Local polling booths are: Newstead Community Centre, 9 Pyrenees Hwy; Newstead, Southern Cross Masonic Lodge Hall, 147 High St, Maldon; Castlemaine Town Hall, 25 Lyttleton St, Castlemaine; Guildford Public Hall, 30 Fryers St, Guildford; Chewton Senior Citizens & Community Centre, 201 Main Rd, Chewton; Taradale Primary School, 98 High St, Taradale. Campaign: pointy end



AS tomorrow’s election looms, candidates for the local seat of Bendigo have been making their final election announcements and pledges. The following announcements have been sent to the *Tarrangower Times* in time to print.

On Tuesday 22 April, The Nationals Candidate for Bendigo Andrew Lethlean and the Liberal Candidate for Bendigo Matt Evans announced the re-establishment of the Coalition’s Building Better Regions Fund (BBRF), a regional grants program for the development of community initiatives and events and infrastructure projects. Shadow Minister for Infrastructure, Transport and Regional Development, Senator Bridget McKenzie said the BBRF , which would be targeted at regional, rural and remote communities, would be an ongoing open application program for two years, until available funds are exhausted. “Local governments and not-for-profit organisations in Bendigo will be eligible to apply for funding, with grants of between \$25,000 to \$200,000 available for community initiatives and \$50,000 up to \$10 million for community and economic infrastructure,” Senator McKenzie said.

Meanwhile, also on Tuesday 22 April, Federal Member for Bendigo Lisa Chesters MP pledged that if re-elected, the Labor Government would deliver \$7 million to the City of Greater Bendigo who will work with DJAARA, North Central Catchment Management Authority and local community groups to improve the health of Bendigo Creek. Labor said funding would restore critical habitat along the creek, help manage flood risk and empower Traditional Owners to practise and promote cultural and spiritual connections to the creek.

Election contenders could not resist an ANZAC Day announcement, with David Lethlean announcing on Wednesday 23 April that Veterans and their families in Bendigo would be supported with a \$5 million commitment to establish a new Veterans’ and Families’ Hub in Bendigo if the Coalition is elected. On Thursday 24 April, Lisa Chesters announced that a re-elected Labor Government would also commit \$5 million to fund the establishment of a Veterans’ and Families’ Hub in Bendigo for veterans and families across Central Victoria.

Heritage enthusiasts invited to forum

A Maldon heritage architect encourages residents with an interest in the region’s heritage to attend a free forum in Bendigo on Thursday 8 May. Andrew Fedorowicz F.A.I.A, who is the resident architect on the Greater Bendigo Heritage Advisory Committee, believes the forum will be of interest to people in Maldon and surrounds.

The event is called *From Pick to Pixel: Unearthing Bendigo’s Tech Heritage* and it will feature numerous speakers including Trevor Budge AM, researcher and Strategic Projects Officer – World Heritage at the City of Greater Bendigo, who has impressed attendees with his public talks in the past.

Andrew said about the forum: “It’s really important because there’s a whole lot of things going on where heritage is concerned and there’s a lot of people here who care about heritage.” When asked which heritage issues might be of particular interest to residents in the *Tarrangower Times* readership area, Andrew said that it will be different for everyone and that’s why they should attend. “The forum is

basically a chance for people to come along and recognise the issues that concern them in particular,” he said. “There’s a whole lot of experts talking, there’s some very important people coming.”

Held as part of the National Trust’s Australian Heritage Festival and hosted by the City of Bendigo, the forum is a chance to learn about and discuss technology and tradition, with a focus on combining heritage and sustainability. The forum will cover digital tools helping to document and preserve Bendigo’s heritage and will discuss ways of inspiring new generations and enriching communities through heritage. There will also be updates on the Victorian Goldfields World Heritage Listing.

Grants available for events

Applications for the next round of the Regional Events Fund open on Thursday 1 May, offering up to \$500,000 for major events of national or international significance, and up to \$50,000 for events that draw visitors from across the state and country. The State Government's Regional Events Fund supports festivals, sporting events, and exhibitions that create local jobs, boost tourism, and showcase Victoria's regional communities. Multicultural review: feedback invited

The State Government is inviting multicultural and multifaith communities, organisations and leaders to have their say in shaping Victoria's multicultural policies and institutions. Minister for Multicultural Affairs Ingrid Stitt announced on Tuesday 22 April the start of community consultations for Victoria's Multicultural Review, with an advisory group set to engage multicultural communities across 10 regional and metropolitan local government areas. The advisory group will lead discussions and workshops to hear directly from multicultural Victorians about how the Labor Government can tackle discrimination, build social cohesion and foster a more inclusive Victoria. The Review will recommend how the State Government can strengthen systems, organisations and policies to better resolve conflict, foster connection and celebrate the rich diversity of our multicultural and multifaith communities.

Avoid headaches – regularly inspect your dam

Regular inspection, monitoring and maintenance of your gully dams can reduce the risk of 'failure' such as leaks and bank collapses. Agriculture Victoria (AV) said stock damage, soil erosion, siltation and excessive vegetation growth can all contribute to the gradual deterioration of farm dams. AV advises that regular inspection should include: monitoring water levels for signs of leaks; checking the bank water line for unusual turbulence or whirlpools indicating a possible leak; checking the dam bank for signs of cracking, tunnelling or settlement and checking the dam bank and immediately downstream, for signs of seepage, softness or lush vegetation. AV encourages landowners to reduce risks by having

a reliable line of emergency communication and maintain emergency procedures so help can arrive if something goes wrong. For more information on dam management visit: tinyurl.com/3afjsm8e.

Bird Flu restrictions reduced

Areas where there are restrictions on the movement of birds, bird products, equipment and vehicles, for the control of the H7N8 avian influenza (bird flu) outbreak near Euroa, have been reduced. Since Monday 28 April, restrictions apply only within a new 5 km

control area around the four affected properties near Euroa. Mandatory movement controls including those for game bird hunters and hunting activities, will no longer apply in areas outside the new control area.

Agriculture Victoria (AV) said it will further revise the restrictions as it continues to monitor for disease, complete decontamination of affected properties and eradicate the outbreak. To prevent and eliminate biosecurity threats, AV said every livestock producer should have an up-to-date farm biosecurity plan and be able to recognise signs of diseases that could impact their animals.

Victoria hosts tourism media after expo

There's a tourism expo happening in Brisbane on now until Thursday 1 May and it includes more than 60 Victorian tourism operators showcasing their businesses to the world. Victoria is also hosting international buyers and media before and after the event to showcase first-hand dozens of Melbourne and regional Victorian products and experiences. State Minister for Tourism, Sport and Major Events Steve Dimopoulos attended the Australian Tourism Exchange (ATE25) in Brisbane on Friday 28 April to support Victorian businesses in attracting more international tourism dollars to this state. Victorian regional businesses participating in ATE are being supported through Visit Victoria's International Business Accelerator Program (IBAP). As part of IBAP, Visit Victoria hosts regular industry training programs to help local businesses to upskill to promote themselves and cater to overseas markets.

Dhelkaya Health Memorial Service returns

AFTER four years as an online event only, Dhelkaya Health is very pleased to offer its annual Memorial Service of Reflections and Memories as an in-person service once again.

This inclusive, non-religious service will be held in the hospital auditorium on Cornish Street Castlemaine on Tuesday 27 May 2025. Arrive at 6.30pm for a 7pm start. The service will go for approximately 30 minutes and will be followed by light refreshments.

The service, which began in 2019, provides an avenue through which family members, friends, staff and the wider community can

remember and give thanks for the lives of patients, residents and clients of Dhelkaya Health who died between 1 December 2023 and 30 November 2024.

Danni Moore and Kynan Sutherland, the pastoral care coordinators at Dhelkaya Health, will be conducting the service this year.

Ms Moore says, "We decided that after four years, it was important to hold this service as an in-person event once again. While it reached a wide audience as a filmed online service, we thought many people are weary of watching things online. Besides, there's nothing quite

like participating in an event such as this in person. We hope it can still reach as many people as possible and look forward to sharing this event with the community."

Mr Sutherland says, "We really want to create a space for people to remember and give thanks to those they have lost. The first 12 months after a death can be very difficult, and we believe it's important to acknowledge the complexity and depth of people's grief. This is our way of paying our respects to those who have been part of Dhelkaya Health and their families and friends."

People are invited to bring a photo or other memento to the service. Memorial booklets will be available and qualified staff and volunteers will be on hand to provide support if desired.

Parking is available at the rear of the hospital, but please be aware there is very little lighting in the Odgers Road car park or along Beddard Street.

Chrestyna Kmetj Liberal Party

Please tell us a bit about yourself, your background and why you'll be a great Senate representative for Victorians?

As a self-employed Business Manager of a family small business operating in the construction industry, I understand the real challenges of small businesses and the impact on families.

What do you consider to be your key values, generally? What's important to you?



My background and family values have been formative in my decision to stand on the Liberal Senate ticket. Melbourne born and bred and devoted to my family, my parents are Ukrainians, who arrived in Australia in 1949. Because of my multi-cultural upbringing, I understand the important role community and multicultural organisations play in maintaining the cultural and social fabric of Victoria.

What do you consider to be your key values, generally? What's important to you?

Service and Leadership. To my mind, these two things go hand in hand. Along with good character and integrity, we need competent leaders in our country that take a servant attitude to positions of leadership. I believe that good government provides a stable and secure environment for people to live out their own lives to the best of their ability, and pursue their own dreams.

What do you see as the key issues for rural and regional areas of Victoria? What are your ideas to address them?

Like the rest of Victoria, our success depends on a strong economy, and a strong economy depends on affordable and reliable power. Our regions need to be acknowledged for the role they play in feeding and powering Victoria, and they need to be listened to when

they speak on these issues. We also need to proactively support business and industries in our regions that have been suffering and suppressed under the current Federal and State Labor Governments. The Coalition's recently announced support for start-up businesses, along with our plan to reduce power prices, reduce the fuel excise, and remove Labor's tax on petrol and diesel vehicles, are all ways we can help revitalise regional Victoria.

From 2014 to 2022, I was a member of the Victorian Legislative Council and held

a balance of power position for all of those eight years. I am proud of my time in state politics where I worked with all sides of the aisle to achieve progressive reform and help affect real change.

I still hold the title for the most private members bills introduced and debated, and in my second term I was the first independent MP to head a parliamentary committee. In that one term from 2018 to 2022 I chaired 10 parliamentary inquiries, and I also helped lead the way for changes to Victoria's outdated and unfair Roadside Drug Testing laws for medicinal cannabis patients. During my time in the Victorian State Parliament I provided a pivotal vote on a range of issues using evidence, common sense and a set of core values around social justice, equality, civil liberties, human rights, tolerance and compassion. I intend to use the same approach if elected. With Labor, the Coalition, and the Greens pretty much guaranteed to win five senate seats in Victoria, the sixth seat is very much up for grabs and we think we can win it.

State politics was a wonderful opportunity

for me to champion so many of the causes I am passionate about and it was such an amazing privilege to represent a diverse array of people whose voices often go unheard. Regional Victoria is often a second thought for major parties come federal election time. Yet regional Victoria provides a treasure trove of opportunities for economic growth in a sector that is ready to boom. Conditions are ideal for hemp and medicinal cannabis farming. Hemp is quite an extraordinary crop. It can be used for food, fibre, fuel, plastics and medicine. Global interest for products made from hemp is on the rise, and the economic potential for hemp farming and manufacturing is huge – the international market for industrial hemp is projected to grow to \$18.6 billion by 2027.

In 2024, Legalise Cannabis Victoria introduced an Industrial Hemp Bill to parliament calling for an easier pathway to establish a thriving industry. Further efforts are ongoing to lobby the Federal Government to support a national hemp industry and if I am successful in my senate bid, I will make this a priority.

Wayne Taylor
Legalise Cannabis Party



Wayne Taylor has been a passionate advocate for adult-use cannabis for many years. His commitment to legalising cannabis began from the very first moment he experienced its effects – an experience that inspired a lifelong mission to end prohibition. Wayne played a key role on the steering committee that registered the Legalise Cannabis Party Victoria. He worked tirelessly to build support, using social media platforms to drive membership and awareness. His first step into politics was as the second Senate candidate for Victoria in the May 2022 federal election, standing under the newly re-branded HEMP Party – now known as the Legalise Cannabis Party. He ran again in November 2022 for the seat of Bendigo West in the Victorian state election. While Wayne is passionate about a range of political issues, it was the injustice of cannabis prohibition that drew him into the political arena. With a background in real estate and small business management, he brings practical knowledge and a results-driven approach to everything he does.

Wayne believes that legalising cannabis could help Australia reclaim its reputation as the lucky country.

Wayne Taylor Advocates for:

*Civil Liberties *Privacy *Human Rights *Compassion *Personal Freedoms *Anti-Discrimination and Tolerance. These core values will guide me as I navigate my way through politics. I see many pressing issues we face today and often wonder why we are not addressing them. Some of these issues include housing, the cost of living, environmental concerns, Medicare, mental health, and the farming and agricultural sector.

I believe that by legalising cannabis, we could recover the \$250 billion in lost revenue that currently goes to the black market. This revenue could be invested in creating more community housing, ensuring that no Australians go without a home. We need to fix our healthcare system and include dental care in Medicare. Additionally, we should increase support for public education and welfare programs. There is also \$75 billion wasted on enforcement costs related to policing cannabis consumers. Redirecting this money could significantly improve the pay and conditions for our front-line workers. Furthermore, we should end the restrictions on hemp farming. Hemp has numerous applications beyond just being a building product; every part of the plant—seeds, roots, and leaves—has value. Voting for the Legalise Cannabis Party serves as a protest vote, highlighting the need for change.

Lisa Chesters





WE'VE all driven past it many times on our way to Hepburn Springs from Newstead: that intriguing old stone house perched on the rise beyond the Yandoit Creek ravine in Clydesdale.

I have always wanted to see this house and last weekend, I managed to do just that when I visited 'The Stones' open garden (part of Open Gardens Victoria).

The old farmhouse was built from local stone and dates back to 1857. There is a stone barn, an Edwardian stucco dairy, a long milking shed and the original first wattle and daub stables, tucked into the ground behind a woodland of peppercorn trees - fascinating.

The garden was not laid out until 20-odd years ago when the previous custodians planted well-chosen trees and plants forming the base for the now amazing garden.

The current custodians, Jeremy and Grant,

took the helm nine years ago and have created a slightly wild and naturalistic garden that fits the property's heady atmosphere.

They admit to being blindsided in the first year, when they lost many plants to the savage frosts and searing dry summer heat. They then turned their heads to notice what seemed to grow and survive in neighbouring gardens. Stalwart plants, cold-climate cacti and soft, whimsical grasses were planted, although they do admit to having a few exceptions to this rule, which they protect on particularly frosty nights.

The Secret Life of a Barrel – What a Year in Oak Looks (and Tastes) Like

IF you were around Panacea Estate this week, you would have noticed us transition the wine that was tasted and blends chosen and discussed in last week's article being transitioned to bottles and new wine from the 2025 vintage going into barrels.

From the outside, they don't look like much—rows of rounded, slightly stained barrels resting in the cool dark. But inside, a slow transformation is taking place. Over the course of a year (sometimes longer), oak barrels quietly shape the wine, coaxing out flavours, adding structure, and creating the final polish that you taste when you uncork a bottle.

It's not just storage. It's a collaboration between wood, wine, and time.

Let's take a look inside.

Month 1: First Contact

When a wine first goes into barrel, it's like introducing two strangers at a dinner party. There's an initial moment of adjustment. Freshly fermented wine is often raw, brash and a little wild. New oak—especially French oak like we use at Panacea—smells toasty, with hints of vanilla, spice, and smoke.

During these first weeks, the wine starts to 'settle in', picking up gentle oak compounds and beginning to breathe through the microscopic pores of the wood.

Months 2–4: Finding Balance

As autumn deepens into winter, the wine and barrel start building a relationship. Oxygen slowly seeps through the wood, softening tannins and rounding out sharp edges. Meanwhile, subtle oak flavours like clove, nutmeg, and cedar weave their way into the wine.

This is when I start regular barrel tastings—checking progress, topping up evaporation losses (what we call the 'angel's share') to make sure there is not too much air contact in the barrels and making notes about which barrels are evolving faster or slower.

As commented on last week with blending, each barrel has its own voice. Even barrels from the same cooperage, made from the same forest, can behave differently.

Months 5–8: Deepening Character

By now, the wine is really changing. Flavours grow deeper. Aromatics lift. Textures smooth out.

Depending on the wine style, at this time some wine makers may rack (transfer) the wine off heavy lees to freshen it up or stir the fine lees gently to build texture (a technique often used for whites).

Months 9–12: Judgement Calls

As spring arrives, it's time to think about decisions:

- Should this wine stay in oak longer for extra structure?
- Should it move to bottle soon to preserve freshness?
- Should it be blended with another barrel to balance out differences?
- Should this wine not be bottled as it is not at the quality wanted.

Not all wines behave the same.

At Panacea Estate, we don't rush this however typically wines are kept in the barrels for 12 months.

On a personal note, some days, when the work is done, I like to stand among the barrels, glass in hand and just listen. Time, patience and a little trust in nature. That's what makes a barrel more than just a vessel—it makes it a partner in the process.

BLAST FROM THE PAST

JOHN NOTT’S GOATS

IN 1858 John Nott was appointed Clerk of Courts at Maldon. Initially he, his wife Mary Anne and their young family lived in a tent on the Commissioners’ Reserve before a house was built for them next to the Court House. The Notts also established a private fenced garden in what is now the middle of the Bill Woodfull Oval and like many Maldon families they kept goats that provided them with a regular supply of fresh milk. These goats, like others in Maldon, probably roamed the town causing damage to public and private gardens.

On Tuesday 31st May 1864 Edward Ellis, the licensee of the Kangaroo Hotel, sued John Nott in the Maldon Police Court claiming £10 for the damage Nott’s goats had done to his garden.

Before the case was heard Ellis complained to the Bench about Nott’s conduct when he went to the Clerk of Court’s office to seek a summons. Nott told Ellis that he would draw up the summons and serve it on himself. Nott refused to show Ellis the summons or provide him with a copy. Ellis said he now found that the charge only referred to damage caused by goats on the day he laid the charge whereas it should have been for damage done on or before that day. Nott told the Bench that the charge must be for a particular offence and could not be cumulative.

The case proceeded and evidence clearly proved that the damage was done by a mob of goats that witnesses thought belonged to Nott. During the hearing Nott persistently interrupted witnesses, the prosecutor and even the Bench who several times had to call him to order. Eventually the case was dismissed, as it was not proved who owned the goats.

John Nott applied for costs saying he would donate them to the Maldon Hospital. The Bench refused to give costs saying that the nuisance caused by goats was intolerable and in this case the damage they caused to Ellis’s garden was evident even though they might not have belonged to Nott.

Immediately following this case, Nott charged Ellis with operating a billiard room without a licence. Through his solicitor Robert Garrett, Ellis pleaded guilty. Nott then said he felt it his duty to inform the Bench that Ellis had applied for a billiard licence but had not paid the fee when it was due. As a result Ellis had defrauded the revenue.

Robert Garrett objected to Nott’s vindictiveness saying that Nott had acted maliciously and taken upon himself the role of crown prosecutor and the duties of the police. The Bench said there could not be one law for Ellis and another for other publicans. They fined Ellis £10 reduced to one shilling if he took out his licence within three days.

John Nott’s behavior was widely condemned. The *Tarrangower Times* called his conduct “gross” and condemned his contempt of the Court. The *Times* also published doggerel lampooning Nott.

The Stella Prize

The annual Stella Prize is reasonably well known. But did you know of the other activities of the Stella organisation? (stella.org.au). Founded in 2012, it seeks to ‘actively champion Australian women writers, tackle gender bias in the literary sector, and connect outstanding books with readers.’ In addition to sponsoring the annual \$60,000 Stella Prize (named to honour Stella Maria Sarah Miles Franklin), the organisation supports a number of worthwhile initiatives: writer retreats, residencies and workshops, Stella Day Out events (free one-day literary festivals all over the country) and Stella On the Go, that places a selection of free books written by Australian women and non-binary authors on trams, trains, buses and in public spaces across the country.

The 2025 Stella Prize ‘short list’ has now been announced and it contains some firsts. For one author, the book is her first novel. And for the first time all shortlisted authors are ‘women of colour’. *Theory and Practice* by Michelle de Kretser is a novel that is also a memoir and an essay. Melanie Cheng’s novel, *The Burrow*, is a deceptively simple tale of family life during the 2019 COVID pandemic. As one reviewer described it “*The Burrow* recreates a feeling of false security in its pages. It is not until days after finishing Cheng’s work that you realise, with panic, that you’ve been afraid the whole time.” Look for this one on our library shelves. *Translations* by Jumaana Abdu (a first novel, written while she was a medical student) tells of Aliyah and her young daughter, Sakina, who have left the city behind to start a safe, quiet life on the land in rural New South Wales, hoping to become an ‘uncitizen’ as a means of self-preservation.

The three remaining shortlisted books are non-fiction. *Cactus Pear for My Beloved* by Samah Sabawi is the story of her family over the past 100 years, starting in Palestine under British rule and ending in Redland Bay in Queensland. *Black Convicts* by Santilla Chingaipe is subtitled *How Slavery Shaped Australia*. Did you know that on the First Fleet of 1788, at least 15 convicts were of African descent and by 1840 the number had risen to almost 500. They included the man who became Australia’s first bushranger, a ferryman named Billy Blue who gave his name to Sydney’s Blues Point and a prominent London Chartist who led the development of Australia’s labour movement. The final book, *Black Witness: The Power of Indigenous Media* is written by journalist Amy McQuire. It is a collection of ‘fierce and powerful essays proving why the media needs to believe black witnesses’.

Which book will win the 2025 Stella Prize? Past prize winners comprise six novels, two works of poetry and three non-fiction books. Winning such a prestigious award can tip the author into publishing, as well as literary success, allowing them to join the small number of Australian women making a living from writing exclusively. Watch this space: the 2025 Stella Prize winner will be announced on May 23.

Three Days in June by Anne Tyler, 2025

Gail Baines is having a bad day. To start, she loses her job—or quits, depending on whom you ask. Tomorrow her daughter Debbie is getting married and she hasn’t even been invited to the spa day organised by the mother of the groom. Then, Gail’s ex-husband Max arrives unannounced on her doorstep, carrying a cat, without a place to stay and without even a suit.

On This Ground: Best Australian Nature Writing edited by Dave Witty, 2025

This unique collection of Australia’s best new nature writing gathers together some of our most widely known and most original voices to reflect on our relationship with nature. These pieces, by turns compelling, urgent, poignant and passionate offer an insight into the wonder of the natural world around us, and form a clarion call for its protection.

Gone by Glenna Thomson, 2024

When Rebecca Bundy fails to return home after the last day of school in 1984, her father reports her missing. But the teenager has run away before and recently she’s been bragging about going to Queensland, so the police tell the family to wait it out.

Days pass. Rumours swirl. A man seen loitering near the bus stop might have followed her. Was there something going on between Rebecca and a male teacher? What about the sheep farmer on Glen Lochan Road where she babysat? And why is her boyfriend, the rough cattle guy Bull Tennant, so sure something sinister has happened?

The Burrow by Melanie Cheng, 2024

The Burrow follows members of the Lee family as they navigate grief and hope in their quiet Australian home. Jin, an emergency physician and father; Amy, a published author and mother; Lucie, their bookish and introverted 10-year-old; and Pauline, Amy’s mother who’s trying to make amends. Racked with grief for Ruby, Lucie’s baby sister who died in a shocking accident, the family adopts a rabbit in the hopes of bringing much-needed cheer to their home.

Past Lying by Val McDermid, 2023

It’s April 2020 and Edinburgh is in lockdown, but that doesn’t mean crime takes a holiday. It would seem like a strange time for a cold case to go hot, the streets all but empty, an hour’s outdoor exercise the maximum allowed, but when a source at the National Library contacts DCI Karen Pirie’s team about documents in the archive of a recently deceased crime novelist, it seems it’s game on again. What unspools is a twisted game of betrayal and revenge, but no one quite expects how many twists it will turn out to have.

The Paris Agent by Kelly Rimmer, 2023

1970 - In the aftermath of his war-ravaged past, Noah Ainsworth is still haunted by memories of his time as a fearless British operative in France. But a critical head injury left Noah with frustrating memory gaps and a burning question that plagues him; who was the agent who saved his life during that tragic final mission?






