

Let's talk about road safety and the school run

MOUNT Alexander Shire Council recently shared a road safety survey for local residents, students and parents of three Castlemaine Primary Schools.

Interestingly Newstead Primary School, who has been petitioning Council for a safer crossing for their students for over a year, were not included in the survey.

Newstead Primary School Principle Kathy Callander told the *Times*, "After two years of letters to the Mount Alexander Shire with endorsement of local police and the local community, it is beyond disappointing to be told that unfortunately Newstead Primary School cannot be included in the current TAC Traffic Studies Project.

"The Shire's wording from its Facebook post stated, 'We all take the safety of the children in our communities very seriously. This is why we would like to get your feedback.' Why is it not important to get feedback from all schools, especially if safety has been raised on numerous occasions? ALL students in Mount Alexander Shire count, and therefore all

residents should be given the option to give feedback about ALL schools in the Shire."

The three schools included are: Castlemaine Primary School, Castlemaine North Primary School and Winters Flat Primary School, and is asking participants to provide feedback on road safety during the school run

Some of the points that Council will be investigating include: traffic management plans, pedestrian movement, effective school crossing points and speeding habits around the schools.

The survey is available on Shape Mount Alexander, Council's online engagement platform, until 27 May and can be accessed at shape. mountalexander.vic.gov.au/school-traffic-Castlemaine.

The project, funded by the 2021 TAC Local Government Grant Program, is part of a larger project to improve safety and traffic management around Castlemaine primary schools, however it is unclear why Newstead Primary School was not included in the survey, given the grave concerns that have been expressed by the parents and students around their road safety.

A response from Mount Alexander Shire Council regarding Newstead Primary School's exclusion from the survey is still pending.

Maldon Streetscape Revitalisation Project Project update – Friday 13 May 2022



Mount Alexander Shire Council is planning to undertake night roadworks in Maldon as part of the Maldon Streetscape Revitalisation Project.

What will the works involve?

Works to replace the road surface will take place at the following locations:

- Main Street between Templeton and High Streets
- High Street car parking between Fountain and Spring Streets

Refer to map on the following page for location of works (area is marked in red).

When are works happening?

To minimise disruption to local businesses, works will be undertaken between 6.00pm and 6.00am.

Works will be undertaken in sections, and are expected to begin at 6.00pm on Sunday 15 May 2022 and be completed by Thursday 26 May 2022 (pending weather conditions). There will be no work undertaken on Friday and Saturday nights.

How will works impact me?

Main Street will be closed to all vehicles during 6.00pm and 6.00am while works are underway. This includes access to businesses.

Pedestrian access may also be limited depending on where the work crew is located each night.

Parking in High Street (listed on map over the page) will be limited at night during the works.

We understand that there may be some disruption while works are underway, and have tried to minimise the impact of these works on residents and businesses by undertaking works at night, in small sections, and not on Friday and Saturday nights.

East Timor 20 years of independence celebration

FRIDAY 20 May 2022 marks 20 years since East Timor (Timor Leste) gained independence.

Timor Leste is Australia's closest neighbour and is comprised of the eastern half of the island and two nearby islands. East Timor is the poorest country in South East Asia.

After becoming independent from Portugal, East Timor was invaded by Indonesia in 1975. In 1999 after sustained and mounting International pressure, Indonesia allowed a UN-run referendum. East Timorese overwhelmingly voted for independence

Indonesian militia then commenced a scorched earth campaign. Hundreds were killed, and large numbers were pushed into West Timor as refugees and remain there today. The majority of the country's infrastructure was destroyed during this attack. The International Force for East Timor (INTERFET) was deployed and brought the violence to an end.

The United Nations administered a transitional period, and East Timor was internationally recognised as an independent nation on 20 May 2002.

The Australian Timor Leste Friendship Network was established in 2009, and in the same year, Mount Alexander Shire entered into a Friendship Relationship Agreement with the sub-district of Lolotoe, Timor Leste and Friends of Lolotoe Timor-Leste Incorporated. This friendship is based on mutual support and

respect for each other's culture. The Friendship group started work raising funds for school infrastructure, school resources, scholarships and gardening programs. Teachers

have been trained, a library stocked, and a chicken raising group started. It's all about food security, education and quality of life. The group also

In 2011, Fern loses her job after the US Gypsum plant in Empire, Nevada shuts down; she worked there for years along with her husband, who recently died. Fern sells most of her belongings and purchases a van to live in and travel the country searching for work. She takes a seasonal job at an Amazon fulfilment centre through the winter.

Linda, a friend and co-worker, invites Fern to visit a desert rendezvous in Arizona organised by Bob Wells, which provides a support system and community for fellow nomads. Fern initially declines but changes her mind as the weather turns cold and

she struggles to find work in the area. There, Fern meets fellow nomads and learns basic survival and self-sufficiency skills for the road.

When Fern's van blows a tire, she visits the van of a nearby nomad, Swankie, to ask for a ride into town to buy a spare. Swankie chastises Fern for not being prepared and invites her to learn road survival skills; they become friends. Swankie tells Fern about her cancer diagnosis and shortened life expectancy and her plan to make good memories on the road rather than waste away in a hospital. They eventually part ways.

A number of real-life nomads appear as fictionalised versions of themselves, including Linda May, Swankie and Bob Wells.

Know Your Local - Kerry Punton

A fourth-generation farmer out at Eastville (near Baringhup), Kerry has a busy time managing the farm (set on around 700 acres) with her husband Leigh, working casually as a relief teacher, running ceramics workshops and making sure she has time to work on her ceramics and her painting.

The farm is absolutely gorgeous. There are chooks, dogs, sheep and even a peacock running around the

picturesque property, made even more stunning by large metal sculptures made by Kerry's husband, Leigh.

A light-filled studio, bursting with artwork, complete with a view of paddocks and trees, is where Kerry works and runs her workshops.

"The building used to be a hairdressing studio on the other side of Melbourne. We cut it in half and brought it over here while mum and dad still owned the farm."

Kerry started working as a teacher in 1989; she worked two years full-time before moving to supplementary teaching so she could focus on her art. She has taught primary, secondary and tertiary, usually teaching art.

"When you're substitute teaching, you expect most kids will try and change their names (to trick you), but they don't realise that we're given photos with all of their names!"

Kerry has been interested in art since primary school, but winning a ceramics award in Year 11 at school really reinforced her desire to pursue the art form. She went on to do a Ceramics Degree, with a Dip Ed tacked on with her parents' encouragement.

"I've tried other mediums like wire and painting, but I keep coming back to clay. You can make it look like anything. It can have functionality or be a sculpture; the possibilities are limitless.

"After painting on pots for 30 years, a friend encouraged me to paint on canvas. I didn't know what to paint, but my friend said to paint what you know. So I painted farm shapes, like silos, and the exhibition sold out. And I got that buzz again.

"Teaching would pay more, but there's more to life than money."

Kerry says she doesn't watch Netflix or play video games,

which frees up her time. She works with the sheep on the farm, with around 1,200 at present.

"I don't have anything to do with the cropping; Leigh does that, he's mechanically minded. I met him in Bendigo. He used to work for ADI (now Thales), and he was happy to get out of the factory environment. He had to learn all about farming, despite his mechanical leaning."

Kerry has lived in Melbourne and Bendigo and travelled the world, starting with a 12-month working holiday when she was 23-years-old. She went to America and Canada first and then to England. She worked in potteries in Scotland and Ireland, coming back through Japan.

"I've been to Europe six times, once with the Queen's



Trust Grant to study tile painting at an amazing tile museum in Portugal. I'm nearly ready to go back, I think. Oh, and I went on a trip to India in 2019, just before the pandemic."

Kerry recently did a Residency with Bendigo Pottery

for five months, where she held an exhibition of her works.

"It was funded through Bendigo Shire Council; there were five different residencies for different arts, part of COVID recovery. Bendigo Pottery were very generous and gave me access to everything." Kerry's artwork is on display at the Harcourt General Store until the end of the month, along with works by Sally Anderson, so make sure to pop down and check them out.

She also runs adult ceramic workshops out of her studio twice a month for \$150, which includes lunch.

"It's a fun day without too much pressure. We make three plates in a day and learn lots of techniques."

WALKING TOGETHER towards Makarrata

Makarrata = 'coming together after a struggle, facing the facts of wrongs and living again in peace.'

FIRST NATIONS AND CHRISTIANITY



TO many Aboriginal nations, the early missionaries (in keeping with the 19th-century view of Indigenous people as inferior), failed to distinguish between the gospel and European culture, which to them was 'civilisation'.

Within a few years of white settlement, settler society exhibited brutal and immoral treatment of Aboriginal people and gross contradictions between Christian values and the whites' lifestyle. These and other factors, like



dispossession and ill-health, led to the missionaries expecting little of First-Nations people and distancing themselves from them socially.

This seriously undermined their efforts to communicate their message to the First-Nations people. There were exceptions, of course, missionaries who not only believed in their essential humanity but acted accordingly.

The first fleet did not transport God to Australia. Aboriginal people already knew God, under different names



such as Bunjil or Baiame in south-eastern Australia, and were religious peoples who sought to relate to their environment in spiritual terms.

It was not in their nature to believe the white man was better than themselves or to suppose the moral and religious laws imposed by them to be better than those of their own tribe.

Few of the early missions and protectorates achieved their goals, and in Victoria were replaced by Government-funded reserves or stations, particularly after the passing of the Aborigines Protection Act in 1886. Some stations were later handed back to the clans belonging to those lands after generations had been moved from one reserve to another away from their traditional lands.

Nalderun Education Aboriginal Corporation is a service that supports the Aboriginal Community, led by Aboriginal people. Many people and organisations in the Mount Alexander Shire contribute to Nalderun; the name is a Dja Dja Wurrung word meaning 'all together'.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

A TRAGIC HOUSE FIRE

On the evening of Saturday 4 September 1875, Mrs Amelia Peard set off from her home at the top of Fountain Street to go shopping. She left at home her five children. They included two young girls aged two and six who slept together in a cot, two older boys who were in a room detached from the house and a 10-month-old infant girl who was in a wicker cradle in the parlour. When she left home, Mrs Peard turned down the lamp in the parlour but left it alight.

Soon after Mrs Peard left, her neighbour Mrs Catherine Patterson heard a child screaming. When Mrs Patterson rushed to the house, she met six-year-old Lucy Peard standing in the doorway surrounded by smoke. Mrs Patterson tried to enter the house but was driven back by the smoke. She then quickly raised the alarm.

Luckily Police Sergeant John Greer, who was on duty in the guardroom at the nearby Camp, heard Mrs Patterson's cries. Greer rushed to the site of the fire and arrived just as the fire flared up. After being told that there were children inside, he entered the house only to be overcome by smoke before he could find them. Greer groped his way back to the front door and then smashed a front window and managed to get three-year-old Louisa Peard out of the house.

Meanwhile, Mrs Patterson with, Constable Kenny and a young lad named Wilson managed to get into the room that was on fire and subdued the flames. They then roused the two older boys from their deep sleep. The boys grabbed a few clothes and ran up the hill behind the house.

At Mrs Patterson's urging, Sergeant Greer searched the house for the youngest child, Alice, who was unaccounted for. When Greer could not find her, it was assumed that Mrs Peard had taken the infant with her. Soon after, when Amelia Peard returned, she told them that she had left the infant in the cradle that now lay charred in the parlour.

Amid the following confusion cries were heard from the parents' bedroom that had not been touched by the fire. Seemingly miraculously, the infant, Alice, was found under her parents' bed with burns to her foot, arm and scalp.

The Fire Brigade arrived soon after the fire bell was rung, but the fire had already been put out. It was something of a mystery how the fire started, but one theory was that a young goat had got into the house and knocked over the lamp that had been left burning.

Sadly young Alice passed away a few weeks later as a result of infections arising from her burns.

Often it is a last count of numbers arriving to play which then indicates how many tables should be set up.


I was an absentee this week, along with some others, but the turn-out was excellent, just the same.

A range of COVID-19 safety measures will be in place as you cast your vote. At all times you should follow local rules and public health directions, as well as instructions from AEC staff.

To protect the health and safety of the community, you should not attend a polling place if you're showing any COVID-19 type symptoms. Go to www.aec.gov.au for the latest updates and advice, including what happens if you are not able to vote.

Voting is compulsory for Australian citizens aged 18 years and older. If you don't vote, you may be prosecuted. If you vote more than once it is a criminal offence.

Maldon Museum

or some months, volunteers at the Maldon Museum have been involved in an exciting project: providing information to the consultants who are overseeing the restoration of Maldon's streetscape. The volunteers have spent hours trawling through old newspapers, photos and rates records to unearth valuable details about the historic buildings in the central part of Maldon.

According to Maldon Museum President Derek Reid, the project was tackled in two stages. "First of all, there was an overview of the CBD, where a list of buildings was drawn up," he said. "About a dozen were prioritised. This was done before Christmas last year."

In the second stage, Museum volunteers have been undertaking in-depth research on six buildings: the Carriers Arms, the Grand Hotel, the State Bank building, the Post Office, the two-storey weatherboard building next to the Maldon Takeaway and the shop that houses the Maldon Butchers (would you believe that this was once a two-storey building?).

Five volunteers have been hard at work on the project, which has had a tight time frame. "In return, we have been provided with some training," Derek said. "Some of our volunteers didn't have a lot of experience with researching old records, and the training helped a great deal. It has been a worthwhile job. It's great to see all the work that is being done around town and to know that we've played a part in it."

With around 80 members, the Maldon Museum is thriving. About a third of those members play an active part in the Museum's operations, according to Derek. "During COVID, some of our volunteers continued to work on family history, property and building research. That kept the Museum going financially. And we're now open, of course - on Wednesdays and Sundays from 11.30am to 2pm," he said.

Thanks to funding from the Maldon & District Community Bank and the Public Records Office, the Museum's collection of the *Tarrangower Times* is being digitised. "We've done from 1858 up to 1900, and in a month or six weeks, that will be up on the internet for all to see," Derek said.

The Museum welcomes new members, and the roles for volunteers are diverse - from cataloguing artefacts to family history research and of course welcoming visitors to the Museum itself. "There's always something happening," Derek said. "For example, during the Gothic Festival, one of our members is conducting four cemetery tours. If you're interested in history and would like to talk about volunteering, please come and see us during opening hours."

aldon Urban Landcare group (MULGA), established in 1992, was Victoria's first urban Landcare group. Our main objective is to care for and preserve the natural environment in the Maldon area, and we have undertaken weed control and revegetation activities on parts of the Maldon Historic Reserve.

Last year we distributed to all residences and PO Boxes in Maldon a brochure *Indigenous plants for the garden in the Maldon* area, which describes the benefits of using local plants and provides plant lists. The brochure is available at the Maldon Information Centre and is included in the Welcome Pack for new residents, available at both the Maldon Information Centre and the Maldon Neighbourhood Centre.

With the support of Kaiser Reef Ltd., which hold a lease for the area, MULGA is undertaking weed control work at the Eaglehawk Pit revegetation site, between Adair St East and Polsue St, a site that is regularly used by walkers.

From 2017, MULGA has surveyed 366 original pre-1852 (pre-European settlement) eucalypts on private and public land, and roadsides in the Maldon area - 75% of the trees have an estimated age between 200-499 years, and there are four trees estimated to be older than 500 years. You can access maps and the tree list at www.connectingcountry.org.au/landcare/mulga.

In June 2018, MULGA re-planted the memorial Circles on Anzac Hill with 64 Yellow Gums, an indigenous eucalypt, as all but one of the original Mahogany Gums had died. Since then, we have continued to re-plant as necessary, and over 70% of the new trees are now growing well.

We really appreciate the MULGA and members who come to our working bees and willingly help with battling the weeds or doing new plantings – it's certainly much Better Together!

region of hills and rolling farmland, the Nuggetty area is situated to the northwest of Maldon. With responsibility for around 5,200 hectares, Nuggetty Land Protection Group was established in 1991 by local primary producers to prevent land degradation.

The Nuggetty Land Protection Group members are a diverse lot, made up of 'blockies' and local farmers who have plenty of experience and knowledge to share. Activities are quite varied and include weed control, nest box monitoring and revegetation.

The group also cares for the old Nuggetty School site and Peace Cairn, where ANZAC Day services are held each year.

You may not know it, but there was once a railway line that extended from Maldon out to Shelbourne. The line was opened in 1891, and it was originally going to extend to Laanecoorie before that plan was abandoned. Nuggetty Land Protection Group members conduct nature walks along the Shelbourne Railway track, finishing at the Shelbourne Station and silo complex. The group also worked with Loddon Shire to install interpretive signage along the track.

Several calendars have been produced by the Nuggetty Land Protection Group as a part of a history project a few years back, and oral histories have been collected.

If you've read as far as this, you will understand that a Landcare group doesn't just 'plant trees'. The Nuggetty Land Protection Group members range in age from one to 90 plus, and all have something to contribute.

amed after one of Maldon's most famous residents - cricketer William Maldon Woodfull - the Bill Woodfull Recreation Reserve is a place where people gather to watch or play sport, visit the monthly Maldon market, or attend an event such as the Maldon Antique Fair.

A few details about Bill Woodfull: he was born in Maldon in 1897 and played cricket in the 1920s and 1930s. He was captain of the Australian cricket team during the infamous bodyline controversy in the early 1930s.

The Reserve is also a very special place - there are probably few recreational areas in Australia where you can find a historic courthouse and trees that are around 500 years old. It is, truly, the heart and soul of Maldon.

A committee of volunteers looks after the Reserve on behalf of the larger community as well as the groups that use the area - the football, netball and tennis clubs.

While Council keeps the oval mown and maintained, the Bill Woodfull Recreation Reserve Committee of Management receives funding to keep the rest of the grounds in good condition. The committee also works together to ensure that the buildings are in good repair. There have been some improvements made to the facilities recently. The netball courts have been resurfaced, and a new netball shelter has been constructed, while new coaches' shelters have been built next to the oval. And there's more good news from the committee: there have been draft designs drawn up for long overdue female-friendly change room facilities.

While the committee receives funding annually, more funds are needed. The footy clubrooms are available to hire for social functions, and this helps in supporting the Reserve financially.

"The Reserve is a special place. It is a significant part of the community," Bill Woodfull Recreation Reserve Committee of Management chairman Graham Thomas said. "We are keen for the community-minded people to join us on the committee to help us maintain the Bill Woodfull Recreation Reserve on Maldon's behalf."



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
