FOLLOWING on from the recently held Maldon Business Expo, around 25 local businesses met at the Maldon Vintage Machinery Museum for a Maldon Business Breakfast. The event, by organisers Luz Restrepo and Jamie Heffernan, gave business owners in Maldon the opportunity to identify individual skills that could be used to support each other.

Luz emphasised the importance of community and collaboration in business. Jamie commented on how he sees his role—as a connector and collaborator—and emphasised the importance of working together to start new ventures, make more money, and support each other during tough times. The breakfast identified the importance of skills such as empathy, conflict resolution, creativity, and strategy in running a successful business.

Around-the-room conversations also included:

1. the ability to see potential opportunities and be fearless in pursuing them.
2. the importance of customer service.
3. the creation of memorable experiences for customers.
4. the need to ‘work *on* your business, not just *in* your business’.

Maldon Inc update

A call for members to consider joining the Maldon Inc committee has yielded promising results.

The call out was necessary because there were only four on the committee, with the positions of secretary and treasurer yet to be filled. There is little doubt that the Maldon Inc committee was somewhat depleted and in urgent need of membership support.

Maldon Inc President Barry Robinson has confirmed that MANet’s Catherine Tait has joined the committee and he has also heard from other members who are interested in signing up. Committee member Rebecca Barnett (Maldon Bakery) is now the secretary and Lindsay Calloway has been appointed treasurer.

For over 30 years, Maldon Inc (and before that, the MBTA) has provided vital support for the town’s business and tourism interests. It has sourced grants, mounted advertising campaigns, run events, liaised with Council, organised business education workshops and more. Most importantly, it has been a unifying

force for Maldon’s business community.

What has happened?

The great social disruptor, when it comes to connecting volunteers and organisations, has been COVID. Those connections are taking some time to rebuild. And there is little doubt that, post-COVID, businesses are facing a challenging environment which places extra demands on owners’ time and resources.

Barry is confident that Maldon Inc is still a portal for information and knowledge sharing. It is also a key player in creating the Maldon brand, conducting tourism campaigns and buy local initiatives and developing a ‘business welcome’ pack.

Watch this space - we’ll update you on Maldon Inc’s progress.

IT was scones, jam and cream for morning tea last Friday morning when Bendigo West MP Maree Edwards was welcomed at the Maldon Men’s Shed for a funding announcement.

The Maldon Men’s Shed will receive almost \$3,500 to fund a new split system to replace two old air conditioners in the kitchen. The grant is part of the State Government’s Men’s Shed Funding Program.

“This grant will go a long way to help the Maldon Men’s Shed continue their important work in our community,” Ms Edwards said.

There have been many improvements to the Maldon Men’s Shed in recent times. Thanks to a FRRR grant, there is now a new kitchen.

A peek in the fridge revealed that there’s not much chance in the years to come of running

short of those Men’s Shed staples: tomato sauce, bread or sausages!

The workspace has changed markedly since the *Times*’s last visit. A wall has been removed, and for safety reasons, the entire workspace has been reorganised with easy and unfettered access. A roller door was only recently installed, with a loading bay marked out directly in front of it. There are 80 solar panels on the Shed roof, quietly harvesting electricity and helping out with power bills. And the garden at the side of the Shed is coming along nicely, with plenty of ripening tomatoes in the veggie patch.

With 40 members, a friendly atmosphere and a hard-working committee, the Maldon Men’s Shed is thriving!

Maldon heritage overlay maps

COUNCIL is updating its heritage overlay maps in Maldon to make sure they’re current, accurate and fit for purpose.

This work involves making changes to the Mount Alexander Planning Scheme.

Referred to as Amendment C99malx, the changes propose to improve the planning scheme by:

- Ensuring heritage overlay maps are current and up-to-date.
- Accurately reflecting the existing use and conditions of the land.
- Reflecting State Government requirements.
- Correctly applying the necessary provisions, including the Heritage Overlay and properties listed in the Heritage Overlay.

The amendment will impact ten properties in Maldon, and guide the way land in that area can be used or developed in the future.

Snake Bite Treatment

A recent incident where a person in Maldon suffered a snakebite has led to the question: why is it that a dog or a cat can be treated for snakebite by local vet Andrea, but human patients can't be treated at the Maldon Hospital? Or in Castlemaine?

According to a spokesperson from Dhelkaya Health, there are good reasons why a known or suspected snake bite patient needs to be transferred to Bendigo Health.

Care is provided in line with Safer Care Victoria Guidance, under the supervision of a local Medical Officer and on-call toxicologist.

A patient with a known or suspected snake bite must be treated in a facility that has an Emergency Department and 24-hour access to laboratory and critical care services. Neither Maldon nor Castlemaine Hospitals have the higher level Emergency Departments or Critical Care Services required for the treatment of snake bite.

Part of the Safer Care Victoria guidelines states:

"Patients presenting to Ambulance Victoria

(AV) should bypass Urgent Care Centres and be transferred directly to an Emergency Department. If transfer time will exceed 30 minutes, the AV paramedics should contact Adult Retrieval Victoria to determine if there is a closer antivenom supply or if it could be collected from a health service and transported to meet the patient".

What to do if someone is bitten by a snake

If someone is bitten by a snake, call Triple Zero (000) for advice and an ambulance. Ambulance Victoria will respond to ensure that the patient is assessed and taken to a nearby emergency facility. The main message to the community is to assume that all known or suspected snake bites are potentially life-threatening. Always call Triple Zero (000).

Completing an accredited first aid course is also helpful for learning about snake bite first aid and bandage application. First aid courses are available through Dhelkaya Health - visit the website at www.dhelkayahealth.org.au to learn more.

Blue-green Algae - Cairn Curran

GOULBURN-MURRAY Water (GMW) is warning people to avoid direct contact with water in Cairn Curran Reservoir after detecting high levels of blue-green algae.

Warning signs will be positioned at formal recreational areas around the lake and will remain in place while high levels of blue-green algae are present.

The reservoir will remain open to the public for any activities that do not involve direct contact with the water while the warning is in place.

People are asked to take care around the water. Blue-green algae occur naturally in waterbodies but contain toxins harmful to humans and animals. Contact can cause rashes; sore eyes, ears, and nose; or if swallowed, nausea or vomiting.

GMW recommends:

- People and pets avoid contact with the water.
- Those who come into contact with affected water should wash affected skin immediately in clean, cold water.
- Seeking an alternative water supply for stock

and pets where possible.

- Not using affected water for cooking, drinking, washing or showering. Boiling the affected water will not make it safe for these purposes.

It is not possible to predict how long the algae will remain at high levels.

People can stay up-to-date with blue-green algae warnings by ringing 1800 013 357 and selecting the option for blue-green algae information, or by visiting the GMW website www.g-mwater.com.au/news/bga.

Water supplied by GMW is not suitable for human consumption without first being properly treated. Human consumption includes showering, bathing, washing, cooking, ice-making, and drinking.

Author to Speak at Athenaeum Library

WELL-KNOWN Castlemaine-based writer Lynne Kelly will be speaking at the Maldon Athenaeum Library at 10.30am on Thursday 21 March. You can expect an entertaining and informative session with Lynne as she discusses her books, which include *The Memory Code* and *Memory Craft* as well as *Songlines*, which she co-authored with indigenous writer Margo Neale.

The *Times* caught up with Lynne Kelly to talk about her writing, which in the course of her career has covered a wide range of subject matter - everything from maths and physics to crocodiles and spiders. She has also published a novel. "I do have a soft spot for spiders," Lynne said. "I could talk about them all day!"

Lynne describes herself essentially as science-based; she has an engineering degree and at one stage in her life she was a physics teacher. Spiders were actually going to be the topic for her PhD, but her plans were derailed when she began investigating indigenous memory systems.

In *The Memory Code*, Lynne describes the way in which First Nations people encode information - through song,

performance and landscape. Using those channels, indigenous elders pass down encyclopaedic amounts of information. This includes huge field guides to thousands of plants and animals, maps of the land and the night sky, genealogical history and much more. We are talking about whole filing cabinets of information that is memorised and passed down the generations.

Now that she was well and truly down the rabbit hole of memory, Lynne began investigating other pre-literate societies and found that the techniques that they used were not dissimilar to the *Songlines*. *The Memory Code* is an in-depth exploration of some of these societies, which used a variety of methods to commit information to memory - mnemonic aids, rituals, legends, music and dance. There is a chapter devoted to Stonehenge which, according to Lynne, was a mnemonic structure for storing and retrieving information.

Lynne has used some of the memory methods she has studied to revolutionise the way in which her brain stores and retrieves information. And it works - she has used the town of Castlemaine to create her own 'memory scape', where she has 10 kilometres of the townscape mapped out. Each detail - be it a letterbox or a tree - is a mnemonic for a tranche of information that Lynne can recall at will.

While *The Memory Code* sets out Lynne's intriguing theory, *Memory Craft* outlines ways in which you can improve your own memory. The *Times* has difficulty remembering people's names, and Lynne provided a simple and useful way to improve this writer's recall. And Lynne's advice is working!

In this day and age of being able to look up information online, Lynne agrees that our memory banks aren't working to the best of their ability.



Google, she feels, has made us lazy and stifles creativity.

Lynne believes that it is important to keep learning. "The brain loves novelty," she said. "We're able to create new neural pathways up to the age of 100." She is currently teaching herself Chinese, using her memory craft - and loving it.

Having lived in Castlemaine for the past 13 years, Lynne says that she'll never leave. "Moving here was the best decision ever," she said. "I'll always stay here because it's a fantastic town, and I also have 10km of *Songlines* in the town that I can't leave!"

At present, Lynne is working on another book, but is unable to discuss it before it is released for publication later this year. Her books are available through Stonemans Bookstore.

A highlight among the stalls is 'GEEZA,' operated by Matt Axon, a Maldon Market stalwart for three years and a crowd favourite. His offerings include irresistible sourdough bread, assorted doughnuts, and exquisite croissants that have garnered a loyal following.

Matt's journey into the culinary world began as a butcher in the Hunter Valley, a role he held for eight years while expanding his expertise through a Certificate III in Commercial Cookery. Relocating to Castlemaine in 2018 with his partner, he initially worked as a chef in Bendigo. However, the pandemic's impact led him to join forces with Ralph Finke at 'Oakwood' in small goods production. His passion for food and a chance inspiration from 'The Black Bird Café' in Newstead catalysed his venture into sourdough bread making, starting with a modest request to supply 30

loaves weekly. This endeavour quickly evolved, establishing 'Geeza' as a market staple.

Sourdough bread, known for its natural yeast starter, requires meticulous care, akin to nurturing a child, according to Matt. His self-taught skills and commitment to quality have allowed him to curate a diverse product line, prioritising local ingredients such as Victorian organic flour, 'Sellers' micro-dairy milk, 'Long Paddock' cheese, and 'Lard Ass' butter. His partner, Sophie Hogan, complements these offerings with homemade jams and condiments, enhancing their already popular sourdough brioche-style doughnuts.

The Maldon Neighbourhood Centre, actively involved at the market, encourages generous donations at the entrance BBQ. Their extensive community support programs, including community lunches, bus rides, and various courses, play a vital role in fostering connections within Maldon.

Musical entertainment for the month features 'Deuce,' a duo set to enchant visitors with their performances. The Maldon Market invites everyone to experience the joy of music, artisanal goods, and local craftsmanship, all while supporting local businesses.

Sean Dooley to speak on wildlife conservation



IN an exciting development for wildlife enthusiasts, Sean Dooley, widely known as the 'Birdman', is set to grace the Ballarat Municipal Observatory & Museum with two engaging sessions on Wednesday, 3 April as part of the International Dark Sky Week (IDSW) events. The sessions are scheduled from 1.30pm to 2.30pm for students and from 7pm to 9pm for families.

Dooley, a celebrated author and former national birdwatching champion, will share insights into the critical importance of maintaining dark skies for wildlife, particularly migratory birds. The profit of summer rains

Memories of summer rains are receding as the landscape dries out again. The evidence, though, of its lingering effects is evident. I came across these two Black-fronted Dotterels earlier in the week at Frogmore Swamp Wildlife Reserve. The adult bird was upset at my presence and I wondered why, until spotting a well-grown juvenile nearby. Black-fronted Dotterels are model parents and will readily deploy a distraction display if you venture too close to an active nest [see this post online from the Rise and Shine in October 2022 <https://tinyurl.com/t46emna4>]. In this instance the adult, in an effort to fool me, pretended to be sitting on a nest as the youngster foraged nearby. I managed a nice record shot of the juvenile snaring a soldier fly larva.

We won’t go over his recent tale of woe, but simply announce the good news that, in his words, “Telstra came good” - to the tune of a compensatory \$300 credit payment to acknowledge Max’s pain and suffering.

He also reported that since being re-connected, the phone has continued to work in the time-honoured fashion to which most of us are accustomed. Max described the outcome as “rather nice”. His fortitude, patience and turn of phrase – not to mention his inflated bank balance – are an example to all of us. Prince of Walmer, we salute you.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

THE GLUE FACTORY

Carl Albrecht Honneus was a jeweller born in Prussia in about 1828. He came to Victoria in August 1853 and in March 1857 he purchased land in Main Street now occupied by Farr’s building and Shakespeare House. In Jonathan Moon’s 1864 *Tarrangower, Past and Present* Honneus was described as a jeweller, assayer, gold buyer and gold smelter. He operated the gold smelter at the Bank of NSW.

In June 1865 the *Tarrangower Times* reported that Johann Voeckler had produced a high quality sample of glue and suggested he establish a factory. Voeckler, who had been a tanner and glue maker in Germany, was a successful miner, who had a claim in Wattle Gully, (to the north of the Golf Club). He and his wife Catherine had been touched by tragedy in March 1861 when two of their infant children died in a tent fire.

Soon after Voeckler’s countrymen Honneus and butcher Gottfried Schmidt help finance a glue factory that was built on land just east of the current intersection of the Bridgewater and Shelbourne Roads. The site, known as the Springs, had permanent water and was used as a camping ground for draymen and carters. Objections were lodged claiming the area should be a water reserve but the land was leased to the partners because they were establishing a ‘novel industry’.

In June 1866 the partnership received a grant of £25 from a fund established to encourage local industries in Victoria. Just two months later however Honneus advertised the factory for sale. It seemed the venture was not viable without direct railway access to Melbourne. In May 1867 Honneus obtained the freehold for the land on which the factory was built and later applied unsuccessfully for the adjacent land claiming he planned to grow hemp.

While the factory was no longer operating, in 1867 Honneus entered samples of its glue in a number of exhibitions. In February it was awarded a medal at the Intercolonial Exhibition in Melbourne and later in September the glue was awarded another medal at the Paris Exposition.

Soon after the factory closed, glue maker Johann Voeckler and his wife Catherine moved to Yarraville. There they established another glue factory in Hyde Street. They operated this business until Johann was killed in a railway accident in 1875. The factory continued under other management until it was demolished in 1903.

Public bitterness towards Honneus for taking land at the Springs persisted. In May 1873 John Hornsby implied in a letter to the *Times* that Honneus had used underhand means to obtain the land. He also spoke disparagingly of Honneus’s success with the ‘glue pot’. Honneus replied with an open letter calling on ‘Johnny’ Hornsby, a devote Anglican, to ‘love his neighbour’. He also asked if Hornsby had ever won prizes for his ‘glue pot’. Honneus said he had purchased the land at a public auction and asked why Hornsby and other critics had not bothered to bid against him.
