"This is the perfect opportunity to clear out those unwanted bits and pieces. Make



Last Saturday, VGR hosted a 70th birthday with over 70 guests aboard the heritage steam train with the words' Happy Birthday Max' scrawled across the engine.

The event was fully catered and included the use of the newly restored Archeron firstclass carriage and two bars.

Sharon Martin, VGR Administrator, Customer Service and Events Management Coordinator, told the *Times*, "It's always great to have the steam train back. We've had to give a lot of refunds and gift certificates over the past two years, and now people are coming back. "For the past year, the trains have been running from Castlemaine to Maldon, which works well. People can now travel to Castlemaine by V-Line and not have to worry about driving or parking their cars. It does mean we're only running one train now instead of two.

"We're really trying to make sure we squeeze everyone in; we don't want anyone to miss out. We've had to add an extra two sessions of the Murder on the Orient Express trips, and Ales on Rails is booked out until June."

The dedicated volunteers on the historic railway are always looking for newcomers to join the team, so if anyone is interested, there are roles to suit all interests, from Stewards to traffic management or customer service; no previous skills are required.

There's also a Young Volunteers Program running for people 14 years or older (14-16 year-olds must have a parent or guardian present), which includes exciting opportunities to help with train restoration, work in the mechanical department or on the track gang.

'Art is akin to Alchemy'

UPON meeting Julie Millowick recently and then reading about her amazing body of work, I realised that what she does is perfectly described in Christos Tsiolkas' latest book, 71/2. He is a wizard with words, while Julie is a wizard with photography. He wrote that Art is 'akin to Alchemy'.

When you look at Julie's photography there is a high degree of alchemy as well as skill. I first met Julie recently during the selection

process of the MANet I Be Human Portrait Prize in the Cascade Gallery. At the end of the process, she gave us each a copy of a delightful little book titled Lockdown - 263 Days. It showed her Chinese pistache tree through the seasons. This, needless to say, sparked my curiosity.

After reading about Julie on her web page and viewing her amazing work, which ranges across all forms of photography, I met up

with her again to find out more. She very generously shared some of the highlights of her photographic career since studying at PCAE.

Julie spent three years as darkroom/studio assistant to Athol Shmith, John Cato, and Peter Barr. She said, 'How lucky was that for a little nobody starting out?'

Her portrait of Athol Shmith marks a distinct time and place in Australia's photographic history. Julie gifted the photograph to the Castlemaine Art Museum the year after Athol Shmith died.

From 1978, Julie's Melbourne studio specialised in corporate/industrial photography with clients, including Shell, Mayne Nickless, Westpac, Victorian Arts Centre (VAC), State Bank, R.E.I.V., Australian Wheat Board, Fluid Freight, Australian Wool Corporation, Shell Petroleum and Fruehauf Semitrailers. Julie was one of only two female photographers working in the CBD.

Maldon Streetscape Revitalisation Project

COUNCIL has received positive feedback from retailers in Maldon regarding the progression of the Maldon Streetscape Revitalisation Project works in the town.

Retailers are telling us that they're enjoying seeing how the project is improving the look of the town, and there's a sense of things starting to come together as the various elements of the project are completed.

This week Telstra contractors have completed the task of replacing old phone pits throughout Maldon's CBD. Thanks to everyone for their cooperation while these works were underway.

Restoration works on the historic stone culverts are continuing along High Street towards the Bendigo Bank. As with many elements of this project, our ability to undertake work is weather dependent. Considering this, our team are monitoring the rain radar regularly and adjusting work plans to reflect any predicted inclement weather.

Council's arborist has also been on-site this week, inspecting trees located near the historic stone drains and providing recommendations that enable the progression of the works.

Once the project to restore the stone drains has been complete, we can start work on resurfacing the asphalt footpath.

Council is consulting with affected residents and businesses on the nature of these works, including their potential impact on traffic in the town, and the optimum time to carry them out.

Where possible, works will be carried out before 12pm, ensuring local trade isn't adversely affected.

In other project news:

• Wayfinding signage consultants have been approached to develop a design brief for signage, which will be subject to consideration from the steering committee.

- Timber pedestrian and vehicle bridge fabrication is underway off-site with installation, to follow stone drain works.
- All existing dilapidated timber and old concrete footbridges are being replaced with new ones.

Again, thank you to the community of Maldon for your support, patience and cooperation while works are progressed on the project.



This year's bird shooting season will be the longest duck slaughter in the state, except for 1986 when the Sunday ban on shooting was scrapped, yet no one trimmed the shooting season length to balance that.

It is a mystery why a declining percentage of bird shooters (currently less than half of one percent of the population) need to be able to shoot native birds for a quarter of the year, at thousands of public lakes, streams, creeks, rivers, waterways and wetlands at their whim. Surely they could make do with a shorter shooting season and a smaller number of shooting zones to give our birdlife - and residents - some peace.

On a local level, the community's pleas for an exclusion zone at Cairn Curran reservoir, which is home to many threatened species and growing numbers of residents, have been completely and utterly ignored.

her assistant with a dry one each time a wave swept over the bow of the launch. That was at the beginning of an adventurous and successful

career. Over time, in her long and distinguished career, Julie has photographed everything imaginable from the birth of the Arts Centre to ballet

dancers and industrial subjects. During this time she became friends with many of her corporate clients, such as Tom Valenta of Mayne Nickless, and Diane Cummins of Hewlett Packard who recommended her to other clients. Julie ran her own business in the CBD for 18 years. She also did a lot of work pro-bono for The Brother-


hood of St Laurence. Laid low by a back injury

in 1996, Julie was unable to lift the incredibly heavy equipment she normally used. She turned to photograms and cyanotypes, which do not require the use of a camera and where every image is completely unique, rather like monoprints in printmaking.

In 1999 the photograms were exhibited in Paraphernalia, and three years later, both cyanotypes and photograms were used in *A Garden for Hazel* which included her lovely photogram titled *A Heart for Hazel* (Hawke).

During the long COVID lockdown, using a Hasselblad scanner, Julie scanned many of her old negatives from 1974 onwards. Because she is living in a bush fire prone area, she stores everything in a very large fireproof safe.

The State Library of Victoria is presently in the process of acquiring her 46-year-old archive. They have had two handovers so far, and there is

*Appearing via video link. The entire Dialogues 2022 program will be live streamed allowing accessibility for audiences who cannot attend physically due to health vulnerabilities or disability. If lockdown or other significant COVID restrictions apply during the event dates, the entire project will be delivered online.

MORE than 35 cyclists descended on central Victoria last Wednesday ahead of a bold bid for \$150,000 in tourism funding to kickstart the Castlemaine-Maryborough Rail Trail (CMRT).

Twenty-four hours later, CMRT and two regional shires, Central Goldfields and Mount Alexander, had submitted their joint bid for state government funding for the trail feasibility study.

The cyclists then made the return trip to Maldon along the 18 kilometre Castlemaine - Maldon Trail. The Castlemaine - Maldon trail is one of three major regional trails with which the Castlemaine - Maryborough Rail Trail will interconnect once built. The cyclists plan to extend their central Victorian trail excursion towards Bendigo and Heathcote later this week. Australia's peak rail-trail body, Rail Trails Australia (RTA) Vice President Steven Kaye, was with the riders visiting Castlemaine on Thursday morning. "RTA's vision is for Austral-

ia's disused rail corridors to be protected for their heritage and natural values and enjoyed by the community and visitors for active recreation, such as walking, cycling and horse riding", Mr Kaye said.

"When visitors come to enjoy these trails, they spend money in local businesses. Every week, trails bring thousands of dollars into regional economies," he said.

"If the Castlemaine-Maryborough trail can be built, we will certainly come back to this amazing area, so full of history and beauty," said Steven Kaye.

The proposed 55 kilometre Castlemaine – Maryborough Rail Trail will allow visitors to experience beautiful and historic landscapes, explore First Nations stories and access award-winning food, wine and arts and cultural experiences.

"The riders' visit is a great way to mark a major milestone for our trail," CMRT Committee Member Bronwen Machin said.

"The community has worked hard over the past year or so to put ourselves in the box seat to get funding to get our trail started.

"This week symbolises what can be achieved with genuine collaboration between community and local government."

In total, more than 80 people, small businesses and community organisations have donated \$18,000 to CMRT to back the joint tourism funding bid. The Shires of Central Goldfields and Mount Alexander have pledged \$12,000.

The State Government's Enabling Tourism Fund enables applicants like CMRT and our two councils to receive up to \$4 for every \$1 they raise.

As of 28 February, the combined funds raised by the community and local government will enable the partners to bid for at least \$150,000 in government tourism funding.

CMRT and the councils will use the funding for a feasibility study to quantify the trail's benefits and determine how to build and operate it. This is an essential first step to getting the trail built.

Since late 2020, and with broad community support, CMRT has attracted more than 4000 signatories to an online petition calling for trail funding, attracted more than 150 members and volunteers, won the endorsement of local and state government and raised more than \$21,000 in community donations.

"There is a groundswell of local support for this trail," said Ms Machin. "Central Goldfields and Mount Alexander Shire Councils have provided advice and funding for the feasibility study, local businesses and other organisations have written letters of support, and the community has contributed more than \$16,000," Ms Machin said.

"Everyone is putting skin in the game. Now, we're looking for support from the Victorian Government."

THIS week the focus is on autobiography. Also included for fans of Elly Griffiths is a review of the latest Dr Ruth Galloway mystery.

Three-time Booker Prize nominee Deborah Levy's trilogy of autobiographies was published between 2013 and 2021.

In the first volume, Things I Don't Want to Know: On Writing, Levy takes inspiration from George Orwell's Why I Write and incorporates personal stories, including moments of her childhood in South Africa, where her father was a political prisoner. Levy is a wonderful writer - this short slice of a memoir has four quick sections, two glimpses at her fractured life as she's writing it, sandwiching two moving sequences, most notably the story of Levy's father's jailing in South Africa when she was a young girl. All along, the central theme is clear: what makes someone want to write, and how do they keep going in the face of adversity? A bit A Room of One's Own, a bit The Argonauts (in its excellent quotation of feminist theory), challenging and charming at once.

In The Cost of Living: A Working Autobiography, Levy leaves her husband and moves with her daughters into an apartment in North London. Even stronger than the excellent Things I Don't Want to Know, Levy is firing on all cylinders in this short memoir segment, which details a year of change after a divorce, and examines instances of erasure of women in modern society. The scenes are memorable, poignant, and often hilarious (a run over chicken from a grocery store in a road; leaves in her hair during a pitch; birds sipping water on a porch).

In the final book, Real Estate: A Living Autobiography, Levy turns 60 and dreams of the ideal home she would buy if she had the resources. Organised around musings on Levy's dream house and how she would like it to be, this concluding volume draws on themes explored in the previous books and works as a conclusion in a way that is highly satisfying.

Fox & I: An Uncommon Friendship by Catherine Raven

Catherine Raven left home at 15, fleeing an abusive father

and an indifferent mother. Drawn to the natural world, for years, she worked as a ranger in National Parks, at times living in her run-down car on abandoned construction sites, or camping on a piece of land in Montana which she bought from a colleague. She managed to put herself through college and then graduate school, eventually earning a Ph.D. in biology.

Yet she never felt at home with people, and though she worked at various universities and taught field classes in the National Parks, she built a house on a remote plot of land in Montana and, except when teaching, spoke to no one. One day, she realised that the fox who had been appearing at her house was coming by every day at 4.15. He became a regular visitor, who eventually sat near her as she read to him from The Little Prince or Dr. Seuss. Her scientific training had taught her not to anthropomorphise animals, but as she grew to know him, his personality revealed itselfand he became her friend. But friends cannot always save each other from the uncontained forces of nature.

Though this is a story of survival, it is also a poignant and dramatic tale of living in the wilderness and coping with inevitable loss. This uplifting fable-like true story about the friendship of a woman and a wild fox not only reveals the power of friendship and our interconnectedness with the natural world but is an original and imaginative work.

The Locked Room by Elly Griffiths

This is the 14th novel in the Dr Ruth Galloway Mysteries.

Ruth and Nelson are on the hunt for a murderer when COVID-19 breaks out, making their task harder, particularly during lockdown.

Ruth is in London clearing out her mother's belongings when she makes a surprising discovery: a photograph of her Norfolk cottage taken before Ruth lived there. Her mother always hated the cottage, so why does she have a picture of the place? As she died three years ago, Ruth can't exactly ask her, and her father denies all knowledge of the picture.

The only clue is written on

the back of the photo: Dawn, 1969. Ruth returns to Norfolk determined to solve the mystery, but she and her daughter are locked down in their cottage, attempting to continue with work and lessons but, in reality, becoming lonely and frustrated. Happily the house next door is rented by a nice woman called Sally, who they become friendly with while standing on their doorstep clapping for carers.

Nelson, meanwhile, has no time to be bored. He's investigating a series of suicides that could be the work of a serial killer. It's only when he links them to an archaeological discovery that he thinks of Ruth. He breaks curfew to visit the cottage to find Ruth chatting to her neighbour, whom he remembers as Dawn Lancaster, a carer who was once tried for murdering her employer. When the deaths continue, Nelson vows to take Ruth and Kate to live with him. But they and Dawn, have vanished.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

VOTE 1, ARNOLD PADDOCK

In July 1864, Arnold Paddock announced that he intended to challenge the sitting member, John Ramsay, for the seat of Maldon in the upcoming election for the Victorian Legislative Assembly. His candidature was not generally welcomed.

The Maryborough and Dunolly Advertiser reminded readers that in 1859 Paddock had organised anti-Chinese protests in Maryborough. Speaking from the balcony of the Golden Age Hotel, Paddock had claimed the Chinese were driving European miners off the diggings, and he had initiated a petition asking for them to be expelled from the Colony. The Tarrangower Times ridiculed Paddock as a costermonger and a writer of doggerel verse. They said that while they were happy to publish his letters and advertisements, they thought his candidature was 'nothing but a stupid joke'.

Arnold promptly replied that he had never advocated the destruction of the Chinese but only sought to support his own countrymen. He also pointed out that he was not a costermonger but a respectable travelling trader dealing in gold and jewellery. He also provided examples of his verse so that the public could judge its merit. After reading Arnold's responses, one member of the public suggested that he stand as the member for Yarra Bend (the site of the Lunatic Asylum).

Despite these negative responses, Arnold took his campaign seriously and published a detailed 12-point plan summarising his policies. He was in favour of state aid for religion, equal opportunity in education and government support for hospitals and benevolent institutions. He was also in favour of opening up the land, the extension of railways, continued immigration and reform of the Upper House by extending the franchise to smaller householders.

However, in October, when it was time to nominate and pay the 50 pounds electoral deposit, Arnold did not put his name forward. John Ramsay was then elected unopposed and served until his death in 1867.



Passed by Council Resolution, 15 February 2022

This Order revokes all previous Orders of Council by Mount Alexander Shire Council made under the **Domestic Animals Act 1994**.

In accordance with the **Domestic Animals Act 1994** from 15 February 2022 dogs and cats are to be controlled in the following manner at all time:

Pursuant to section 25 cats within the municipality are to be controlled: **Cat Curfew**

All cats within the municipality must be securely confined to their owners' premises between the hours of sunset to sunrise.

Pursuant to section 26(2) dogs and cats within the municipality are to be controlled: **On-Leash**

The person in control of any dog must keep the dog in effective control by means of a chain, cord, or leash held by the person and attached to the dog while the dog is in:

- all roads* in the areas of Campbells Creek, Castlemaine, Chewton, and Maldon prescribed in Schedule 1; and
 - the Castlemaine Botanical Garden; and
 - all other parks and reserves:
 - between sunset to 6 am; and
 - when park maintenance is being performed; and
 the principal location of an organised public meeting, sporting or community event or festival when occurring or being proported for and
- event, or festival when occurring or being prepared for; and
 within five metres of a permanent barbeque or picnic area when in use; and
- within rive metres of a permanent barbeque or picnic area when in use; and
 at any place where Council has placed signs indicating that dogs must be on a lead.

*Roads as the meaning is ascribed to it in the Local Government Act 1989

A person may exercise a cat in a public place but must keep the cat on a chain, cord, or leash held by the person attached to the cat at all times. **Off-Leash**

With the exception of the above, a dog may be exercised off-lead providing the person in control actively supervises the dog and maintains a clear and unobstructed view of the dog at all times, and:

- carries a chain, cord or leash sufficient to bring the dog under effective control if the dog behaves in a manner which threatens any person or animal; or
- remains in effective voice or hand control of the dog so as to be able to bring the dog under effective control by placing the dog on a chain, cord, or leash if that becomes necessary; or

• is in a prescribed dog park and places the dog on-lead when exiting the park. **Prohibited areas**

Dogs are prohibited at all times:

within five metres of any playground;

- from the playing surfaces of the following:
 - Camp Reserve Oval Castlemaine,
 - Castlemaine War Memorial Stadium,
 - Western Reserve Oval Castlemaine,
 - Elsie Palmer Field Oval Castlemaine,
 - Doug Powell Oval Castlemaine,
 - Wesley Hill Recreation Reserve, Castlemaine
 - Campbells Creek Recreation Reserve Oval,
 - Chewton Soldiers Memorial Park Oval,
 - John Powell Recreation Reserve Oval Guildford,
 - Harcourt Recreation Reserve and Leisure Centre Oval,
 - Cricket Ground & Recreation Reserve Oval Newstead,
 - Bill Woodfull Reserve Oval Maldon,
 - Public Recreation Reserve Station Oval Taradale, and
- at any place where Council has placed signs indicating that dogs are prohibited.

Pursuant to section 26(2A) dogs within the municipality are to be controlled: **By Agreement with owner of private land**

The person in control of any dog must keep the dog in effective control by means of a chain, cord, or leash held by the person and attached to the dog while the dog is on: • 149 Duke Street Castlemaine (Wesley Hill Market)

Pursuant to section 26(4) a condition as to the means of restraint of a dog does not apply to a dog in any circumstances listed in section 20(2). **Exemptions to Order of Council**

A dog that is an Assistant Animal within the meaning of the **Disability Discrimination Act 1992 (Cth)** that is under the effective control of the handler / patient.

A dog may be temporarily tethered to a post or pole on a short leash or chain while the person in control of the dog conducts a short-term activity provided the dog's behaviour is monitored and immediate action is taken to bring the dog under control. An Authorised Officer may temporarily suspend or amend a provision of this Order for the purposes of facilitating a planned event or in an emergency.

- The following has a prescribed off leash dog park:
 - Wesley Hill Dog Park, Wesley Hill Recreation Reserve

Excitement is building around the Club for the inaugural competition for the Forster Cup tournament on Saturday 2 April, a full complement of 48 players have entered.



MALDON Pony Club held its second rally of the year with a turnout of 20 plus riders on the day.


This rally had a big emphasis on the Pony Club Team Championships, which are being held in Bendigo next week. We






