The couple recently sold the winery to Peter Christen of Bendigo, who plans to continue making wine on the

property.

But for the Chapples, it's back to Melbourne – to the Oakleigh area where their children, grandchildren and great children live.

Mind you, moving back to the big smoke is going to take some adjustment.

Harvesting and wine making have been part of their daily routine for the past two decades and Lynette says she has loved every minute of it

"The picking, the sorting and everything to do with making wine has been our way of life here at the winery," Lynette says.

The couple bought the picturesque 100 acre, 'bare block of dirt' back in 1999 and built their beautiful home, vineyard, winery plant and Cellar Door from scratch. It all sits on the shore line of beautiful Cairn Curran Reservoir.

Arthur recalls that they started off by making Shiraz and then decided they needed a white so they added a Rosé. "We did that for a couple

of years and then we discovered 150 rogue Semillon vines amongst the Shiraz so we extended (the range) again, and later we developed a Cabernet Sauvignon," he said.

The first commercial vintage was released in 2004. They had come a long

way from their life in Mount Waverley where Arthur

worked as a plumber. *Continued on page 5*

SEVERAL residents have raised concerns about works that are currently underway on the perimeter of Porcupine Village on the corner of Allans and Maldon-Bendigo roads, Maldon.

are bulldozer "There tracks there less than a metre from the Maldon-Bendigo Road and quite a few trees have been knocked down," said a resident, who did not want to be named.

"What's going on? It looks like they're putting in a BMX track or something?'

Doug Baird, the manager of Porcupine Village, told the TT they were actually putting in a new boundary fence for security reasons.

"(Mount Alexander Shire) Council has been informed and they have given us permission to clear a 4 metre track so the fencer can get in there and do the work," Mr Baird said.

"We've been verv conscious of the number of trees we've pulled down and have actually dog-legged some to miss them."

Mr Baird said a local landscaping architect has been engaged to help work through the rest of the plan to keep everything as pristine as possible.

He said the fence should be

10 years, has recently been purchased and is in the process of being brought back to life, with the help of Jimmy Chaplin, who was involved with the initial building, 30 years ago.

According to Jimmy, the previous owner would source old buildings from local towns and have them brought back to Porcupine Village and reassembled.

The biggest of these, the old Barn, Jimmy says, was originally owned by a family in Moolort, and brought to Maldon, where it was carefully returned to its original state and was often used as a place where locals would gather for dances on a full moon.

On the day of filming,

the barn was set up as a makeshift dressing room, hairdressing studio and gathering place for the cast and team of extras to warm their cold hands by the fire.

The biting cold did little to deter the excitement of the huddles of extras, all happy to spend their Sunday being part of a movie production, particularly those with a keen interest in acting and filmmaking.



MELBOURNE-BASED local historian, Ken James has just completed A History of Muckleford.

The book is 503 pages in length it is made up of 24 chapters and 20 appendices.

Ken is the co-author of Yapeen of Yesterday (2017), A History of Seventeen Central Victorian Schools: Baringhup, Baringhup East, Baringhup West, Bradford, Brokenback, Eastville, Gowar, Muckleford, Muckleford South, Neereman, Nuggetty, Porcupine Flat, Shelbourne, Shelbourne South, Tarrengower, Walmer, Walmer North (2018) and A History of Guildford (2019). Ken's interest in Castlemaine and surrounding districts comes from the fact that his great great grandparents, William and Elizabeth James and their children, resided at Golden Point, Chewton between 1857 and 1875, William working as a miner. In 1875, the family purchased land at Lyal, adjacent to Redesdale, which they farmed up to 1912.



MALDON'S Blue Light Youth Camp is looking at providing wholistic therapy services that will enhance and support not just atrisk youth, but the wider community at large.

"Post-COVID, people are still grieving," says the Blue Light Camp's Executive General Manager Jonathan Mitchell.

There is already something in the wind. "In October, we are organ-

IN November 2010 I answered an ad in the TT for a 'Silver Service Wait Person' in a new Maldon restaurant. I met Janet Doyle over coffee and confessed to having no experience; she explained that she could train pretty much anyone, but what she wanted a particular look. Which, apparently, I had. I got the job.

So began my involvement with Janet's restaurant ventures, and a beautiful friendship. First were the lavish Degustation evenings at her home on Newstead Road. Guests were greeted at the door with a complimentary glass of bubbly before being seated for a classy five-course meal, and later farewelled with a souvenir copy of the night's I quickly understood that waiting is like a stage performance: in pressed black trousers, snowy white shirt, waistcoat and bow tie I was costumed to play the role of unfailingly polite and attentive-but-not-irritating servant. Janet found my actor's perspective enlightening: she had a way of making you feel interesting and with something valuable to offer. Always a self-esteem booster, that first night she described me as a 'star'. It inspired my fierce loyalty and redoubled efforts to do her proud.

In 2013 she bought the High Street premises that became the second Janet's Restaurant, and we did it all

again. Then came the Great Storm that left the kitchen ankle-deep in water, necessitating months of repairs and renovation. But we came back. The triumph of that time was the legendary 'Tapas Night' of June 2014: John Arnold and I furiously poured drinks for a crowd so huge that people had to be turned away and directed to the pubs. At one stage both microwaves died ... "what about the warmed lentils?" was the question; Janet's answer, "Get me the ice cream – it's chilled lentils now!"

Tess took over the site as proprietor of The Spotted Cow, but some years later Janet was back for one final burst, brushing aside unreliable and/or absent chefs to run the kitchen herself. It was all over when the virus came into our lives last year of course – and sadly, what is arguably the best hospitality venue in town remains vacant to this day.

Janet Doyle came from a highly distinguished academic and medical background, but she only talked about it to share a relevant story about teaching or visiting remote communities - things we had in common. It was some time before I realised she was actually Doctor Doyle! And, always the student, she would eagerly pick my brains about indigenous culture, languages, history and literature. Janet's occasional soirées brought together all she loved: good food, fine wine, music and poetry. I would contribute with a recitation from Yeats or Shakespeare or Chaucer, and sometimes reprise the drinks waiter one more time.

I was proud to be a part of the rich life she made in retirement after moving to Maldon. Through her I met some fine people, including my Book Club 'harem'. A visit to Janet's always open and welcoming home meant coming away feeling clever or interesting or well-read or good-looking or even all of the above, and with her sincere thanks for the visit ringing in your ears.

Janet Doyle passed away on the last day of March this year. A bright light has gone out, and it is difficult to imagine a world without her. As usual, The Man says it best: 'We are such stuff as dreams are made on, and our little life is rounded with a sleep.' Sleep now, my friend. You will not be forgotten. *Mike Smythe*

ll are welcome at the launch by Maldon Urban Landcare (MULGA) of a new brochure, 'Indigenous plants for the garden in Maldon', on Sunday 23rd May, at the old Battery site in Adair St East, starting at 10.30am.

Morning tea will be provided. And you'll be able to buy some of the plants listed, as Frances Cincotta from Newstead Natives, (recently featured on ABC Gardening Australia) will have a plant sale at the launch. Following the launch, the brochure will be distributed to all letterboxes in Maldon, and will be available at both the Maldon and Castlemaine Information Centres. Production of the brochure was supported by a Mt. Alexander Shire Council Community Grant.

MULGA's main objective is to care for and preserve the natural environment in the Maldon area. Over the years we have assisted Parks Victoria in undertaking weed control and revegetation activities on parts of the Maldon Historic Reserve. We've recently started a new project to undertake maintenance and weed control work at the Eaglehawk Pit revegetation site, between Adair St East and Polsue St, with the support of Centennial Mining, who hold a lease for the area.

From 2017-2020 MULGA surveyed 318 original pre-1852 (pre-European settlement) eucalypts on private and public land and roadsides in the Maldon area. Of these trees, 75% are estimated to be aged between 200-550 years. You can access maps and the tree list at www.connectingcountry. org.au/landcare/what-is-landcare/landcare-stories/mulga. We continue to work with Mt. Alexander Shire Council to obtain long-term protection for these precious trees.

In June 2018, MULGA re-planted the two memorial circles on Anzac Hill with 64 Yellow Gums, a local indigenous eucalypt, as all but one of the original Mahogany Gums had died. Due to the dry conditions in 2018-2019, not all of the new plants survived, so we re-planted in 2019 and 2020, but thanks to good rain last spring and summer, the vast majority are now growing well. We will continue to re-plant as necessary.

We really appreciate the MULGA members who willingly help with our activities, and it's great that we have been able to 'Reconnect' with everyone now that our working bees have got going again after the restrictions in 2020.




One hundred and fifty years of volunteering!



Grants to control gorse

PROPERTY managers, their neighbours or local Landcare groups can now apply for up to \$5,000 in grants to help combat gorse in your local area.

The Victorian Gorse Task force will support groups, starting from just two landholders, who are genuinely willing to control gorse and keep it under control.

VGT Chair Ron Cosgrave said if infestations of gorse are not controlled, they will continue to get worse. The time to start control is now.

"The VGT grant funding is about helping those who haven't received past incentives, have old stands of gorse

and need more support," Mr Cosgrave said. "In a way it's like seed

funding, a way to help landholders get the ball rolling in managing gorse." Interested landhol

All landholders who receive grant funding must sign up to a three-year voluntary agreement to maintain their control.

virus is very contagious. 4. Crusting stage — the blister dries up and becomes crusty, with the scab usually clearing up within seven days.

According to the National President of the Pharmacy Guild of Australia, Trent Twomey, at the first sign of a cold sore you need to speak to your community pharmacist who can provide advice of any treatment which may be suitable for you.

While cold sores are usually just an annoying

 and often unsightly problem for most of us, people with some types of immune-suppression are at an additional risk of the sores spreading and this may result in severe symptoms which may require special medicine.

Complications that require treatment can include bacterial infections which are at times characterised by redness around the blisters, a fever and pus developing within the blisters.

Professor Twomey warned that cold sores can spread to the eves, fingers or other parts of the body.

"A cold sore in the eye requires immediate medical attention as sight can be affected if it is left untreated," he said.

"Avoiding cold sores is difficult as there is no cure for them but we can reduce the risk by avoiding known triggers.

"Wearing sun screens on the face, avoiding stress and getting run down, and looking after your general health are good basic defences."

Another defence is avoiding activities which transmit the virus - especially in the first few days when the blister begins to form which is when it is at its most infectious. Direct contact or via saliva are among the most common ways of transmitting the virus.

Kissing and contact with the blisters should be avoided but also people with cold sores should not share toothbrushes, cups and glasses, cutlery, towels and so on.

Your community pharmacist can advise and help you to deal with cold sores so don't hesitate to ask them for help at the first sign of a cold sore emerging.

"The vast majority of councils and councillors do a fantastic job for their communities, but there have been examples of poor behaviour and bad governance in recent times - not just in Victoria but across the country," Mr Leane said.

"I strongly believe that by working together we can improve the culture overall. Our goal should be to put out a clear message that, as a sector, we won't accept poor

behaviour."

A series of workshops with the local government sector will follow, with the final report due to be published in the last quarter of 2021.

Mr Leane also announced further support for women in local government, increasing the government's support for the Australian Local Government Women's Association mentoring program to \$41,000.

The funding will support 60 new women councillors in this term of council and provide opportunities for leaders in the sector to be trained as mentors.



A book just published this year is A Crooked Tree. This very different novel is written by American-born writer Una Mannion who now lives in County Sligo Ireland. This book has a scary theme which most of us would find impossible to imagine. When rage engulfs the car the driver, a mother with her five children in

the car, pulls to a halt and orders her small 12-year-old daughter to get out of the car and then drives away despite the screams and pleas of her other children. Some teasing between the children started an argument and the mother loses the plot. The child is abandoned at least six miles from her home and darkness is approaching. This terrible

incident changes everything for all the Gallagher children.

The Other Side Of Silence is a thriller by Philip Kerr. It's a twisting tale of espionage and betrayal with the setting being 1956 on the French Riviera. I find it intriguing when writers mix fictional stories with real life characters and this book is a prime example of that. Somerset Maugham becomes a target of a former Nazi commander. Harold Henning, who now lives from the proceeds of blackmail. A photograph of Maugham with a group of naked men including British spies, Guy Burgess and Donald Maclean, is held by Henning who is demanding \$50,000 for its release.



Burgess and Maclean had recently defected to Russia so this was another aspect to be considered.

The Reader is an older book written by Bernhard Schlink. It has been translated from the German into

English by Carol Brown Janeway in 1997. It's a serious book looking at the connections between Germany's past and its present (up to 1995 when it was first published in Germany) and it won praise across Europe for the tact and power with which it handles its material. It has been described by Ruth Rendell as 'Deeply moving, sensitive enough to make me wince, a holocaust novel but light years away from the common run.'

Cross Fire is by James Patterson. I've said it before but I have to say it again, I cannot believe the number of books written by Patterson! Every time we find a new one I think, 'It can't be!!' but here we have another Alex Cross thrilling the Patterson readers with another chilling story. There is a sniper in Washington and he's already killed two corrupt and hated politicians so is he a murderer or a hero? As the media frenzy intensifies Alex Cross battles with a rival in the FBI as to the jurisdiction of the case. Alex Cross is also trying to plan his wedding as the killings begin so yet another difficulty for him.

Please remember to also look carefully on the shelves of the various genres and you may come across a book just waiting for you.



More pain in store for universities and TAFE, says Chesters

BENDIGO MP, Lisa Chesters has written to the Prime Minister demanding answers on university and TAFE funding cuts hidden in last week's Federal Budget.

"I've written to the Prime Minister demanding to know what impact his higher education funding cuts will have on our local LaTrobe University Bendigo campus and Bendigo TAFE," Ms Chesters said.

"I'm calling on the government to guarantee that cuts to higher education in this year's budget will not result in further job losses or course cuts at our local higher education institutions."

Ms Chesters said last week's Federal Budget was a double blow to the higher education sector.

She said the Budget shows the Government is cutting university funding by 10 per cent over the coming years, with a cut of around \$430 million in the next two years alone.

Since the start of the pandemic, the Federal Government has locked universities out of JobKeeper, cut overall funding to the sector and introduced a higher education bill making

it harder and more expensive for students to go to university, Ms Chesters said.

'To top it all off, the Liberals have refused additional support to the sector, despite the budget showing that international borders are likely to remain closed until mid-2022.

"Universities have been brought to their knees by the Morrison government, and instead of using this Budget to help them, Scott Morrison has made further funding cuts."

More than 17,000 university workers have lost jobs since the start of the COVID-19 pandemic and universities lost an estimated \$1.8 billion in revenue



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

the evening of On Saturday, 28 June, 1902 American evangelist the Rev Ernest Shanks held the opening meeting of Maldon's 'Simultaneous Mission'. The clergymen of Maldon's 'dissenting' churches had organized the mission. The churches involved were the town's three Methodist chapels, the Congregational, Presbyterian and both the Welsh and English Baptist Churches.

Simultaneous missions were part of a religious revival that swept eastern Australia in 1901 and 1902. This revival started in Sydney in 1901 when Methodists launched the Centenary Commemoration Fund hoping to raise 50,000 guineas to support their Church's work. The Fund's chairman, Ebenezer Vickery, suggested that they should also aim to "win 50,000 souls for Christ". Methodists accepted this challenge and decided to hold tent missions in every major town in NSW.

In April 1902 a simultaneous mission was held in Melbourne. Over 200 churches participated. A group of 50 missioners, led by American evangelist Dr Reuben Torrey, preached at a wide range of venues including the Melbourne Town Hall and the Exhibition Building. Torrey recruited several other American preachers to join the mission. Later these missioners held similar event in regional cities and towns. Rev Shanks had previously conducted missions at St Kilda and at Eaglehawk in Bendigo.

In Maldon mission meetings were held in the Temperance Hall, (now the Community Centre). They

were held each night of the week with an additional meeting on Sunday afternoon. A choir drawn from members of all the local churches was a major attraction of these meetings. It contained as many as 100 singers and was conducted by John Roberts.

Rev Shanks' first meeting began with 15 minutes of singing and prayer. Shanks, who the Maldon News described as "earnest, kind, sympathetic and humorous", told the packed hall that he had been working under heavy pressure for the past ten weeks and did not expect to rest in the near future. The previous day he had held two rousing meeting at Eaglehawk at which fifty souls had been saved and he believed there were many more waiting for redemption in Maldon. Shanks then spoke about the need to be practical Christians, to support the Church and practice kindness and gentleness.

Rev Shanks' meetings proved extremely popular with most of them drawing full houses. He also held a children's meeting at which he spoke on the subject, "Even a child is known by his doings". At the end of Shanks' last meeting on the evening of Sunday 6th July a large number of the audience came forward to profess their conversion.

Rev William Watson from Melbourne replaced Shanks who left to conduct another simultaneous mission at Mornington. The Maldon mission continued with large attendances until it concluded on the evening of Sunday, 20 July.




