

Councillor's Column with Tarrengower Ward Councillor Stephen Gardner



The Maldon Streetscape project is still ongoing and you wouldn't know it but most of the street is now operating currently on the underground cables. PowerCor is on track to have everything finished by the end of June.

Driver fined

UNSAFE loads pose a danger to all road users, property and the environment.

When out on patrol last Friday morning, Maryborough Police came across a vehicle (pictured) and dished out a \$578 fine to the driver for carrying an unsafe load.

There are so many heritage experts involved in this project including expert consultants, local heritage expertise, the Council's heritage advisor, and numerous and extensive heritage reports. It's the heritage aspect of Maldon that makes this community unique.

Some of the elements like new cross overs have been designed to improve access and make it safer for many people in our community. This includes the more elderly people and people with mobility issues.

The cross overs will slow down traffic and make it safer and easier for people to cross the road and gutters.

We as a community need to cater for and be inclusive of everyone. I do find it sad that, for some reason, several people seem to have no concern about this.

Apart from the cross overs, there will be new furniture, street lighting, resurfacing of roads and paths, restoration of the gutters and a grants' program to restore shopfronts.

This is a large investment from the Victorian Government and Council, and I for one am very pleased to see that Maldon is getting the attention it deserves.

May Council meeting

Council meetings are back to 'normalish' in our usual meeting place but conducted within COVID-19 rules and they are still being streamed on YouTube. The Council approved the community grants round and there were several successful groups in Maldon; I am looking forward to seeing their projects up and running. These grants, whilst only small, make a lot of difference to these volunteer organisations.

Most of the other business at the meeting was administrative with two planning applications in Castlemaine, both of which were very difficult decisions to make. Council officers recommended that no permit be granted for the establishment of a medical centre in a residential street. I supported this recommendation due to neighbour amenity issues and that, with the current shortage of housing across the Shire, we should not be supporting residential housing properties being turned into commercial properties. The majority of Councillors supported not issuing a permit.

The other application was to demolish a building and build a new one. The building to be demolished was an example of an original miner's cottage and whilst it was in a state of disrepair, the front façade could have been kept. Council officers recommended that no permit be issued, and I supported that. Unfortunately, most Councillors did support issuing a permit for their own reasons.

Council 2021-22 **Draft Budget**

In the April Council meeting it was agreed to advertise the 2021-22 budget for public consultation. I know many people have made submissions and on Tuesday 25 May a special meeting will be held to hear responses and listen to people's concerns or projects. I look forward to hearing from these people before I decide on how I will be voting on this budget.

Maldon will have another busy month no doubt, so stay safe and be kind to each other.

Community **Consultation Sham**

The proposed crossover designs for Main Street, Maldon are horrific.

In recent years, residents such as myself have given significant time and energy participating in Council's various streetscape working groups/sub-committees.

These opportunities were presented to us as part of Council's commitment to 'community consultation'. It is now apparent that this was a sham. We have been used.

What has been delivered on Main Street is not what the sub-committee I sat on endorsed or anticipated. It was to be a temporary trial of the least intrusive design possible. Plainly, we have been had. The illusion of choice was no true choice. None of the 'options' are acceptable yet we are not allowed to say no. What has been executed was clearly predetermined. I was a fool to think otherwise.

All four designs are out of keeping with the precious heritage streetscape for which Main Street is celebrated and frequented by tourists.

These 'off-the-shelf' designs are better suited to a run-of-the-mill urban environment.

Why can't we have an inexpensive and low key solution (to what is actually an unquantified and poorly understood problem)?

For example, a plain white wooden post either side of the gutter crossing (similar to outside the Post Office) would give pedestrians greater space between parked cars to cross and avoid the need to introduce new materials into the fabric of the street. Or better still, reduce the speed limit on Main Street.

Just because Council has money to burn does not mean they have to go shopping for something we do not need or want. Perhaps they could focus on repairing footpaths and maintaining heritage gutters. Get the basics right first.

Based on my engagement with Council, there is a total lack of respect for residents and no genuine desire to listen or understand. The goodwill has gone.

This is just the tip of the iceberg. The design selected will be rolled out throughout the town as part of her 'beautification'.

Those who are actually making the decisions for us do not live here and will move on to another Council someday with their burgeoning portfolios. We will be the ones struggling to answer 'how did you let this happen to Maldon?'

Our town is special. It deserves expert care and sensitivity. I feel she is lost. RIP Maldon heritage. Millicent Lang, Resident, Maldon.

"(Locally) we're thicker on the ground than anywhere in the world."

Council on track to slash greenhouse emissions



The Dundonnell Wind Farm near Mortlake will be one of two wind farms to provide renewable energy for the VECO project.

MOUNT Alexander Shire Council is one of 46 Victorian Councils to sign on to VECO, the Victorian Energy Collaboration, the largest ever emissions reduction project by local government in Australia.

VECO, led by Darebin City Council in Melbourne's north, will provide 45 per cent of all Victorian Councils' electricity requirements with 100 per cent renewables, reducing greenhouse emissions by 260,000 tonnes of C02-e every year.

Provided by Red Energy, the 240GWh of clean power is equivalent to powering 48,000 homes with

renewables or removing the emissions from 90,000 cars every year.

The ground-breaking project will reduce each of the Council's current energy bills and reduce electricity prices by using clean renewable energy generated in Victoria.

By joining the project, Mount Alexander Shire Council will power 100 per cent of its total electricity use with 100 per cent renewables.


This includes streetlights, public toilets and facilities such as the Civic Centre, Castlemaine Town Hall, community buildings and the Castlemaine Library.

"I'm delighted to say that by signing on to the VECO project, we've met a key milestone of Council's Roadmap to Carbon Neutrality 2020-25," said Council's CEO Darren Fuzzard.

"As of January next year, we anticipate to have zero-emissions electricity for all Council-managed operations, cutting out over 700 tonnes of greenhouse emissions per year."

The renewable energy will be provided by two wind farms in Victoria – Dundonnell wind farm near Mortlake and Murra Warra II wind farm near Horsham.

A range of stimulating



Stephan, a well-known musician, very sadly passed away on April 26, 2020 at the age of 60.

Lewis, 32, juggles his time and commitments between life in Melbourne and in Maldon, the latter being a place to recharge the batteries and work on his sculptures with fellow artist Joshua Petherick.

The pair recently finished putting together their third body of work from a shedturned-studio located on the property at the base of ANZAC Hill.

"We're not driven by anything didactic or even sensible," he laughs. "Basically we began collaborating because we both share an interest in hobby activities, special effects and applications."



THE HORTICULTURAL SHOW

School.

On the evening of Tuesday, 20 May, 1902 the Maldon Methodist congregation opened their third annual Flower Show and Industrial Exhibition at the Maldon Temperance Hall (now the Community Centre). The Show ran over three days and featured not just horticulture, but also cooking, music, art and handicrafts. The organising committee offered prize money in over 150 categories.

At an organising meeting a week prior to the Show it was decided to include a 'Ping-Pong' table with a small charge to play. Edward Lloyds also offered the use of his dart gun and Mrs Jane Rowe was elected as convener of the 'Look Out' committee that was charged with seeing that the exhibits were not interfered with.

On the opening night, after Rev Charles Fowler offered a short prayer, Rev William Palamountain welcomed all those present. In his remarks he emphasised the refining influence of horticulture, music and the other arts. He also asked everyone to patronise the various stalls that had been set up and so drop 'a few coppers in our coffers'. He concluded by thanking the judges who had provided their valuable services and in particular, Rev Edward Sugden, Master of Queen's College at the University of Melbourne who had agreed to judge the musical and vocal competitions. The opening evening also featured items by the Maldon Orchestral Society and concluded with a dumb bell performance by

their partners were invited to a social at the Methodist Sunday School in Fountain Street. The evening featured musical items, parlour games and some interesting chemistry experiments performed by Horace Paull. The highlight of the evening was a 'Ping-Pong' tournament. At the end of a very enjoyable

evening the Rev Palamountain thanked everyone for supporting the Show and announced that the proceeds would be used to improve the Sunday school building.

Joe O'Loughlin, a clinical psychologist is nearby and trying desperately to persuade the woman to come off the bridge. She whispers, 'You don't understand', and jumps. Joe is haunted by his failure to save the woman but when

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

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Millions for Maryborough

A \$95 million allocation in last week's State Budget to fund the upgrade and expansion to the Maryborough District Health Service has been welcomed by Central Goldfields Mayor Chris Meddows-Tavlor.

He said the funding, on top of the \$5 million already allocated, will significantly expand the shire's health services but also encourage many more visitors to Maryborough and the wider Goldfields region.

When it comes to cash being splashed about, it's been a big month for Maryborough.

As previously reported in the TT, Regional Development Minister Mary-Anne Thomas recently announced \$1.8 million for Stage 2 of Maryborough Railway Station.

Minister then The

announced an additional \$1 million to support Go Goldfields and its focus on the early years in the new Go Goldfields HQ in the Maryborough Resource Centre.

"We will continue to lobby for added train services and

sewerage for Talbot so we can have all the components of the Ballarat-Maryborough's growth corridor in place to capitalise on the diverse range of opportunities a major regional centre creates," Cr Meadows said.

Regional rail upgrade

PASSENGERS in the Greater Bendigo area are set to receive more frequent train services, thanks to work underway to introduce new technology on the regional network.

The new electronic train order (ETO) system will be installed on the Bendigo to Swan Hill and Echuca line.

The upgrade will see more train services delivered to Eaglehawk, Epsom and Echuca.

Local MP and State Minister for Transport and Infrastructure, Jacinta Allan, said, "This project will triple the number of services to Echuca and make those services faster, connecting passengers in these communities to more opportunities for work, education, health and recreation within Bendigo and Melbourne."

Planning for the upgrade is now underway and the work is expected to be completed by 2022.

The upgrade is being delivered by the Federal and State governments.


