TALISING MALDON

Streetscape million aldon's Revitalisation project has reached the next stage; replacing the uneven Telstra pits to ensure smooth, safe footpaths and restoring the culverts on High Street.

A group of Mount Alexander Shire Council (MASC) representatives and Member for Bendigo West Maree Edwards visited Maldon on Wednesday to view the progress of the work.

MASC Acting CEO Lisa Knight said, "This is an incredible opportunity and so beneficial to the community. The work is well overdue and it is exciting to see it finally come to fruition."

Michael Annear MASC Director of Infrastructure and Development told the *Times* it was necessary to replace the Telstra pits before commencing work on the footpaths.

"The old Telstra pits were at uneven heights; replacing these will ensure there is an even surface with no tripping hazards," said Michael.

"Council has received communication from local residents regarding the mess that was left after the pits were replaced. We have spoken with the contractors involved in the streetscape works about making sure the sites are left as clean as possible.

"There will be some disruption due to the scale of these works, however, we are trying to keep this to a minimum where possible.

"We're increasing our communication with the community via Facebook, the MASC website, direct communication



2022 duck hunting season

THE Game Management Authority (GMA) has announced the arrangements for the 2022 duck season, including changes to the start times, daily bag limit and hunted species.

The 2022 season will start at 8am on Wednesday 16 March 2022 and will close 30 minutes after sunset on Monday 13 June 2022. The bag limit is four birds per day.

Spokesperson for the Coalition Against Duck Shooting, Craig Davey said, "The Victorian Government has declared war on native waterbirds, at a time when their numbers in Victoria are dangerously low.

"The Government should be held responsible for decimating Australia's native waterbirds, especially when their numbers are in serious

"Duck shooters must not be allowed to continue to shoot native waterbirds. The only option is for the Government to cancel the season. If not, concerned members of the public will again be out on the State's wetlands to help rescue wounded waterbirds,' said Craig.

The GMA has stated that the Blue-winged Shoveler and Hardhead may not be hunted across Victoria as both species were recently listed as threatened due to declining populations.

The arrangements for the 2022 duck season are based on analysis and modelling of habitat and waterbird abundance surveys conducted across eastern Australia, and other data relating to game

duck abundance, habitat distribution and climate.

According to the GMA, the full-length season was recommended based on harvest modelling by two experts in waterfowl ecology and population dynamics, Professors Klaassen and Kingsford. They advised that reducing the bag limit is a more effective way to reduce the overall harvest of game ducks rather than reducing season length.

As in previous years, the GMA will continue to monitor conditions in the lead up to and during the season. Where warranted, wetlands may be closed to hunting, or hunting may be further regulated to protect concentrations of rare or threatened species.

State Member for Bendigo, Maree Edwards told the Times that she has read the GMA's release regarding the decision to open duck hunting this year and feels it is imperative that the Government takes significant advice from the GMA.

"I understand this is a very emotive issue for both those who are opposed and those who participate in duck shooting," said MP Edwards. "The Government doesn't make these decisions lightly.

"I think the restriction to four bags and prohibiting certain birds are significant."

"Duck shooters need to be aware that there will be punishment and consequences if they do the wrong things; entering private property and consuming alcohol and drugs. This will be enforced

New rules for cats and dogs

PET owners in Mount Alexander Shire are advised that new changes regarding dog and cat controls are on the way following the Council meeting on Tuesday 15 February.

Councillors voted to confine cats securely to their owner's premises between the hours of sunset to sunrise and to prohibit dogs from the playing surfaces of sporting ovals in the shire.

"These changes will help guide and support pet owners' management of their pets so they can live in harmony with nature and our wider community," said Mount Alexander Shire Mayor, Councillor Bill Maltby.

The amendments to the shire's animal management laws are effective from 24 February 2022, however Council is advising pet owners that there will be a grace period to allow the new rules to become normal practice.

"We understand that pet owners will need time to adjust to this, and I'd like to assure the community that we won't actively be enforcing the changes immediately."

"We are looking forward to working together with our community on the gradual implementation of this, making sure there are plenty of opportunities for pet-owners to access free information to help them adapt their behaviour.'

Other animal controls adopted by Council include the requirement for all dogs to be on-leash when being exercised on the streets and roads in the townships of Castlemaine, Maldon, Chewton, and Campbells Creek.

Dogs can currently be exercised at the recently constructed off-leash dog park at Wesley Hill Recreation

In the coming months, Council will provide educational resources to the community to enable residents to learn how to safely and cheaply provide confinement for their cats.

OOPS - Council says sorry about **'OVERSIGHT'!**

The unexpected demolition and earthworks at the netball court a couple of weeks ago prompted me to ring Council. I was told new player/coach boxes were being installed on the football oval and netball court. On hearing this, I immediately sent Council an email requesting they carefully consider the building design and materials for these new player/coach boxes. I believe this is essential, as the reserve is surrounded by Victorian Heritage Registered buildings (State School, Market House/Museum and the Court House right beside the oval) and that all the adjacent streets have Heritage Overlays and nearby surrounds have Significant Landscape Overlays. The historical importance of Maldon is widely recognised, as evidenced by the recent funding and investment by Government and Council in the Streetscape Project, for example, the recent underground lighting. It, therefore, seems to me common sense that the design of any structure on the reserve should make every effort to comply with the Maldon Design Guidelines.

But no, too late for that! On Friday, Council emailed me stating that, 'With regards to your request to reconsider materials, your email was received after the contractors had commenced works and the materials had already been ordered and delivered. We, therefore, would not have been in a position to change the materials at this late stage'.

And why didn't we know about this? It was an 'oversight'! Council simply 'forgot' to tell the community what was going on - 'With regards to informing the community of the works, I apologise for consultation not being undertaken prior to works commencing on site - this was an oversight.


Maldon was supported by Walmer, Victoria Police was also in attendance and are investigating the cause. Maldon units

The Jenkins family celebrated their 74th family reunion at the Castlemaine Botanical Gardens last Sunday. The family scroll created by Ray Maxfield in the 1960s measures 25 metres and is proudly displayed on the grass as new babies are added to the historical document.

The first reunion took place in 1948 at the Melbourne Botanical Gardens and now alternates between Geelong and Castlemaine.

Jenny Rule, who has been organising the event for the past 30 years, said, "It's easy to organise; we have a Facebook

page that we share the information on. I love it."

The family historian, Paul Rule, a wealth of information, told the Times the story of how the welsh miners came to reside in the area.

James and Elizabeth Jenkins immigrated to Australia in 1851. They travelled on an immigrant charter, the Omega, for 1051 days with their two-year-old Thomas James and one-year-old Nicholas John. They first worked in the copper mines in South Australia before walking to Victoria with all their belongings in a wheelbarrow to look for gold.

The family moved around Forrest Creek, Bendigo, Campbells Creek, Daisy Hill, Creswick, Maryborough and Avoca before settling on the Loddon River at Joyces Creek

in 1857. Here they stayed for the next 70 years until James died in 1900 and Elizabeth in 1912. Their graves are the first on the right in the Maldon Cemetery, along with their

son Nicholas John and their four babies; Elizabeth 1853-1854, William 1854-1858, Joseph 1856-1858 and Mark 1858-1821.

with shopkeepers and through regular updates in the Tarrangower Times.

'We are hoping to have all works to the footpaths, crossovers, culverts and roads

completed mid-year. The works to shopfronts may take longer as those are being completed by the owners themselves."

Senior Project Manager Jeff Jackson told the Times that the current work being undertaken involves replacing and restoring the culverts on High Street from Fountain Street to Spring Street.

'We are using the original stone from Mount Tarrengower to restore the culverts. We will then replace the footpaths, timber crossings, and the last stage will be repairing the road. The issues relating to the crossovers have been resolved with the steering committee, and the new design will be available to view shortly."

Work on the footpaths is due to commence in the next few weeks. Council is trying to ensure minimum disruption to the town by ensuring contractors finish works on Friday afternoons and commence on Monday mornings. There is a focus on cleaning up and ensuring the street is safe and accessible to locals and tourists. Works will be suspended over the Easter weekend.

The final stage of the Streetscape Revitalisation project will be the upgrades to shopfronts, with 16 applications currently being reviewed by Council. The funding for this project is limited, and there will be no new applications permitted. The funding criteria require the owners to pay 50% of the cost. Owners are able to utilise their own contractors with support from Council in applying for permits, access to contractors and material supply, which has been particularly difficult due to COVID.

Member for Bendigo West Maree Edwards told the Times, "I'd like to thank the residents for their patience. The significant infrastructure work being undertaken has been necessary and will benefit the community well into the future.

'The \$4.5 million has been well spent, and I would like to thank the shire and contractors for trying to minimise the impacts on the town."

Really! In this day and age, when the shelters are funded by Government and Council money? An 'oversight' such as this seems to me astonishing.

Given this oversight, I have little confidence that 'Council officers will work with the club and the committee to ensure that community engagement is undertaken on all works at the reserve going forward'. I wonder what Council actually means by 'consultation' and 'engagement'.

In last week's paper, our local representative on Council

states that he is 'supportive of and aims to continuously improve these facilities for those who use it'. Mr Gardner notes that the 'the netballers have had no facilities and substandard courts'. From that, I understand that a new or improved court will be constructed. I hope the community knows about that plan and also what is planned for 'hopefully new female change room/facilities'.

I agree with Mr Gardner that sporting facilities are important to Maldon's community. But I also believe it is essential that Council undertakes informed and easily accessible community consultation and that, most importantly, that any upgrades be respectful of the heritage values of the surrounds and Maldon's historical importance.

It is an anomaly that this reserve is not covered by a Heritage Overlay. Regardless of that, I consider it the responsibility of Council and the MFNC to ensure that any project undertaken respects the heritage-listed surrounds. Corrugated sheds were demolished. Council states that the 'previous shelters, which as you are aware were corrugated iron – a material that was likely to have been chosen based on cost rather than heritage values'. That is, in fact, incorrect. Corrugated iron is definitely a heritage element characteristic to Maldon, plus it is noted as a preferred material for walls and roofs of outbuildings and new builds in the Maldon Design Guidelines. Furthermore, the guidelines state that materials should complement materials used in the immediate area. The newly constructed sheds blatantly flout these guidelines.

Council should ensure that all upgrades to the Bill Woodfull Reserve recreation area are respectful and well-considered so they do not detract from the reserve's unique position in such a magnificent heritage site and instead contribute to the preservation and conservation of Maldon.

MAKARRATA - Australia's way forward





Makarrata = 'coming together after a struggle, facing the facts of wrongs and living again in peace'.

The Statement from the Heart generously offered to all Australians in 2017 contains these words:

'Our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander tribes were the first sovereign nations of the Australian continent and its adjacent islands, and possessed it under our own laws and customs'.

The Statement calls for VOICE to Parliament, TREATY with Government, and TRUTH about their sufferings. MAKARRATA would be 'the culmination of our agenda; the coming together after a struggle... We seek a Makarrata Commission to

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supervise a process of agreement-making between governments and First Nations, and truth-telling about our

history.' The Yolgnu people of Arnhem Land have used the principles of Makarrata for centuries.

Firstly, the disputing parties are brought together. Each party, led by their elders, must speak carefully and calmly about the dispute. They must put the facts on the table and air their grievances.

If a person speaks out of turn or recklessly, he or she is sent away and is not included any further in the process.

The leaders must always seek a full understanding of both parties' sides; what lies behind the grievance, who is



responsible, what each party wants.

Once resolved, the dispute is settled forever, as if it never existed.

The process of Makarrata has already begun, because the Uluru Statement tells the truth of the position of the aggrieved party. It is a call to the leaders of the Second Nation of Australians to come forward and meet.

A rather different gathering began outside the political centre of Australia on 26 January 1972, an election year. Protesting about the government's adamant refusal to acknowledge Indigenous land rights and native title, four young Aboriginal men travelled to Canberra, put up a beach umbrella on the lawns of Parliament House, with a sign saying, 'Aboriginal Embassy'.

During the following weeks, many First Nations people joined the four activists, erecting tents and making clear they wanted the return of land.

A five-point plan for land rights was presented to Parliament on 5 February 1972. When Labor came to power that December, some of these demands were met. Many were eroded during subsequent changes of government.


Surely IT'S TIME for a Makarrata Commission or Tribunal that would enquire into the historical circumstances in a process of truth-telling, supervise and facilitate a process of agreement-making, and oversee the implementation of the agreements made.

Nalderun Education Aboriginal Corporation is a service that supports the Aboriginal Community, led by Aboriginal people. Many people and organisations in the Mount Alexander Shire contribute to Nalderun; the name is a Dja Dja Wurrung word meaning 'all together'.

by GMA members on the ground, as well as local police.

"I encourage communities to contact their local member of parliament if they have concerns," said MP Edwards.

Regional Victorians Opposed to Duck Shooting inc (RVOTDS) say the announcement to open the 2022 duck shooting season being made on Saturday seems a 'pretty

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Know Your Local - Julie Hough



Julie Hough is a volunteer at the Maldon Machinery Museum.

"I had a fantastic rural upbringing on a sheep farm in Fryerstown. As teenagers, we used to ride to Castlemaine for Pony Club, a one and half/ two-hour ride. The horses were pretty tired by the time we got home.

"It was all hands on deck for my two sisters, brother and me. I used to love shearing time.

"My dad, at the age of 96, is still running the farm today!"

Julie went on to study nursing in Castlemaine and worked at the Queen Victoria Hospital in Melbourne and in Newcastle for a short time.

In 1977 Julie went around Australia for 12 months, armed with a little Olympus camera.

"During my travels, I was given a book called *The Great Outdoors*, written by Jeff Carter. In the back, there was a small section on photography. I used to read it every night. That was my initial inspiration.

"In Perth I bought my first SLR, a second-hand Olympus OM1, that cost \$100. That was the start of my photographic journey.

"Back then, there was still film, so I used to write my camera settings in a notebook. I'd take my film to the chemist to get developed and then check what worked and what didn't until I got a result I was happy with"

On her return home, a friend offered Julie the use of her darkroom, which furthered her love of the art.

"Then I started having children. I bought another Olympus and a whole swag of lenses. I would take photos of my babies and children as they grew, while still working casually as a nurse.

"Photography was still a hobby, but I wanted to take it further. I really wanted to be a photojournalist. I love storytelling, taking an everyday person who has had extraordinary experiences and telling their story with photos."

In 2006 Julie went to University as a mature aged student to study her Bachelor of Visual

Arts with comparative studies in Photo Journalism.

"I was overwhelmed at first; it had been a long time since I'd been at school, but I thought, 'its a great opportunity, just go with it'. I worked really hard and actually did really well. I even did my honours year- it was a fantastic time in my life.

"During the start of my second year, a job came up for a photographer at the *Bendigo Advertiser*, which was pretty rare. It was difficult because

of my studies, but in the end, I job-shared and worked weekends. I worked every weekend for seven years.

"I left in 2015 when there were massive job cuts in the sector; it was a very challenging time for everyone."

Amongst her many professional accomplishments, Julie worked with the Nuggetty Landcare Group to visually record aspects of contemporary life as it is today in the Nuggetty area. The Nuggetty Landcare

Group project incorporated an oral history; recording the social, farming and landscape history of the Nuggetty area and resulted in a calendar with Julie's photographs.

Julie also spent 10 years photographing and documenting the Fryerstown Antique Fair which has been made into a book called *A Fair Trade*

(available at The Book Wolf and Stonemans).


"It's a good social record of that time in history.

"I've also been working on a landscape series for the past 14 years. It's the same photo of Mount Tarrengower, taken from my backyard, exploring how light falls, through different seasons, at different times of day and in varying weather conditions. I call it a 'landscape in my pocket'. If I'm inside looking at the view and see a certain light, I'll go running out (I've been known to run out in my PJs, or in winter, I'll throw on a coat. I'm usually in my thongs). The light can change within one or two minutes, it's so fleeting."

Julie is also an active member of the Walmer Fire Brigade and the Machinery Museum. She is fortunate to have her three children and four grandchildren living in Castlemaine and Axedale and 'Mamma Julz', as she is known, is available to help out when needed.

I asked Julie what advice she would give to budding photographers, particularly as she has run a class for beginners at the Mill in Castlemaine.

"Its not so much the device, but training the eye to see; look behind and above, and not have tunnel vision. Get down on the ground, shoot from different levels. Experiment and keep trying to read the light. The camera is just a lightbox, it needs to be taught how to see what you're looking at through the viewfinder."

Childcare gastro on the rise

VIRAL gastroenteritis is on the rise in Victorian early childhood education and care services, and good old-fashioned handwashing with soap and water is still our best defence against the bug.

Youngsters mix and congregate closely with other children and adults in care settings, and readily pass these bugs on to others and bring them home to family members.

Victoria's Chief Health Officer, Professor Brett Sutton said childcare workers, children and their families all had a role to play in limiting the spread of the virus.

Children needed to be taught and reminded of the need for handwashing, and families needed to keep their kiddies home from early childhood services until 48 hours after they recover.

"Gastroenteritis can spread quickly through settings such as early childhood education and care services, where children play and interact closely with each other and their carers and can readily spread their bugs," Professor Sutton said.

"With the COVID-19 pandemic, disinfecting hands with alcohol-based hand rubs has become routine, but these are less effective for gastro

"Handwashing with soap and water is still the best personal hygiene method to minimise the chance of spreading the virus."

At the start of 2021, after a COVID lockdown was eased, 389 outbreaks were detected in childcare settings up to the end of April – four times higher than the average for that time of year.

Viral gastroenteritis is highly infectious. Symptoms include nausea, vomiting, diarrhoea, fever, abdominal pain, headache and muscle aches. They can take up to three days to develop and usually last between one or two days, sometimes longer. In rare cases it can develop into much more serious illness.

Infants or children in early childhood services or schools, as well as staff who develop vomiting or diarrhoea should stay at home for at least 48 hours after their symptoms

have stopped. If symptoms are severe or they persist, people should see a GP for advice and testing.

Anyone recovering from gastroenteritis should avoid visiting hospitals, early childhood services and aged care facilities to avoid spreading the infection to those most vulnerable.



Prehistoric Times

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
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


