Mended chair: collaborative effort

At the centre of the photo, and the story, is Hilary Da Costa, who noticed that the seat near the entrance to Tarrangower Village had collapsed and was in need of repair. She approached the Men's Shed and the Village's (volunteer) Committee of Management, who arranged an inspection of the resting spot. Maldon Men's Shed Secretary Barry Murphett said: "The seat was unsafe, it had rotted through," but the team was undaunted. "I said yeah, we can fix that! Part of it was a restoration and some of the seat timbers have just been refurbished."

Maldon Men's Shed is thriving and has increased to around 40 members in the past 12 months, with activities involving teens all the way through to blokes over 90. They build things and fix things but as with all volunteering, there is another side to the helping hand. Volunteers also benefit while offering assistance. Barry says: "The social stuff and getting out of the house, that's what the Men's Shed is there for — the woodwork and the

playing with the tools is just the carrot."

Hilary is very happy with the results, saying: "It's a delightful partnership to have, the Men's Shed is an institution that everyone knows about. They embraced the project with enormous enthusiasm and the chair looks great."

And as to what's next for the Maldon Men's Shed and Tarrangower Village (which by the way is a not-for-profit, community organisation too)? Barry said this collaborative partnership will continue for a while yet: "There are two more seats at the Tarrangower Village in the queue!"

Premier takes train to announce free seniors travel



PREMIER Jacinta Allan joined Member for Bendigo West Maree Edwards MP for a train ride from Bendigo to Castlemaine on Saturday 17 May to announce free weekend travel for seniors.

A throng of media representatives greeted the State Government representatives as they alighted at Castlemaine Station with a group of Seniors Card holders (which happened to include the Premier's parents). Passengers getting ready to travel on the Victorian Goldfields Railway (VGR) steam train to Maldon were surprised and amused at the unexpected activity — and security— at the station.

Premier Allan had taken the trip to announce that the The Victorian Budget 2025/26 (which was delivered on Tuesday 20 May) will make public transport free on the weekend for Seniors Card holders, statewide. "This is about supporting a fantastic public transport system and supporting families," the Premier said, saying it will be easier for seniors to visit loved ones as well as beautiful sites around the state. "We don't want cost to be a barrier to families spending time together."

To be eligible for a Senior Myki, travellers need a Victorian Seniors Card. Victorian Seniors Card holders must be permanent residents of Victoria, aged 60 or over and work less than 35 hours a week. Passengers with a Senior Myki will need to carry their Seniors Card while travelling and use their Senior Myki to touch on and off as usual - but Myki cards won't be charged. Cardholders will continue to be

eligible for a 50 per cent discount off the full fare on weekdays.

Ms Edwards laughed that the train had been full of Collingwood supporters, heading to a match in Melbourne, "Which I was really pleased to see." She added: "We have seen an increase in usage on this line." Ms Edwards also highlighted and praised the VGR steam train as a fantastic activity for families and visitors to the area.

Free travel for young people too

The Government also announced on Sunday 18 May that the budget will also include free travel for children on a new Youth Myki, which will be used like any other Myki to tap on and travel through ticket gates at stations and when getting on a bus or tram. The card will stay valid until the child turns 18 and it means free public transport for everyone under 18, everywhere in Victoria.

Gold event attracts history experts



A full weekend of historian talks, site visits and discussions about the impact of the Gold Rush attracted multitudes of participants across the region and beyond from Friday 16 to Sunday 18 May. 'The Alchemy of Gold' event was facilitated by Castlemaine Historical Society, Castlemaine Society, Chewton Domain Society, Maldon Museum and the Castlemaine Pioneers and Old **Residents Association.**

The weekend-long event was launched at Castlemaine Art Gallery on Thursday 15 May with introductions by Professor Keir Reeves who is the Co-Director of Future Regions Research Centre, Federation University. Also in attendance were CEO, National Trust of Australia (Victoria) Collette Brennan and former Premier of Victoria The Honorable John Brumby AO, who has long been an advocate for the Goldfields World Heritage bid.

Professor Reeves told the Tarrangower Times that the event attracted experts from far and wide. "There are groups from the heritage community and specialist historians from around the country,' he said, noting that: "Many hands together has made it possible."

The Alchemy of Gold was designed as a way to bring together experts, historians and the community to consider the economic, social and political impacts of the gold rush on Victoria. Maldon Museum President Derek Reid said The Alchemy of Gold offered participants the chance to undertake field trips to

places like Maldon's North British Mine and Taradale's 1860s Back Creek Siphon as well as Indigenous sites, sharing the history and the heritage. He said the weekend achieved its goals. "It provided a forum where people could exchange knowledge and network through all levels, from academics, local historians and general community members," Derek said. "I was certainly very pleased with the number of people who attended, there were around 200 people each day."

The launch event commenced with a powerful didgeridoo performance and Welcome to Country by Djaara's Jason Kerr who said: "A marathon starts with one step. We've all made the step onto Djaara Country, now we need to work together."

Director of Castlemaine Art Museum (CAM) Naomi Cass said: "Thank you for selecting CAM as the place for this remarkable intellectual festival."

Contentious levy law passes



the centre of a recent community meeting in Baringhup has been passed by the Victorian Parliament. The bill relating to the **Emergency Services and Volunteer Fund** was debated late into the night on Thursday 15 May and reportedly got the stamp of approval in the Upper House at around 2am.

Farmer and property owners, including many in the local area who were present at the Baringhup community meeting on Wednesday March 26, have argued against the changes and increases to what was the Fire Services Levy, as has Mount Alexander Shire Council

THE proposed State Government levy at (see also the *TT* editions of Friday 28 March and Friday 4 April). The Government says that the increased funding raised by the higher levy will allow a \$110 million investment to deliver a rolling fleet replacement program, which includes new tankers and rescue trucks, for VICSES and the CFA as well as Fire Rescue Victoria.

The Victorian Farmers Federation said it was disappointed in the outcome and it remains concerned about the impact the levy will have on farmers. "The sheer reality is that this levy will create a crippling financial burden to farmers," said VFF President Brett Hosking. "This decision shows a clear disconnect between our state government and the day-to-day realities faced by those on the land." Liberal Party Upper House Member for Northern Victoria Wendy Lovell MP described the new levy as an "excessive new tax" that comes at a time when farmers are already struggling. "Large parts of rural Victoria are currently experiencing horrendous drought conditions, and farmers are under incredible financial stress," she said.

Premier and MP respond to local concerns

During her visit to Castlemaine Station, Premier Jacinta Allan responded to a TT query about the timing of the new levy. "We know as a state and as a nation that we are experiencing more frequent and more severe weather events," she said, saying the levy would support people in rural and regional areas where these events often occur. The Government says the Emergency Services and Volunteers Fund (ESVF) will provide emergency services and volunteers with equipment to respond to increasing natural disasters.

There has also been some clarity provided to concerns raised at the community meeting, such as eligibility for volunteer rebates under the new levy. The Government describes

eligible volunteers as all active VICSES and CFA Operational and Support Volunteers who have served for at least 12 months, have passed probation and not been suspended on disciplinary grounds or taken a leave of absence for the duration of the preceding 12 months. The cost to property owners, which is calculated using Capital Improved Value, has been reduced from the originally proposed amount and the Government says it commits to transparency and ensuring that all the money raised by the levy goes to funding emergency services.

Member for Bendigo West Maree Edwards said that the issues discussed at the community meeting in Baringhup were relayed back to Spring Street "I think all of the concerns raised at the meeting were delivered to the Emergency Services Minister and Treasurer," she said. "That is the nature of consultation. This meant that there could be amendments." Ms Edwards said that her role as the Speaker of the House was not an impediment to her speaking for the community that she represents. "I still advocate and was able to advocate for my community and to the minister."

She also pointed to the bigger picture, saying: "Governments have to do what is most important for the whole state."

The mud map was created by Dja Dja Wurrung Elder Uncle Rick Nelson and designed by Trace Balla, local author and illustrator. It's a Djaara cultural interpretive sign, and includes pictures, information and landmarks from across the area, including Dja Dja Wurrung language names. It highlights both historical and contemporary culturally significant sites, and shows the shire's footprint from a precolonial perspective.

"We're incredibly lucky to have this beautifully designed map from Uncle Rick Nelson and Trace Balla," said Mayor Annear.

"It adds an important element of history, artwork and commemoration to Victory Park, which sits in the centre of Castlemaine."

"It will be great to share information about these important Djaara cultural heritage sites with the community," said Uncle Rick Nelson. Sorry Day Commemoration takes place on

Monday 26 May, 10am to 12pm at Victory Park, Castlemaine. Includes free barbecue supported by Castlemaine Lions Club.

Awards for early years educators

Victorians are encouraged to nominate their most innovative, inspiring and dedicated early years teachers, educators, organisations and programs improving outcomes for child in their critical early years.

Nominations for the Victorian Early Years Awards are now open; early childhood professionals and organisations, families and members of the community are encouraged to submit their nominations. Categories include creating collaborative community partnerships, improving access and participation and promoting children's health and wellbeing recognising the important work involved in improving the health, wellbeing, learning and development of children from birth to eight years. Victoria's entire early years sector, from maternal child health services to playgroups, early childhood initiatives and everything in between, are eligible for awards.

All winners will receive \$15,000 to further develop their initiatives and share the learnings of their approaches, or to support their professional development. Nominations for the Victorian Early Years Awards close on Thursday 12 June, with finalists announced in August. Report says Yallourn Power Station is unreliable

A report by Nexa, an advisory firm of experienced specialists focused on accelerating a clean energy transition, has found that a third of the time, Yallourn Power Station is experiencing an unexpected outage. It says that 32 percent of the time in 2024, the coal-fired power station was experiencing an unplanned outage for at least one of its four generators. "Unplanned" outages, as a category, does not include periods of time when a generator is closed for maintenance. If all outages are included, each of the four generators were down for roughly 12 weeks each year. The ageing power station is due to close in 2028, and Nexa's report suggests it is limping to the finish line. Yallourn Power Station, a 1,450 MW brown coal-fired facility located in Victoria's Latrobe Valley, has been a significant contributor to the state's electricity supply since its commissioning between 1974 and 1982. Scheduled for closure in 2028, Nexa says Yallourn has been experiencing increasing operational challenges, including frequent unplanned outages and high carbon emissions. It says these issues pose risks to Victoria's energy reliability, affordability, and decarbonisation objectives.

Rail Trail progresses

CASTLEMAINE Maryborough Rail Trail Inc. (CMRT) has appointed Fitzgerald Frisby Landscape Architecture (FFLA), in collaboration with a team of specialised subconsultants, to lead the pre-construction phase of the Castlemaine to Maryborough Rail Trail project.

The CMRT says it undertook a thorough and rigorous tender and evaluation process which included assessing the capability and capacity of organisations to perform the work, how well the proposal addressed the scope of work and the projected cost.

CMRT President Janice Simpson said, "The successful tenderer was selected from a robust field of businesses based throughout Australia. Competence and skill were key in our deliberations. We are very pleased to welcome FFLA on

board to take charge of the second stage of our project. It will be good to work with this professional and diligent team of experts again."

The tender evaluation team consisted of representatives from CMRT, Mount Alexander Shire Council (MASC) and Central Goldfields Shire Council (CGSC). CGSC procurement provided leadership and guidance throughout the process ensuring the rigour and professionalism required.

CGSC Mayor Councillor Grace La Vella said this milestone was an exciting step for tourism in the region. "We know that developments of this type bring people from far and wide to both our larger and smaller towns. It also opens up new possibilities for their communities to re-develop facilities and infrastructure left behind by the closure of rail services, many of which are historic landmarks. It makes sense to turn these neglected paths winding through our beautiful landscape back into wonderful trails of discovery."

MASC's Director Infrastructure and Development, Michael Annear said the appointment of FFLA is an important step in the project. "We look forward to working with the team at FFLA to bring this idea of a world class rail trail to fruition."

Following the successful completion of the Stage 1 Feasibility Study in 2023, FFLA and team will now progress the project by delivering a Reference Design and undertaking the necessary due diligence reports, including a Cultural Heritage Management Plan and an Ecological Assessment. The team



will also provide cost estimates for the trail construction and develop an operational model to support the ongoing management of the rail trail.

FFLA will also engage with landowners along the proposed trail alignment and conduct broader community consultation to ensure local perspectives are considered in the design and planning process.

The CMRT says Stage 2, the pre-construction project, will be completed by June 2026 and will lead directly into the construction of the rail trail between Maryborough and Castlemaine. Community-friendly vet clinic

POOCHES and their people gathered to celebrate the launch of the first regional Victorian not-for-profit vet clinic. Regional Community Vet Clinic (RCVC) has opened in Castlemaine; it will specialise in affordable veterinary care for Central Victorians, with a special focus on offering quality treatment for companion animals whose owners are having a financially hard time.

RCVC had been operating pop-up clinics around the region, obtaining spaces to work by partnering with local organisations and councils and it will continue to do so alongside running the permanent space. The organisation has created the permanent clinic through the work of volunteers and a fusion of funding from sources including the State Government through Animal Welfare Victoria and Regional Development Victoria; the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal; the Albert and Barbara Tucker Foundation; Community Bank Maldon & District and the Lions Club.

One of the founding members and RCVC President Dr Yvette Berkeley acknowledged the financial supporters at the launch: "This has made a difference for us and for the people and animals in Victoria." She also highlighted the role of volunteers involved in the organisation. "It's all about the collective power of volunteers. We could not have done it without them."

State Member for Bendigo West Maree Edwards MP, who unveiled the plaque to officially open the clinic, talked about how important it is to support companion animals in families that are struggling. She said that RCVC provides access: "This means that companion animals will be physically safe and well-looked-after into the future." Maree also revealed that her beagle, Beto, suffers from car sickness and wasn't able to attend the opening. Member for the Upper House in Victoria Georgie Purcell spoke about how projects like the RCVC can be achieved when MPs work together across party and (parliamentary) house lines*. "We joined together because we believe so strongly about the Regional Community Vet Clinic," Georgie said as her dog Larry, attempted to pull focus as well as her arm.

RCVC was created by a group of passionate people who believe that companion animals play a vital role in the welfare and overall wellbeing of residents in regional communities. The great many people who arrived to the launch event with their dogs seemed to demonstrate that pets are integral to the everyday enjoyment of life for many in the community.

Accidental alchemy

IT turns out that all those ancient philosophers, sages and scholars who have attempted to synthesise gold were on the right track but just lacked the necessary tech. On 14 May, scientists in Switzerland announced that they have created tiny amounts of gold "by accident."

Professor Ulrik Egede from Monash University's School of Physics and Astronomy provided further information and his description of how it occurred makes it sound at first like something that could be achieved in the shed: "The gold was created while scientists were smashing lead atoms into each other..." However, the "accident" in Switzerland took place at the Large Hadron Collider near Geneva which is the largest and most powerful particle accelerator in the world, ever (do look it up). Forget about fitting your smart phone in your pocket, this piece of technology is 27km around and lives in a tunnel hundreds of kilometres below ground. Professor Egede went on to say that the lead atoms were being smashed "...at almost the speed of light to mimic the state of the Universe around the time of the Big Bang." The goals of the Large Hadron Collider include answering fundamental questions about the world and the universe raised by particle physics; for example, to help understand gravity, matter, antimatter, energy and time. Making gold might have been a handy side-hustle when the estimated power consumption of the LHC is around 700 GWh per year, the size of a nation's.

But there's unlikely to be a technological gold rush any time soon. "The amount created is so small that the individual atoms are counted. These scientists created 29 trillionths of a gram, so would take billions of years to create just a single gram of gold this way," Professor Egede said.

Scientists are not calling it a waste of effort, because the accident still adds to the world's scientific knowledge. Professor Egede explained: "This accidental alchemy is important for the understanding of how particle beams behave in accelerators. Improving this can help physicists to run their experiments in a more efficient way in the future." Gold-lovers: don't pack up your bunsen burner or your metal-detector just yet.

Words in Winter: minestrone for the mind



THE organisers of the upcoming Words in Winter Festival have created an event that will be as warm and satisfying as a bowl of soup in winter - but for the brain instead of the belly. Words in Winter is a weekend of discussions and workshops in Maryborough about ideas, writing, communication, stories and more; it takes place from Friday 30 May to Sunday 1 June.

The organisers Janice Simpson, ex-academic and active member of 'Sisters in Crime,' (a national organisation to promote women crime authors in Australia) and Patty Browne, a former publisher, approached a variety of speakers through their networks and have created the event for locals. Ms Simpson said: "I think the festival is for locals who want to explore and discuss ideas. It's conversations about topics that are important to the local community."

The line-up of events features a range of guests with a variety of interests and areas of expertise. There is a workshop for writers with author Tania Chandler about how to create complex characters, plus panel discussions about the positive aspects of ageing and dealing with despair in the modern world. A group of crime writers will discuss their work in an event called 'Crime Pays!'. Local librarians will host a fun-sounding 'romp through words'. Real-life experts such as the Victorian Coroner and doctors from the Victorian Institute of Forensic Medicine will explore the real-life processes of crime scene investigation (the program states: 'It will not be gruesome.'). There will be chats about how birds communicate, a new approach to wellbeing through Social Prescribing and Barry Golding will have a conversation with Lynne Kelly about his fascinating research and book, *Six Peaks Speak*.

There are many other names of note in the line-up, including broadcaster Ramona Koval, author and writing coach Lee Kofman, novelists Dennis Glover and Christine Keighery, plus journalist/academic Denis Muller. It will be an amazing opportunity to hear from a variety of generous experts who specialise in 'words'.

But Ms Simpson said the festival is not another 'writers festival' and is more about sparking conversations. "It's fun, there's usually lots of laughs; no session is without humour. It's a great way of just being with a group of people and listening, laughing, talking, thinking". She encourages local people to come along, even if it seems outside their comfort zone. "It's a community event and it's not scary or high-brow."

ANZAC HILL

IT'S definitely possible to spend time in town and not get into nature but why would you do that when the town is surrounded by beautiful bushland and paddocks, some full of marvellous boulders? Naturally you'd need some pointers to find the good 'nature', because many of those giant marbles are on private land. It's also definitely possible to fall into a mine shaft around here and create your own soap-opera cliff-hanger; not recommended in real life.

ANZAC Hill is an example of nature that's close and not too treacherous; just on the outskirts of Maldon, where the kangaroos hang out (when they are not in town themselves, in the evenings). The funny thing is that ANZAC Hill was not always so lush and bushy as it appears these days; it was denuded in the nineteenth century and evidence of new planting can be seen in antique photos of the hill. It's possible to drive up ANZAC Hill from Cox Street or you can walk up the short side from Spring Street; there are a few points of interest including a war relic and there are old mining remains but it's worth it just for the great view of Maldon, made lovelier by the autumn colours when we visited. The lookout spot is a few hundred metres from Spring Street (follow the paths) and a great way to show a new perspective of the town to visitors.

Walking on and up to ANZAC Hill is a very pleasant activity to do with your dog but please use a dog-lead so you can stick together. The model in the photo met an off-leash dog while walking up the hill and while everyone is ok, it caused a fright all-round. When the sheep won't listen – A guide to wine and lamb pairing

WE love our sheep. They're hardworking, low-maintenance, and don't ask for much beyond a patch of grass and the occasional escape attempt as we covered off in last week's article. But let's be honest. Sometimes they get a bit too comfortable in the vineyard. They're supposed to keep the weeds down, add a bit of fertiliser, and then shuffle off to other pastures when the vines start to wake up in spring.

But occasionally, they linger. They push boundaries. They eat things they shouldn't. And that's when thoughts start to drift from wool to roast. So, if a few of our woolly workers decide they'd rather munch on fresh bud burst than winter grasses, here's a guide to turning a sheepish situation into a perfect pairing.

Why lamb and wine are such a great match

Lamb and wine are a classic duo, and it's no wonder. The rich, slightly gamey flavour of lamb loves the structure, depth, and complexity of a good red. It's a bit like a sheep finding the tastiest vine shoots in the paddock—just a natural fit.

Here are a few classic pairings we recommend (sheep behaviour permitting):

Lamb Shanks and Shiraz

Big, bold, and structured. The tannins in Shiraz cut through the richness of slow-cooked lamb shanks, while the wine's peppery notes complement the earthy, savoury flavours of the meat. Panacea Shiraz – Big enough to handle a rich lamb stew or shanks, with dark berry flavours and a touch of peppery spice. **Butterflied Lamb and Shiraz - Cabernet Blend**

Fire up the grill and break out a blend. The firm tannins and dark fruit notes of a good Cabernet cut through the fatty, charred edges of barbecued lamb, making this a match that's as much about texture as taste.

Rack of Lamb and Grenache

For something a bit more refined, a rack of lamb pairs



beautifully with a medium-bodied Grenache. The wine's bright red fruit and hint of spice play well with the slightly sweet, tender cuts.

Lamb salad and Rosé

For those rare, warm winter days or in Autum leading up to Winter and it is still nice warmer weather, when a lighter touch is needed. Pair with lamb cutlets straight off the barbecue with a rosé or Panacea Estate Little Red.

On a personal note, I should point out that we don't actually turn our vineyard grazers into dinner (they're more like co-workers), but the joke always comes up when I catch a few of them lingering a little too long among the fresh shoots. What goes on down at the Maldon Men's Shed?

t is often asked what a Men's Shed is all about. Well let's try and explain it in simple terms.

The aim of Men's Sheds throughout Australia and internationally is to provide a safe, neutral environment where men can come together, have a chat, and develop new acquaintances and friendships. Historically, there has been little encouragement for some men to take an interest in their own health and well-being over many years. Most men are reluctant to talk about their emotions, sad experiences and personal health and that means that they usually don't ask for help. Probably because of this, many men are less healthy than women, they take more risks, and they suffer greater from isolation, loneliness and depression. Relationship breakdowns, death of a partner or family member, retrenchment or early retirement from a job, loss of children following divorce, physical or mental illness are just some of the problems that men find it difficult to deal with on their own.

At the Maldon Men's Shed

The Maldon Men's Shed welcome and invite all men within the Mount Alexander Shire and surrounding areas to visit our Shed and perhaps become a member. Our members are involved in a range of activities from woodworking, restoration, metalwork and community-based and personal projects. We have guest speakers on men's health along with socialising, outings to places of interest and developing friendships. So please come and have a cuppa and biscuit with us.

Our members come from diverse and interesting backgrounds, with ages from 16 to 94, some are retired, semi-retired or are self-employed. The background skills some members have come from industries such as: agriculture, mechanical and general engineering, building, finance, insurance, business administration, trade skills, teaching, marketing, health, transport, carpentry, cabinetmaking, environment management, to mention a few.

Our workshop prides itself on the safe work environment and possesses some excellent equipment which we have acquired through grants, fundraisers, community work and donations. Currently the shed is open on Wednesdays from 10am to 4pm.

The Maldon Men's Shed is run by a committee of volunteers and operates on a non-profit basis and is entirely reliant on grants, self-generated funds and donations.

Several pairs were observed alighting at hollows in large River Red Gums at the Loddon River Reserve, poking about the entrances and entering the hollows on a number of occasions. Musk Lorikeets breed locally and typically become most active around their nest sites in late winter.

Castlemaine Graffiti Busters



Looking for a fun and useful volunteer activity? Become a 'Buster'

re you looking for a fun, empowering and meaningful volunteer activity that helps preserve the beauty and safety of Mt Alexander Shire?

Why not join Castlemaine Graffiti Busters?

We are a group of volunteers who meet about twice a month for a few hours to remove ugly and illegal graffiti tags from private property in the shire (with permission), to help restore civic pride and discourage further crime.

Graffiti busting is a safe and social activity that's always followed by coffee and cake.

On the job training provided, along with public liability insurance through Castlemaine & District Neighbourhood Watch.

Our core group of five had been lobbying for years for more action to combat the proliferation of ugly, illegal and misogynistic tags in the shire, but the last straw came in December 2023 when the ABC named Castlemaine 'the graffiti capital of Victoria' based on police per-capita statistics.

Inspired by the highly successful Beaumaris Graffiti Busters, the group held a fund-raising concert in June last year to buy a trailer equipped with graffiti removal equipment and paint, raising almost \$10,000, including a \$3,000 grant from Mt Alexander Shire Council and a \$1,400 grant from Castlemaine Rotary Club.

More than 20 'busts' later, the group has proved that prompt and persistent removal works.

Busters' Co-President Marli Wallace said, "They come back, but so do we."

he Nuggetty area is a region of hills and rolling farmland situated northwest of Maldon. With responsibility for around 5,200 hectares, the Nuggetty Land Protection Group was established in 1991 by local primary producers to prevent land degradation.

The Nuggetty Land Protection Group members are diverse, made up of 'blockies' and local farmers with plenty of experience and knowledge to share. Activities vary, including weed control, nest box monitoring and revegetation.

The group also cares for the old Nuggetty School site and Peace Cairn, where ANZAC Day services are held yearly.

You may not know it, but a railway line once extended from Maldon to Shelbourne. The line was opened in 1891 and was originally going to extend to Laanecoorie before that plan was abandoned. Nuggetty Land Protection Group members conduct nature walks along the Shelbourne Railway track, finishing at the Shelbourne Station and silo complex. The group also worked with Loddon Shire to install interpretive signage along the track.

The Nuggetty Land Protection Group produced several calendars as part of a history project a few years back, and oral histories have been collected.

If you've read this far, you will understand that a landcare group doesn't just 'plant trees'. The Nuggetty Land Protection Group members range in age from one to 90-plus, and all have something to contribute. The group would like to thank present volunteers for their work and would also love to hear from anyone who might be interested in helping out from time to time.

AT the opening of the Maldon Artist Network (MANet) Gallery exhibition of Plein Air paintings of the Maldon and District Goldfields last Saturday 17 May, there was a special guest appearance of Lola Montez (Aka Eliza Tree).

As no doubt you know, Lola visited the Central Victorian Goldfields in 1855, she travelled and performed from Ireland to India across Europe, the United States, and Australia, causing constant controversy and thrilling crowds as she went. 'Our Lola', who is an artwork in herself, read a poem about the original to great applause.

The *Plein Air* Exhibition in the MANet Gallery is a contemporary interpretation of the Maldon and District Goldfields by local artists exploring the theme of plein air paintings as they are today, retracing the works of S.T. Gill'. Samuel Thomas Gill (21 May 1818 – 27 October 1880), also known by his signature S.T.G., was an English-born Australian artist who captured the essence of tralia

colonial Australia.

As no doubt you also know, 'En plein air' painting, means 'in the open air' in French, and is the practice of painting outdoors directly from the subject. This method allows artists to capture the immediate effects of light, weather, and atmosphere of their subjects. There are 12 artists participating in this exhibition, which MANet mounted as part of the Maldon and Castlemaine Forum on *The Alchemy of Gold* from May 16 – 18, which, in turn, is part of

the National Trust's Australian Heritage Festival. The Festival also includes a series of lectures, workshops and field visits in and around Castlemaine.

The local area is a rich source of inspiration with intriguing rock formations, aged gum trees and the big sky. One of the artists in the exhibition is Brendan Nicholl. He is also a finalist in the Maldon Portrait Prize and won the Castlemaine Rotary art show last year.

I had a chat with Brendan about his work while the exhibition was being set up. He explained that he originally trained as a sign writer and has spent many years painting and designing. He took up plein air painting about 10 years ago and really enjoys going out into the landscape with his equipment on the tailgate of his truck and capturing the changing light. His paintings can take up to two to four hours to complete while out there.

He said that, "The feeling of job satisfaction and independence is there. Everything I require is at hand: the scene before me, my toolbox on my tailgate and above all, the love I have for being in nature. This district has a huge presence in terms of climate and beauty and my instincts

connect with it by painting it, wishing to record its character and the way it makes me feel. Painting the landscape always reveals a story about us and our relationship to the land." His paintings display a very subtle palette.

Historic Reserve burn complete

VARIOUS local environmental groups including Friends of Maldon Historic Reserve; Maldon Urban Landcare Group; Muckleford Landcare; Muckleford Forest Friends; Friends of the Box-Ironbark Forest and Castlemaine Field Naturalists have been consulting with Fire Forestry Management (FFM) staff since 2022 in regard to the planned burn near the Railway Track in the Maldon Historic Reserve. This included onsite meetings and email updates since then. The burn was originally planned to take place in Autumn 2023 but was postponed due to weather conditions not being suitable for a low-intensity burn.

Concerns were raised about how the fire might impact flora and fauna in the burn and surrounding areas. Several patches of the Small-flowered grevillea, Grevillea micrantha, rare in our district, plus various other wildflowers, including orchids, were within the designated area to be burned. FFM were willing to listen and, after walking these areas with staff, it was agreed that areas where these rare species were growing would be excluded from the planned burn area.

Two members of the Friends of Maldon Historic Reserve met the Operations Manager for FFM, on Monday 5 May for a pre-burn meeting. He explained the procedures that would be followed when the burn is ignited and invited us to drive the site with him once the burn was going.

The burn was ignited on Friday 9 May and we accompanied the manager on the next day to view progress. He explained that the fire is a low-intensity burn to remove 4cm of potential fuel and prevent future elevated bushfire hazards. A pre-burn fire was lit to create smoke so that animals could get away. He advised that staff had relocated several lizards following the pre-burn.



There were 35 FFM staff both lighting and patrolling the site. The area burned is approx. 110 hectares divided up into blocks. Melbourne University staff/students had placed temperature probes around the site to measure heat levels. The weather conditions over the period of the burn and subsequently were ideal i.e. clear skies, little wind and correct moisture levels.

From what we heard and observed firsthand, this seemed like a well-planned and executed controlled burn. It was conducted over three days and completed on the afternoon of Sunday 11 May and is now being patrolled.

The Operations Manager has invited us to accompany him to check the outcome in around eight weeks' time.

Maldon's gardens from the goldmining era



IN 1966, Maldon was declared Australia's first notable town by the National Trust. To help secure the preservation of the town, the *Maldon Conservation Study* was commissioned by the Victorian Government in 1977 to record the history of particular buildings within the historic centre of Maldon.

In spite of the heavy emphasis on the conservation of architectural history, little was done towards the protection of Maldon's landscape and its early trees, shrubs and gardens. To overcome this situation, a study was commissioned, titled *Trees and Gardens from the Goldmining Era A Study of the Maldon Landscape* and was prepared by the Department of Planning by the Royal Botanical Gardens, Melbourne. Compiled during 1980-1981, this was the first time (most likely in the whole country) that a detailed assessment of a 19th-century landscape had been undertaken.

The study consisted of a survey of all street trees and significant trees in High Street and Main Street; a survey of all pre-19th-century private gardens; a brief study of the overall landscape, and suggestions on how to increase public awareness of the findings.

The Study outlines how the regeneration of natural vegetation on the goldfields led to the predominance of two native shrubs: golden wattle (*Acacia pycnantha*) and Chinese scrub (*Cassinia arcuata*). The most conspicuous exotic tree that colonises the area is the South American Pepper Tree (*Schinus molle*). Exotic shrubs such as various brooms and boxthorn were introduced as hedge plants and are not regarded as characteristic of early goldfields, but they do contribute to the character of the area.

The early gardens in Maldon show regularities in structure and design, including a front picket fence and can be represented by three distinctive styles. Firstly, small cottages - bedding boxes with shrubs in the front, orchard at the side and vegetable plot at the rear. Secondly, larger, more affluent homes with formal gardens – specimen trees near fence, centre pathway with circular bed for specimen tree, all surrounded by bedding plants edged with hedge planting. And finally, houses set back from the road, away from the main urban area – driveway bordered by formal planting; fruit trees dominate the front of the property with small formal beds in front of the verandah.

Part of the Study's recommendations state that owners of gardens in areas of historical interest should be encouraged to develop gardens along lines in keeping with the period.

The large number of well-preserved gardens we can see in Maldon today can be, in part, attributed to the in-depth study of this report.

National Reconciliation Week

This week marks the start of National Reconciliation Week – 27 May to 3 June. These are significant dates for all Australians. May 27 was the date of the 1967 referendum when, by an overwhelming majority, Australians voted to remove clauses in the Australian Constitution that discriminated against Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. June 3 marks the historic 1992 Mabo decision in which the High Court recognised native title.

The word reconciliation means the restoration of harmony, the renewal of friendship, the process of parties coming to peace with each other. It is a very positive term, about strengthening relationships between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and non-Indigenous peoples, for the benefit of *all* Australians. Making a kinder, more peaceful country. In a world where conflict appears to be the norm, harmony, friendship and peace seem even more desirable.

In her most recent book, Unsettled: A Journey Through Time and Place, the Australian author Kate Grenville describes a memorial in a small town called Bingara, northwest of Tamworth in NSW. This is the town closest to the site of the Myall Creek Massacre, where in 1838 a group of white men trapped about 30 'natives', old men, women and children, forcing them into the bush and killing them, later burning their bodies. Seven men were eventually tried and hanged. Descendants of both the killers and the victims still live in the area, in what Grenville describes as what could have become 'a town divided, a town stiff with silence, a town of pain on one side and self-righteous defensiveness on the other'. Instead, in 2000 the small community came together to create a memorial 'in an act of reconciliation, and in the acknowledgment of the truth of our shared history'. Grenville writes, 'there is no way forward without acknowledging the things that were done... To know them and to understand that we have to live with what we know.... To pick up our grief and sorrow and not look for somewhere to put it down as something that is too heavy for us'.

Kate Grenville's books, including *Unsettled* (2025), *The Secret River* (2005), *The Lieutenant* (2007), *Sarah Thornhill* (2011), *A Room Made of Leaves* (2020), and *Restless Dolly Maunder* (2023) can be found on the shelves of the Maldon Athenaeum Library.

Library reviews

The Dark Lands by Markus Heitz, 2019

1629: The Thirty Years' War with its conflicts shakes Europe and rages particularly mercilessly in Germany. The young adventuress Aenlin Kane travels to the neutral city of Hamburg to explore the legacy of her famous father, Solomon Kane. Together with her friend Tahmina, a Persian mystic, she is drawn into the turmoil of the war. They accept a mission from the West Indian Company. A motley crew is supposed to fight its way behind enemy lines to the Southern German town of Bamberg, where the stakes are already burning for the most cruel witch trials, however, things take an unexpected turn.

The Bitter Season by Tami Hoag, 2016

A murder from the past. A murder from the present. And a life that was never meant to be. As the dreary, bitter weather of late fall descends on Minneapolis, Detective Nikki Liska is restless. After moving to the cold case squad in order to spend more time with her sons, she misses the rush of pulling an all-nighter, the sense of urgency of hunting a murderer on the loose. Most of all she misses her old partner, Sam Kovac.

Sam is having an even harder time adjusting to Nikki's absence, but is distracted from his troubles by an especially brutal double homicide: a middle-aged husband and wife bludgeoned and hacked to death in their home with a ceremonial Japanese samurai sword. Nikki's case, the unsolved murder of a family man, community leader, and decorated sex crimes detective for the Minneapolis PD, is less of a distraction.

Stealing Snow by Danielle Paige, 2016

Seventeen-year-old Snow has spent her life locked in Whittaker Psychiatric but she isn't crazy. And that's not the worst of it. Her very first kiss proves anything but innocent when Bale, her only love, turns violent.

Despite Snow knowing that Bale would never truly hurt her, he is taken away dashing her last hope for any sort of future in the mental ward she calls home. With nowhere else to turn, Snow finds herself drawn to a strange new orderly who whispers secrets in the night about a mysterious past and a kingdom that's hers for the taking if only she can find her way past the iron gates to the Tree that has been haunting her dreams. Beyond the Tree lies Algid, a land far away from the real world, frozen by a ruthless king. And there awaits the River Witch, a village boy named Kai, the charming thief Jagger, and a prophecy that Snow will save them all.

Suspect by Robert Crais, 2013

LAPD cop Scott James is not doing so well. Eight months ago, a shocking nighttime assault by unidentified men killed his partner Stephanie, nearly killed him, and left him enraged, ashamed, and ready to explode. He is unfit for duty until he meets his new partner.

Maggie is not doing so well, either. A German shepherd who survived three tours in Iraq and Afghanistan sniffing explosives before losing her handler to an IED, her PTSD is as bad as Scott's. They are each other's last chance. Shunned and shunted to the side, they set out to investigate the one case that no one wants them to touch: the identity of the men who murdered Stephanie. What they begin to find is nothing like what Scott has been told, and the journey will take them both through the darkest moments of their own personal hells.

Eye of the Oracle by Byran Davis, 2006

Eye of the Oracle takes the reader back in time to the days when dragons abounded. From the era just before Noah's ark, through the battles between dragons and mankind in the time of King Arthur, and to the haunting presence of dragons in our day, this stunning prequel reveals the mysteries that led to the bestselling fantasy adventure that began with *Raising Dragons*.

How did dragons survive the flood? Who helped preserve an ancient evil force that led to the demise of the dragons in the days of King Arthur? What heroic sacrifices kept that evil from exterminating the dragon race forever?
