Proposed quarry: more news

THE company proposing to dig a hornfels rock quarry at Bradford, near Maldon, have provided some updated information and encouraged residents to check its website for unfolding news. Some of the issues raised by residents at the community consultation session held at Baringhup in December continue to be followed up by Mawsons Concrete and Quarries.

Mawsons says that discussions with Mount Alexander Shire Council in relation to transport are ongoing and it has engaged consultants to monitor truck movements through Maldon and undertake modelling of traffic from the proposed quarry. Regarding water run-off, a spokesperson from Mawsons said: "Regulations disallow runoff to leave the site. Surface water will be collected and used on site. Stone sediments generated during rainfall events are settled in dams on site." As for dust and airborne pollutants, they said that the company's modelling shows worst-case scenarios and that averages relate to weather patterns and prevailing winds. "Dust levels will be well below EPA requirements," the spokesperson said.

Details in the referral documents in the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation (EPBC) public portal, as reported in last week's *Tarrangower Times* (11 April 2025 edition), indicate that some culturally significant Indigenous places have been observed at the site but are yet to be fully surveyed.

The Mawsons spokesperson clarified: "The quarry pit has been surveyed and designed to fit around two scarred trees. Further surveys will take place, if required, as land for the access roads is developed." They stated that this is standard practice.

In relation to the other environmental impacts reported in the EPBC referral, Mawsons confirmed its plans to implement a range of strategies. "Extensive tree planting will continue with specific habitat established for native birdlife. Tree hollows have already been installed throughout the forest to assist fauna species," they said. "The land will be cleared slowly, with only around 10 ha lost in the first 15 years. This will allow significant habitat to be established before further clearing. Ongoing ecological surveys will also take place throughout the life of the quarry." In general, Mawsons stated that: "Management of the effects of habitat loss will be determined by government."

The *Tarrangower Times* approached the coordinators of the World Heritage bid to ask whether a UNESCO listing would impact or be impacted if the quarry proceeds. A spokesperson replied: "The Victorian Goldfields World Heritage Tentative List sites do not include any areas under consideration for the proposed quarry."

Democracy, Sausage



THE candidates are locked in; more on them later but if you can't wait, check out https://www.aec.gov.au/election/candidates. htm. Meanwhile, the *TT* continues to blab about barbecues, attempting to impart information about the process as Australia prepares to vote in the 2025 election.

The Australian electoral system is often described as a 'two-party' system in which two political parties dominate but it's not entirely true; that would be like vegetarians facing off against meat-eaters at a barbie. In fact, we have a variety of smaller players such as pescatarians, vegans and the hungriest: fruitarians. (That's not even accounting for sub-groups such as halal, kosher, or organic meat-eaters).

It's possible for any of these groups to join forces and make a 'coalition', which is exactly what the Liberal and National Parties have done since 1949 to compete against the Labor Party. And if neither of these two major players, Labor or Coalition, win enough seats in Parliament to form a majority government, it is called a Hung Parliament. They will have to form a 'minority government' by negotiating and teaming up with others to progress their plans and push through laws. There might not be enough vegetarians to keep meat off the grill, but if they team up with the vegans they might exert significant influence over

Sitting members from smaller groups called minor parties, such as the Greens, Socialists or Democrats (and also independents) sit on what is called the cross-bench, where they can have great negotiating power in Parliament because they're not obliged to align with either of the Big Two in debates. That's why it's important to remain friends with the fruitarians — raw fruit may not be the entirety of *your* diet but you may need their help to put the finishing touches on the trifle.

Duck queries prompt website updates

THE water authority that manages Cairn Curran Reservoir has responded to the *Tarrangower Times* about hunting at the site after the government ducked the paper's questions (see last week's edition of Friday 11 April). However, Goulburn-Murray Water (GMW) did not say whether it has any power to exempt the reservoir from the duck hunting season, stating that the State Government's Game Management Authority (GMA) sets the rules around duck hunting season.

The TT asked GMW how potential recreational users of Cairn Curran are to know that duck hunting is permitted and happening now, wondering if there is signage or if particular areas that are off limits for hunters or recreational users of Cairn Curran. A GMW spokesperson said: "Duck hunting is permitted at some GMW-managed lakes, dams and reservoirs, but is prohibited around public recreation areas and GMW assets at these storages. GMW has detailed maps on its website showing people where duck hunting is prohibited at its storages."

The spokesperson pointed to the GMW website and social media channels, saying it uses these to notify potential users of the waterway. Feedback from the *TT* led to an immediate update of alerts on the GMW page about Cairn Curran and upgrade of the associated map.

However, the spokesperson said that, due to the size of Cairn Curran, it was unlikely that recreational users would be impacted by hunting, so signage was not employed in recreational areas such as picnic facilities.

GMW said that it uses "targeted messaging to ensure hunters know where hunting is permitted and what responsibilities people have to ensure recreation areas remain safe and enjoyable to everyone." Information on duck hunting at GMW storages, including Cairn Curran can be found at: **gmwater. com.au/duckhunting**, while illegal behaviour should be reported to 136 186 or via the GMA website: **gma.vic.gov.au**.

Easter bilby news



The Australian alternative Easter emblem, the bilby, is iconic but at risk. Bilbies once occupied much of arid and semi-arid Australia but have disappeared from about three quarters of their historic range. Today they are found only in parts of the Northern Territory, Western Australia, and Queensland, so researchers undertake surveys of remote habitats as part of the conservation efforts. Surveying can be expensive and challenging, but they have found some success by combining Indigenous knowledge with western survey methods, according to a new study led by Charles Darwin University (CDU) in collaboration with the North Tanami Rangers and Traditional Owners from the community of Lajamanu. The study used two different methods to collect bilby scat for genetic analysis - standardised scientific surveys and tracking techniques based on Indigenous knowledge. The study said the results showed combining the two methods more accurately estimated bilby abundance than using either technique individually, meaning an integrated approach was not just more inclusive, but also more precise.

Heritage Walk brings history to life

The Maldon Heritage Network, in partnership with the Maldon Neighbourhood Centre and Plein Air Company, will take a step back in time and take attendees for a walk through the former Maldon government reserve and police

camp on Sunday 27 April and Sunday 18 May. Established as the Police Commissioner's camp by 1854, the area housed the first government buildings of Maldon, a township surveyed on the Tarrangower diggings in the same year. On this walk through history a host of characters will share tall tales (all true!) about the places on site that evidence the life and times of Maldon from the 1850s until now. Take a Heritage Walk on Sunday 27 April 2025 from 2pm to 4pm or Sunday 18 May 2025, 11am to 1pm. The walk is slow and informative, covering about 1km of gently sloping ground, mainly on paved paths, with opportunities to sit and rest. Bookings required, visit: tinyurl. com/bdwc4uy9.



Horsemen win at festival

They had some successes: Toby Collins won his Bull Riding event and Bailey O'Dell won for Bronc Rising, while Flinders Greentree won for Horsemanship and Training. Congratulations all!

Underutilised site to be repurposed

The State Government announced on Tuesday 8 April that it is unlocking and restoring contaminated and underutilised land to create new opportunities for regional communities.

Detailed site investigations are underway at the former mining site on Chum Street, Bendigo to inform future remediation and the healing of Country in partnership with the Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation (DJAARA). Healing Country on the land will deliver long-term benefits for the Traditional Owners, the Dja Dja Wurrung people, and the wider Bendigo community. The community will be kept informed ahead of any planned site activities.

Safety and inclusion for women officials in community sport

Research by La Trobe University has highlighted some of the common barriers faced by female officials in community sport and suggested actions to attract and retain women officials in community sport. The study found that women and girl officials - those who judge, referee, umpire, score or officiate over the conduct of a sport event or game - often faced abuse and exclusion from their male peers, including being told to step aside so male officials could make the call. A new resource called 'Steps to recruit and retain women officials' will be shared with thousands of community sports clubs across the state through the Office for Women in Sport and Recreation.

Police now issue electronic penalties

Minister for Police Anthony Carbines joined Victoria Police on Wednesday 9 April to announce that Electronic Penalty Infringements Notices (ePINs) technology will roll out statewide, allowing police to create and issue electronic penalty notices. Drivers who consent to receiving a receiving an ePin will then immediately receive it via an email or text. This will replace existing paper-based infringements which can take weeks to process before arriving in the mail. The ePINs application will operate through a secure central system and will include information on a driver's offence history, penalty amounts, demerit points and due date calculations - giving police greater visibility on an offender. Upon receiving an ePIN people will have 28 days to either pay

their fine, seek a payment plan or lodge an objection as per the current process.

Police began issuing ePINs from February across Melbourne's south-eastern suburbs as a trial before rolling the system out broadly. During the first six weeks, police reportedly issued more than 5,000 electronic infringements.

Free mental health support for Victoria's Emergency Service workers

Black Dog Institute is offering free world-class mental health support for emergency service workers and volunteers who have been impacted by recent severe weather events in rural and regional Victoria. The National Emergency Worker Support Service (NEWSS), established by Black Dog Institute and UNSW Sydney in 2020, achieves PTSD recovery rates of more than 80 per cent and has reached over 230,000 emergency workers across Australia since its launch.

Nearly one-third (30%) of emergency service workers report experiencing high or very high psychological distress at work, while an estimated 1 in 10 will develop PTSD related to critical incidents. Their work often involves responding to traumatic events such as vehicle accidents, house fires, and medical emergencies, as well as facing potential violence and the escalating impact of natural disasters. Emergency workers in rural and regional areas, particularly those in small, close-knit communities, face even greater risks, with the added emotional strain of assisting people they may personally know.

NEWSS services are accessible to emergency service workers and volunteers across Australia. Clinical services are available in person and via videoconferencing, and the NEWSS team also provides specialised training for local GPs in communities around Australia. In addition to helping those impacted by trauma, the service also offers resources to support mental wellbeing, helping emergency service workers stay resilient and proactive in managing their mental health on the job. Liberals Against Nuclear speak against Dutton's plan

The group Liberals Against Nuclear say that Peter Dutton's nuclear plan would spark an Australian water crisis, potentially sucking a mammoth 200 gigalitres away from farmers in dry years through water buybacks and acquisitions, pointing to a new report by subject matter experts. The report, 'Australian nuclear energy proposals, water availability and acquisition options' was commissioned by Liberals Against Nuclear and authored by former Land & Water Australia chief executive and ANU visiting fellow, Professor Andrew Campbell. It reveals the scale of water acquisitions required to run the Coalition's proposed nuclear reactors by asking how much water would need to be acquired through buybacks or compulsory acquisitions to run them at the seven proposed

Relying on the Coalition's own modelling, the report found that annual high-security water allocation for 200 gigalitres would potentially have to be acquired from farmers and other water users, such as coal mines and urban water supplies, to cool the nuclear reactors. Liberals Against Nuclear say there is no guarantee farmers would give up this much water for sale and that compulsory acquisitions would likely be required. The group says: "This water grab threatens to sever the trust between the Coalition and agricultural communities permanently. We've spent decades building our reputation as champions of farmers' rights

- particularly water access. Why would we throw away that political capital for nuclear plants that most Australians don't want?"

Coalition commits to make agriculture industry safer

Leader of The Nationals David Littleproud said a future Coalition Government would provide \$2.5 million over three years for farm safety by supporting Farmsafe Australia and the delivery of the National Farm Safety Education Fund Strategy. The Coalition said farm safety strategy will be delivered through education and awareness to develop and disseminate educational materials on safety practices; community engagement to facilitate conversations between farming families, industry and government, to ensure a coordinated effort; and a national campaign across various media channels to promote farm safety. It said that improving safety outcomes on farms would also help to address critical workforce shortages by attracting more workers to the

One Nation commits to protect forestry jobs in Victoria

One Nation announced on Wednesday 9 April 20 that it would protect the 17,000 jobs in Victoria's forestry sector as part of its policy to make Australia self-sufficient in timber and help address the national housing crisis. Lead Senate candidate for Victoria Warren Pickering said One Nation's policy would leave old-growth forests and other sensitive areas untouched, but still support limited harvesting of native trees. "Our policies to exempt basic building materials from GST for homes up to \$1 million for five years, and to reduce electricity costs by 20%, will help reduce industry costs." Mr Pickering said. "Trees are the ultimate renewable resource, and forestry is a renewable industry One Nation is more than happy to support. Improving our timber resources is critical to our efforts to increase housing supply. We must plant more trees and become self-sufficient in timber so we don't have to rely on imports from countries with poorer stewardship credentials and exotic pests, and we must also explore innovation in value-adding – such as generating energy from

Labor commits \$4.5 million to Maryborough Pool

Members of the Maryborough Facebook Group didn't know whether to cheer or jeer* at the announcement on Thursday 10 April that Labor, if re-elected, would commit \$4.5 million for upgrades to the Maryborough Olympic Outdoor Pool Complex. Greg Olsen, Labor Candidate for Mallee said it highlights Federal Labor's ongoing commitment to improving regional infrastructure. "The community deserves world-class facilities, and this funding will help us make that a reality. I understand how important these amenities are

for both recreation and community well-being. I look forward to seeing the pool complex transformed for everyone to enjoy."

Coalition launches Regional Australia Future Fund

Leader of The Nationals David Littleproud announced on Thursday 10 April a Regional Australia Future Fund to deliver a guaranteed annual funding stream in perpetuity for regional, rural and remote Australia.

Mr Littleproud said Coalition Government would preserve a portion of commodity windfall receipts towards the establishment of Regional Australia Future Fund to grow the Fund to \$20 billion. Following consultations with local communities, the Dutton Littleproud Coalition identified initial key priorities of the Regional Australia Future Fund including: fixing local road and transport networks; growing the regional health workforce; developing regional industries; delivering flexible childcare solutions for families in regional, rural and remote areas; growing tourism industry opportunities and building or upgrading economic and community infrastructure, facilities and services. The Coalition said the funding stream would supplement, rather than replace, normal government funding across these critical areas where regional Australia faces unique challenges.

Porcupine Village: comment by Tuesday

THE Porcupine Village development has been referred under the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation (EPBC) Act and is available on the EPBC Public Portal for community feedback until Tuesday 22 April. Describing it as a Holiday Park Redevelopment, the owners are 'seeking to develop infrastructure for tourism and accommodation' on 5.2 hectares at 8 Allans Road, Maldon.



Project and Impact

The proposed project is described as including 26 cabins, a petting zoo, plant nursery, camp kitchen, games room, swimming pool, machinery shed, entertainment marquee and museum and will also formalise the car park areas and access ways within the site. These are in addition to the existing historic buildings, a restaurant-café, eight motel units and a manager's residence.

The EPBC Act is the law to protect and manage Australia's significant plants, animals, habitats and places. A referral is a written request for the Environment minister to decide whether a proposed project needs assessment and approval under the EPBC Act. The Porcupine Village referral indicates that there is likely to be impact on Grey Box Grassy Woodland and Derived Native Grasslands of South-eastern Australia ecological community. It says that the proposed project will result in the removal of 2.334 hectares of native vegetation and three small scattered trees.

Habitat Affected

The documentation says that the native vegetation on the site is considered potential habitat for at-risk birds including Brown

Treecreeper (South-eastern), Swift Parrot and Hooded Robin as well as the marsupial Brushtailed Phascogale, saying that its removal may adversely affect these species. Some endangered plants are also indicated to be potentially affected.

The largest threat to native flora and fauna listed in the referral is human activity, particularly since tourist accommodation is the planned use of the site. "This can be in the form of littering, soil compaction from increased vehicle and pedestrian activity, introduction of invasive plants, pathogens and pests, trampling or removal of understory vegetation and collection of timber for the construction of huts, historical demonstrations, media productions and nearby construction."

The referral documents describe recent destruction of native vegetation that had occurred prior to the site assessment, including earthworks, scraping of topsoil, construction of a marquee, use of trees for construction and clearing of land; all of which it says must immediately cease.

In relation to drainage, the referral states that the majority of the site will drain over land as it currently does and will be diverted via grassed swale drains to a new retention dam located on the northeast boundary of the site. It says that stormwater drainage 'should not have any adverse impact' on the natural water course or neighbouring Crown Land and all sewerage from the site will be collected and pumped to Coliban Water's sewer reticulation system.

Community consultation

The documents state that: "The proposal will be advertised to the local community and referred to relevant referral authorities as part of the

planning permit application process" and that a Cultural Heritage Management Plan (CHMP) was prepared for the project area and approved by the CEO of the Dja Dja Wurrung Clans Aboriginal Corporation. The CHMP reportedly did not identify any Aboriginal cultural heritage values "likely owing to a history of disturbance and displacement associated with historic mining and construction of Porcupine Village" but that "the majority of the project area has been identified as an 'area of cultural heritage sensitivity'".

Mitigations

The referral included a number of mitigation actions that the project managers intend to institute to protect the environmental values of the site. They include protective fencing, revegetation using appropriate local species, the installation of nest boxes, controlling of feral predators and the engagement of a suitably qualified zoologist to identify nests or hollows and manage any misplaced fauna.

Two volunteers at the Library offered to accommodate Kerry and her partner David and so we were in full swing. However we had no concept that the event would be so overwhelmingly popular and tickets so sought after. Very soon we had sold all tickets and people were begging us to let them stand around the hall. People came from Melbourne, Geelong, the Mornington Peninsula, Bendigo and many other places.

Kerry's talk was an outstanding success and her support of the Athenaeum was fantastic. She wouldn't take any fee but donated her services to the library.

Since that time I have kept in touch with her exchanging Christmas greetings and letters. Her grandmother had lived in Maldon and I helped her with photographs of the house.

She was a most gracious, clever, funny and generous lady with a wealth of talent. Apart from her success as a writer she was a barrister and solicitor and gave generously of her time working for Legal Aid. Her death a couple of weeks ago leaves a loss in Australia's literary world and to her many friends, but Phryne Fisher and Corinna Chapman live on. Her generosity to Maldon will be remembered for a long time.

Looking back at vintage and fermentation

THE bins are empty. The hoses are coiled. My boots are finally dry and hands are no longer stained purple.

It's a strange feeling—the stillness that follows harvest. After weeks of early starts, sticky clothes and the steady bubbling of fermenters, the quiet is almost loud. But in that silence, something beautiful is happening: the wines are finding their shape.

This year's vintage at Panacea Estate had calm and chaos, ripeness and restraint, old favourites and trying new things. Now that the grapes are pressed and the ferments are settling, I wanted to look back and share what really goes into getting a grape from the vine



There's nothing romantic about 5am starts, purple hands, sticky equipment and continually washing all the equipment. Harvest is the most exhilarating time of the year. It's all hands-on deck—picking fruit at just the right moment, pressing whites gently, managing ferments, checking temperatures, cleaning, cleaning... and then cleaning again.

This year, Mother Nature kept us on our toes. A warm and dry summer pushed ripening much faster than expected. We picked earlier than usual, six weeks earlier than the late picking of 2023. In some varieties to preserve freshness we picked early, while others we waited a little longer and as long as the birds would allow for that extra depth of flavour.

For whites, it's a quick press and straight into a tank, this year we are making a sparkling white as well as a table white. Chilled red was picked early and left with some skin contact. For reds, it's all about skin contact—letting the juice extract colour, tannin and structure from the grape skins during fermentation.

There's a fine balance between control and letting the wine be what it wants to be. Fermentation isn't just science—it's feel. It's intuition. It's checking a ferment regularly because your gut says something may be needed. It's the quiet pride of catching the first whiff of perfume from a ferment that tells you this one's going to be special and catching things that are not going to plan and changing tact quickly before anything negative happens to the wine.

Vintage highlights and lowlights from Panacea Estate

- Shiraz was picked much earlier than last year but still at a baume (sugar content), showing the bold structure and dark fruit we love. Ferments were well-behaved, considering the early pick and warm weather. Taking the fermentation out at night to allow the cooler nights to slow down fermentation and back indoors during the day helped immeasurably.
- Semillion was a great yield with slightly earlier pick intended to make clean crisp whites and good base with for sparkling.
- Cabernet Sauvignon was a disappointment with a small yield turning into nothing worth producing as the birds descended on the vineyard. This is a continual area of learnings for getting better yields and one I hope to improve on next year.

We experimented with a few new yeast strains this year and even trialled a small batch of piquette. The results? So far, they are looking promising; I'll give more on these stories in a future article.

On a personal note, I learn a lot each year and try new things also to continue to learn more; this is a joyful experience. There's something deeply satisfying about putting in the work, trusting the process, and knowing you're creating something people will share at tables, picnics, weddings and lazy afternoons for years to come. While I am still learning so much about the industry and how to make the best products from my little corner of paradise, I thoroughly enjoyed the experience of being tired, sticky and covered in grape skins. I always make sure to try and keep smiling. I love the support provided by all other winemakers in the region that I ask for assistance and creating a better wine region we live in and everyone that has helped as part of vintage.

If you have ever wondered what harvest looks like behind the scenes? We will be having a harvest festival again next year with music, picking, foot stomping and tastings of wine in various stages of fermentation along with the final products from previous years. Mark it in the calendar and make sure to join us; the exact date will be dictated by Mother Nature, however, we will keep you posted as the time comes near.

"Is it alive?"



Sofie Laguna comes to Maldon

THE first time that I heard Sofie Laguna speak, she had just won the prestigious Miles Franklin Award, and I was a fledgling 'dabbler' in the art of writing. I had just clicked over 60 and felt I might have something to say, but was completely at sea as to how to say it. I eagerly distributed my little pieces to family and friends, hoping of course, for vigorous praise. And occasionally, I got it. But it was never enough.

So when the interviewer asked Sofie, "How do you know if what your writing is any good?", I was all ears.

"You don't, that's the torture." she replied. "My personal litmus test for writing is - Is it alive? Is my character alive? Is the story alive? As I allow myself to enter the story, to inhabit it, does this feel alive? If not ... you know what to do. But if I even find one point of aliveness, go there and work with that."

Yes, I felt I knew something of what she meant, but knew too, that I now wanted to read everything that she had written. Sofie's work is among the most awarded writing of current Australian authors. The Eye of the Sheep, Infinite Splendours, The Choke, One Foot Wrong. Each of them an exploration of the beauty and the darkness that can inhabit a life. As she said on that afternoon in 2016, "Writing is a lens. It is life flowing through me passionately".

We are extremely fortunate to have Sofie come and join us at our next Maldon Readers and Writers Group 'in Conversation' event. Once again that conversation will be facilitated by Bruno Lettieri who so wonderfully engaged with Arnold Zable at our first event. Whether you are a writer, or a reader, or both, we invite you to join us in this celebration of Sofie's work.

HAVE you ever wanted to own a piece of legendary Twentieth Century art that has a pop twist? There's a painting by Jean-Michel Basquiat coming up for auction in Melbourne this weekend and if you have a spare few (10 or 100) million dollars kicking around, it could be yours.

If the name isn't familiar, the works might be; Basiquat paintings have been shown in recent years at the National Gallery of Victoria (NGV) in the 'MoMA at NGV' exhibition in 2018 and again in 2019/20 as part of a major exhibition called 'Crossing Lines', where Basquiat's work was shown with that of his friend, fellow street-artist, Keith Haring. The works themselves are bold, scribbly, sprawling: full of fervour and often with a side of

As for the pop connection, that's because Basquiat emerged from the creative soup of Downtown Manhattan in the 1980s. He dated Madonna when she was unknown, hung out with (for example) Blondie as they exploded onto the music scene and collaborated with Andy Warhol, who was king of New York Cool. Sadly, like so many pop luminaries, Jean-Michel Basquiat

shone brightly but quickly and died at age 27 of a heroin overdose. (If you're interested to know more about his life, check out the 1996 film called *Basquiat*, which was directed by another prominent artist, Julian Schnabel).

The painting for sale in Melbourne depicts a boxing figure wearing one of Basquiat's trademark crowns.

Site unveiled for Maldon's Community Battery

Powercor has officially selected a site for Maldon's new battery, with installation at Adair Street to get underway soon.

Powercor had investigated multiple sites and had identified Adair Street as the most suitable based on feedback from neighbouring properties, the visual impact and reliability benefits it would deliver for the local electricity network.

The location was chosen after months of engagement and feedback from resident locals around multiple proposed sites and is the best position for residents, township amenity and also network suitability.

Powercor's Head of Network Program Management, Andrew Bailey, emphasised the battery's role in helping locals make the most of their solar generation.

"This will help keep Maldon's solar power in Maldon," Mr. Bailey said. "The battery will soak up people's excess solar during the day, giving it a place to go, before discharging later in the day when demand rises."

39% of residential customers in the local area already generate their own solar power — far exceeding the network average of 28%.

The 100kW / 290kWh battery will store excess rooftop solar energy and supply up to 50 nearby properties during peak periods for up to three hours.

This project is jointly funded by Powercor and the Australian Government's Community Batteries for Household Solar program, this battery is set to make a real difference for the town.

The next step for the Maldon community will be selecting artwork for the battery enclosure. Powercor will present two design options online and in person, inviting locals to have their say so watch this space. The battery is expected to be operational in the first half of 2025.

Her exhibition titled *This Place* was opened by Naomi Cass, Director of the Castlemaine Art Museum, at 2pm last Saturday 12 April. There was a very large crowd listening intently to Naomi's words which concluded with her calling Gabrielle the *Master of Malmsbury*. The day before the opening I had the honour of talking to Gabrielle about her work, which includes portraits, landscapes, and still life.

Gabrielle said that since graduating from the Victorian College of the Arts, with a Bachelor of Arts and a Graduate Diploma in Fine Art (Painting), she has been painting constantly for 32 years. And, that this exhibition represents three years of work since her last exhibition in 2022 at the Castlemaine Art Museum.

Gabrielle has a very impressive list of solo exhibitions, selected group exhibitions, grants, awards and residencies, publications and reviews, as well as receiving public commissions and being represented in many collections.

I was intrigued with the fact that Gabrielle said that when she is painting a portrait, it can take some months to complete with up to eight sittings so that she really gets to know and understand her subject well, as you can see in the portraits of *Martine in the Garden* and *Thea*. She may do drawings as reference, but the sittings, which include preliminary drawings,

Her landscape paintings are inspired by daily walks around her home, along the Coliban River and in the fields surrounding it. Gabrielle said that, "This is remnant pastoral land of dry grass and weathered pines, once planted as windbreaks. Recent projects have reintroduced wirilda, eucalypts and blackwood, and these shrubs coexist with wild fruit trees, gorse and blackberries, which resist all efforts of containment."

"Although it is an embattled landscape, I am struck by moments of great beauty. The landscape is continuously transformed by light, as day moves to night and seasons change. I sketch and take colour notes and then develop these impressions freely in the studio, searching out colour equivalents for the feelings invoked. I am drawn to the 'in-between' light of dusk and dawn, where the firm boundaries between objects soften and nature is more easily sensed as a living, breathing unity."

In other words, what photographers and film-makers refer to as the magic hour. In some of her works, such as *Pines with Moonrise* you can almost imagine the grass moving. Her work is not literal as it combines her inner vision with the outer reality and is more dream-like.

Gabrielle is inspired by the poetic mystery of a place, rather than pragmatic reality. She starts a painting with a wash of burnt sienna which she builds on with a playoff between warm and cool colours. If you study *Medlar Tree in Autumn* you can see what she has done quite clearly.

Her Still Life with Three Quinces illustrates how she captures the transience of objects from the garden while taking time to sit and look at them. As Gabrielle said, she enjoys the things for themselves, and her paintings are a celebration of humble things.



Natural Newstead

Marauders arrive in force

The weather has cooled appreciably and autumn has well and truly arrived, albeit without more than a drop of rain.

Newstead locals will have noticed the crescendo of noise over recent days as large numbers of Pied Currawongs have arrived from their breeding haunts along the Great Divide. While a few individuals remained over summer the mid-autumn influx is to be expected and numbers seem to be increasing each year. These curious and clever birds are omnivores and will feed on garden fruits as well as large insects such as moths and phasmids, and even the occasional house mouse.

Sulphur-crested Cockatoos are with us year-round and outside the breeding season form into small, roving flocks feeding on fruits such as olives and hawthorn.

BLAST FROM THE PAS

Frederick Moss's campaign

IN 1891 Victoria fell into an economic depression following the excesses of the 1880s land booms.

When a banking crisis developed in 1892 the liberal Premier William Shiels cut expenditure and raised taxes, which only made things worse. Shiels was eventually forced from office in 1893 and was replaced by MLA for Castlemaine James Patterson and a conservative ministry. The economic crisis however worsened and Patterson was forced to call an election for the Legislative Assembly in September 1894.

Three candidates put their names forward for the seat of Maldon. They were the sitting member, conservative John McIntyre, James Curnow (a Bendigo accountant and real estate agent) and Frederick Moss, an orchardist

On Friday 7 September Moss opened his campaign at the Temperance Hall, (now the Community Centre). He said he was a true independent who, unlike the other candidates, lived in the district. Moss promised to represent all constituents whether they were a millionaire or a swagman. He said that the Patterson ministry, which included McIntyre, had no ideas or policies but, like Charles Dickens' character Micawber, were waiting for 'something to turn up'. Meanwhile Victoria's debt had increased to over £4 million.

Moss proposed that expenditure cuts start at the top. The Governor, Lord Hopetoun's, salary should be reduced to £5,000 and if he did not like it, Hopetoun should be sent back to London. Similarly the salaries of the Premier and all ministers should be cut and the number of seats in the Legislative Assembly should be reduced. Moss said he believed in politicians being paid but they should live in their electorates. He promised to have an office in Maldon and be available each week to meet with his constituents.

Regarding taxation, Moss said it should fall on the rich as well as the poor. While he supported an income tax, there should also be a wealth tax or, more simply, a land tax. Squatters such as Sir William Clarke and the Chirnside family held vast areas of vacant land, which if taxed at a penny per acre, could quickly reduce the deficit. Moss also said even higher land taxes should apply to absentee landholders. He was in favour of abolishing import duties on tea and sugar but would support the continuation of tariffs provided they encouraged local industries.

When questions came from the floor, Moss said he supported women's suffrage. Women were expected to obey the law, and if a 'lazy loafer' could vote, why not a sensible woman? He was also in favour of Federation and 'one man, one vote'.

Another candidate, James Curnow, was present and said it would be disastrous if both he and Moss opposed McIntyre. He asked for the meeting to vote on who should stand against McIntyre, but Moss declined to consider his proposal. Later, following a meeting with his supporters, Curnow withdrew from the contest. Eventually Moss lost the election but did gain a majority of votes in the town of Maldon.





Has Anyone Seen Charlotte Salter? by Nicci French, 2024

On the day of Alec Salter's 50th birthday party, just before Christmas 1990, his wife Charlotte vanishes. Most of the small English village of Glensted is at the party for hours before anyone realises Charlotte is missing. While Alec brushes off her disappearance, their four children, especially 15-year-old Etty, grow increasingly anxious as the cold winter hours become days and she doesn't return. When Charlotte's coat is found by the river, they fear the worst. Then the body of the Salters' neighbour, Duncan Ackerley, is found floating in the river by his son Morgan and Etty. 

Weed Watch

Paterson's Curse (aka Salvation Jane and Riverina Bluebell)



Botanical Name: Echium plantagineum

Weed Classifications: Paterson's Curse is a declared noxious weed in Victoria and a Regionally Controlled (priority) weed in our Nth. Central Catchment area.

Where did it Come From: Paterson's Curse, a native from western and southern Europe, was introduced into Australia as a garden plant for its attractive purple flower, by a settler near Albury in the 1850s. It was well established in Victoria by 1858, only 8 years later.

What Does it Look Like: Paterson's Curse is an annual herb which grows up to 120 cm high. After autumn rains it establishes a ground level rosette with paddle-shaped leaves, then develops several erect stems which are covered in hairy bristles. The plant is distinguished by its very attractive, trumpet-shaped, purple-blue flowers which form in Spring. However, the seeds have a longevity of more than seven years and an ability to germinate at any time of year, given the right conditions.

Why is it a Problem: Paterson's Curse is one of the most invasive weeds in Australia. It is a very competitive and dominant species in a range of habitats, with whole landscapes covered with its purple-blue flowers. It smothers and reduces native plants and reduces native biodiversity in local bushlands,

thereby affecting native birds and animals by altering their habitat and displacing essential food plants. In Victoria, it is considered a potential threat to two threatened native plant species listed under the Victorian *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act 1988*. In addition, the plant contains toxins that can be poisonous to livestock, especially if eaten in large quantities.

How does it Spread: Paterson's Curse produces copious seed, with seed production of up to 12,000 seeds per square metre in a single year. Seeds are dispersed by wind and water and often transported in soil and fodder grain, by vehicles and in the fur and manure of livestock.

Spread: Paterson's Curse is an extremely widespread weed throughout temperate Australia, occurring along roadsides, in bushland, in pastures and crops and in disturbed soils. It is now so widespread; it's often also found growing in domestic gardens, including throughout our Maldon-Baringhup area, in farm paddocks, in Maldon Historic Reserve and in private gardens.

How can it be Controlled: Please ensure you don't have this introduced plant in your garden or on your property. Isolated plants can be pulled out, and if flowering, should be double-bagged and sealed, then disposed in domestic waste or land fill (as the seeds will continue to mature even after the plant has been removed from soil). Registered herbicides should be applied in June-September to large infestations at the seedling or rosette stage when the plant is actively growing. There are also three effective biological control agents; the root crown weevil, the taproot weevil and the flea beetle, which have proved highly successful in reducing the density and abundance of Paterson's Curse and should be considered as an additional control method in an ongoing management plan.

We can dance if we want to



DAVID Skinner is a beloved legend in the town of Maldon but many residents would not recognise him if they bumped into him in the street. Unless, of course, the street were Maldon Main Street with David leading hundreds of people in joyous dancing abandon! He's the name and character behind one of the most popular traditions of Maldon Easter Fair: Dancing in the Street.

The *Tarrangower Times* caught up with David to find out how it all started and how he keeps busy in between Easters. The truth is that he can't remember how long the event has been running. "I started when I had dark hair and now I've got grey hair," David laughed, reminiscing about origins at a bush-themed birthday party for the Waller family that he thinks was more than 30 years ago. "We used to plug into the Waller Realty office on the corner; I'd just take up some speakers and a table, there were about 20, maybe 50 people. And then it just grew and grew, so they put me on a small trailer, but that bounced up and down so I moved to a truck." At its pre-Covid peak, David says the Dancing in the Street

event attracted up to 1,000 people.

It's obvious that David is an absolute master of what he does and that's because he has been dancing since he was 11 years old. "I started ballroom dancing in the children's class, we went into some basic competitions and we went pretty well as juveniles and juniors, we were local champions," he explained. "There was the Commonwealth Society of Ballroom Dancing — we won that in our field — and then the Victorian Championship and the Australian Championship in Ballroom Latin, like what you see on Dancing with the Stars." Soon after, David became a dancing teacher. "I loved the idea that you're sculpting something, you're creating something, so I honed those skills and became a professional teacher at the age of 21." He runs his own dancing school and has been running regular classes in various venues around Melbourne for many years.

David explained that his philosophy around teaching makes dancing fun and accessible. "Everyone that's in front of me is successful; they're not competing against one another. Everyone's good at it and then it builds confidence," he explained. "So that's the philosophy — Everybody Can Do."

Despite the amount of fun and joy it generates, David takes Dancing in the Street very seriously and cannot name a favourite dance. "If I get a reaction from the crowd, that's my favourite moment for the night." And yes, it is as tiring as it looks: "I'm exhausted but I can keep going because of the crowd". David described the happy 'high' that he feels after a night in Maldon, saying that he struggles to sleep for hours afterwards. "And the next day, I'm still high but I am walking like an old man!"

Maldon's Dancing in the Street is unique, special and a total hoot. It's suitable for the whole family and full of familiar

favourites like the Macarena, Nut Bush, Chicken Dance and the Heel-Toe Polka. David guides the crowd through every step and it doesn't matter if you get it wrong. Bring your friends, even if they don't dance!

Drink, Snack, Sunscreen, First Aid Kit, Hat, Walking Boots or Shoes


