Hearing for all

WORLD Hearing Day 2021 (Wednesday 3 March) marked the launch of the World Report on Hearing, presenting a global call for action to address hearing loss and ear diseases across the life course.

The theme of the World Hearing Day was 'Hearing care for ALL! Screen. Rehabilitate. Communicate'.

The key messages of World Hearing Day 2021 are:

- Good hearing and communication are important at all stages of life;
- Hearing loss (and related ear diseases) can be avoided through preventative actions such as: protection against loud sounds; good ear care practices and immunisation;
- Hearing loss (and related ear diseases) can be

addressed when it is identified in a timely manner and appropriate care sought;

- People at risk of hearing loss should check their hearing regularly; and
- People having hearing loss (or related ear diseases) should seek care from a health care provider.

Castlemaine resident Carol McDonough wrote to the *TT* after attending the first session of a new acting course at the Maldon Neighbourhood Centre last Sunday only to encounter hearing problems once she was inside the hall.

A Sit-in to show 'solidarity with survivors of sexual violence'

AN invitation has been issued to all women from Castlemaine and surrounding towns to gather together on Dja Dja Wurrung country for International Women's Day on Sunday 7 March.

The gathering will be at Victory Park, Castlemaine at 2.30pm.

"This is a grassroots event, organised by local women for local women and girls. The idea is very simple - a Sit-In, in Victory Park, in

solidarity with survivors of sexual violence," said one of the organisers, Marion Yates. "This is an event centring all women and girls. This is about creating something positive - an opportunity for women to hold space together in public.

"This is a rare and unique thing. A joyful, connective thing. And potentially deeply healing thing. Many women may never have experienced this in their lives."

A COVID-safe plan will

be in place.

The event will be live-streamed for people unable to attend, or for those who may wish to gather in small groups elsewhere and watch.

"We will give a collective nod to the significance of the worldwide #MeToo movement, in creating a powerful cultural touch stone for women to support each other in naming their experiences, exposing and holding perpetrators to account, and shining a light on endemic cultures and environments where sexual violence towards women is enabled and hidden," Ms Yates said.

This is an inclusive, grassroots community event.

Aboriginal and Torres Straight Islander women, women of colour, women with disabilities, and LGBTIQ women are warmly encouraged to attend. Boys under 13 years with female carer welcome.

Background support from men is welcomed, as is the heart-felt intention to listen and learn.

"They are paving the way for other community groups and organisations to promote sustainable energy."

The solar panels were installed in mid-February by Central Sparks Victoria's Matt Wilson of Castlemaine.

"There were quite a few (Council) requirements we had to adhere to because of Maldon's heritage and basically it's important not to be able to see the panels (from the street)," Mr Wilson said.

It was an interesting return visit to the Centre for Mr Wilson this week - he revealed that he went to

playgroup in the hall when he was toddler.

"I've still got a certificate at home saying I won second prize in the gardening competition for the biggest zucchini," he laughed.

Maldon Neighbourhood Centre Coordinator Amy Atkinson said, "We are very grateful for the Federal Government support for our application for additional solar panels on the Centre.

"It means we can keep our energy costs down and do more in our community."

Ms Chesters said the next step will be for her to join

forces with (State) Bendigo West MP Maree Edwards and engage with Powercor to work out how more people can connect to the grid.

"People in Maldon want to put solar on but they're being told they can't," Ms Chesters said. "We need to talk to Powercor to change that."

Energy Efficient Communities Program provides community groups with grants up to \$12,500 for energy efficient equipment energy generation and storage systems, and energy audits.

Campdraft is on this weekend!

MORE than 150 competitors and their families are coming to Maldon this weekend for the annual Maldon and District Campdraft.

The Campdraft will be held on Saturday and Sunday, 6 and 7 February, at the Maldon Racecourse Reserve in Lewis Road, Maldon from 7am on both days.

The event is expected to run into the evening on Saturday and will wrap up between 4pm and 5pm on Sunday.

Maldon and District Campdraft Secretary Rachel Wallis said there will be nine events over the weekend and a range of ages will be competing.

"Youngsters can start Campdraft at the age of eight and we also have people in their 70s competing," Rachel said.

"They come from as far as South Australia and New South Wales as well as from all over Victoria."

Spectators are welcome - food and drinks will be available on both days and there will be several small

stalls selling clothing and horse gear. Admission to the event is free.

"It's such a great family event," Rachel said. "People can camp overnight if they want to."

She explained that Campdraft involves a horse rider entering a gated yard where he/she selects a cow,

separates it from the herd, yells 'Gate!', which opens the gate to the arena and then has 40 seconds to steer the cow around a figure eight and then back through the gate into the yard.

"The rider is marked on horsemanship; they don't touch the cattle at all. It's based on skills used on (cattle) stations and farms for many years."

"We only ever use a cow once and we use about 800 cows over the weekend."

Remarkably the 2020 Maldon and District Campdraft was the last draft before COVID-19 hit and this year's event is the first one back.

Naturally, a COVID Safe plan will be in place on the weekend and everyone needs to abide by the COVID guidelines which includes scanning the QR code when you enter the grounds.

Historic ice van gets a makeover

different liveries (branding) were used for box vans and the VGR chose to use the William Angliss livery because it is well known as a hospital and a school.

As he showed the *TT* inside the van, Fletcher said, "These vans held up to 2.5 tons of salted ice – salt extended the life of the ice and it lasted for a couple of weeks."

"The vans would travel as far as Mildura and right across the state including to Melbourne."

Remarkably, the van is insulated with thick and heavy cow hair.

"You could have a hot day of over 40 degrees up here and at the end of the day you can come in here and it's cold."

The restored van will

now be used for the VGR's driver experience and special trains.

As the interview comes to an end, the young man sits and looks at the van parked at Maldon Railway Station.

"You know, this is the only operational refrigerated van left out of a couple of hundred that were built back in the early 1900s. This was the start of refrigeration – it's pretty special."

Fletcher has been a volunteer with the VGR for seven-and-a-half years, starting when he was 14.

He said the VGR's Young Volunteers Group currently has about 20 members, after starting in 2016 with just four.

A labour of love has given new life to a run-down, 1911 Victorian Railways (ice) box van that has sat idle at Castlemaine Railway for nearly 30 years. A fleet of box vans (known as T vans) were developed in 1881 to transport milk, butter, meat and other products that needed to be kept cold, across the state.

The Victorian Goldfields Railway (VGR) recently undertook the huge challenge of restoring the old T van that was parked at Castlemaine, right here in Maldon.

VGR's Leader of the Young Volunteers, Fletcher Cole, said the 110-year-old refrigerated van was in a pretty sad state when they started the project.

"We got it off Victorian Railways in the '90s and it sat at Castlemaine as a storage van until the start of 2020," Fletcher said.

"Basically, we never touched it until a private individual donated \$10,000 to do it up.

"About 10 of us worked on the project at different times and it took us about six months (to completely restore it). First, we lifted the van off its wheels so we could give it a mechanical overhaul.

"Then we re-timbered and re-roofed it and after that we did the sign writing," Fletcher said three

Gibson played in three consecutive Premiership sides with Hawthorn (2013-15), winning the Peter Crimmins Medal (Hawthorn B&F) in 2013 and 2015.

He retired at the end of 2017 and is still regarded as one of the best defenders of his generation.

After their training session with Gibson, the kids enjoyed a free sausage sizzle courtesy of the club.



Vale Jane Elizabeth Mitchell (1955-2021)



THE sudden and unexpected death of well-known local Jane Mitchell came as a great shock to many in the greater Maldon area whose lives have been touched by her. She was a truly inspirational woman.

Although Jane spent most of her adult life in this area, she was not 'born a country girl'.

The daughter of Lorna and Albert (Bert) Mitchell, and with brothers David and Tim, Jane grew up in Cheltenham, where from an early age the passions that later informed her rich life had their beginnings.

She is remembered by longstanding school friends for her curiosity; she loved to explore the natural world and was drawn to history, leading her companions

on 'jolly jaunts' - come rain, hail or shine - around local market gardens and cemeteries.

Described as 'born wise', Jane loved older people and related well to them, regularly visiting elderly relations to hear their stories or bring an element of light into their lives.

Her out-going and confident personality, made her a natural fit in school drama and debating groups, and it is no surprise that her caring nature saw her go on to study nursing.

Jane was a devoted mother; she adored her three children - Mitch, Tusker and Clara. Mitch was born in 1978 in Alphington before Jane and her partner, Vince Jacobs, moved to Maldon.

They purchased a house

with a mutual friend Steve Nicol, a blacksmith, and his partner Alicia.

It was through Steve that Jane met Oz Patterson, who first became a friend and some years later her partner.

Jane had the creativity and ability to make wherever she lived into a comfortable and welcoming home. This was so when in 1980 she brought herself some land on the outskirts of Maldon and with the help of Oz and other friends, moved a disused railway carriage onto the block, turning it into a cosy dwelling, and creating her first garden. She loved her gardens.

In November 1983, Jane and Oz welcomed their son Tusker and the family moved into what was then a small two-bedroom fibro house at the end of Browns Road in the Nuggetys.

Set in the middle of two acres of dry and dusty land, there were plenty of weeds, but it had great potential and endless views to the north, plus the legacy of bountiful fruit trees, established in rich pockets of soil and a wonderful spring. In August 1986 Jane and Oz's daughter Clara was born.

Jane's deeply embedded love for this fragile country and its flora and fauna blossomed in these years.

In her oral history, recorded for the Nuggety History Project, she summed this up saying: 'If you walk with bare feet on the ground it seeps into you. It becomes part of you.'

In 1988, Jane returned to nursing and then again in the mid-1990s to study, to become a welfare worker.

On completion, she worked for 10 years for Bendigo Health at the Anne Caudle Centre in the Rehabilitation Department before moving to be a Case Manager, first based in Inglewood, then in Maryborough.

Jane left this work in 2000 to become her mother's full-time carer. She regarded this as an absolute privilege and during this time she rediscovered her latent passion for family history.

Love for and support of her family was always paramount for Jane. She was the connector. She adored her grandchildren Elena and Eli; she was a significant presence in and influence on the lives of her niece Tab and nephew Oskar and a great supporter of brothers David and Tim and their partners.

Jane's final home was purchased in 2016 in Shelbourne, just around the

corner from 'Tuss' and his wife Kerri, with a wrap-around verandah for optimal sunset viewing.

Jane transformed a rundown house in a dry paddock into an oasis, where all were welcome and the tea (or wine) and freshly baked cake or scones, with her jam, were always readily available. Jane was a deep, reflective thinker and a wonderful amateur historian.

In her retirement, she revelled in the opportunity to develop her passions for natural, family and local history, as well as her passion for the environment.

She was a great believer in the power of community participation; she sought to and did make a significant difference in her local community. She was persuasive and managed to instil her enthusiasm into those around her.

Jane's contribution to the Nuggety Land Protection Group was enormous. She was the group's treasurer, applied for numerous grants, was a willing participant/organiser of the group's involvement in Australia Day, the Maldon Show, ANZAC Day and more.

It was Jane who spearheaded the Nuggety

History Project. She was pivotal to its success and she embraced the many unexpected ways in which it took on a life of its own.

The project will be a lasting legacy to Jane's foresight, drive, commitment and respect - for people, those who settled the Nuggety area and those who continue to farm it and/or act as custodians of it.

In her short time in Shelbourne, Jane achieved a standing in the community that would take most people a lifetime. Not only did she become friends with many of her neighbours, she also started a weekly playgroup for all the local children, extended the Nuggety Land Protection Group to include Shelbourne, took on monitoring the local endangered bird life, organised community trail walks and started work on preserving the history of the local railway.

Jane was honourable. Her counsel was considered and her advice strong. Her friends and family describe her as a 'lighthouse and a steady force in my world'. Jane will be sorely missed by her family, her many friends and the many community groups she served.



Our Environment & Sustainability

TARRANGOWER TOMORROW

RESULTS from the Tarrangower Tomorrow community survey have been published in the TT over the past two weeks.

This week we are providing more details on the survey topic area, Our Local Economy.

During the consultation sessions, the Tarrangower community suggested a number of activities on this topic. Twelve of these were included in the survey.

In the survey, people were asked to rate each proposed activity in terms of its importance to the Tarrangower Community.

In each topic the activity with the highest average rating was seen as the most important, the second highest as the next most important and so on.

The activities in Our Local Economy are shown below in the order in which they were rated from most important to least important:

1. Promote 'buy local' so that essential retail services are not lost.
2. Strengthen links between farmers and town residents to increase community cohesion

and support during hard times.

3. Retain planning provisions that prevent the sub-division of farms.
4. Bendigo Regional Tourism, Council's Tourism Officer and Maldon Inc to work together to improve visitation across the four seasons.
5. Increase the reach and service of the Visitor Centre in Maldon e.g. '10 things to do in Maldon'.
6. Attract digital businesses to Maldon to reduce commuting and encourage local employment.
7. Conduct exit interviews with closing businesses.
8. Encourage collaboration between event organisers, and consider an Events Officer in Maldon.
9. A mentoring scheme for businesses.
10. Build an electric vehicle charging station.
11. Consider a 'Welcome Pack' for potential new businesses.
12. Explore options for free WiFi in Maldon town

centre.

Over the next weeks the other results will be published in the TT. The committee will also start to develop the new Tarrangower Tomorrow Community Plan.

This will involve working with community groups and interested individuals, to see how the activities of most importance to the community, can be achieved. If you are interested in assisting with this task, please email tarrangowertomorrow@gmail.com.

Mah Jong at Maldon Neighbourhood Centre



IT'S not clear when the Chinese game of mah jong was first played.

One legend is that it was invented by the philosopher Confucius, which would date it around 500BC.

Whether the legend is true or not, the game was certainly being played in China in the mid-1800s.

There are many variations to the game of mah jong played across the world.

Unlike other games, there is no international body governing the rules, but a generalisation can be made. When the game was introduced to America in the early 1900s additional rules were introduced. So, today

mah jong can be played according to the Western way or the Chinese way.

Mah jong is played with beautifully decorated tiles, making it a very tactile game.

These tiles comprise three sets called Bamboo, Circles and Characters. In addition there are Winds, Dragons, Flowers and Seasons. Being Chinese, the tile decorations are full of symbolism.

Superstition also plays an important role in mah jong.

In China, before the game begins, the four players will decide who has the first choice of seating position round the table. A good seating position brings good

luck.

VISITORS to Barkers Creek Reservoir near Harcourt will be able use new toilet facilities that were completed last week.

Coliban Water Managing Director Damian Wells said the new toilet block will benefit locals, visitors and recreational users of the reservoir, thanks to funding

from the State Government.

building. In fact, while I was talking to Kareen, a man came in and said, 'I've come to say a prayer'.

Kareen and Jeff plan to hold eight-week exhibitions, which are a lot longer than in the past, to give people time to get here in COVID normal times.

In addition, Kareen has turned her professional abilities towards writing arts appreciation. Hence her new book about David Moore, which has been edited by local professional editor (and painter) Melanie Scaife.

In 2021 there will be seated floor talks, and evening talks, involving paying customers. In the past most of this has been 'free', so it is a big perception shift. The floor talks are scattered throughout March and April. Some are scheduled during the Castlemaine State Festival, two nights with wine and canapés from the *Blackbird Café*, and two daytime talks, with afternoon tea.

David Moore is an Australian painter living and working in Castlemaine. Still life and landscape are his preferred subjects, and his chosen medium is oil paint on linen or cedar wood panel, and gouache on paper.

David has been painting since he was 11 years old. As a child, he would sit alongside his father's easel at their home in Croydon, Melbourne, and be instructed in the painting techniques of tonal realism.

In 1970, David was awarded the Alice M. E. Bale scholarship, which afforded him a studio and use of a house, with a few bills paid. He was assigned two painting mentors, Sir

William Dargie CBE and Harley Griffiths. The latter, his preferred mentor, was chief restorer at the National Gallery of Victoria. He took David behind the scenes to see *The Banquet of Cleopatra*, the enormous 18th century Giovanni Battista Tiepolo painting, as it was being restored. For David, it was an exciting glimpse of art history being made and preserved, and reinforced for the aspiring painter the realisation that some people value painting highly indeed!

Kareen attended classes for about a year in his *Song to the Moon* studio in Elphinstone, to learn more about tonal painting and hear his endless stream of amazing stories.

To quote him, 'A painting cannot relay emotion if no emotion is felt during the work. I believe that the real effect and feeling aroused by a subject can only be understood and communicated when the artist relates directly to the subject matter.'

The preview is from 5 - 7pm, Saturday 6 March, 2021. Peter Perry, Fine Art Valuer and Assessor will officially open the exhibition.

David Moore - Painter, the new book by Kareen Anchen will be launched at the preview. The book is full of great images of his deceptively understated tonal work, with descriptions and stories, which capture his thoughts and ideas.



A new look for old carpark?

THE old Frederick Street carpark in the heart of Castlemaine could get a new lease on life as an outdoor eating and entertainment area.

The site, which is privately owned, is on the corner of Frederick and Lyttleton streets.

A Mount Alexander Shire Council spokesperson told the *TT* that Council is currently working with the landowner to temporarily activate the site as part of the State Government's outdoor eating and entertainment program.

"This program provides funding to increase dining and public programming

options in response to the impacts of COVID-19," the spokesperson said.

The site ceased to be used as a carpark back in 2015 after Council consulted with business owners and operators regarding parking availability in the Castlemaine CBD.

"Council evaluated the financial implications of continuing to lease the Frederick Street carpark, along with further details provided in the parking report, and resolved not to renew the lease of the Frederick Street carpark at its Ordinary Council Meeting on 8 December 2015."





Due to the Maldon power outage next Thursday, 4 March, there will not be any Bridge.



BLAST FROM THE PAST

THE BURIED VERANDAH POST

RECENTLY, during the Streetscape Project, two pieces of a broken cast iron verandah post were found buried 50cm below ground in front of the Book Wolf in High Street.

The post seems to be similar to those that support the verandahs at Much Ado and the Maldon Hotel. The question is where did the post come from? The following is a possible answer.

In 1895, plumber John Joseph Matthews erected a two-storey brick building on the site now occupied by the Maldon Take Away. He ran his plumbing business from the ground floor while he and his family lived upstairs. Matthews' building was built two years before the Goldsmith Building that now includes Much Ado.

Matthews' building was regarded as one of the best in Maldon with a large balcony and ornate cast

iron lacework. The balcony, which looked out on Bank Corner, was sometimes used by the Brass Band to give public concerts.

In July 1920 Matthews announced that he intended to dismantle his Main Street shop and residence. He had brought land in Ouyen and he proposed to transform his Maldon premises into two shops there. He expected to be able to lease each of these shops at rents of up to two pounds a week.

The buried post was found just 30 metres from the site of the building Matthews demolished in 1920. Is it possible that one of the buildings verandah posts was broken during demolition and that it and perhaps other rubble was used to fill a nearby hole on the roadside?





Farm safety for everyone

THE State Minister for Agriculture Mary-Anne Thomas has announced a new \$3 million Farm Safety Rebate Scheme, which will provide a rebate of up to \$5000 per farm for infrastructure and equipment to address health and safety risks on farms.

The scheme recognises that those at risk of injury or death on Victorian farms are not just farmers, but also families, employees, suppliers and contractors.

"Farms are workplaces but they're also homes - we want to make sure that everyone who steps onto a farm gets

to return home safely," Ms Thomas said.

Some examples of equipment and infrastructure that are eligible for the rebate include child safety fencing, animal handling equipment, dedicated chemical storage sheds and wash stations, emergency shut off switches and reversing cameras for tractors and vehicles.

The Farm Safety Rebate Scheme will close on 31 December 2021 or when all funds are allocated. For more information or to apply for a rebate, visit the Rural Finance website or call 1800 260 425.
