Twilight Dinner and a new Twilight Market

THE Maldon Twilight Dinner 2023 is set to be bigger and better than before with the possible addition of a Friday Night Market.

The committee is awaiting council approval to include a free Twilight Market to showcase local street traders, food trucks, produce stalls, bands, and swing and belly dancers.

After conducting research last year, the committee found that while most of the visitors to the Twilight Dinner stay in accommodation Friday and Saturday nights (due to the two-night minimum on most stays), most of these visitors were spending the Friday evenings in Castlemaine. Event organisers hope to encourage visitors to stay in Maldon by extending the festival to include activities, music, food and stalls on Friday.

The move to a two-day festival has resulted in concern from some local businesses regarding extending street closure hours.

Cr Stephen Gardner told the Times he has had a number of local traders contacting him with concerns regarding the event and the subsequent street closures.

Pamela Jewson, the organiser of the event, has told the Times, "The proposal is to close the street on Friday from 5.30pm until 9.30pm, which shouldn't affect local trade. There won't be any fencing for the Twilight Market, and local stores will be able to remain open. If the council approves the event, the street will have one-lane access for overnight traffic."

Event organisers are hoping to close the street at 10am (in the past closed at 11am) on Saturday 21 January, to allow additional time for volunteers to set up for dinner, including white picket fencing along the shopfronts on Main Street in place of the controversial hurricane fencing that has been used for the past few vears (with the exception of hurricane fencing at each end of the street).

"We are trying to alleviate stress for the volunteers by allowing more time for set-up before the heat of the day," said Pamela. "Moving heavy tables and chairs in the summer heat, especially for our older volunteers, can be difficult; we're always racing against the clock.

"I have worked closely with the council for seven years to





This Little Piggy Market is coming to Maldon

THIS Little Piggy Market will open its doors on Monday 19 September, providing delicious pre-cooked Thai, Chinese, Spanish and Indian cuisine.

Lisa Speed, owner and chef, has travelled the world, honing her craft while living in Spain and while travelling around Asia. Since its conception 25 years ago, This Little Piggy has had many forms, initially operating as This Little Piggy Sausage and Co business making sausages and salamis.

"I was known as the queen of pork," said Lisa.

The company then moved into catering before a move to Bali, where it was known as This Little Piggy Warung, a popular local eatery.

From 2017 until the beginning of the pandemic, This Little Piggy Market was operating in Barker Street Castlemaine, where Lisa's Bahn Mi and Rice Paper Rolls became infamous.

Now, This Little Piggy Market has found its way next door to the Maldon Post Office. Two meal portions will be available for \$24.50 and a one-person portion for \$15.50.

Lisa will begin offering five meal options: Chinese Sticky Master-stock Braised Beef Cheek, Thai Chicken Lemongrass and Ginger Curry, Spanish 'El Matador' Mixed Seafood Cazuela, North Indian Lamb and Kidney Bean Rama Masala and Western Indian 'Salaam Bombay' Vegetables with Lentils and Spinach. With accompaniments of salad, rice, bread, raita and fried shallots that make the dishes sing.

Blue Light Youth Camp closure


According to (BLV) the land is zoned PCRZ, which under the Victorian planning provisions is:

BLV was established in 1976 and began delivering drug and alcohol-free discos for young people before being established as a not-for-profit organisation and a registered charity.

BLV acquired the Derby Hill Property in Maldon in 1987,

THE much-loved camp on Derby Hill will officially close its doors on Saturday, 24 September. The results of the closure are widespread, with 25 employees left without work and the cancellation of all future school camps and programs for disadvantaged young people. The future of the camp is uncertain and many are concerned

The future of the camp is uncertain, and many are concerned about the loss of a valued community facility. Community events such as the Folk Festival have booked the camp for future events and are now left to find alternative accommodation.

Pam Lyons, organiser of the Folk Festival told the *Times*, "We have advertised the Blue Light Camp as available accommodation on our website. Some people have already paid deposits and we're left trying to find them somewhere to stay for the festival."

The camp was about to begin running programs for vulnerable, marginalised, disadvantaged young people at risk of being engaged in the youth justice system. These programs, designed to support young people to return to structured learning, will no longer be available to those who need them most.

Jonathan Mitchell brought on as the Executive General Manager of the camp early in 2021, managed to sustain the camp amidst the pandemic, despite considerable financial strains. When the camp was able to reopen in March this year, Jonathan told the Times, "Once restrictions were lifted, we were inundated with bookings, right up to 2024."

CEO of Blue Light Victoria (BLV), Elissa Scott, told the *Times* that despite ongoing fundraising and grant applications, the pandemic has had a significant impact on BLV's ability to generate income. BLV owns the campsite at Maldon and has had a lease in place for the site with the tenant, the Victorian Blue Light Youth Camp (VBLYC).

"The Maldon campsite requires significant maintenance, has increased running costs and expensive insurance (insurance costs have more than doubled)," said Elissa Scott. "A rental increase was not viable for the camp tenant. The camp will close at the end of September 2022 and will go on the market shortly, with the assistance of real estate agents Mason White."

ensure we run a slick, professional event that doesn't cut corners. Restrictions and regulations have changed dramatically over that time, and of course, in the last two years, we have run an event through the middle of a pandemic," Pamela told the *Times*.

"I agree not everyone is happy with street closures, but they are the minority, and it has never stopped the event before from being a huge success and boost to the town's economy."

New builds slash costs with solar

THE state government is ramping up its nation-leading Solar Homes program, driving down emissions and saving Victorians thousands of dollars on their new houses and energy bills.

The state government will expand the eligibility for the solar panel rebate to new homes under construction, enabling Victorians to save on installation costs and electricity bills from the moment they move into their newly built home. The changes will save homeowners up to \$800.00 on installation costs by fitting panels as they wire the electricity to their new homes, as well as an average of \$1,073.00 each year in energy costs.

The expansion paves the way for the increasing electrification of homes while opening the program to tens of thousands of additional households each year - with around 40,000 new homes built in Victoria annually. Under the changes, eligible Victorians building homes will be able to apply for a rebate of \$1,400.00 as well as being able to access a \$1,400.00 interest-free loan to install solar panels during construction.

Since it began in 2018, the state Government's \$1.3 billion Solar Homes Program has helped more than 195,000 Victorian households install solar PV systems. This investment has already cut Victoria's carbon emissions by 1.6 million tonnes equivalent to the emissions produced by 500,000 cars each year - while supporting 5,500 clean energy jobs. Household solar is expected to generate 12.5 per cent of Victoria's 40 per cent renewable energy target by 2025.

This financial year, there are 64,000 Government rebates available for solar PV systems. Applicants must use a Solar Victoria authorised retailer and install a product included on the approved products list to qualify for the rebate. For further information, including eligibility criteria, visit solar.vic.gov.au.

Minister for Solar Homes Lily D'Ambrosio said, "We know energy prices are putting pressure on households - expanding Solar Homes to new builds will help tens of thousands of Victorians save thousands on electricity costs and help us cut emissions by 50 per cent by 2030. We're putting power back into the hands of Victorian households - driving down energy costs and boosting supply, creating thousands of jobs and cutting solar installation costs for new builds by hundreds."



TREATY Day Out, the biggest, blackest event on Victoria's music calendar, is returning, and this time it'll be rocking Bendigo.

A first-class, all-First Nations line-up is set to light up Dja Dja Wurrung Country in October, with Briggs, Dan Sultan, No Fixed Address, Marlon x Rulla, Kee'ahn, and more, sharing the stage for a celebration of our Treaty journey and the oldest surviving culture in the world.

Kicking off on Saturday, 1 October, at the Bendigo Showgrounds, the festival will play host to food trucks, First Nations market stalls, a smoking ceremony and traditional and cultural activities for the whole family.

Treaty Day Out is hosted by the First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria (the Assembly), the elected voice for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in the Victorian Treaty process.

Tickets to the festival are free for First Nations people who are enrolled with the Assembly and are available to purchase for friends and allies.

Any Traditional Owner of Country in Victoria who is 16 years and older is eligible to enrol, along with any Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander person from interstate, as long as they have lived in Victoria for at least three of the past five years.

Enrollees can vote in Assembly elections to pick the members who will represent their interests on the journey to Treaty.

Amy Rust, proud Kokatha woman and Head of Engagement and Communications at the Assembly, said she wants Victorians to share in First Nations culture.

"Treaty Day Out is a way for us to share our culture and to invite all Victorians on the Treaty journey with us.

"The work we're doing is monumental, but this is an opportunity to come together, reflect on how far we've come and have fun with the mob. Our culture, our music, is deadly, and we want to share that and to celebrate it all."



He was born in Paris during WWII, a difficult time for anyone. His father abandoned the family, and his mother had to work to survive during the war years. She was a translator and, unable to personally raise her son, he was placed in the care of the children's homes, as so many young children all over Europe were at that time. Serge would have been five years old when the war finished, and the task of reuniting families commenced. He was reunited with his mother, and they continued to live in France but eventually emigrated to Australia in 1955. Serge worked for many years in the shoe industry and later joined MacDonald Industries working in sales.

He married and had two children but suffered loss yet again after his wife died of pneumonia, leaving him a single father.

In 1970 Serge commenced painting and found some solace in this activity. He took lessons with Lance McNeil's Art Academy for quite a few years and learned the technical side of drawing, painting and tonal values; the start of Serge developing his observational skills.

Do you know the signs of stress in dogs and cats?

IT'S not uncommon for dogs and cats to be nervous when visiting the vet clinic.

Some signs that they may be stressed include: not wanting to get into the car, vocalising during the car ride, refusing to enter the clinic door, or hiding behind their owner or under the chairs inside the clinic. Dogs that are feeling anxious may exhibit signs such as excessive licking, yawning, panting or drooling, trembling or tail wagging. Cats may also lick or meow excessively, flatten their ears, or hide within their carrier and refuse to come out.

There are many things we can do to make vet visits more comfortable for them, and this starts by preparing them at home. For cats, choose a cat

AS the days become warmer, snakes are starting to emerge to bask in the sun and search for food and a mate.

Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) Senior Wildlife Projects Officer, Leila Brook said sunny weather also means it's more likely people will encounter a snake.

"It's not uncommon to find snakes warming themselves on a rock, path or in a clearing during early spring, particularly on a sunnier day, so it's important we're mindful that they can be out and about earlier than normally expected," Ms Brook said.

"Snakes are generally shy and prefer to keep away from people. Often when a snake is found in a backyard, it's because it's moving through the area to another habitat.

Photo courtesy Adrian Martins. "In most encounters with humans, a snake will seek the fastest escape route and take off. However, if cornered and feeling threatened, a snake may defend itself.

"Snake species found in the Loddon Mallee region include the Eastern Brown Snake (Pseudonaja textilis), the Red-bellied Black Snake (Pseudechis porphyriacus) and the Tiger Snake (Notechis scutatus).

"These three species are venomous, but it is rare for them to bite people. Most snake bites occur when people try to capture or kill a snake.

"Being aware that snakes may be around and being informed about how to react to them is important at this time of year."

If you live in an area with snakes, please remember:

motion - non-slip mats can help too. Finally, try not to feel rushed or stressed yourself, as this may be picked up by your pet and make them feel anxious too.

If your pet doesn't travel well, mention this to your vet so that they can prescribe anti-nausea or anti-anxiety medication if appropriate. Motion sickness can add to travel anxiety, and anxiety can also lead to motion sickness. It can help to not feed too much on the day of the visit, and bring lots of their favourite treats with you. If you know your pet struggles with walking into the clinic, call ahead and let the clinic staff know so they can meet you outside or offer a home visit consultation.

Know Your Local - Anne Borg - Part 3

Continued from last week

We found Maldon in 1989. I wanted to go to the country, and because I was a painter, people said, 'Go to Maldon; you'll love it.'

Albert and I saw the sign for Maldon and parked at the top end of town, and before we'd even gone anywhere, Albert said, 'Quick, where's the real estate agent?' Graham Waller helped, and I saw that Cumquat Tearooms (where Table et Terroir is now) wanted to sell. I sat all of Saturday and Sunday watching the street. That evening I walked in at 5.45pm and said to Judy, I'm going to buy the business (I didn't know anything about the town. I did not ask one question re the business. I hadn't even talked to Albert!) I went to Graham Waller and organised a second mortgage and a place to rent.

The tea rooms seated 16 people and had a terrible little kitchen and two little spare rooms out the back. Albert took the wall down two weeks later (without even telling me!) There was dust all over the tablecloths and plates, but he was very clever and made two small rooms into one big room. When we sold it, it seated 85 people.

Initially, after I bought it, I thought, 'What have I done?!' The first meal I cooked used Kosher meat I had in the fridge at home. I made turkey soup.

We had no income for three months, living on Mum's pension. It took me a while to be efficient and fast with my food. I always tried to cater for children, diabetics and vegetarians. Scones were my speciality. I remember on Easter weekend, serving over 3,000 people over the three days. And I made everything myself, even the marshmallows.

I was upset, as people who came into my shop often complained there was nowhere to stay overnight. There were only three beds in all of Maldon. So after five years, I bought Palm House and turned it into a bed and breakfast. I went to the auction of the Australian Hotel and bought fridges, TVs, bedding for home and stuff for the shop.

I got sick of people asking if I'd open nights, so we did. Albert was the waiter; he was the most amazing person in the shop. The first night we opened, one of the customers called me over and said, 'This is real food!' (As a child, I was always helping in the kitchen. Mum had me plucking chickens and cooking at eight years old).

Due to back injuries from lifting my son, it got to the point where I was unable to stand and had to spend many days in bed. My faithful, young helpers ran my kitchen; 16-year-old Kerry Sheldon and her wonderful mother, Faye Sheldon. After a year, I had a spine operation, which I recovered well from.

The shop has changed hands many times since we sold it. I don't understand why people like a shop, buy it and immediately change it. I love Maldon and businesses, and some people are not aware of what is needed.

I used to open on Monday and Tuesday because no one else was open, and I'd be really busy. It worried me that people coming here were disappointed and were unable to see what they wanted.

Three years ago, I had a painting exhibition, and I surveyed 80 people; most people came to Maldon on Mondays and Tuesdays as they were coming from other towns travelling home to Melbourne. It really upsets me when the shops are closed. There's so much potential in Maldon, especially with all the investment happening, we're going to be hopping.

These days I volunteer at the Castlemaine Salvation Army Opshop; I handle fabric, measure, price and check donated sewing machines for them.

I still make apple pies and sell them at the Sunday market in Castlemaine; I guess that's because Mum used to make them when I was a kid.

I still own my own sewing business, and at the moment, I am repairing an 80-year-old wedding dress for a display at

the shop above Run Rabbit Run in Castlemaine. The dress, made in France, was ripped to shreds. I've spent hours and hours repairing it. I'm doing it with love, and I'm enjoying it. Patience, that's my gift; I have boundless patience. My mother was the same. And it's important to think positively. I don't like anything to beat me!



Stone Sky Gold Mountain by Mirandi Riwoe

There have been a number of novels set in the goldfields told from the perspective of white men (or sometimes a woman). Having little luck panning for gold, Lai Yue, the brother, goes sheep minding while Ying works as an assistant in one of the many Chinese-owned shops in Maytown. Through their voices, Riwoe tells of those who, although dominant in number, were nevertheless relegated to the margins and regarded with suspicion in a brutal and racist society where white males wield authority. In researching this novel, Riwoe delved into the academic literature of her Chinese-Indo-

nesian father, who spent time

BLAST FROM THE PAST WE DID BUT SEE HER PASSING BY

 $\stackrel{\text{\tiny theta}}{\longrightarrow}$ Royal Tour Train 1954.

Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip's tour of Australia in 1954 was long anticipated. They had been due to visit in 1952, but their plans were cut short by the death of King George VI. Following Elizabeth's coronation, they finally arrived in Sydney aboard the liner Gothic on Wednesday, 3 February 1954. The couple would tour every State, visiting each capital city and many regional towns. At most stops, local councils organised receptions for the couple.

In Victoria, the royal couple toured regional centres by train. The Royal Train was scheduled to stop at Castlemaine at 5.55pm on Friday, 5 March 1954, as it travelled between Bendigo and Maryborough. The Castlemaine Council proposed that the Queen would leave the train, walk past cheering school children and be welcomed by Castlemaine councillors and their wives in front of the Midland Hotel. All Maldon's school children were invited to attend the event.

Hearing of the arrangements, the Maldon and Metcalfe Shire Councils protested that the presidents of all Shires in the district should be presented to the Queen. Their protests fell on deaf ears, and the Castlemaine Council proceeded with their arrangements.

However, all their plans were cancelled when a number of polio cases were reported in Castlemaine and Maryborough. The cancellation was not due to a fear that the Queen might contract polio but that large gatherings of children might result in the spread of the disease. A similar reception in Maryborough was also cancelled. While the cancellations might have been well-intentioned, they were not welcomed and did not prevent large crowds from gathering.

The Royal Train only stopped briefly at the Castlemaine Railway Station before it travelled on to Maryborough. The Queen received local councillors and their wives on the train and later appeared on the observation platform to wave to a crowd of about 6,000.

Rather than come to Castlemaine, Maldon's school children were bussed to the Newstead Racecourse, where they joined a local crowd of more than 2,000. The local State Member, Clive Stoneham, who was on the Royal Train, arranged for the train to slow down as it passed through Newstead so that the crowd could cheer the Queen.

Maldon's own contribution to the Royal Tour celebrations was the illumination of the Mount Tarrengower Tower. Reportedly the Royal party saw the Tower as their train travelled between Newstead and Carisbrook. The Maldon branch of the CWA also planted several flowering gums on the Castlemaine Road to commemorate their visit.

The next day more than 200,000 people lined the streets of Ballarat to welcome the Queen. It was reported that the crowd included many who had travelled from Castlemaine and Maryborough.






