ast week Maldon Primary School received the first of four visits from two very special guests: therapy dogs Archie and Mo, two members of the PAWS in Schools Program.

The school was able to access the program after a recent state government investment of \$217.8 million (over a fouryear period), to support student mental health and wellbeing (including \$200 million over four years and \$86.9 million ongoing funds to create a Schools Mental Health Fund). Rural and regional schools are the first to receive the funding, and they have been given a list of evidence-based programs and initiatives designed to give schools confidence in identifying programs, staff and resources that will improve mental health and wellbeing outcomes for their students.

Maldon Primary School Acting Principal Alisa Burdett said she loves the idea of having a therapy dog in the school, "However, there can be unplanned costs and additional responsibilities with having our own school dog.

'By having the PAWS in Schools program come out, it allows us to still have therapy dogs visit the school without the associated requirements of having our own school dog.

The children have enjoyed the time with the therapy dogs, and we look forward to our next three days with Archie and

of students. It allows for meaningful opportunities for social and emotional learning in both whole class and small group

The use of therapy dogs in schools can assist children to re-engage with onsite learning, help with emotional regulation, social skills and coping strategies. Therapy dogs can also help children to recover from trauma, help cope with mental health and understanding boundaries and consent.

PAWS in Schools Educator Melanie Rundle said, "The scope of our PAWS in Schools program is flexible, ranging from a supporting role in the classroom for specific students to running support group sessions (relaxation, predominantly hands-on

Tarrangower Village energy upgrades

TARRANGOWER Village is investing in the future with a recent upgrade of 15 hot water services.

Taking advantage of the Victorian Energy Upgrades scheme (www.victorianenergysaver.vic.gov.au/save-energy-and-money/victorian-energy-upgrades), energy-efficient heat pump hot water services have replaced the old electric hot water storage systems.

These upgrades were at no cost to residents and came at a fortunate time as energy costs are expected to increase.

According to Sustainability Victoria, the heat pump hot water systems typically use around 60 to 75% less electricity than a conventional electric hot water system. This is because the electricity is used to operate the heat pump and doesn't heat the water directly with an element.

"The systems are excellent", says a Tarrangower Village resident. "My power usage has gone down by more than 15% compared with last year."

In addition to saving money, the heat pump hot water systems reduce carbon emissions and contribute towards a net zero carbon future for Victoria.

Tarrangower Village is an 18-cottage, independent living retirement village, located in the heart of Maldon. It is run by a volunteer Committee of Management – which is seeking new Committee members to join the small team.

Battle for Australia Day



ON Wednesday, 7 September, the Maldon RSL Sub Branch will commemorate 'Battle for Australia Day'.

Why do we do that?

Battle for Australia Day is a commemoration recognising the battles that Australia fought to defeat the Japanese during the war in the Pacific during World War II. Australia was under direct attack between 1942 and 1945. The

Japanese were bombing the coast of Australia, Darwin in the Northern Territory, the coast of Western Australia as far south as Exmouth, and the coast of Queensland down to Townsville. Midget Submarines were seen in Sydney Harbour, and politicians were developing Australia's last line of defence, known as the 'Brisbane Line'.

Back in Maldon the hospital closed its 'blackout curtains' as the evening fell, volunteers sat in a tin shed on ANZAC Hill spotting aircraft, and an air raid siren was installed on the roof of Cooks Garage.

The men of our town signed up to fight this war. They fought in Darwin, Malaya, Borneo, New Guinea and more. Our nurses committed themselves to the defence of our country also and served

Our honour boards and photos hanging on the walls of our hall honour those that served. Some of these men did not return. Children were born never seeing their fathers. Mothers, wives, and siblings watched their family members return, changed men. Some of them would suffer depression, malaria, skin disorders, digestive disorders and more for the rest of their lives. Everyone suffered.

Maldon RSL commemorates the sacrifice everyone made to keep our country safe. We acknowledge how much they suffered and we thank them for their service.

Spring firewood collection season opens

THE designated firewood collection areas in state forests across Central Victoria have opened, with restrictions still in place for some state forests to prioritise firewood for local residents.

Access to Central Victorian State forests is limited to local government areas found within Central Victoria.

Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) Team Leader Values and Assets Planning Amy Groch said firewood collection restrictions introduced at the start of the Autumn season this year would continue, with some designated collection areas restricted to residents of specific local shires.

While firewood is free to collect, supply is not unlimited. This means firewood needs to be managed responsibly to ensure environmental sustainability," Ms Groch said.

"We had a very positive response from community members following the introduction of local restrictions

in Autumn. Thank you to everyone who has followed the rules."

Firewood can only be collected during Autumn from 1 March to 30 June and Spring

WALKING TOGETHER towards Makarrata

A Journey Towards Solidarity - Janet Phillips

Makarrata = 'coming together after a struggle, facing the facts of wrongs and living again in peace.'



I would like to Acknowledge the Traditional Custodians, Elders past, present and future of Djaara Country, on which I write this. I also Acknowledge other Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who live on this land, or who are reading this. I was born on GunaiKurnai Country, my ancestors are primarily of English origin and my two sons were born on Djaara Country.

I think my journey of solidarity really started in the early 1990s when with friends we became early supporters of the Pay the Rent campaign, and we were invited to join in on Invasion Day commemorations. We dressed up as convicts, went aboard a tall ship in Port Philip Bay, launched a longboat and landed on St. Kilda Beach. We were met there by local Boon Wurrung and Wurundjeri people, spears at the ready. Our (role-playing) Commander kindly requested and was given permission to come ashore, where we were warmly welcomed by local people. As newcomers, we signed a pledge to honour this Country and the people of this Land.

On moving to Djaara Country in the mid-90s.

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local treasure Vic Say introduced me to Reconciliation Learning Circles, self-directed exploration of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture and history, of colonisation and the impacts of racism on our countrymen and women. As a small group at Castlemaine Community House, we created a safe space to challenge one another and to learn what Reconciliation could actually mean for us. One community activity our group initiated was Women's Story-telling Day. We invited local female Aboriginal Elders to share their stories with us as together we created a large wall hanging to represent our connection to Country, local lore and people. It was displayed in Green Goes the Grocer for many years.

In the early 2000s my sons were in the Community Class (a multi-age parent-guided classroom) at Winters Flat Primary School. We were very fortunate to have Elder Aunty Julie McHale as our Lead Teacher. Aunty Julie's generous offerings and teachings deepened our knowledge of local country and our connections to local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

Tatts



In 2012 our family took a year to travel through the Central Desert and Top End, finally arriving in Gapuwiyak, Northeast Arnhem Land NT. The boys enrolled in school and my partner and I took on community development roles. Later I also developed another project where I mentor a local woman, Minay Wunungmurra, to manage a whole of community Nutrition and Wellbeing program. We had fun creating community events like Family Cooking Competitions and Women's Bush Camps, all underpinned by the ever-present nature of health issues in remote communities. Over these eight years, Minay has become a respected local authority on Yolngu nutrition and is about to take on mentoring the program herself.

In 2019 I started work in Darwin developing a social enterprise that works sideby-side with remote Aboriginal Corporations to build both-ways capacity in social and human services delivery. And now, I am back in Castlemaine, a member of the Friends of Nalderun and part of a group hosting Self Reflection Conversations in Castlemaine. These are facilitated

conversations for those who wish to become good allies to First Nations people, to reflect on white privilege, racism and decolonisation.

I have found in my relationships and conversations with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, that an open hand is always extended; I always hear 'We can do this together, my sister'. I believe this open hand is linked to an open heart and an open mind and I aim to embrace this in my journey toward being a good ally. As we collectively move closer to enlivening the Uluru Statement from The Heart and making real Voice, Treaty, Truth, I invite you to consider how you too can become an ally. All you need to do is to start somewhere and follow it everywhere.

Winery Macedon Ranges 2019

Pinot Noir

Macedon Ranges consistently been very well regarded for its Pinot Noir and for good reason. Arguably Australia's coldest grapegrowing region, it is cold by world viticultural standards and

produces wines that have much in common with the cooler regions of France.

This wine was made using traditional methods including open vessels and wild yeast fermentation, with hand-picked fruit from a variety of clones in Hanging Rock Winery's 'The Jim Jim' Vineyard.

Wetter than average spring for Australia's east

THE bureau expects a wet spring for most of the eastern half of Australia with a high chance of above-average rainfall.

The Spring 2022 Climate and Water Outlook, released this week, reflects several climate influences, including a negative Indian Ocean Dipole event to the west and the chance of a La Niña returning this spring increasing to around 70 per cent.

Bureau of Meteorology senior climatologist Dr Lynette Bettio said, "Where soils and catchments are wet, and

streamflows are high, further rainfall this spring will increase the risk of flooding for eastern Australia."

"In northern Australia, the first rains of the wet season are likely to be earlier than normal for much of Queensland and the Northern Territory."

October is the official beginning of the wet season across northern Australia.

Further, Dr Bettio said a positive Southern Annular Mode (SAM) is also likely, which pushes weather systems south, bringing wetter easterly

winds to NSW and fewer cold fronts to western Tasmania.

Dr Bettio said parts of Western Australia and western Tasmania are likely to experience below-average rainfall this spring.

Almost all of Australia is likely to experience warmer than average nights, while cooler days are likely for large parts of the mainland except the tropical north.

We encourage communities to keep up to date with the official forecasts and warnings on the bureau's website and BOM Weather app.

Healthy Soils Project seeks local farmers

MOUNT Alexander Sustainability Group's Healthy Soils team is looking for commercial farmers with soil issues within a 50-60km radius from Castlemaine.

This Healthy Soils Project offers the opportunity for 20 participating farms to receive free soil constraint assessments and soil testing, as well as assistance with developing a soil health management and monitoring plan. Participating farmers will also be invited to help road-test planning tools and information resources developed under the project. The focus of the project is to provide farmers with practical ways to benchmark current soil health constraints and plan and monitor how their soil is responding to farm practices aimed at building and maintaining soil health and farm productivity.

Over the next two years, field days will be held on local farms already working to build and maintain healthy functioning soil. Dates and locations for field days in September will be announced shortly.

This project is funded by the federal government's Smart Farms Small Grants: Soil Extension Activities program through Mount Alexander Sustainability Group and Federation University. Bill Grant, Research Fellow at Federation University, will head the project, along with MASG's newly appointed Healthy Soils project officer, Mikaela Becklev.

"We're focusing on how farmers can cost-effectively benchmark their current soil constraints, plan practical and cost-effective ways to rectify these constraints, and then monitor changes in soil performance without the need for frequent laboratory testing of soils", says Bill. "Laboratory tests are useful and should be undertaken as needed, but there are fairly simple field and 'kitchen table laboratory' tests, as well as precision farming and nutrient management tools, that can help farmers monitor and manage their soil all year round."

The aim is to have a diverse range of participating commercial farms within the region, including grazing, cropping, orchards, groves and vineyards, market gardens, 'Conventional', 'Regenerative', and 'Organic'. A small landowners network for those farming for some income on smaller, more 'lifestyle' properties will also be supported by the project.

"We used to go to the hospital to talk to the residents and keep them company. I've missed this, and I think being a pen pal is a good idea to keep in touch with them."

With an enrolment of 80, from Prep through to grade 6, all students know each other at the school and often join together for games during class and play times. Downball, soccer and chasey are always favourite games in the playground, and there is usually a mix of age groups participating together. Students look out for each other and help each other in the yard. Maldon Primary School is definitely a community within the wider Maldon community, and we love it!

Spring firewood collection season opens

from 1 September to 30 November.

"Designated firewood collection areas are selected for a range of reasons including the availability of firewood, community safety, and to protect sites of cultural and environmental significance," Ms Groch said.

"You are only allowed to collect two cubic metres per person per day. You can only collect a total of 16 cubic metres of firewood per household per financial year.

"Most people do the right thing and stick to the collection limits and local restrictions; however, authorised officers will be patrolling parks, forests and reserves to catch those who aren't.

"Firewood collectors may be asked to prove their residential address when collecting firewood.

"Please be aware of the environment around you at all times and the safety of others when in state forests; trees may fall or drop limbs without warning."

Know Your Local - Anne Borg - Part One



☆ Anne at 16 years old.

I am not sure how one person can fit so much into 89 years of living! Anne has experienced so many losses, difficulties and achievements throughout her life. It was impossible to condense her life, so this Know Your Local will be a two-part series.

"I was born in Perth; I love the Perth weather and miss it. We usually go gold detecting in Kalgoorlie with friends every year, but unfortunately we didn't get to go this year due to COVID. I found a 19-ounce nugget on my 82nd birthday at 8am. I was detecting with six men, and no one found anything except me, because I'm fastidious. I sold it for \$36,000. They're now calling that track 'Annies Track'.

My mum was blinded when I was born; the doctors did it to her. She had glaucoma (we didn't know much about what happened, but my brother Ernest, an ophthalmologist, had a lot to do in detecting glaucoma and handling it better). Her irises were cut, and the wrong medication was applied; thus, she was left blind in one eye and left with a part smokey section in her second eye, but was unable to see much else.

Ernest wanted to fix Mum's eyes, so he became an ophthalmologist. He is an amazing man. He's one of the first ophthalmologists to be sent by the government to India and Africa. He never was able to fix Mum's eyes. He's the second oldest. He's 94 years old now. We're the only two left out of seven siblings. He's written a book about our lives.

I'm writing my own story now that I want to turn into a book one day. I talk about growing up in a very deprived family with the most beautiful, loving parents. People used to talk about the Finkelstein family being such a united, loving family.

Our grandparents were Orthodox Jews who lived in Russia. They left and walked for two years, all the way to Israel. Our dad was left in an orphanage. His father and stepmother moved to Perth, and when he was 14 years old, he moved with them. He was never accepted by his step-mum, and they put him in a shed as a farm hand. He had to catch brumbies and sell them to make money.

Then he heard about this lady that had also come from Israel; neither of them had any English nor education. Her dad wouldn't allow him to marry her as he had no money and did not speak English. So my dad entered a competition, riding a bucking bronco. He won 150 pounds, and after that, her dad said he could marry (my mum) and gave him a block of land.

My parents didn't have it easy. They moved to York before moving to the heart of Perth. We lived in a hovel behind a shop; we had no clothes, no underwear, no shoes and dad was always gone, travelling into the bush to try to sell goods and fresh food to farmers.

I was the fifth child and the first girl. I never saw my brothers until dinner time; they were always selling papers before and after school. I was treated so differently from the boys. My sister and I would get up in the morning (Mum would be off washing), and we'd make our own sandwiches and grab a weet-bix and walk to school. Mum was too busy to do my long hair. I remember searching and searching for a pair of panties to put on, and often went to school without any. As Orthodox Jews, we were persecuted. Every day I'd be running home from school, and we'd have rocks thrown at us and be beaten. The quickest way home was over a gate in the back lane, over our picket fence and to safety.

I spent a lot of time doing the housework and looking after my baby brother. I was eight years old when he was born, and I was 11 when he died of diphtheria. I was his little mother.

Our mum filled the whole backyard with vegetables. She was an amazing woman, with fortitude, which she gave to me.

Then when I was 13 years old we moved to Hollywood in Perth, where my parents brought a shop, before moving to

My brothers had moved to Melbourne, so when I turned 17, I moved in with them. It was the first time I'd ever had a bedroom. Mum put me on a sewing machine when I was four years old. At 12 years old I needed bras, we were so poor, so I tried to make my own. It didn't work. I did start teaching myself to sew other clothes.

The third brother, Max, did an apprenticeship with Mussolini's tailor in Melbourne. He took me to a men's gabardine coat factory and told them I was experienced. They soon learnt that I wasn't. But within three months, I was the sample hand - because I was a perfectionist.

I worked up and down Flinders Lanes; there were hundreds of warrens of factories with all kinds of garments.

When I got married, my brother bought me a big sewing machine. Unfortunately, I married a man who was very lazy and unable to provide me with adequate money to live on. We had two children together. I was very sick all the time, and we were very poor. I remember one time, going to the shops with five shillings and buying a spine bone and doing the best I could with it.

My husband ran up gambling bills and I'm not argumentative, so I just took what he gave me.

We moved to Wonga Park, where my husband got a job training seeing eye dogs at 12 pounds a week, and a free cottage to live in with no amenities. We had our third baby. We were only there three months, and then the bushfires came. It was February 22, 1962. That morning he (my husband) went to Melbourne and took the car. I was on my own on a 10,000-acre reserve with a five-month-old baby, a four and five-year-old boy, and a dog and bird.

I had a big English pram, so I put the animals in the pram with my baby and struggled down the unmade gravelly road and walked to the next farm. I remember it was so hot, and we were all in shorts. I wet the baby's nappies, and I was going to put the children in the dam, but suddenly my husband turned up with the car. He didn't even talk to me, just ran to our house with 17 other men

I was in shock. I'd spent hours and hours on my own with the children, with the smoke, the black sky and the sound of screaming horses.

Then this man came in a massive dairy truck and lifted the pram up and ran. Three minutes later, the fire came through. We lost everything. The man drove us to Croydon. A taxi driver I knew took us to Melbourne, to my sister's. We were black and stank of smoke, and when my sister saw us, she put her arms out and grabbed me.

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
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Uniquely Newstead



Blast from the Past

THE BARINGHUP BOYS



On Friday, October 26 1917, the ladies of the Baringhup Red Cross Society, headed by Mrs Elizabeth Bell and Miss Gwen Phillips, held a dance and concert at the Baringhup Library Hall. The most important part of the evening was the unveiling of the Baringhup district honour board. The board was the gift of Cr Thomas Bell, a long-time representative of the Baringhup riding, who had been Maldon Shire President in the previous year.

The honour board, described as 'a beautiful piece of work', was made of Australian blackwood and inscribed in gold lettering. The top of the board read, 'Baringhup Boys who served the Empire in the Great War 1914-191'. As the War was still in progress its end date could not be included. Below the heading, in two columns, were the names of 64 local men who had enlisted.

The board was fixed to the wall behind the hall's stage. On the night, it was covered by two large Union Jacks until it was time to unveil it. Maldon Shire President, Cr John Bowen, as the chairman for the night, thanked Cr Bell for his generous gift and said that the community could not do too much to recognise the deeds of their boys.

Bowen then called on the MLC for Maryborough, Alf Outtrim, to unveil the board. Outtrim said he performed the ceremony with mixed feelings. He was proud of the local men who were doing their duty, but as someone who had 28 relatives on active service, he realised that it was the mothers of these soldiers who were making the greatest sacrifices. He hoped that the Allied armies would soon prove victorious over Germany. The unveiling of the honour board was followed by a concert and supper.

It should be noted that the honour board was not produced at the end of the Great War, but while the worst of the fighting was still taking place. This is perhaps emphasised by the fact that the Baringhup State School had unveiled their honour board a month earlier. Neither of the boards seemed to have later included those who enlisted in the last year of the War.

The 'Baringhup Boys' honour board probably hung in the Baringhup Library Hall until the 1950s, when it may have been removed prior to the sale of the hall in July 1958. What then became of the board is unknown. Only the top of the board survives. It is currently in the Baringhup Hall supper room along with the Baringhup School board.

My brother Max, the tailor, took me in for three months and taught me tailoring (I was a dressmaker). Max was always there for me. He taught me everything; how to drive and use tools.

After three months, Max helped organise for me to buy a government house in Heidelberg for 11,000 pounds. It was a three-bedroom house and was unfurnished.

I put a sign in the window, 'sewing'. Every few days, my sister-in-law would arrive with a big bag of repairs for my brother's business. I'm pretty sure I pegged (took in) every boy's pants in all of Heidelberg!

I wrote to the government, asking for a sewing machine, and they sent me a house full of furniture and an old treadle sewing machine. After a while, Max helped again and gave me a big industrial

I remember there were massive piles of dirt all around the house, leftover from when they dug the sewerage, and I moved it all myself, using nothing but a cardboard box.

I worked for my brothers at the Heidelberg house for five years. I asked them to keep all the money in a safe. My husband had never been very good with money, and there were a lot of bills to be paid from things he'd bought. It took me a year to pay off debts my husband had incurred.

In the end, I said to Max, 'I've got to come work in the shop one day a week. I need to see people; I am going crazy all on my own just sewing away.' I had a little Mini Minor, and I would take the kids and pick up my sister and her kids (so four children and two

adults in the tiny mini minor) and I'd drop the kids at Jewish school - Bialik College. I had been granted free education for a while.

When Danny, my second child, was four-years-old, I noticed that he couldn't lift the latch on the car, but Yvonne (who was not even three) could. I'd watch Yvonne walk up the stairs, and Danny would slide himself up backwards. He couldn't even carry my handbag. I realised he was very weak!

He was diagnosed with Muscular Dystrophy. I was told he wouldn't live past 11.

I thought to myself, 'What can I do to force this, to get air into his blood?' We didn't know much about the disease; there were only nine cases of Muscular Dystrophy in Australia at the time.

I worked out that every mouthful that I gave him counted. I'd give him six Vitamin E tablets a day, plus other vitamins and good protein. He ended up being the oldest person to live with the disease out of all his friends at Yooralla. He got to live to 26 years old.

After he died, my sisterin-law told me, 'We always thought you were being silly with his food.'

Danny was very clever and very quiet. He attended the Yooralla School and his carer found him a job at the Red Cross as their editor. I had taught him to read at a very young age, and he was excellent at English.

My brother Max helped me organise a second mortgage, and I took the seven thousand pounds I had earned working for my brother and bought a house in Bentleigh. Then the bad times started.


