespeare's Macbeth [Mike played Macduff], and I organised the English Literature class's Literary Conference, inviting the senior English Lit classes from the district to attend, present papers and join high-powered discussions."

That conference was held at a place Mike had never heard of called Maldon, and they camped in the former workers' dormitories on the shore of Cairn Curran. His muchloved English teacher - who he is still in touch with – was a huge positive influence in those days and inspired Mike to forget plans for a career in Journalism and choose teaching instead; Mike still regards him as the greatest of his mentors. So it was on to La Trobe Uni, courtesy of a teaching scholarship, where his rather naïve ideas about many things — particularly politics — were challenged. And where he met Annette and her best friend (Collard family descendant) Anita, daughter of Clare and Milton Warn — who ran the Maldon supermarket and lived up on Lisle's Gully Road. Weekend visits as Maldon kept calling.

"My early years in teaching were pretty miserable", recalled Mike. "I found myself at odds with the system and floundered generally, but although we often argued, my

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

This week we review three non-fiction books from Australian writers, two about violent deaths in their families and one about a young man who goes missing and is eventually found many years later.

The Boy in the Dress by Jonathan Butler



On a balmy Townsville night in 1944, young serviceman Warwick Meale is found beaten to death under a bridge. The army and police do not, or will not, conduct a proper investigation, and history forgets the killer until now. Nearly 80 years on, Warwick's descendant Jonathan Butler dusts off the case and chases the leads that were there all along.

The Boy in the Dress delicately exhumes secrets of life on the home front during World War II, where tensions between soldiers boiled over, new expressions of sexuality flourished, and the threat of invasion catapulted the status quo into disarray.

The truth of this family legend, and little-known chapter in Australian military history, is more complex and engrossing than anyone could have imagined.

The Mother Wound by Amani Haydar

Amani Haydar suffered the unimaginable when she lost her mother in a brutal act of domestic violence perpetrated

by her father. Five months pregnant at the time, her own perception of how she wanted to be a mother (and how she had been mothered) was shaped by this devastating murder. After her mother's death, Amani began reassessing everything she knew about her parents' relationship. They had been unhappy for so long - should she have known that it would end like this? A lawyer by profession, she also saw the holes in the justice system for addressing and combating emotional

Amani also had to reckon with the weight of familial and cultural context. Her parents were brought together in an arranged marriage, her mother 13 years her father's junior. Her grandmother was brutally killed in the 2006 war in Lebanon, adding complex layers of intergenerational

abuse and coercive control.

Writing with grace and beauty, Amani has drawn from this a story of female resilience and the role of motherhood in the home and in the world.

Missing by Tom Patterson

Beautifully written and affecting, this is the true story of a young man caught in a world he can't control and how he finds a way to survive.

In 1972 Mark May is 18. He is bright, beautiful and has a scholarship to study law. Ten years later, he descends alone into remote gorge country in north-western New South Wales. He lives in rough camps and stays for 35 years. Then, on a feeling, his brothers go looking for him.

Missing is a true story of immense emotional force. It tells of a broken life and a ruptured family but is also a spare and eloquent story of survival that carries a deep humanity. It announces a significant new talent in Australia writing.

first Principal was a man of great character and integrity who I came to admire as another of those mentors. When I put my head down and tried to get on with the work, I was equally unhappy for different reasons. After four years, I knew two things: first, I loved working with young people, and second, I wasn't suited to teaching; one of those conclusions was premature. I was unemployed and casually employed for a while before going into (education-related) retail for a couple of years."

By then, Mike and Annette had baby Stephen, and the need to provide more economic security prompted a return to teaching. This time it was in the Northern Territory at a remote Arnhem Land location, Ngukurr, where Mike discovered that he actually was a pretty good teacher - and the environment of an indigenous community suited him very well. They were very fulfilling years of profound learning experiences from which Mike has a wealth of stories and insights to share.

THE NEW COURT HOUSE

Maldon's first Court House, which opened in January 1857, was little more than a tent on the Commissioner's Reserve. Less than a month after its opening, a violent storm forced the Court to adjourn to the Tarrangower Hotel. In May 1857, the Mount Alexander Mail reported that the Maldon Court House was in a 'disgraceful state' and, although the Government had provided for a new court house in its budget, no further action was taken.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

Finally, in November 1860, tenders were called for a new court house at Maldon based on plans drawn up by German-born architect Frederick Kawerau. The Tarrangower Times reported that the building would be 'an ornament to the Town and a boon to the public'. It would include separate rooms for judges, lawyers, the jury and prisoners. It would also have a public gallery and a reporter's box.

John Robertson & Co was awarded the contract and undertook to build it at a cost of £2,016. Work commenced with the laying of granite foundations in December 1860, and rather optimistically, it was expected to be completed in the following April.

It seemed that satisfactory progress was being made until Frederick Kawerau inspected the building in February 1861. Kawerau found that the bricks being used were substandard and immediately stopped the works. The bricks were under burnt, brittle and too large. In the absence of John Robertson, one of his foremen was said to have purchased the cheap brick from Castlemaine. On Kawerau's orders, the brickwork was demolished, and work was restarted using better quality

The new Court House was completed by August 1861. Soon after it was offered to the Maldon Municipal Council as a place for their meetings. Previously the Council had met in the Town Clerk's office. The Court House allowed the public access to the Council's meetings.

The first cases were heard at the Court House when the County Court sat there on 10 September 1861. The opening was accompanied by the longest list of cases ever heard in Maldon. The large crowd of spectators who attended created much confusion in the Court.

Not everything went smoothly with the new Court House. There were many complaints about the building's acoustics. Some magistrates were unable to clearly hear witnesses, and there were calls for matting to be installed to improve matters. The Government Stores were also slow in providing furniture, and when some tables and benches arrived, they were twice the length of the rooms they were intended for.

Sabina was born into an Orthodox Jewish family, but she became a Christian after she and her husband, Richard, were given a Bible by a German carpenter. Their newfound faith in Jesus Christ radically transformed their lives, prompting them to abandon a selfish pursuit of pleasure and ease.

During the Nazi occupation of Romania, Sabina and Richard carried on intense, prohibited work and were arrested several times for their underground Christian activities. After the war, as a million Communist Soviet soldiers invaded their homeland, their activities only increased; they showed love to their Nazi enemies by hiding them from the Soviet troops who hunted them down like animals.

Sabina and Richard stayed faithful amid Nazi and Communist oppression — at great cost. It led to a 14-year imprisonment for Richard, and Sabina suffered three years in Romanian labour camps and prison. Eventually, Sabina and Richard were able to leave Romania. But they continued their mission of helping persecuted Christians and sharing the message of loving and forgiving enemies, co-founding The Voice of the Martyrs (VOM) in 1967. Today, VOM continues to provide practical and spiritual assistance to persecuted Christians around the world.

I can personally recommend this movie.
