



Crossing upgrade gets underway



☆ Local resident Carmel Naismith is rapt to see works underway to upgrade the Maldon level crossing.

"I'M thrilled to bits!"

That was Maldon resident Carmel Naismith's reaction to the news that the level crossing on the Maldon-Bendigo Road is being upgraded this week.

The upgrade is being done by the Victorian Goldfields Railway in conjunction with the State Government and Mount Alexander Shire Council.

It will include re-building the rail track through the crossing, re-surfacing the roadway and fitting the crossing with automatic flashing lights and bells.

"Hopefully it means there will be no more screeching of brakes or mad tooting from the train," said Ms Naismith, whose property is near the crossing.

She said there had been several near misses in recent

"There are just so many cars that go through there and the drivers don't look for the train - it (the upgraded level crossing) will be a potential life saver."

VGR Ganger Will Maylor and a group of hard-working volunteers started on the upgrade about a week ago.

"We're replacing rails on either side of the crossing with much longer, less worn rails to improve the service life of the track," Mr Maylor said.

He said the new rail track will be laid on concrete sleepers and the roadway will be resurfaced in line with current Victorian standards.

Mr Maylor said the roadway will be finished with thick asphalt that will give road users a less bumpy ride when they drive over the crossing.

"The Department of Transport is funding the installation of flashing lights and bells, so this crossing will be the same as our other three crossings in Castlemaine.

"The lights and bells should be installed here in Maldon by the end of the financial year."

crossing won't have gates and there hasn't been provision for pedestrian access at this

Asked how necessary the upgrade is, Mr Maylor said, "It's ridiculously needed."

"This crossing is very high on the list of near misses with cars.

"There have been two accidents that I'm aware of in recent years, one where a car went into the side of a train and there have been

countless close calls."

He said the trains currently pass through the crossing at 15km/h.

'Some drivers think they can beat the train over the crossing, which is a very dangerous thing to do."

Who cleans the tables?



COUNCIL has established a number of temporary outdoor dining and entertainment precincts throughout the shire over the past month to assist hospitality businesses to cater for more diners.

The temporary outdoor dining site that popped up on the Old Bank Corner in Maldon earlier this month has been welcomed and well used by locals and tourists

And it is certainly a boost for local cafes and takeaways who can only provide limited seating in their premises due to COVID Safe restrictions.

But one local resident, who asked not to be named, raised an interesting point when he recently contacted

the TT last week.

"Who's going to clean the outdoor tables and seats? There were lots of people coming and going from the Old Bank Corner last weekend, many of them enjoying a coffee or a bite to eat but the tables weren't disinfected after each sitting and there was no hand sanitiser or COVID Safe signage around to remind people about social distancing."

A Mount Alexander Shire Council spokesperson said due to the cost and resources of routine disinfection at each location, the areas are unable to be regularly

"If Council was able to clean a site on a routine basis we cannot guarantee it will be COVID-free. As soon as someone touches the surface, it becomes unclean," the spokesperson said.

"This approach consistent with how we've re-opened and are operating our parks, playgrounds and other public spaces."

The spokesperson said users of the outdoor dining and entertainment precincts are encouraged to take responsibility for their actions, and ensure they follow physical distancing and hygiene rules protect against coronavirus (COVID-19).

"Signage is due to be installed at each of the temporary outdoor dining and entertainment precincts to remind everyone of what they can do to protect themselves from COVID-19 and reduce the spread.

"Each temporary outdoor dining and entertainment precinct has been designed to enable safe and sociallydistanced interactions between separate groups of people, and we encourage people to make common sense decisions in keeping with the advice from Victoria's Chief Health Officer.'



CFA Vegetation Management Officer Lisa Haines said the mulching works were undertaken through Safer Together, a government initiative to encourage agencies and land managers to work more effectively together to reduce the risks of bushfire in Victoria.

"Concerns about fire risk at this Spring Street site were raised by a concerned resident," Ms Haines said.

"The site is on Mount Alexander Shire-managed land and the works were arranged by CFA using a "The works removed a

large amount of blackberries and other weeds that had built up over time." Meanwhile Forest Fire

Management Victoria (FFMVic) has recently completed slashing around five hectares on the eastern side of ANZAC Hill in Maldon.

A further 12 hectares of mechanical fuel reduction works, and a 41-hectare fuel reduction burn are planned for ANZAC Hill in the 2021 Joint Fuel Management Plan.

"FFMVic crews conduct mechanical works and fuel reduction burns to reduce the size, intensity and impact of future bushfires to communities and the environment," said Murray Goldfields District Manager Adrian Parker.

"These works are part of FFMVic's strategic fuel management program of approximately 30 planned burns totalling more than 4,700 hectares in the Murray Goldfields district coming months if conditions are suitable."

THE Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) is urging Victorians who were sent an Apparent Failure to Vote Notice to respond by the 28-day deadline with a detailed explanation.

The notice - which is not a fine - asks apparent non-voters for a reason for why they appear not to have voted in the 2020 local council elections.

A detailed response with supporting documentation, where possible, will help to determine if the excuse is considered sufficient, while ignoring the notice, or not providing a sufficient reason for not voting, may result in an infringement notice and a penalty of \$83.


This year children at Newstead Preschool are working towards these key messages with a visit from Bendigo Health's Community Dental Services.

"Oh yes Jeff," she would holler over the very loud television which suddenly droned into silence. "Come

And there we would sit and chat about her life, past and present for I don't know how long. And we chuckled and we laughed and, on each occasion, the time just flew.

In one of those interviews, Daphne told me about her early life.

She was born in a little house in Brunswick in 1919.

She remembers going to Sunday School and experiencing what she called a "teenage betrayal".

"I was 16 at the time and I was sweet on a boy there. Well, this girl came down from the country and the boy asked me to be friends with her, which I did – then he upped and married her!"

Councillor's Column

with Tarrengower Ward Councillor Stephen Gardner



It was great to see the pop-up dining area finally happen on the Old Bank Corner.

I must admit it has been a pleasant surprise to receive mainly positive feedback. This is a temporary installation to support cafes during COVID-19.

As Council has now taken out a long-term lease on this site, I am hoping that the Old Bank Corner will become permanent community space. Whilst the Salvage Yard did an excellent job in a short timeframe, there are a few things and questions that need to be looked at for it to become a permanent installation.

As people would know there are a number of local people who are committed to reviewing the elements of the proposed streetscape, including street furnishings. This group will be looking at the Old Bank Corner and what it should look like on a more permanent arrangement before the whole community is asked for feedback.

Some people have raised some issues with me including disability access to tables; the current chairs are OK but not very comfortable particularly for elderly and people with back pain. The loss of parking (the space has always been private property

and has never been a car park) is becoming more of an issue. There have also been calls for a water fountain to be installed. These are all worthwhile and important areas that need to be looked before a permanent arrangement can be pursued.

March Council meeting

Finally, a Council meeting that was back to normal last Tuesday but due to distancing requirements it was held in the old Town Hall in Castlemaine and members of the public were in attendance with public question time. Most questions were about an issue in Farnsworth Street, Castlemaine, a bridge in Castlemaine and a permit that was issued for a music festival.

This month there were no planning applications for consideration and it was mainly an administrative meeting.

Baringhup speed limits

At the February Council meeting, I was pleased to introduce a petition from the Baringhup community to reduce some of the speed limits in and around Baringhup.

The Council officers have liaised with the local community and Police and support and agree to the proposed speed changes.

The Council officers will now lobby and seek support from the Department of Transport to make it happen. I know that the community of Baringhup has wanted changes to the speed limit for some time now so I am very hopeful this will occur very

Events

Events have been cancelled, postponed, or are going ahead in a COVID-19 safe way. With no overseas travel for a while yet, we can see an increase in visitors as well as more people moving here. It is exciting in a lot of ways but will be challenging going forward.

Waste strategy

Waste is not a very exciting topic but is core to what a Council does. As a group of Councillors, we have made it a priority over the next couple of years, so it was agreed to appoint a full-time position with high level technical expertise to oversee the current and future waste operations and strategy. This was an important appointment and there are a lot of things that need to be done, including:

- Managing the current waste contract transfer stations improve services possible.
- Cell capping the old tip. This is a large undertaking and finally is getting done.
- Implementing the Victo-Government's rian circular economy policy for waste. This is to better manage recyclables and I know several other Councils have done this and we can learn from them.
- Overseeing the design and building of the proposed waste recovery depot.

The handling of our waste is very important, particularly to ensure that the Council and the community meet our target of zero emissions. The Council will also be advertising for community members to be involved, so if you are excited by getting involved look out for the advert or contact me and I will pass your details on.

It's great to see events back on again and that Maldon is busy (yes, I know it can be a pain, particularly on weekends) but I know our traders are grateful. We are getting close to Easter and I understand that the Easter committee has advertised a calendar of events, with some changes. I know Council is working with the organisers to make this happen, so hopefully we can have COVID-19 safe Easter events.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

EFFIE LAIDLER

Effie Laidler came to Maldon in 1922 when her father James was appointed head teacher at the Maldon State School. James had previously been a teacher at the Gravel Hill State School in Bendigo. Effie was aged 27 when she came to Maldon. She was her parents' only daughter and lived in their Adair Street

home for the next 30 years. During her time in Maldon, Effie was involved with many local organisations. She was active in the Golf Club and in February 1925, when the Maldon Croquet Club was formed, she was elected to its committee. Soon after, Effie became the Club's secretary, a position she held for many

years. In December 1934 at the Croquet Club's competitions, Effie won both trophies on offer. returned one of them and it became the perpetual trophy that bore her name and for many years was awarded to the Club champion.

As a young woman, Effie attended the Bendigo School of Mines where she studied arts and crafts. In 1915, as part of her course, she made an honour roll for the Campbells Forest State School, north of Bendigo. The honour roll is now housed in the Campbells Forest Community Hall.

In 1935, Effie formed the Maldon Book Lovers' Club. The Club met fortnightly to discuss novels, plays and poetry. They also invited guest speakers to address them and wound up each year with a bush ramble. A feature of the Club was the charming syllabuses produced each year that contained the Club's schedule of meetings, listing for each meeting the date, subject and name of the hostess. Effie almost certainly produced and illustrated these in the Club's early year.

In 1936, Effie and some other members of the Book Lovers' Club formed the Maldon branch of the Country Women's Association with Effie as the branch She remained secretary. active in the CWA both locally and nationally for many years.

In 1947 Effie, with fellow CWA member Vera Delahenty, produced a booklet simply titled 'Maldon' as part of a CWA local history competition. Published with the help of local sponsors, this booklet proved both popular and profitable. The funds raised were used to support the recently opened Baby Health Centre. The booklet included several illustrations by Effie of local landmarks. Later Effie became a State CWA handicraft demonstrator and

Effie's father died in 1942 and her mother, Anne, died in 1951. In December 1952 Effie married James Earl in Burleigh Heads, Queensland. She remained in Queensland until her death in 1975.


