According to Castlemaine Health, attendance at the Urgent Care Centre has been declining in recent years, with around five people visiting the centre each month, and many Maldon residents already opting to attend Castlemaine Hospital or other health services for injuries or illness that need attention.

Board Chair of Maldon Hospital, Vanessa Healy said, "Maldon Hospital and Castlemaine Health have a close relationship, sharing a CEO and many staff, and with Castlemaine Hospital just 15 minutes away it makes sense that we should be sharing our resources."

She added, "With a changing demographic, we need to ensure the way we operate best reflects the way our community uses the hospital and allows Maldon Hospital to support our aged care residents, our people and manage clinical risk."

Recently resigned board member Stephen Gardner told the *Tarrangower Times* that his resignation was due in-part to the decision to close the Urgent Care Centre, amongst other decisions *Continued on page 9*

Triple load in lockdowns takes toll on women

WOMEN with young children face long-term consequences from COVID-19 lockdowns, including a disproportionate impact on work and career opportunities, new research reveals.

As around 15 million people across Australia continue to live under lockdown restrictions, the RMIT University Women, Work, Care and COVID report reveals the experience of women and how they managed work, family and remote schooling.

The study found that women took on the bulk of additional work at home and home schooling during lockdowns.

Lead author Dr Fiona Macdonald said the disruption caused by COVID-19 may be especially critical for women with young children, potentially increasing their career disadvantages and reinforcing traditional gender roles.

"Our study really highlighted the precariousness of women's economic independence," said Macdonald, a Vice-Chancellor's Senior Research Fellow in the School of Management at RMIT.

"We found that remote working and schooling may be leading to deeper gender divisions in parenting and household work.

"During lockdowns, women managed most of the home schooling, household work and care and they often had less dedicated time and space for their paid jobs than their male partners.

"Under the triple load of work, family and remote schooling over many months women stepped back from their employment and deferred career plans as their part-time jobs became secondary, in comparison to their

partners' jobs and in relation to family needs."

While supportive and flexible workplaces can make a big difference to how families manage in lockdowns, the research found households relied largely on women's flexibility, at a cost to their careers.

"If that flexibility disappeared, the capability of these households to function would likely crumble," she said.

Macdonald said addressing the work/family issues raised during lockdowns was critical. We need to find better

solutions, including increasing men's access to flexible work," she said.

"Reducing families' ongoing reliance on women to be endlessly adaptable also requires universal access to flexible and affordable childcare."


The grant recipient, and their funding project, are all listed on page 9.

RAIN. It's been as ever-present as the rolling lockdowns this year. Gushing at speed through the downpipes, skating over the paths and pooling in puddles in my garden, I've watched it flow, yet made scant use of it. My friend and keen gardener Brian Morris, on the other hand, has been making the most of it while it's here with good reason.

Over the coming years, rainfall is projected to decline in winter and spring in our region, while extreme rainfall events will become more intense. "How water comes to us, particularly in the Goldfields, is changing, and you can see that in the climate modelling," says Brian. "There's going to be these big, erratic dumps of water at different times to what we expect, so it's about putting strategies in place where you live to harvest the rain when it comes."

Put simply, rainwater harvesting is the practice of collecting and storing rainwater, and it's an excellent strategy for building your household's resilience, whether you're harvesting it to drink, storing it for later, or diverting it to plantings around your home. Over the past decade, Brian has trialled numerous methods on his property in Barkers Creek, from terracing ☆ Brian Morris in his garden.

to de-compacting the soil. But where to begin? As a starting point, Brian suggests three things:

- 1. Spend time observing what the water does - how it moves through your property.
- 2. Slow the water down and spread it out where you can.
- 3. Build the soil it stores much more water than you think.

This last point is critical. "Because of our sun, our heat, the soil hardens up, it gets compacted, and it can become hydrophobic, where the water just skates across it. You can de-compact the soil in simple ways, just with a pitchfork, levering the soil and opening it up for water and air to get

in," says Brian. "Then there's planting the soil out with something appropriate - plants hold so much water. You can catch water off your roof and put it in a tank, but good soil is the best reservoir of water that you can possibly have. So having ground-covers, for example, mulching, those things really help the water sink in and stay in the land, and improve the overall ecology of your place."

It's worth researching which plants are suitable for our climate. Maldon Urban Landcare's brochure Indigenous plants for the garden in the Maldon area - recently distributed through our letterboxes – is a fantastic guide. Also consider 'zones' for plants that have similar water needs. "One of the earliest things I did on our property was to build a dry garden that I knew would never be watered once established, and it's been really successful," says Brian.

"For us, rainwater harvesting has been a long-term fix, and we've really noticed that water retention building. There's the variability of drought years and so on, but overall, we've seen things stay greener for longer."

Wurrung people and are hoping to get a plaque, amongst other initiatives '

The library is also part of the Dementia Friendly Alliance and they are looking to obtain funding for signage to make the facility more accessible for those living with dementia.

"We really want it to be a vibrant, social hub," said Suzette. "We hope to get more comfortable seating and perhaps have a quiet reading room. We're also trying to minimise the library's carbon footprint. By putting more things online, we will be able


to reduce printing, as well as efficiently sharing information and encourage people to come in."

"We want the library to be community led. It's your library and we need your support," said Tina.

Charles Webster was a chemist who traded in Main Street during the 1860s. He was highly regarded and many of his clients preferred to consult him rather than gualified doctors. Dr Henry Lewis O'Hara came to Maldon in August 1863 from Ballarat and set up consulting rooms in Webster's store. At the time Webster was recovering from a long illness and was being treated by Dr Thomas McGrath.

On Friday 19 August 1864, in the Tarrangower Times, Webster published, under the heading 'CAUTION', a 'little bill' he had received from Dr O'Hara. In his account O'Hara claimed more than £27 for three consultations each day from August 24 to September 17, 1863. In his paid advertisement Webster said that Dr McGrath was his medical attendant and O'Hara had only offered to attend him as a friend and watch over him as a part of a medical study.

In the next edition of the Times, Dr O'Hara published 'an explanation'. He said that he had attended Webster during a long period of serious illness. It was absurd to claim that he treated Webster as a 'friend' as he had not met or heard of Webster before his first consultation. As Webster was not a qualified medical practitioner, he was not entitled to the traditional courtesy of 'gratuitous services'.

Dr O'Hara also said that his treatment of Webster had not been part of a medical study. O'Hara had spent many years in hospitals, gaols and lunatic asylums researching various forms of disease and did not need to undertake any further studies. O'Hara also claimed that his attendance was not limited to three visits per day but that he had often been with Webster late into the night fearing each hour would be his patient's last.

In his response Webster agreed that O'Hara had been a 'perfect stranger' to him and so there was no reason for him to consult O'Hara. Webster admitted that, while Dr McGrath was treating him, O'Hara had paid him many unwanted visits. However he would have preferred that O'Hara paid more attention to the inmates of Victoria's gaols and asylums.

On Wednesday 31 August 1864 the dispute had a sequel in the County Court. Webster sued O'Hara for the cost of drugs he had provided. O'Hara acknowledged the debt but said that Webster still owed him £27 for professional services.

The case then revolved around O'Hara's bill. Dr McGrath told the Court that even at the height of Webster's illness he had only visited him a few times a week. Judge John Forbes found that Webster was entitled to recover the cost of the drugs but that O'Hara was only entitled to claim fees for one visit per day.



Snakes start to slither out this spring

WITH the weather warming up, snakes are starting to emerge from their winter hibernation to bask in the sun and search for food and a mate.

Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) Senior Wildlife Management Officer, Leila Brook said: "People are starting to see snakes out and about in the Loddon Mallee Region.

"Snake species commonly found in Loddon Mallee include the Eastern Brown Snake (Pseudonaja textilis), the Red-bellied Black Snake (Pseudechis porphyriacus), and the Tiger Snake (Notechis scutatus).

"While these three species are venomous, it is rare for them to bite people. Most snake bites occur when people try to capture or kill a snake.

'Snakes have been known to bite animals, such as dogs, if they feel threatened. If your dog or cat encounters a snake,

the best course of action is to remove your pet from the area or tie it up while the snake passes and if you suspect your pet has been bitten take it to a vet immediately.

"Snakes are generally very shy and prefer to keep away from people and often when a snake is found in a backyard it's because it's moving through the area to another habitat.

"Snakes are more common around the urban fringe or in rural parts of Victoria, but they can also be found close to cities and towns, particularly around watercourses and parkland.

"Whether you're exercising outdoors or gardening, please be aware that snakes may be around, and make sure you're informed about how to react to them if you encounter one," Ms Brook said.

If you live in an area with snakes, please remember:

When left alone, snakes present little or no danger to people.

- If you see a snake, keep calm and move yourself and anyone with you (including pets) away from the area.
- Don't attempt to capture or harm snakes. Instead call DELWP on 136 186 for further advice.
- up around your house, as snakes are attracted to shelter such as piles of rocks and timber, sheets of metal, and building materials.
- Undertake first aid training and ensure your first aid kit contains several compression bandages, and if someone is bitten, call 000 immediately.

Snakes are protected under the Wildlife Act 1975 and it is illegal to harm or kill them or capture them without authority. Reports of people willfully destroying protected wildlife will be investigated by the Conservation Regulator.
