

# Helping those who can't help themselves

ince 2011
Newstead Fire
Brigade has been
raising funds for
the Good Friday Appeal,
raising over \$27,000 for
the worthwhile cause.

Organiser of the event, Newstead Fire Brigade area manager, Christopher Simmins and his wife Cheryl pictured left, have been raising funds for the Appeal since 1977, when they lost their first-born son James (fondly known by nursing staff at the Royal Children Hospital as Jimbo or Little Spartan).

Born premature at 4.3 pounds, James wasn't gaining weight, and doctors were unable to determine why. After a few weeks of feeding him with an eyedropper, James was taken to the Royal Children's Hospital. Seven months later, after a number of surgeries

and living on a respirator, James passed away.

"The staff were wonderful and looked after him beautifully," said Cheryl. "You couldn't stay at the hospital then. We were living in Dandenong at the time and had to travel in every day. It's great that there's accommodation now and a better understanding of people's pain and suffering."

"There have been so many changes to the hospital over the years," said Christopher. "The actual building itself is a fantastic thing and the research is world-class.

"We've come along way. In those times, men were expected to be stoic. People didn't talk about those things, it was 'chin up old chap'. I got a day off for the funeral and then had to keep working. Now





# Letter to the Editor

# Time to hold MPs to account

Dear Mr. Quilty,

We have yet again received an unwanted flyer from you in our letterbox.

Let me explain why it is unwanted.

We understand you are a member personally of Sporting Shooters (who pushed for camping on licensed crown land, which no farmer wants) and of National Shooting Council. However, we understand an MP takes an oath to represent his/her constituents and to avoid real or perceived conflicts of interest.

Whilst we support target shooting, no electorate has more than 2.48% of their voters as duck shooters. Most electorates have between 0 and 0.5%. There's a reason.

Meanwhile, one in four Victorians now live in regional areas. Peace and safety is important to them.

You continue to promote the interests of your hunting lobby mates, who represent less than one per cent of

Victorians, to the detriment of the majority of the rest of us. You are speaking against the wishes of over 6.5 million Victorians who do not agree with the recreational shooting of native waterbirds. Many regional folks are outright seriously disadvantaged by it. You will be familiar with the ongoing professional polls, which show most Victorians want duck shooting banned, as it has been in other states, with the strongest support for a ban coming from regional Victoria (UComms 2021).

Can you advise when the last health and safety risk assessments took place at the thousands of Victorian public lakes, creeks, rivers, reservoirs, wetlands and waterways where unmonitored bird shooting is allowed? Can you say how many of your own constituents live within 200 meters of unmonitored shooting, which goes for months from before sunrise, upsetting children, stock and pets and making it impossible to work from home? Can you tell us what is the cost to taxpayers of having to try and monitor this uncontrollable activity? Or the cost in lost tourism? Or the results of any real cost-benefit analysis? Are you aware of the eye-watering sums of taxpayer money being siphoned to hunting/shooting clubs?

Are you aware of what the statistics say about the value of keeping our wildlife alive? This is a tremendous unique asset we have in regional Victoria.

Our organisation which incorporated in 2018, now has over 5,700 supporters from around the state, many in your region. We would be happy to have a meeting with you to further discuss.

In the interim, if you are appealing for our votes, please fight for Northern Victoria, not just the hunting lobby.

# Fogartys Gap Road upgrade project

MOUNT Alexander Shire Council is intending to reconstruct a 3.5km section of Fogartys Gap Road in Ravenswood South beginning in August 2022. The 3.5km stretch of road being reconstructed spans approximately 1.2km west of the Woodbrook Road and east to Leversha Road.

Council has identified this section of Fogartys Gap Road as requiring treatment, including narrow lane widths, high speed, unsealed shoulders, poor sight distance over crests and poor road signage.

There may be some delays to traffic during this period, and to undertake these works in a safe and efficient manner, traffic management will be required.

Access to affected properties will be maintained during the course of the work.



# Know Your Local - Kath McCann "After a while, I tried acryl-

WINNER of this year's Australian Art Excellence Award in the category of Best Watercolour, with a stunning painting of Nuggetty Hills, Kath McCann's passion for art is infectious as she describes the process of working with watercolours.

"I only started painting in 2000 after becoming very ill. I went to a painting class and realised that painting is like a philosophy of life; it made life wonderfully fun. It's not about what you should do, but about what you want to do.

"Using watercolours is all about the granulation; it's loose. I start with my inspiration and then let the water and paint move on the paper. It can be quite challenging to let it move; it's not controlled; you layer and shape.

"After a while, I tried acrylics, but I found it hard to move; it doesn't have the same lusciousness as watercolours.

"It's really portable, so I can take a small travel kit whenever I want. I often go to the top of Mount Tarrengower and paint.

"Flowers were never really my thing, but since moving to Maldon, I've found myself painting them, and I've got one in this year's Bendigo Arts Show."

Kath and her husband John moved to Maldon last year from Hawthorn. Kath used to come here a lot to paint, and John was here before the last COVID lockdown, staying in a caravan at the Butts to do some gold prospecting.

"When the lockdown was announced, the police told John he had to leave, so he ended up leaving the van in the care of a local. After lockdown ended, we came back up and saw this house for sale. We pulled up, and both said, 'wow!' We fell in love and rang the real estate agent straight away. We'd spent lockdown in a unit with a courtyard, and now we have all this space, light and colour."

Kath, born and raised in Jordanville, went to a primary school with 100 kids in each class, including a lot of refugee children. Kath said, "I

wonder if I ever would have learnt to read and write if it wasn't for my parents reading to me each night.

"A lot of the kids at school were from Latvia and Poland and didn't communicate with words, they'd smile, and I'd smile back. In secondary school, we moved to Malvern, and I was sent to a girls' school, which was a huge change, with only 15 in a class.

"I started teaching music and drama in the 70s when there were huge social reforms, so I worked in small alternative schools in St Kilda, with class sizes of only 18-20 students, and we'd do a lot of exciting, learning-based activities.

"When I resigned from teaching, I went into philanthropy. I was in charge of scholarships in public schools for the Education Foundation."

Both Kath and John are keen to enjoy working in their garden and John, previously a dairy farmer and a protective services officer is busily converting a corner of their shed into an art studio.

# brad hooper

he world has changed in the past two years. No activity has avoided disruption and change. The construction industry has been and continues to be working through shortages of labour and materials. Not even Councils and building surveyors are exempt as lead times on planning, and building permit processing have been greatly extended.

No matter how comprehensive the application documents, these in-trays are full. Similarly, builders' quotes for contracts, once turned around in a reasonably short time to offer a fixed price, are now difficult to nail down.

The traditional project process of schematic design, design development, planning permit application, construction documentation preparation, tendering for a contract price, then contract establishment and signing a contract, all in a straightforward linear flow, is now not happening.

For my architectural services practice, the first three stages up to lodging a planning permit application can be made with some degree of certainty in timing (the exception may be receiving the reports for other consultants for bushfire ratings or land capability assessments). Beyond that delivery, timing has to be flexible. For example, the preparation of construction documentation is now more likely by negotiation, having a builder involved to tailor the design to resources availability. This protracts the preparation time but ultimately assists in saving the client money and time. This is achieved by reducing the risk of contract variations during construction which arise from hastily prepared drawings and specifications that don't take supply issues, construction preferences and resources, and rising costs for particular market segments into account.

Not all doom and gloom, but expectations need to be mellowed to achieve realistic outcomes in this challenging period. Everything is simply taking longer to do.





# How to beat the bite these Easter holidays

AS holidaymakers head north for fresh air these school holidays, Victorians are being reminded that mosquitos are still active at this time of the year.

Mosquitoes carry a range of dangerous diseases, including Japanese Encephalitis (JE) virus and Ross River Virus.

JE virus, which can cause a rare but potentially serious infection of the brain, was detected in Victoria for the first time earlier this year, with nine confirmed human cases to date.

Deputy Chief Health Officer Associate Professor Deborah Friedman said most Victorian cases had spent time in Victoria's north and north-west or southern New South Wales.

'Several Victorian cases had extensive mosquito exposure prior to illness onset, while the majority spent time in the state's north, particularly near the Murray River.'

"There have also been positive detections of the virus in mosquitoes trapped in four sites in Northwest Victoria near the Murray River."

Increased mosquito numbers have been detected along the Murray River, with ongoing mosquito trapping and testing being carried out to help identify high-risk areas.

With an increase of visitors to the region expected over the Easter break, D/CHO Friedman is urging people to enjoy everything the region has to offer but to take simple steps to

"Anyone is potentially at risk of being bitten by mosquitoes, and while most bites will only cause minor swelling and irritation, an infected mosquito carries a higher risk."

Those visiting, living or working in the region, particularly those spending time outdoors, are being reminded of the simple ney can protect themselves from being bitten:

wear long, loose-fitting clothes outdoors.

- use effective mosquito repellents containing picaridin or DEET on all exposed skin.
- try to limit outdoor activity if lots of mosquitoes are about.
- use 'knockdown'fly sprays and plug-in repellent devices
- sleep under mosquito nets treated with insecticides if you don't have flywire screens on windows on your home or are sleeping in an untreated tent or out in the open.
- use mosquito coils, which can be effective in small outdoor areas where you gather to sit or eat.

In my time in the parishes of Maldon and Inglewood I have met a number of people who are at risk of homelessness, whose employment is unreliable, or who are under major stress trying to survive on a pension.

The good news of Easter is that God is not at a distance from our troubles, but has entered into the brokenness of this world.

At Easter, Christians across the world celebrate that Christ died on a cross and rose from death to new life. Through the cross of Christ Jesus, God has defeated evil. In his resurrection, we find the basis of our hope and faith that a new way is possible, and God is remaking the world in His love and justice.

Our communities face significant challenges in the coming years. The rising cost of living is just one of the many issues that we must confront together.

Our church is only small, but we seek to reflect the good news of Easter: that in the midst of the brokenness of this world, through the cross of Jesus, God makes forgiveness, love and hope possible.

Mount Alexander Shire Councillors noted the two plans at their meeting on Tuesday, 15 March 2022.



HAVE you ever had someone say these words to you, 'It

They can be devastating words or could be words of comfort and relief. If said by a shopkeeper having an unbelievable one day sale and you arrived just as the doors had closed, these words would be very disappointing, but if you have been going through extended medical treatment and the doctor used these words in a positive way, then you would be elated. The greatest person who ever lived said, "It is finished". What does that mean, and how should we feel?

As we come to Easter, we think about the crucifixion of Jesus Christ. He was tried for crimes he did not commit, savagely beaten, a crown of thorns forced down, piercing his head; then he was marched through the streets carrying his execution cross while being mocked by a hostile crowd. Arriving at the town garbage heap, Jesus was nailed to his cross, stripped of his clothes, and propped up before a jeering crowd. Jesus remained in that position, suffering excruciating pain, for several hours in plain view of his mother, his friends, his crucifiers and anyone else who happened to go past.

We are told in John 19 v 30 that it was from the cross and in this condition that Jesus said his final words before dying, "It is finished" . In Greek, it is 'Tetelestai'. What did Jesus mean by that? Was it something to be glad about, or was it a statement of devastation and defeat?

At that time the word Tetelestai (it is finished) was written across a receipt when a debt had been paid in full. So, at the point of believing faith, God takes all our sin and lays it on the shoulders of Jesus, while at the same time taking all of Christ's righteousness and wrapping us up in it. Our sin is paid in full. What a transfer! We receive it by trusting in Christ alone.

Jesus' final words from the cross, 'It is finished', are the most important words ever spoken in history, and we all should sit up and take notice. There is an opportunity after Easter to watch an 11-part DVD series which unfolds the story of the Bible from the beginning and will explain exactly what Jesus finished. BLAST FROM THE PAST

THE MERRY-GO-ROUND Maldon's first Easter Fair to raise funds for the Hospital and the Ladies' Benevolent Association was held on Monday, 22 April 1878. A feature of the first Fair was a merry-go-round that did a roaring trade. The owner paid a fee of just £1 10s to operate at the Fair but was said to have taken home more than £30. The Fair's organisers were criticised for not striking

While planning the 1879 Easter Fair, the organising committee sought to hire the Creswick Hospital's merry-go-round.

When told it was not available, committee member Frederick

Cox managed to find another machine and secured it on


