

DESPERATE NEED OF FU BLUE LIGHT CAMP IN I

he Maldon Blue Light Youth Camp is at risk of closure due to funding losses from COVID-19. The camp has a 30-

iconic community, running school camps and education programs.

The new Executive General Manager of the camp, Jon

Mitchell, told the *Tarrangower* Times that the Maldon Blue year legacy in the Maldon Light Youth Camp became



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independent from the Victorian Police in 2014.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions camps are unable to run at present, leaving the camp without any form of revenue.

"I've inherited a deficit of lost earnings due to COVID and are currently going week by week, trying to keep staff on," said Jon.

'Funding is non-existent. We are a not-for-profit organisation and cannot access funds through state or federal government or by local council."

Jon, who has an extensive history working with at-risk youth, took on the role as general manager, early last year, to develop a suite of programs for at risk youth and communities.

"Instead of focusing on re-engagement techniques, it's important to understand the underlying issue of engagement, which is trauma. This program focuses on mental

health and overall health and well-being."

Jon, who used to run Reconnect, one of the largest re-engagement programs in Australia said, "It's important to focus on strengths versus barriers. As Victoria starts to open up, the Blue Light Camp will be able to support children with COVID recovery by providing outdoor education, which is shown to improve anxiety and other

mental health issues."

Jon and the Youth Blue Light Camp Board are currently running a crowd funding campaign to raise enough money to sustain the camp.

"The camp is an iconic institute which contributes to the economy in Maldon and from talking to locals, the community love the camp. I often have people telling me they've missed hearing the kids and seeing them ride their bikes around town.

MALDON Market: Hand Made, Home Grown was launched by the Maldon Neighbourhood Centre in November 2013 as a monthly farmers and makers market set in the picturesque goldfields town of Maldon.

The Market features the very best hand made products and home grown produce from independent makers and growers and attracts locals and visitor alike. Each month a local not-for-profit community group has an opportunity to use the Maldon Market as a fundraising platform by collecting the gold coin donation on entry, running the sausage sizzle and having a free stall site.

"We wanted the Maldon Market to be a place where locals can gather and the community can be centre stage," explains Maldon Neighbourhood Centre Coordinator Amy Atkinson. "Ensuring that the Market can double as a fundraising opportunity for our local community groups is a great way to achieve that.

"We have about 1,200 visitors at every market and up to 2,000 during long weekends and school holidays. Community groups can sell a lot of sausages and if every visitor pops a \$1 coin into the collection bucket it can raise a lot of much needed funds for our community.

"We estimate that over \$70,000 has been put back into the local community – whether it is into sporting clubs, Landcare, CFA or the local pre-school – all the community have benefited," said Amy.

"It is a truth universally acknowledged that a community organisation is always in need of funds." explains Graham Pitts, President Maldon Golden Movies. "The finances of the Maldon Golden Movies (MGM) Film Society are always boosted very nicely indeed when we are lucky enough to score a day at the Maldon Market. We couldn't

be more enthusiastic, for it's not just the gold coin entry fee and the sausage sizzle profits, it's the warm feeling. Actually, that's not true, it's the money, the money!"

Throughout the year, a different local community group is allocated a month to fundraise by running the sausage sizzle and collecting a gold coin on entry. There is also the opportunity to have a market stall site at no cost – perhaps to hold a raffle, have a cake stall or sell your wares as did the Maldon Men's Shed in August.

"If you are involved in a local not-for-profit community group then you are eligible to apply for a fundraising month. This opportunity is highly sought after so there is an application process and ballot system to make sure everyone has a turn."

The Maldon Market is on from 9 -1.30pm, every second Sunday of the month at the Bill Woodfull Recreation Reserve, Frances Street Maldon. The next market is on Sunday 13 November – celebrating our eighth birthday!

THREE masked men, believed to be in their 20s, broke into the Harcourt Service Station at 1.30am on Wednesday 27 October.

According to the station manager, William Mantri, the men's faces were covered and they were wearing gloves.

"They were driving an Isuzu ute and I was able to write down the registration details from video footage. The police told me they believe the car was stolen," said William.

"They smashed the window and filled a bag with hats, sunglasses, chargers and a few boxes of chocolates. They took a basket of ice-creams and butane gas. They tried to get into the cupboard containing cigarettes but couldn't break the padlock."

The three men then drove to the Maldon Newsagency where they smashed the door, pulling it free from the lock. They forced their way into the security doors that contained cigarettes and tobacco, causing significant damage to the doors.

Owners of the newsagency Graeme and Barb were alerted by their security company at 2.30am and Graeme drove to the shop.

"Unfortunately there was no one around, the street was deserted apart from the baker's car, but he wouldn't have heard anything," said Graeme. "They took about

got thirsty because they took gl a few drinks out of the fridge. "We're insured, but it will take us some time to re-stock and repair the damage.

"This is the third break in we've had. One five years earlier, when they broke the back door and stole cigarettes. Then a few months later I was in the back room when I heard a noise from the front. I ran to the front of the shop where a man had smashed the

window with an axe."

The Harcourt Service Station also had a similar burglary in March 2020 with cigarettes and tobacco being stolen.

"We've had to close the shop and the petrol pumps this morning, while the glass door gets repaired, which means we've lost a whole morning's trade," said William.





Wheel Cactus Field Day in Maldon **Historic Reserve**

THE Cactus Warriors invite you to join us on Sunday 31 October at 10.30am along Mount Back Road where we will be assisting Parks Victoria to remove Wheel Cactus plants from our sensational Maldon Historic Reserve.

We'll be armed with digging hoes and buckets and will concentrate on digging up small wheel cactus plants in an area along Mount Back

Road. If you already have a digging hoe and/or buckets at home, please bring these along to use on the day.

Small Wheel Cactus plants are really easy to dig up because they're very shallow rooted and it doesn't matter if you leave roots behind in the ground (this cactus does not re-grow from roots). Digging up small plants before they grow large and need injecting with herbicides also means using less chemicals, which is great for the environment and reduces costs.

Come along and learn how to deal with Wheel Cactus infestations, or just to help combat the problem in our local park.

All equipment is provided, just wear protective clothing and sturdy boots. The mornings activities start at 10.30am, and finish with a BBQ lunch and friendly chat.

The route will be well signposted from South Parkins Reef Rd, Maldon. Please check our website at www. cactuswarriors.org for a location map.



ON interviewing Gary I realised he isn't, in technical terms, a resident of Maldon. However, I think given Gary has given each of us advice on coughs and colds, sores and nappy rash for quite a few years, we can make an exception. "It was 10 years ago and I wrote a note saying due to unforeseen circumstances the shop will be closed for the remainder of the day. And it was unforeseen, because she was born prematurely!"

When I asked how it's been for Gary during the pandemic

"I treated the locals ok at the time, I didn't snap at them or anything!" Gary laughs.

Gary bought the pharmacy on April Fools' Day in 2009. He found out about the sale of the pharmacy through his networks and came up to have a look during the Folk Festival in 2008.

"It was a good first impression, such a vibrant town. I've never regretted it."

Gary and I are sitting in the back of the pharmacy for the interview, he never takes a lunch break and informed me that he's only closed the shop early once, the day his daughter was born. he said, "I think there was a lot of responsibility on a pharmacist's shoulders during that time. It was a little messy to begin with, everything happened at such a fast pace. I didn't sleep much, it was very stressful, trying to figure out what medications to order and stocking up on hand sanitiser and toilet paper. "I treated the locals ok at

the time, I didn't snap at them or anything!" Gary laughs. "I remember one guy came in and was in tears because he couldn't find any toilet paper, so I gave him two rolls from my personal stash."

Gary and his wife Ann, who is also a pharmacist, both grew up in Hong Kong. Gary, who had travelled and studied in Australia, said it was brave of Ann to move to a country she'd never been to before.

Like many others with families overseas, it's been difficult for Gary and Ann not being able to return and visit their families, particularly as Gary's father died during the pandemic.

"If we were to go and see my mum and sisters we'd need to quarantine in Hong Kong for 21 days and then another two weeks in Australia. It means five weeks of quarantine which is just not possible."

Gary doesn't have much in the way of down time, particularly since he's opened another pharmacy in Bendigo. He does, however, enjoy taking his one year old golden retriever MoMo for her daily walks and spending time with his 16-year-old son Augustine and 10-year-old daughter Lauren.

Direct from Graceland: Bendigo to rock'n'roll with Elvis



IN an Australian exclusive, Bendigo will celebrate the life and legacy of the 'King of Rock 'n' Roll' Elvis Presley with a major exhibition curated by Bendigo Art Gallery from 19 March-17 July 2022.

The exhibition will feature 300 artefacts owned by Elvis including his military uniforms, a 1976 Red Bicentennial Custom Harley Davidson, some of his famous jumpsuits and includes personal items like baby clothes from his daughter Lisa Marie, his first job application and his firstgrade crayon box he took to school.

BLAST FROM THE PAST A CASE OF FORGERY

On Tuesday, 15 November 1859, Maldon cattle dealer John Subritzky went to the Bank of New South Wales to deposit 90 pounds in his account. The money included two £5 bank notes issued by the English, Scottish and Australian Chartered Bank. When he presented these notes, the teller told Subritzky they were forgeries. Subritzky had received them from two local butchers, Charles Bull and Henry Cox. Soon after several other businesses discovered that they had also accepted forged notes.

Police Sergeant Thomas O'Brien acted promptly. Based on descriptions provided by the duped tradesmen, the next day he arrested three men and a woman at Sandy Creek. In their tent forging materials were found including a £1 note with the 'one' cut out and letters cut from newspapers that could convert notes into higher denominations. The police also confiscated 50 genuine £1 notes they believed the forgers planned to alter. O'Brien recognised one of the men as Thomas Beasley who had absconded from Carisbrook after being charged with horse stealing and passing forged coins.


On Thursday 24 November those arrested appeared in the Maldon Police Court. Two of them, Eli Burchett and Mary Reed, were immediately discharged due to a lack of evidence. Extensive evidence however was heard against the other two, James Reed and Thomas Jones, also known as Beasley. Among the witnesses was George Walker, the chief teller of the ES&A Chartered Bank in Melbourne, who confirmed that the notes were forgeries. When the hearing closed Reed and Jones were committed for trial at Castlemaine. The Police Magistrate Robert Mackenzie also congratulated Sergeant O'Brien on the way the police had investigated the case and presented their evidence in court.

On Friday 9 December Reed and Jones faced trial in Castlemaine. Reed appeared on two charges. The first charge related to the forged notes offered to Bull and Cox and the second to notes he passed at Warnocks' Beehive Stores. Despite the jury recommending leniency on account of his youth, Reed was sentenced to three years hard labour on the roads on each charge. Jones was found guilty on one charge and was sentenced to five years on the roads.

George Leech, the barrister who represented Reed and Jones, asked the Court to rule that the police release the genuine bank notes confiscated when the men were arrested. This would allow them to pay their solicitors and Leech's fees. The Court agreed to release £10. When Leech protested that this was not enough, he was told that it was more than enough to conduct such an ordinary case.

Following the convictions, the Chief Commissioner of Police presented Sergeant O'Brien and two of his constables each with a reward of £5. Later the ES&A Chartered Bank awarded O'Brien with £10 for his cleverness in tracing and bringing Reed and Jones to justice.

New booking form reduces wait times for local COVID-19 tests

THE CHIRP/Castlemaine Health COVID-19 Testing Clinic has seen a significant increase in demand for testing recently, with the team taking over 2,900 swabs in October alone. The clinic has introduced a new online form to help streamline bookings and reduce wait times for people coming through for tests.

Kerryn James, Executive Director, Community Services and Wellbeing at Castlemaine Health, said: "We review the clinic on a regular basis to make sure it continues to meet community need. Our most recent analysis showed that we have completed more tests in the past two months than over the whole of the previous year."

This increase was driven by a local outbreak in Mount Alexander Shire with several exposure sites in Castlemaine, combined with an expanding number of cases and exposure sites in surrounding areas.


The Chief Health Officer, Prof. Brett Sutton, warned this week that these numbers are expected to increase further as restrictions lift. "We are going to see more cases over the coming months than we have seen during the entire pandemic," he said.

He also pointed to a greater number of infectious people travelling as the restrictions lift. "As we open up further, on Friday night, there will be more individuals who are infectious going to regional Victoria," he said.

In response to the anticipated rise in COVID-19 case numbers, the testing clinic will offer an increased number of clinics over the coming months.

Community Nurse and COVID-19 Testing Clinic Coordinator, Bron Grieve, said: "We always aim to meet community need and provide a responsive service. We have recently streamlined our testing booking system with a dedicated booking registration number and an online registration form. This is already helping reduce wait times for people coming through, particularly given the large numbers of tests we're doing each week."

HEALTHCARE FOR THE COMMUNITIES OF MOUNT ALEXANDER

Planning for stronger regional health and wellbeing for the communities of Mount Alexander

Maldon Hospital and Castlemaine Health are formally exploring the unification of Maldon Hospital and Castlemaine Health. The Boards are commissioning a proposal that will examine the potential benefits of unification. Change will only happen if the boards are in unanimous agreement, if community benefit is assured, and if the State Government accepts the boards' recommendations.

Why is this happening?

This process has been motivated by demand from patients and residents, changes in the Mount Alexander demographic, dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic, the implications of two health Royal Commissions and reassessing how we allocate resources. Now is the time to build on this collaboration – in fact, it's overdue.

What is the process from here?

We are going to work together now, to involve staff, patients, stakeholders and communities in planning for better regional health and wellbeing in the communities of Mount Alexander. In early December, we will present back to the community with what we've heard. This community feedback will also help inform the proposal, which if endorsed by both boards, will be submitted to the Department of Health by the end of the year.

Will there be loss of services?

Definitely not. There will be no loss of services at either of the healthcare services. Our proposal is driven by a desire to improve the breadth, accessibility, quality and sustainability of local healthcare in the region.

Will we lose our identity if we amalgamate?

No. Whatever happens in this process, we can guarantee that Maldon Hospital and Castlemaine Health will remain here under their current names in the future.

Will staff lose jobs?

No. This is about recruiting and investing in our staff. There will be no reductions in staffing levels and people will be able to work when and where they work today, unless they wish to change.

What about governance – will it be diluted in a bigger health service?

Not at all. Any health service would be underpinned by clear governance structures. In fact, a unified service would significantly reduce the time taken to fulfill two separate compliance structures, ensuring better focus on these important issues.

Will we lose our board? How can you ensure local representation?

Should we come together, it is correct to say that there would only be one board. Local representation on the board for both communities would be strongly recommended to the Minister for Health, and community advisory committees in Maldon and Castlemaine would be mandatory.

Assurances for Maldon

- Maldon Hospital has a proud 161-year history of care in our community. This will continue into the future, with the same name and connection to the people of Maldon.
- There will be the same access to high quality care at the Maldon Hospital, with no loss of services.
- Aged care will always be at Maldon Hospital. In fact, we are looking at ways to enhance this offering.
- There will be no reductions in staffing levels and people will be able to work when and where they work today unless they wish to change.
- Past and future fund-raising in Maldon will always stay in Maldon unless otherwise advised.
- Ensuring local board director representation, with appropriate skill mix, is a key priority for any new health service.

"I like to run and play with my friends," said Ned (4-years-old).


"Friends, when they play with me, I love it!" says Reuben (3-years-old).

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WALKING TOGE towards Reconciliation

Aboriginal language and culture

FOR Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, being able to speak in language has a deep connection to their cultural identity. There are teachings in language for which there is no English equivalent. Language is essential for passing on cultural knowledge, kinship, songlines and stories from generation to generation.

Whilst cultural practices and beliefs may change and evolve, many of the basic aspects remain the same. When people are disconnected from their culture, as has happened

since colonisation, it has a deep impact on their sense of identity and belonging. This loss and damage takes away their sense of meaning and purpose.

The importance of language and culture to First Nations Australians is one of the 16 socio-economic targets of the new National Agreement on Closing the Gap, a target relating to the number and strength of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander languages.

Up to 160 languages are still in use, many critically endangered. Only about eight percent of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children speak an Australian Indigenous language at home.

Currently no more than 12 traditional languages and two of the new ones are considered strong.

Land, family, law, ceremony and language are elements that play a crucial role in shaping all our lives, regardless of our culture or heritage. These five elements are intricately interconnected in Indigenous culture.

The relationship between Indigenous people and the land, or Country as mob call it, is one of reciprocity and respect - the land sustains and provides for the people, and the people sustain and manage the land through culture and ceremony. Honouring this reciprocal relationship with the land is central to Indigenous culture.

If the land is disrespected, damaged or destroyed, it can have real impact on the wellbeing of the people.

Families are connected to Country through the kinship system, and this connection to land comes with specific roles and responsibilities, which are enshrined in the lore/law and observed through ceremony.

A person's position in the kinship system establishes their relationship to others and to the universe, prescribing their responsibilities towards other people, the land and natural resources. Traditional kinship structures remain important in many Indigenous communities today.

Some individuals and families protect particular knowledge, such as specific dances and songs, while others protect other types of knowledge, such as body design or symbolism, or are guardians of sacred sites. These guardians hold great religious and spiritual power within a language group, and conduct ceremonies accordingly.

The Dreaming refers to the complexity of Aboriginal cultural, spiritual and religious beliefs, practices and lore. Ceremonies ensure that vital components of the lore and The Dreaming stay intact. They provide a time and place where all people in a language group and community work together to maintain and ensure the ongoing survival of cultural beliefs.

Recovering language, which could bring with it traditional ceremony, lore/law, respect for sacred sites and ancestral country, may be the key to restoring dignity, identity and purpose to First Nations people. When other Australians learn more about their culture, it will help lead to healing for both First and Second Nations.

Nalderun is a service that supports the Aboriginal Community, led by Aboriginal people. Many people and organisations in the Mount Alexander Shire contribute to Nalderun; the name is a Dja Dja Wurrung word meaning 'all together'.
