Butts Pavilion works underway



Works are underway to repair Butts Pavilion, at Butts Reserve, Maldon.

IN happy Heritage news, the rustic and historic picnic shelter known as ‘Butts Pavilion’ at the base of Mount Tarrengower is currently receiving attention by contractors. Parks Victoria has confirmed that funding has been pledged towards its maintenance and repair and says the Beehive Chimney is next in line.

“We’re delighted to have \$240,000 of works underway on the Butts Reserve shelter and Beehive Chimney, two beloved heritage sites in Maldon,” Parks Victoria Area Chief Ranger Karen Doyle said. “At Butts Reserve, contractors are stabilising the shelter and reducing the lean. Meanwhile, we’ll soon start repair works on the chimney. Both sets of works

mean visitors can continue enjoying these special places.”

Parks Victoria says that the shelter, known as Butts Pavilion, will receive \$110,000 of works. It said the structure was “constructed around 1900 and has local heritage significance as a reminder of the citizen soldier movement”. Contractors have been observed in the past week working on the posts to support the roof of the shelter.

The funding has been allocated by the State Government as part of a wider set of projects that encourage and provide access for Victorians to get outdoors. Maldon’s Beehive Chimney has been earmarked to receive \$130,000.

Goods Shed looking good

RESIDENTS who have taken the train from Castlemaine Station in the past few months will have noticed scaffolding and works taking place at the nearby Castlemaine Goods Shed which is managed by Castlemaine State Festival. The Festival announced an update on Thursday 29 May, saying that the maintenance and upgrade project is on track to be completed by the end of 2025.

The shed, a Victorian-era building, located within the Castlemaine Railway Precinct, was originally built to store freight in the 1860s and more recently as a cultural hub that includes the festival office and meeting rooms. The festival’s update said: “Stage 1 building works were completed in April 2020 and the Stage 2 works commenced earlier this year in March. A significant project milestone was recently achieved with the removal of the termite damaged flooring and the installation of the screw piles for the new flooring.”

The repairs and improvements, which the festival says have been funded by donations and support from the State Government, continue to see the conversion of the Goods Shed into a “flexible and vibrant creative hub,” for the region.

Meanwhile, the festival also declared that planning for the 2026 festival is successfully proceeding in the wake of the organisation recently undergoing nearly four months of voluntary administration. Over 90 artist proposals were submitted between December and March related to the theme: ‘Surprise, Surprise!’ The festival says: “We received over 90 proposals that draw on the region’s unique landscapes, hidden gems, and special spaces to create unforgettable artistic experiences.” Shortlisting has commenced and the 2026 festival is expected to feature “...delightful, playful and extraordinary works in the distinctive places and spaces of Castlemaine and the region’s townships.” For further information, stay tuned to: castlemainefestival.com.au.

Chicken farm application decision



Central Goldfields Shire Council unanimously voted against a proposed Baringhup broiler farm at its council meeting of Wednesday 28 May. In their comments to the meeting, Councillors indicated that the submissions and petitions that they received from the community featured in their considerations.

The CGSC's Coordinator of Statutory Planning's report recommended that Council determine that — had an application to VCAT for review not been made — it would have issued a Notice of Decision to Refuse a Permit for a planning permit application for a broiler farm at 705 Baringhup Road Carisbrook. Its reasoning was that the proposal is inconsistent with the Central Goldfields Planning Scheme, saying that: "...the proposed Class B broiler farm would be contrary to policy framework that respectively seeks to protect landscape values, residential amenity and environmental values."

The motion to accept this recommendation was put forward by Councillor Gerard Murphy who said that the application had not met the required standard. "It is a poor application, and it appears that (the applicants) thought this would just be ticked off. Well, not on this watch."

Councillor Ben Green seconded the motion to refuse the permit. He said: "I was moved by the sincerity and the substance of the objectors' submissions." Councillor Green referred to the various concerns raised in the submissions, saying: "It's not just one chicken farm. We must take into account an accumulation of these adverse impacts."

Councillor Gerard Murphy indicated that 39 objections to the application had been received. "As a council, we can't just let these chicken farms — 'factories' — blight the landscape."

The Decision to Refuse motion was passed

unanimously by Councillors in the room. Councillor Liesbeth Long had excused herself from discussion after declaring a conflict of interest, due to involvement with the Central Goldfields Bushwalking and Hiking Club, who were recent partners of the Castlemaine-Maryborough Rail Trail CMRT) project. The CMRT has publicly objected to the broiler farm application, while its project continues to roll out.

Welcoming streetscape for Castlemaine

Mount Alexander has announced plans to



revitalise Castlemaine town centre, starting with streetscapes and features such as tree canopies, garden beds and bench seating for Barker and Forest Streets. Council's Director Infrastructure and Development Michael Annear said:

"The design includes landscaping such as new trees, turf nature strips, and garden beds with low shrubs, grasses and ground covers." The council undertook community consultation for the project and is working to address the feedback it received. "There are sustainable design elements, and a good balance between heritage and street character, and function and accessibility," said Mr Annear. When the funding is secured, the design will be implemented in stages over a number of years. Councillors will consider the Barker Street and Forest Street Landscape Design for adoption at the July 2025 Council meeting.

First steps towards Treaty

The local Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation, DJAARA, has registered with the Treaty Authority its intent to negotiate a Traditional Owner Treaty. DJAARA stated that it is acting on behalf of Dja Dja Wurrung People and that they are the first Traditional Owner group to register intent to negotiate a Traditional Owner Treaty. Under Victoria's Treaty Negotiation Framework, Traditional Owner groups across the state can negotiate their own Treaties, which will reflect the aspirations and priorities in their local areas. The framework came about after the First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria and the State Government reached agreement in 2022. The framework is designed to enable Traditional Owners of Country to negotiate Treaties across the state, and for the Assembly — as the democratic voice for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people

in Victoria — to negotiate a state-wide Treaty to deliver structural reform.

Director of the DJAARA Board Director and Dja Dja Wurrung Reserved Seat Holder at the Assembly and Proud Dja Dja Wurrung man Djaran Murray-Jackson said: "Local Treaty will be led by our mob and focus on the issues that are important here on Dja Dja Wurrung Country."

Council census focus on lifestyle



Mount Alexander Shire Council (MASC) is asking shire locals to complete an online census, so it can learn more about residents' health, wellbeing and lifestyle habits. Council plans to use the data collected to guide future community planning and investment. The census, called the Active Living Census (ALC), will be delivered by Healthy Loddon Campaspe as part of a State Government funded regional survey that covers several shire areas in this region. The survey covers topics such as physical activity, nutrition, life satisfaction and access to recreational opportunities. Council says the ALC will provide a snapshot of how people in our region live and what barriers they may face to staying healthy and active.

"Completing the census online is easy, anonymous and takes around 15 minutes," said Mayor of Mount Alexander Shire Council, Cr Rosie Annear. "Your responses help us make decisions that affect your day-to-day. It helps us improve our trails, bike paths, playgrounds, and sports and recreation facilities. of various sizes and colours appear in bushland and gardens of Central Victoria. The amount of knowledge and experience required to confidently identify safe mushrooms almost requires a doctorate.

"Adults and children should not touch wild mushrooms with their bare hands, let alone eat them, and animals should be kept well away from them," Dr McGrath said. He said wild mushrooms growing in home gardens should only be removed by wearing gloves, carefully placing them in a bag and disposing of them in a closed general waste (landfill) rubbish bin.

Mushrooms for dinner

In an effort to balance the negative publicity around the humble mushroom, the *TT*

suggests adding them to the dinner rotation. They are easy, flavoursome and great raw or they can be prepared using a simple formula: oil + companion flavour + vehicle = delicious. Oils include butter or olive oil — you just need to sauté the mushrooms on a medium heat and add the second element, a companion flavour. This could be lemon or almost any herb (is that a rosemary bush poking through the fence?). Other suggested companions include kimchi or soy. Then decide how you will get the resulting mushrooms into your mouth (the vehicle), perhaps in an omelette, soup or on toast. Lashings of salt and pepper, added throughout the cooking process (that will elevate this simple meal) are a given. It's

difficult to go wrong.

And if this change of seasons, with the wait for rain, dimmer light and shorter days, creates some melancholy, the Japanese momiji-gari tradition offers a zen-like poem:

*In this autumn,
Why I get older?
The clouds and birds.*

Surprise developments for new levy

THE State Government announced on Friday 30 May, amongst a list of drought-relief measures, that it would pause the implementation of a contentious new levy to fund emergency services.

The Emergency Services and Volunteer Fund (ESVF) Legislation was passed by the Victorian Parliament on Thursday 15 May, amidst vocal opposition from groups including farmers and volunteer firefighters, many of whom rallied in Spring Street against it on State Budget Day. In the past week, momentum gathered against the changes, as local councils also began

to speak out against the legislation, objecting to new obligations it places on them and the projected impact upon residents. On Friday, the State Government released a statement saying that the increased levy will now not apply to primary production properties until the end of the 2026 financial year. The *Tarrangower Times* has been following the story and chatting to various stakeholders as the story unfolded towards this unexpected pause to one aspect of the ESVF.

Progress Hall

THE sign on the building — Progress Hall— seems to announce that this place has seen some changes, which sounds about right because it has been standing there for over 150 years. Tucked away from the main shopping strips of Maldon, Progress Hall sits at the top of Dolphin Street (See Blast from the Past on page 21 for the story of that name) in a handy location for its current role as community centre.

According to a Maldon Conservation Study undertaken in 1977, the hall was built by ‘Edwards and Smith of Maldon’ in 1873 as a Temperance Hall. The Temperance Movement was perhaps the Gwyneth Paltrow of its day: prepared to go to great lengths to convince others that their lifestyle is the healthiest. The Temperance Movement (often connected with churches) encouraged restraint (‘temperance’) or abstinence (teetotalism) from the

consumption of alcohol, which was then even more entrenched in society than it is now. The hall was probably used for holding sobriety lectures and meetings of reform clubs before being taken over by the Salvation Army from 1884 to 1903. Later renamed Progress Hall, the building reverted to Council ownership and is now used as Maldon Community Centre for all sorts of wonderful local activities including the weekly Community Lunch. The original developers of Progress Hall may not be so thrilled to learn that progress has in recent years included some raucous events; it has hosted parties and gigs for independent bands and theatre groups; exuberant Maldon Folk Festival shows plus Goldfields Gothic Festival who put on some devilishly outrageous performances in this former house of restraint (For details about the Community Lunch, visit maldonnc.org.au).

More Than Just a Label

WHEN you hold a bottle of wine, what do you notice first? For most, it’s the label—how it looks, what it says, the feeling it gives. A label can catch the eye, tell a story, or simply invite you to pick up the bottle and imagine what’s inside.

At Panacea Estate, the label is more than just packaging—it’s a reflection of who we are. And, in our case, it’s also a family project.

Most labels feature artwork created by my two daughters - Olivia and Amelia - who are, in their own way, an essential part of how our wines are shared with the world. As we are

getting the new range bottled and ordering the wine labels, I thought I’d take the opportunity to talk a little about making a wine label.

The Process Behind a Label

Designing a wine label sounds simple. In reality, it’s a layered process that blends creativity, regulation, and a deep sense of identity. Here’s what goes into it:

1. The Story

Every wine begins with a story. Sometimes it’s about the season, a particular vintage, or a block of vines that produced something unexpectedly beautiful. Other times, it’s more personal - a moment, a memory, or a feeling we want to share.

That story becomes the foundation of the label. Before any artwork is made, we ask ourselves: What is this wine saying? And how do we show that without too many words?

2. The Artwork

This is where Olivia and Amelia come in. Each year, they create paintings, typically abstract and Jackson Pollock style.

It’s become a tradition made with lots of paint and mess, swings, spinning around and one that brings a lot of laughter, negotiation, and a fair bit of insight from two very creative minds. Their art brings warmth and personality to the bottles. No two pieces are the same, just like no two vintages are the same.

3. The Design and Layout

Once the artwork is chosen, we work it into a proper wine label layout, balancing visual elements with legal requirements (alcohol content, standard drinks, sulphite disclosure, barcode, etc.).

We aim to keep our designs clean but expressive, letting the art speak while ensuring the important details are easy to read. I work with a good friend who’s a designer to turn the pictures, ideas and guidance into wine labels.

I find the labelling more challenging in many aspects. While making wine has some opportunities to adjust as the process is occurring, there are an infinite number of reworks and adjustments that can be made to the labels and it can be easy to whittle away days trying to make small adjustments.

4. Printing and Bottling

Once approved, the labels are printed on textured paper stock that feels right in the hand - something with a bit of grip and character. Some with a high gloss, some with a more matte finish, depending on the artwork and look we are after.

Bottling day is always exciting. There’s something surreal about seeing a label your daughter painted six months ago roll off the line on a finished bottle of wine, ready to be enjoyed by someone else.

It’s a full-circle moment: from vine, to barrel, to bottle, to art.

On a personal note, every time I hold one of our wines, I see more than a finished product—I see my daughters’ creativity, their joy, and the quiet pride that comes from knowing that their work is part of something real.

The wines change with every vintage, just like they grow and change each year. The labels reflect both. It’s not always polished or perfect, but neither is winemaking.

Next time you pick up a bottle of Panacea Estate wine or any other bottle of wine, take a moment to look at the label. You might just see a moment of joy, a dash of imagination, or a scene from our little patch of land through the winemaker’s eyes or their family.

There’s nothing conventional about Morgans, or the people who drive them and so they are naturally attracted to Maldon, where they seemed completely at home.

There’s even a Morgan logo on the side of

the old motor museum on the corner of Francis St.

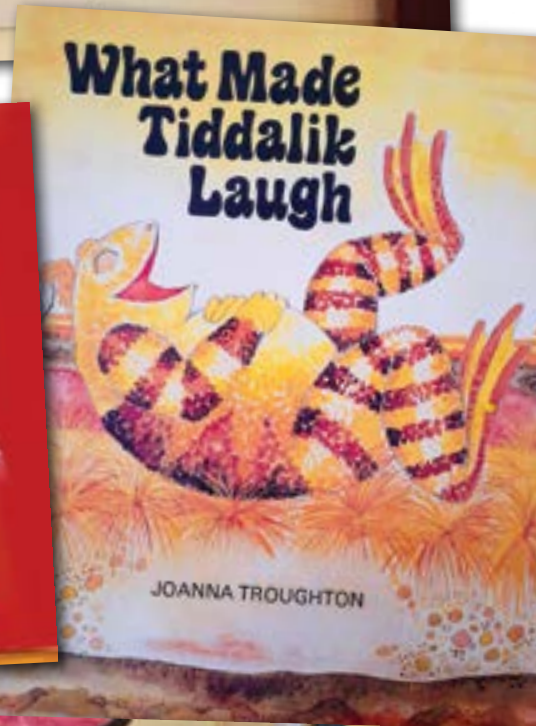
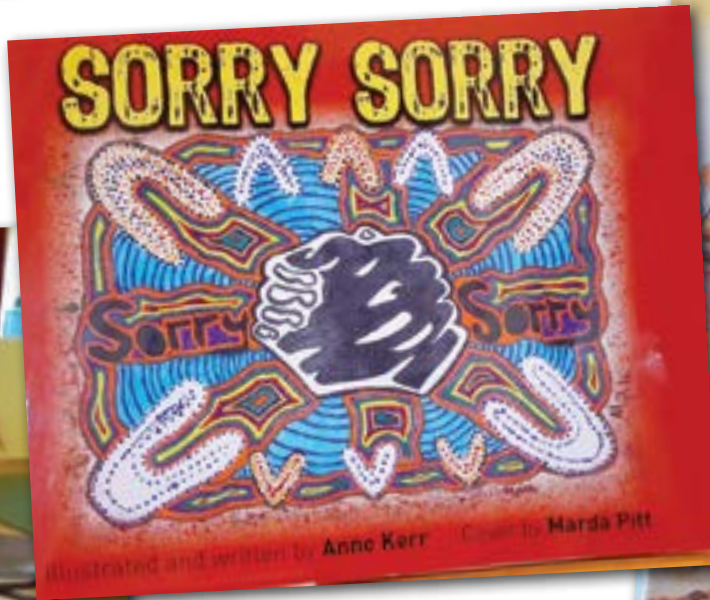
This week we observed Sorry Day by reading the wonderful book Sorry Sorry and discussing some of the themes in the book.

Surprise developments for new levy

Rural residents and councils resist

The legislation requires the new fund to be collected by local councils; the amount payable by property owners is a fixed rate plus a variable rate based on property's classification and capital improved value.

A number of farmers spoke their mind to the *TT* about the issue, with Newstead farmer Tony Butler saying that many people around him are angry that the property classification system seems to unfairly target them. "Rural people, whether they be CFA volunteers, whether they be small business, whether they be townspeople, their rage is white-hot," Mr Butler said. He said the exclusions included in the legislation do not offer comfort. "The rebates did not go far enough," he said. "You have to pay it up front then they give you the rebate. This issue has got country people up in arms and the issue is not going away." Mr Butler and other community voices called for rural councils to step in, which some subsequently did.

While some councils have commenced the process of updating websites to inform ratepayers of impending changes, others made public statements against the new levy.

Central Goldfields Shire Mayor Cr Grace La Vella said on Thursday 29 May that the impact of the ESVF on farming communities is concerning. "While there is no doubt that our first responders deserve better frontline services, vehicles, and facilities, ultimately helping to maintain preparedness and response capabilities, especially given the incredible work they do—this support must not come at the cost of our struggling farmers," she said.

City of Whittlesea Mayor Cr Martin Taylor also made a statement on Wednesday 28 May outlining numerous concerns with the levy, Hepburn Shire Mayor Cr Don Henderson said in a statement that the ESVF "levy places a disproportionate financial burden on rural and regional communities like ours, particularly on our primary producers," and said after the government's pause for farmers: "(Hepburn) Council will continue to advocate for a permanent review of this levy.

Meanwhile, a petition to the Parliament of Victoria requesting a cease to the introduction of the ESVF and a "genuine consultation process" currently has over 38,000 signatures.

Government Pause

The State Government responded on Friday 30 May in an announcement called "Expanding Drought Support To Farmers Across Our State," which included grants of up to \$5,000 to support on-farm drought management improvements, in

addition to financial counselling and mental health support.

The statement said that due to the dry conditions that are expected to continue into June, all primary production properties will pay a reduced ESVF contribution – capped to the same amount they paid in 2024-25. "This will mean the ESVF variable rate on primary production properties will remain at 28.7 – the same as it was in 2024-25 – for the duration of the 2025-26 financial year. This reduced rate will be applied to rates notices for primary production properties automatically."

Rural Councils Victoria (RCV) responded to the pause by saying: "The government's backdown is recognition the spirited community campaign against the levy was effective." RCV vows to continue its advocacy. "The ESVF is a bad tax that will do great harm to rural communities. We would still like to see its full removal. But delaying its implementation is very welcome."

Local Councillor Responds

Mount Alexander Council's Deputy Mayor, Councillor Toby Heydon — who attended the recent community meeting in Baringhup about the ESVF — welcomed the recent government announcement. "As councillors we're all very happy that the state government has decided to pause the introduction of this. I would imagine there's a lot of reasons behind that," he said, referring to concerns including increased financial pressure for primary producers and the risk that councils could be forced to foot the bill if residents don't pay the increased ESVF.

"I think every councillor across of the state has heard about this issue; mostly from commercial farmers, less from residential and commercial ratepayers. There's no doubt that the criticism of the levy has been widely communicated to me, from different farming groups, from the various farming regions across the shire," Cr Heydon said. He said the community meeting, also attended by Member for Bendigo West Maree Edwards MP and Member for Ripon Martha Haylett MP, was worthwhile and that he expects they provided feedback to Spring Street. "I think community meetings do have a very important impact on government policy. To have local MPs in attendance is crucial. A whole range of meetings across the state would have fed back into that government thinking."

Cr Heydon said it was important to remember that volunteer emergency services would welcome extra funding. "It is a point worth noting that the fundamental question behind all of this — need to raise more money — is very real. We're seeing massive increase in call-outs for emergency services, particularly from storms. It's a difficult question, how do we raise that money?"

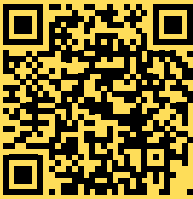

BLAST FROM THE PAST

Some Maldon street names

MALDON has some very generic street names such as High and Main that probably reflect its English heritage. The names of other streets date from Maldon's first years. John Templeton and Thomas Adair were the surveyors who laid out the town in 1854 and George Lowther was one of the two Assistant Goldfield Commissioners appointed to administer the Tarrangower diggings.

Francis Street was named after Maldon's first storekeepers. In 1854 the Francis brothers, Henry and William, established a branch of their Beehive Stores on the current site of the Scotch Pie House. The brothers had opened their first Beehive store in Bendigo in 1852. James and Samuel Warnock later purchased the business and moved it to High Street where they built a complex including a flourmill. The Beehive reef and mine took their names from the Francis brothers' store.

Edwards Street takes its name from William and Charles Edwards who opened Maldon's first quartz crushing plant in 1856. The plant stood on Francis Street and included the old Motor Museum and Community Centre sites. The Band room is the only surviving part of the plant.

Phoenix Street has its origin in a fire that burned down the Atlas crushing plant near the South German dam in November 1862. Publican Daniel Hutton later purchased the ruins and reopened it naming it the Phoenix Quartz Crushing Plant after the mythical bird that was reborn from its own ashes. Later James and Eliza Rickard purchased the plant and also established the Phoenix Hotel on the road nearby.

One might wonder why a central Maldon street is named after an aquatic mammal. Dolphin Street however has a more prosaic origin. In 1860, following a huge flood, the great drain was built from High Street to Tobin Street. Between Francis and Main Streets it passed through land owned by Thomas Calder who in 1866 donated the land to the Shire Council on condition that it remain open to public traffic. It is named after John Dolphin who originally purchased the land in 1857.

Other streets, such as Harker and McIntyre were named for our representatives in Victoria's colonial Parliaments. Many local councillors such as Hornsby, Warnock and Lawrence are also remembered in our street names. Another early councillor David Marshall did have a street named after him, but it was later renamed Steele Street after yet another councillor.

One of the more recently named streets is Forsythe Street that runs between Union and Phoenix Streets. This street was named after Senior Constable Lindsay Forsythe, a local policeman, who in 1983 was fatally shot after being lured to an ambush at Sandy Creek.

None of our streets are named after women.

And — exciting news! This Little Piggy

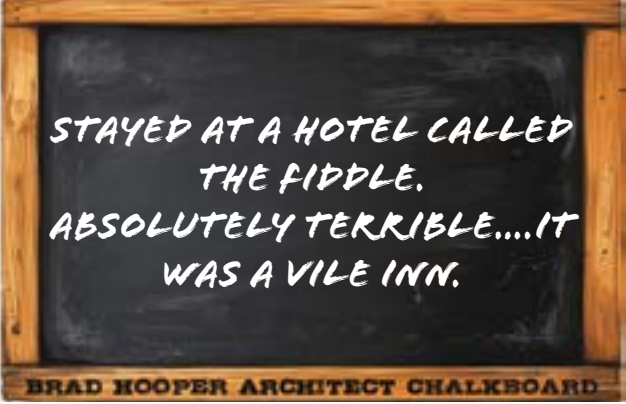

World Oceans Day: Sustaining what sustains us

WORLD Oceans Day 8 June is a day to raise awareness of the importance of oceans and take action to protect them. Living in Maldon (144 km from the nearest ocean), it is easy to forget the role that oceans and their inhabitants play in our everyday lives. They feed us, directly or via marine food chains. Because oceans are the largest natural reservoirs of carbon and heat, they have a major impact on our lives, absorbing from the atmosphere one quarter of the CO2 emissions produced by humans and acting as heat sinks, moderating global temperature change. In combination, these properties have resulted in the world’s oceans acting as brakes, slowing down the full effects of greenhouse gas warming of the atmosphere.

We need healthy oceans to maintain a functioning world. However, oceans are in crisis. Fish population crashes, the result of factors such as over-fishing, loss of breeding sites, temperature change and pollution, impact every species that lives in the oceans. Around the world, marine mammals such as whales and dolphins are threatened by habitat loss, being killed by fishing fleets as ‘bycatch’ and because of migration disruption from noise pollution. Seabird populations have dropped by 70 per cent since the middle of the 20th century. Plastic pollution is a major form of marine pollution that affects marine life. Plastic waste can entrap marine animals, resulting in them drowning, starving or being eaten. Soft plastics and microplastics can be ingested by marine life and cause their deaths.

What can we do? Here are some thoughts:

- Read about the oceans to small children so they grow up to love and save them
- Shop and eat sustainably - look for the *Certified Sustainable Seafood* label.
- Use fewer plastics and demand plastic-free alternatives.
- Use eco-friendly products - down the drain often means out to sea.

Library reviews

***All That’s Dead* by Stuart Macbride, 2019**

Inspector Logan McRae is looking forward to a nice simple case, something to ease him back into work after a year off on sick leave. But the powers-that-be have other ideas. The high-profile anti-independence campaigner Professor Wilson has gone missing, leaving nothing but bloodstains behind. There’s a war brewing between the factions for and against Scottish Nationalism; infighting in the police ranks, and it’s all playing out in the merciless glare of the media. Logan’s superiors want results, and they want them now.

***The Lost Battalions* by Tom Gilling, 2018**

A little-known story of two Australian battalions abandoned in Java during World War II and the heroes who kept them alive in the worst of Japan’s prisoner of war camps

They were thrown into a hopeless fight against an overwhelming enemy. Later, hundreds died as prisoners of war on the Thai-Burma Railway and in the freezing coal mines of Taiwan and Japan. Through it all, wrote Weary Dunlop, they showed ‘fortitude beyond anything I could have believed possible’.

Until now, the story of the 2,000 diggers marooned on Java in February 1942 has been a footnote to the fall of Singapore and the bloody campaign in New Guinea. Led by an Adelaide lawyer, Brigadier Arthur Blackburn VC, and fighting with scrounged weapons, two Australian battalions plus an assortment of cooks, laundrymen, and deserters from Singapore held up the might of the Imperial Japanese Army until ordered by their Dutch allies to surrender. Drawing on personal diaries, official records and interviews with two of the last living survivors, this book tells the extraordinary story of the ‘lads from Java’, who laid down their weapons, but refused to give in.

***The Man who Died Twice: The Life and Adventures of Morrison of Peking* by Peter Thompson and Robert Macklin, 2005**

This biography tells the story of George Morrison, an Australian journalist who reported on China for the *London Times* during the era of the Boxer Rebellion. This is both the personal story of an intrepid journalist who became a national hero and the broader story of the emergence of China onto the world stage. Morrison’s involvement in the behind-the-scenes power struggles and his role as advisor to the fledgling government are covered in detail.

***The Unusual Life of Tristan Smith* by Peter Carey, 1994**

If you are not a citizen of Voorstand, you may not be familiar with the strange case of Tristan Smith and his illegal appropriation of Bruder Mouse. Even if you are a citizen of faraway Efica, you will only have heard rumours about the juggling, the somersaulting, the Burro Plasse tunnel, and the motel on the border. Here, for the first time, is the truth about Tristan Smith. This fully annotated edition follows Tristan’s career from his birth in the Republic of Efica in the year 371 to the present day.

***People of the Deer* by Farley Mowat, 2004 (originally published 1951)**

People of the Deer is Canadian author Farley Mowat’s first book, and brought him literary recognition. The book is based upon a series of travels the author undertook in the Canadian barren lands, of the Keewatin Region, Northwest Territories.

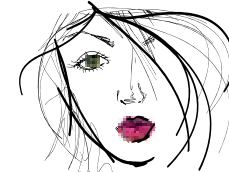

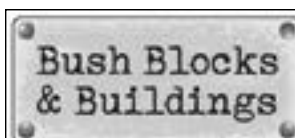

Getting there:

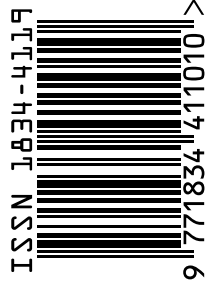
- Travel from Newstead towards Castlemaine on the Pyrenees Highway, past the school and the motel
