VGR applies to extend station platform



HERITAGE Victoria is advertising an application to extend the length of the platform at Maldon Railway Station. The application is summarised as "construction works for a 42m long by 8m wide eastern extension to the main southern platform at the Maldon Railway Station."

Victorian Goldfield Railways President Rob Lee says the proposed works will improve access and safety. "At the moment our platform only caters for four carriages. Because the train is so popular we run more carriages and we have two doors off the platform," he said, explaining that there was significant safety risk if anyone opened a door without a platform due to the long drop to the ground. Rob also explained that for people who need mobility support, the narrow internal doors on the trains are a challenge to navigate.

Extended trains can also help to cater to the increasing number of cyclists who travel along the

Castlemaine to Maldon rail trail and use the train to return. "With the bike path, we have people who ride by bicycle and if there's a group, we need the extra van to carry the bikes." The Castlemaine and Muckleford station platforms are already long enough to cater for the increased requirements.

The application includes details of the proposed bricks. "We would have to source bricks that are similar to the ones used in 1884," Rob said. "They don't want exact, close enough would be fine." The bluestone elements will be more challenging to acquire. "A disused station may have them," Rob said.

Submissions relating to the proposal are being gathered by Heritage Victoria until Tuesday 11 March. Rob encourages residents to be in touch with the VGR if they have any questions or concerns, saying: "We're part of the community, we don't want to make changes without consultation." Contact details can be found on the website at **vgr.com.au**. Details of the application, including civil en-

Rob believes an extended platform would be a positive step. "A longer train helps us bring more people to town and that's got to be a good thing." *Michelle Dorian*

Bridge works disruption ends soon



MAINTENANCE works on the historic railway bridge over the Midland Highway are scheduled to be completed by Monday 10 March, according to V/Line. The works, which are significant and involve heavy machinery and trucks, are forcing detours for drivers heading into Castlemaine and coach replacements for rail commuters.

President of the Victorian Goldfields Railway Rob Lee said that while services of the historic trains have also been affected, they will resume shortly and it will have been a worthwhile pause. "We haven't run trains since 21 Feb, but we should be able to start back on Friday with normal steam trains," he said. "It's definitely a good thing, because V/ Line have rebuilt our track with concrete sleepers, which is something we would have had to do."

V/Line crews will continue to carry out bridge maintenance and upgrade works on the Bendigo Line in Castlemaine until Monday 10 March.



Measles in Bendigo

Victoria's Chief Health Officer (CHO) has issued an alert after measles was confirmed in the Greater Bendigo area. It is the second of two cases of measles reported in Victoria in people that have not travelled overseas and have no known links to recent cases of measles. The CHO says it means that there is now local transmission of measles in the community. Exposure details for the Bendigo case include the morning of Wednesday 19 February at Lansell Square and the afternoon of Thursday 20 February at Epsom Village Plaza. Anyone at these sites during the specified dates should monitor for symptoms for 18 days after the last exposure and if symptoms develop, isolate and telephone a GP. Two doses of measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine are advised; anyone unsure if they have been vaccinated should contact a GP.

Measles is a highly infectious viral illness that can lead to uncommon but serious complications, such as pneumonia and brain inflammation.

Grants for Local Sports

Grants of up to \$5,000 are available for clubs to improve the skills and knowledge of volunteers, coaches and officials. Grants of up to \$4,000 are available to help clubs deliver new programs to the community. Clubs can also apply for grants of up to \$1,000 to purchase uniforms and equipment, while \$750 travel grants are also available to participate in competitions away from home. for McKenzie Hill



A new project was announced by the Federal Government and Mount Alexander Shire Council (MASC) last week to encourage opportunities for walking and cycling in Castlemaine. A 3.6km shared cycling and pedestrian pathway linking McKenzie Hill to Parker Street via the Castlemaine Railway Station is part of the 'Active Transport Program'.

MASC Mayor Rosie Annear said: "McKenzie Hill is a growth area in our shire, that currently doesn't have great linkages or connections to central places and services in Castlemaine."

McKenzie Hill is familiar to residents of Newstead and Maldon who use the Pyrenees Highway and Maldon Road to drive to Castlemaine. Projects funded as part of the Active Transport fund are expected to be physically and financially completed by 30 June 2029.



The Council is seeking feedback on the 2024-2025 outdoor pool season as it draws to a close. Council's four pools are located in Castlemaine, Harcourt,

Maldon and Newstead and are managed and operated by YMCA Victoria. Each year, pool visitors are asked to complete a customer satisfaction survey to identify areas that are working well and those that have room for improvement. Surveys are available at pool kiosks in Castlemaine, Harcourt, Maldon or Newstead pools or on the Shape Mount Alexander website. Feedback must be received by Monday 31 March. Newstead Open Studios art trail has been held annually since 2015, with artists opening their studios for visitors to observe their processes and perhaps even buy some gorgeous art.

State forest firewood collection available

Victorians are able to collect free firewood for personal use from designated state forest firewood collection areas from Saturday 1 March until Monday 30 June. Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA) Director Forest and Fire Operations Loddon Mallee, Scott Falconer, urged collectors to play it safe and check local weather conditions as well as their planned route before heading into the forest.

While firewood is free to collect, supply is not unlimited. Mr Falconer said people can collect up to two cubic metres per person per day with a maximum of 16 cubic metres per household per financial year. He encouraged people who rely on firewood for heating and cooking to plan for their needs early. To prioritise local communities' access to available firewood, collection from designated firewood areas in state forests in central and northern Victoria will be limited to residents of specific local shires and firewood collectors may be asked to prove their address when collecting firewood.

The Nationals' Member for Northern Victoria Gaelle Broad urged the State Government to guarantee firewood would be available for collection when the season opened. "With skyrocketing electricity prices, many people in regional Victoria rely on wood heating to stay warm over winter," Ms Broad said. "However, under the Allan Labor government, it appears as though the areas open for firewood collection get smaller and smaller each year."

Mr Falconer said: "Firewood needs at least 8-12 months

to cure and must be dry before use. We prioritise firewood availability for local communities and those who depend on firewood as their primary source of heating and cooking. This autumn, there is a reduced supply of domestic firewood available and fewer firewood collection areas will open."

VFF responds to levy

The Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) says changes to the Fire Services Levy (FSL) could see some farmers forced to pay untenable amounts. The State Government has announced that the FSL will be replaced by the Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund (ESVF) from Tuesday 1 July and says that the ESVF will be calculated based on a fixed charge that varies by property type, with a variable charge based on property value.

VFF President Brett Hosking said the new levy would place an enormous and unfair financial burden on those already struggling and farmers who are facing volatile prices, ever-decreasing profit margins and increasing extreme weather events. "A one-size-fits-all approach clearly doesn't work when you've got some farmers facing a hike of up to 400 per cent. There's no way a rise of that much can be justified and for some, it could be the nail in the coffin for their farm businesses," Mr Hosking said.

Mr Hosking stated that while levies to fund emergency services are critical, the ESVF is unfit for use and the Victorian Government must urgently consider an alternative. He said: "Instead of placing a blanket levy on all property owners, the government should consider a more targeted approach that ensures the funds are distributed where they're needed most.'

Extra train services for Bendigo Line

A new V/Line timetable was announced on Friday 28 February for passengers on some of Victoria's busiest regional train lines, including the line to our region. From 13 April, five new weekend services will be added to the Bendigo Line including late-night trains from Melbourne. Five popular weekend services on the Bendigo Line will also be expanded from three to six-carriage trains, meaning more capacity across the weekend for locals and visitors.

Black Forest Drive works complete

Works are now complete on a series of safety improvements on a section of Black Forest Drive between Woodend and Macedon, with new continuous bike lanes and intersection upgrades at key locations. Safety improvements include changing the lane configuration to one lane in each direction, installing dedicated cycling lanes in each direction and installing new

Protecting the right to protest



THERE was plenty of colour and movement in Bendigo last Thursday when protestors gathered outside Premier and Bendigo East MP Jacinta Allan's electoral office. They had assembled to send her a message regarding the proposed 'social cohesion' laws which are under State parliamentary consideration.

The protest was organised by the Central Victorian Climate Action group and consisted of a loose alliance of people from Bendigo, Castlemaine and Melbourne. Speakers included prominent activist Violet CoCo and Bendigo Greens candidate Avery Barnett-Dacey.

The new laws will ban wearing masks at demonstrations, restrict certain symbols and will prohibit tools such as locks, ropes and glue. Multicultural organisations will be asked to sign a 'social cohesion' pledge if they wish to receive government funding. The creation of 'safe zones' around religious buildings may exclude some areas of Melbourne's CBD from public assembly.

According to the protest organisers, the proposed legislation is a direct attack on democracy. While they claim it is aimed at

restricting pro-Palestine activism, they view it as a threat to other protest movements including anti-war campaigns, union marches, environmental action and First Nation demonstrations.

The *Times* spoke to Violet CoCo, who as an Extinction Rebellion activist has been arrested many times for acts of protest and is therefore no stranger to the justice system. She remains committed to protecting the right to protest.

"The police can be scary and violent and the court system can be unjust," Violet said. "Nobody wants to spend time in a jail cell when you could be with your family. But there are struggles in the world that are greater than our own lives. And disruptive protest works. It's a cornerstone of our democracy. I'll do whatever it takes.'

Was Jacinta Allan in her office? Who knows? All was quiet behind the closed doors. Apart from the odd heckler, most of those present were on the same page as the protestors. And this protest was a warm-up for the big one, which will be held at 5.30pm on Wednesday 19 March outside State Parliament.

AUTHOR Carmel Bird delighted a packed room of around 30 people on Monday 2 March, in an event hosted by the Maldon Athenaeum Library. She spoke about her writing processes and her inspirations, going back as far as her childhood.

She described how, after observing a tragedy when she was eight years old, "something stirred" and it became obvious that writing was her true purpose. Carmel said: "I couldn't do anything about it but I could do something with it." She talked about writing as a way of "delving into the meaning of things," even if it is not always possible to arrive at an answer. During the event, which was followed by

a convivial morning tea, Carmel read her elegantly illustrated children's book about a shy cat called *Arabella* and held a generous raffle to give away copies. The audience laughed at Carmel's portrayal of a dying cockroach (a grandmother and a matriarch!) and mourned with a protagonist who had lost her tightly wound mother many years before. Carmel Bird's short stories demonstrate wonderful imagination, empathy and humour.

It was clear that Carmel enjoys speaking and engaging with an audience; she named some of her favourite authors (Nabokov, Martin Amis) and asked about local writing groups. In fact Carmel admitted that she even came prepared to manage disruptions; when somebody coughed she said: "Have you got a cough lolly? Because I have! I carry Strepsils for the audience, just in case."

Carmel created a joyous and comfortable atmosphere and surely everyone who attended left feeling inspired to either read one of her books or try their hand at writing.


Launch of *Ride MaldON* booklet and picnic ride



Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund

Thank you for bringing the new Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund (ESVF) tax to readers' attention. The new tax will replace the current Fire Services Property Levy (FSPL).

The government's intention with this tax is to transfer core state budget costs onto ratepayers.

Whilst their marketing spin for the new tax seems very noble, if the state can't afford to fund the additional emergency services, then neither can we.

Victorians have been crushed by over 50 new and increased state charges over the last few years. Any unreasonable impost on rate payers will mean a further increase in the cost of living and hardship for many people.

The new tax is calculated using the Council rates mechanism of Capital Improved Value (CIV). Compared with the current FSPL and without so much as a blush, the new tax will see CIV component increase by 99% for residences and 199% for farmers. This is not a joke. Councils are concerned that the proposed large increase will limit any reasonable increase in rates and hence further reduce the effectiveness of Council services.

Last year my FSPL increased by 25% from the previous year. Many local members of the CFA I have spoken to question where all the current money is going. They're not seeing much. How about some transparency from Government and provide all Victorians with a full audit of where all the FSPL money went?

Country Victorians are suffering badly from the profligate spending of the current state government. Fancy level crossing overpasses (replaced with traffic lights underneath!), \$200bn for the ridiculous Suburban Rail Loop, eye-watering budget blowouts on almost all government projects, massive compensation payments to the East West link contractor and millions more to the Commonwealth Games Federation. And none of these projects are of any benefit to country Victorians. And sadly, Victoria is a laughing stock in Scotland, where posters thank us for funding their hosting of the 2026 games.

A community meeting is being held to discuss the impact of this massive tax grab, which affects all rate payers but is most severe on farmers. Local council election notices

The Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) is reminding those who did not vote in the October 2024 local council elections that the VEC is required to issue a fine of \$99 if a person fails to respond in writing within 28 days. Close to 530,000 Victorians failed to vote in the election have an opportunity to explain why and will have received an 'Apparent failure to vote notice.'

Electoral Commissioner Sven Bluemmel says the Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) is urging people who receive a notice to respond with a detailed explanation. "Completing and sending the notice back to us within the 28-day timeframe gives us a chance to consider your explanation and whether you can be excused," he said. Voting in local council elections is compulsory in Victoria if you were enrolled to vote.

Be prepared for snakes

Ambulance Victoria is reminding everyone to keep an eye out for snakes in all weather, after treating 129 suspected snakebites this summer. From 1 December 2024 to 18 February 2025, paramedics have responded to 28 incidents in Hume, 24 in Loddon Mallee, 16 in Barwon South West, 33 in Metro, 21 in Gippsland and seven in Grampians. Ambulance Victoria (AV) Director Emergency Management Dale Armstrong said of these cases, 125 people were transported to hospital. "With hot weather continuing, the snakes are out, which means we need to be vigilant," Dale said. "If someone is suspected to have suffered a snake bite, even if you're not sure, you should call Triple Zero (000) immediately."

Dale said there are some basic first aid steps people can take while waiting for an ambulance if they're with someone who suffers a bite, suggesting that a snake bite victim should remain still if possible, apply a pressure immobilisation bandage to the affected limb and if a victim is not breathing normally, CPR can commence. Wait with the patient until help arrives.

next exhibition at the Cascade Art Gallery at 2pm on Saturday 8 March. John Wolseley's exquisite prints of strange little creatures in their native habitat are delightful and very collectable. In lieu of meeting the artist himself, who has just returned from the Melbourne Art Fair, I dropped in during the hanging of the new exhibition to talk to Jeff Gardner, a printmaker of renown himself, who has been working with John over the past four years.

John Wolseley's recent body of work incorporates etchings of the Bettongs, Bilbies and Tree Creepers, exquisitely drawn copper plates by Wolseley. Studio assistant and printmaker, Kaitlyn Gibson proofs the plates at the *John Wolseley Whipstick Forest Studio and Print Workshop* and then the plates are passed onto printmaker, Jeff Gardner at *Cascade Print Workshop*, who prints the editions using 300 gsm Hahnemühle etching paper.

John Wolseley said recently "I'm 86 now and I started printing, doing printmaking, when I was around 18." So did I, but unfortunately, I didn't continue with it long enough to achieve the artistic heights he has in his very long career. It has spanned several continents and as John has been quoted recently as saying, "My life has been a wonderful rampage through about six or seven of the great print workshops studios... I have always been obsessed with printmaking."

On his web site John said that, "My work over the last 45 years has been a search to discover how we dwell and move within landscape. I have lived and worked all over the continent, from the mountains of Tasmania to the floodplains of Arnhem Land. I see myself as a hybrid mix of artist and scientist, one who tries to relate the minutiae of the natural world - leaf, feather and beetle wing to the abstract dimensions of the earth's dynamic systems. Using techniques of watercolour, collage, frottage, nature printing and other methods of direct physical or kinetic contact I am finding ways of collaborating with the actual plants, birds, trees, rocks and earth of a particular place."

"Arguably one of Australia's leading visual artists, John Wolseley has a genuinely unshakeable respect for ecological interdependency of all sentient creatures, evidenced in his lifelong artistic outpouring. In the process of making art, especially works on paper, he has continuously championed wildlife conservation highlighting both the importance of habitat and his love of printmaking." In 2005, Wolseley received an Honorary Degree of Doctor of Science from Macquarie University and the Australian Council Visual Arts Emeritus Award.

IS it possible to resist spending your last \$5 when multiple homes across town are selling their unwanted goods at bargain prices? The Maldon Townwide Garage Sale on Saturday 1 March, under glorious blue skies, was hailed very early as a success by organiser John Bainbridge of Maldon Neighbourhood Centre (MNC). With close to 85 registered households and a constant stream of visitors buying maps, the event was a great fundraiser for the MNC. "It's a record," said John of the numbers, pointing out that people travel far to visit Maldon's famously large sale.

The TT did not attend anywhere near 80 sales, but saw plenty of tempting items: home made jams, potted plants, household goods, textiles and books. Guy had made some lovely and useful butter knives out of baltic pine. "I made them at the Mens Shed and most of them have already sold," he said. Jane and Carol had set up in the forecourt of the MNC; for some people this made sense because their homes are out of town. The Athenaeum Library had been working towards a book fair for months.

Numerous garage sales were a combined effort of multiple households: Yvette and Wendy created a great atmosphere with music and baked treats available. "It's quite a lot of work to set up and then pack up, but it's worth it," Wendy said. Leigh and Carol wondered if their photo would be any good because they had already sold most of their wares.

Paul and Jeanine showed that it doesn't have to be complicated: they used a tree as a hanger to display clothes for sale. They noticed that the crowds ebbed and flowed across the day, and said it was impossible to predict what would sell.

One browser described the event as a fantastic example of recycling. "I call it the great transfer: from one garage to another," he said, laughing. Another was travelling by bicycle and enjoying meeting his neighbours; it was a very social day.

As to the challenge? News just in: the Maldon Townwide Garage Sale is impossible to attend without being tempted. The *TT* succumbed to hunger in the end and bought some home-made brownies to share. That seemed like a win-win.





BLAST FROM THE PAST

Vote 1, Arnold Paddock

IN July 1864 Arnold Paddock announced that he intended to challenge the sitting member John Ramsay for the seat of Maldon in the upcoming election for the Victoria Legislative Assembly. His candidature was not generally welcomed.

The Maryborough and Dunolly Advertiser reminded readers that in 1859 Paddock had organised anti-Chinese protests in Maryborough. Speaking from the balcony of the Golden Age Hotel, he had claimed the Chinese were driving European miners off the diggings and he had initiated a petition asking for them to be expelled from the colony. The Tarrangower Times ridiculed Paddock as a costermonger and a writer of doggerel verse, which he had printed in a booklet and sold for 6d a copy. They said that while they were happy to publish his letters and advertisements, they thought his candidature was "nothing but a stupid joke".

Arnold promptly replied that had never advocated the destruction of the Chinese, but only sought to support his own countrymen. He also pointed out that he was not a costermonger but a respectable travelling trader dealing in gold and jewellery. He also provided examples of his verse so that the public could judge its merit. After reading Arnold's responses, one member of the public suggested that he stand as the member for Yarra Bend (site of the Mental Asylum).

Despite these negative responses, Arnold took his campaign seriously and published a detailed 12-point plan summarising his policies. He was in favour of state aid for religion, equal opportunity in education and government support for hospitals and benevolent institutions. He was also in favour of opening up the land, the extension of railways, continued immigration and reform of the Upper House by extending the franchise to smaller householders.

However, in October when it was time to nominate and pay the 50 pounds electoral deposit, Arnold did not put his name forward. John Ramsay was then elected unopposed and served until his death in 1867.

Arnold did not retire from public life. His letters advocating various causes appeared frequently in local papers. In June 1870 he campaigned for better toilet facilities at Victoria's police lock up. In his petition, he said he had some first-hand experience of these places and also included some original verse on the subject.

Library Book Sale

A big thank you to the people who came to the library book sale last Saturday. It was a busy morning, with locals and visitors alike making purchases and stopping to chat. The money raised will help to keep the library open, paying for some repairs needed to the old building and providing funds to purchase new books.

International Women's Day 8 March

In 2007, ABC Radio National surveyed the nation in search of unforgettable public speeches. Over 5,000 responses were received, with the final list of 20 published in April of that year. Martin Luther King "I Have a Dream" topped the list, followed by Jesus, Paul Keating, Winston Churchill, Abraham Lincoln and JFK. Earl Spencer's "Funeral Oration for Diana Princess of Wales" was a surprising 7th. What was not surprising was the inclusion of only two women: Queen Elizabeth I and Elizabeth Cady Stanton "We Now Demand Our Right to Vote".

We all love Aunty ABC and trust it to report the truth. Perhaps it was the public that was unaware of women as orators! Let's look more widely at books of speeches with titles such as *The Penguin Book of Twentieth Century Speeches* and *Great Speeches of Our Time*. The pattern is the same: the vast majority of speeches considered worthy of inclusion have a male orator. This longstanding underrepresentation of women's voices in the public record is worrying. Orations by women continue to occur. They are just not well-represented in the public record. And the impression that leaves is that leadership and authority are exercised by men alone.

Fear not: your library is on to it. Published in 2021, *Great Women's Speeches: Speeches by Women to Empower and Inspire* (Anna Russell) is a thought-provoking book, beautifully illustrated, containing the iconic speeches, or extracts of speeches, from 50 women from Elizabeth I to Michelle Obama via Marie Curie, Toni Morrison, Hillary Clinton, Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Jane Goodall, Gloria Steinem, Indira Gandhi and Margaret Thatcher.

Another great resource, digital this time, is Madam Speaker, Australia's first digital archive of women's speeches. An initiative of the Victorian Women's Trust (**vwt.org.au**), the archive currently contains over 200 speeches ranging from pre-World World I to the present day, with the aim of reaching 800 by 2026. Library reviews

The Comfort of Water, by Maya Ward, 2011

The Comfort of Water, Maya Ward's lyrical exploration of her river as it winds through the city and the wild is a revelation, a testament to the fact that the greatest of worlds are often at our doorstep. Its author understands the power of the natural world to transform lives and writes about the connection between a river and the self with humility, humour, and a clear-headed wisdom. The telling of her own journey and that of her fellow walkers is seamlessly woven together with ecological and cultural history, the revelation of the pilgrim's path and the unknowable depth of Aboriginal myth. Through trekking this Wurundjeri Songline, this ancient, ever-renewing river, she discovers rich possibilities of belonging and shares how a river can nourish the passion and resilience required to transform our world.

Born in a Tent by Bill Garner, 2012

Bill Garner reminds us that Australia was settled as a campsite: the nation was born in a tent. But while Europeans brought tents, they did not bring camping. Australia had been a camping place for millennia. For more than 100 years, settlers, women as well as men, colonised the country by living under canvas. It changed them into a new sort of native Australian. It gave them a feel for the place, a wry can-do attitude, and a lasting taste for equality. And it led to a sense of belonging.

Born in a Tent takes the story from the campfire to the gas bottle, from a tarp slung on saplings to polymer tents and aluminium poles. It reveals how deeply our camping holidays connect us to the land, to the past and to one another.

Field of Poppies, by Carmel Bird, 2018

Keen to escape the pressures of city life, Marsali Swift and her husband William are drawn to Listowel, a glorious historic mansion in the seemingly tranquil small town of Muckleton. There is time to read, garden, decorate, play chess and befriend the locals. Yet one night Listowel is robbed, and soon after a neighbour is murdered. The violent history of the couple's adopted Goldfields town is revealed, and plans for a new goldmine emerge.

Atmospheric and beguiling, this is a novel that seduces the reader with mysteries and beauties but also speaks of something much larger. The planet is in trouble, but is the human race up to the challenge? Are Marsali and William walking blindfold into a hostile world?

Dear Writer Revisited by Carmel Bird, 2013

Many people wanting to write do not know where to begin. Carmel Bird has taught writing to a wide audience and understands the difficulties facing the new writer. *Dear Writer Revisited*, is a collection of letters to an aspiring author, speaks on the one hand about writer's block, about plots, about publishers, and on the other hand, about the nature of fiction, offering the inspiration required for writing.

As a Woman: Writing Women's Lives, edited by Jocelynne Scutt, 1992.

A collection of autobiographical essays by 22 women active in areas such as women's issues politics, the law, the arts, and the media. Contributors include Lynne Spender, Kay Setches and Moira Rayner. The editor is a Melbourne writer and lawyer.

Whether a one-off visit when the funds run a bit short for the week, or you require a bit more ongoing support to keep the shelves stocked, know that you will be made welcome by the volunteers.

People ask us how to help the Pantry. There are a range of ways: pop some change into the 'Share the Love' containers at our wonderful local bakery, butcher, and cafes; donations of non-perishable food can be left at the Maldon Neighbourhood Centre during opening hours (or direct to the Pantry); garden produce, food, and groceries can be left at the Pantry Wednesdays (9.30am-11.30am from 12 March); nominate the Pantry when you're visiting container deposit sites; or cash donations (100% going towards the provision of food and groceries). Donations of toiletries (including toilet paper) are always welcome. And, if you haven't visited the Pantry, drop in for a visit and a cuppa – the volunteers are always keen to show people around, and you can help by telling people about us.
